START HERE

A high density floppy disk can contain about 1.4 megabytes of software, but we want to bring you as much as possible every month. Therefore, we use compression programs to reduce the files in size so we can fit more on – this month there's well over three megabytes worth. Unfortunately, this means you can't use the programs straight off the disk. You must install them on your hard disk first.

Doing this is very simple. Just double-click on the floppy disk icon, then double-click on the MACFORMAT 19 icon. A copyright message appears. Click Continue. A box then appears that asks you where you want to save the contents of the disk. Choose the place on your hard disk where you want everything stored and click Save. After a couple of minutes or so of frantic disk activity, the files will be stored on your hard disk.

Before installing the cover disk we recommend that you back up any important work on your hard disk. This sensible precaution will avoid problems should any software not be compatible with your setup. We make every effort to check our disks for compatibility and viruses, but the information here is intended as a guide only, and MACFORMAT cannot be held responsible for any damage to data, any inability to use this software or any consequential losses. So please, for your own sake, back up first.

In these energy conscious days we all have to do our bit to save electricity. Here's a simple

GETTING YOUR BACK UP

Before you do anything else, you should make a backup of the MACFORMAT COVER disk and work only with the backup – just in case anything does happen to go wrong. Make sure the original cover disk is write-protected (move the tab so that you can see through the hole). Then nothing can be written to the disk. After that, follow these simple steps:

1. Insert the MACFORMAT COVER disk.
2. Drag the disk's icon over your hard disk's icon. The contents of the cover disk will then be copied into a new folder on your hard disk called 'MACFORMAT 19'. It's still not decompressed, however, so you can't

yet run anything directly.

3. When the copying finishes, drag the cover disk icon into the Wastebasket to eject it.
4. Insert a blank high density disk. Check that it's not write-protected and if need be format it, naming it 'MACFORMAT 19 backup' (or 'Fred' if you want. It doesn't matter).
5. Drag the 'MACFORMAT 19' folder from your hard disk on to the new floppy disk's icon. When it has finished copying, your backup is complete.
6. You can now delete the 'MACFORMAT 19' folder from your hard disk by dragging it across to the Wastebasket, and selecting 'Empty Wastebasket' in the 'Special' menu.

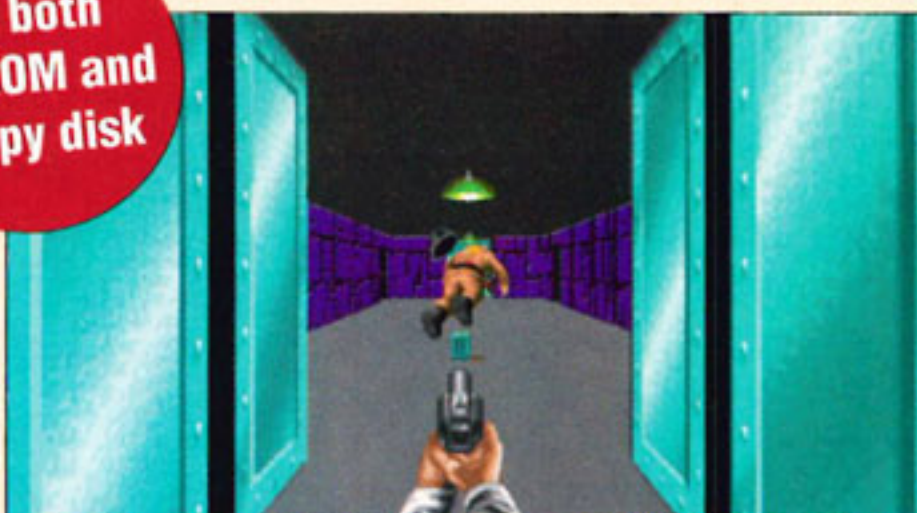
Wolfenstein was a huge seller on the PC and now this brilliant game has been

much else (I haven't found a mirror yet).

You can move around this world with the keyboard. On the numeric keypad, 4 and 6 rotate you left and right, while 5 and 8 move you backwards and forwards. To shoot, press

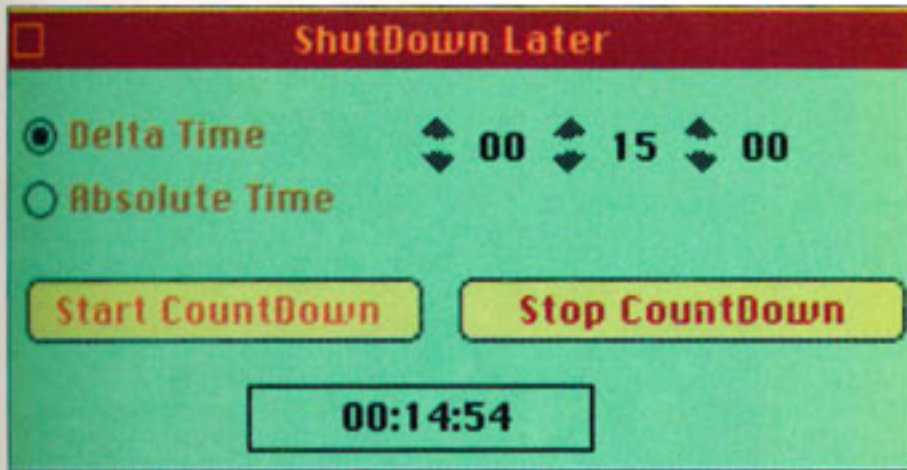

freeware program from Switzerland to help. If you have to leave your Mac completing a task but want it to close down when it's finished, *Shutdown Later* (as its name suggests) will handle that task for you.

You can set it up to close down at a specific time, say 12.30, or a relative time, maybe in 20 minutes. This can be particularly useful if you're connected to a network, because there will be occasions, such as when you go home, when you need to leave your machine on for a while so that other people can access it.

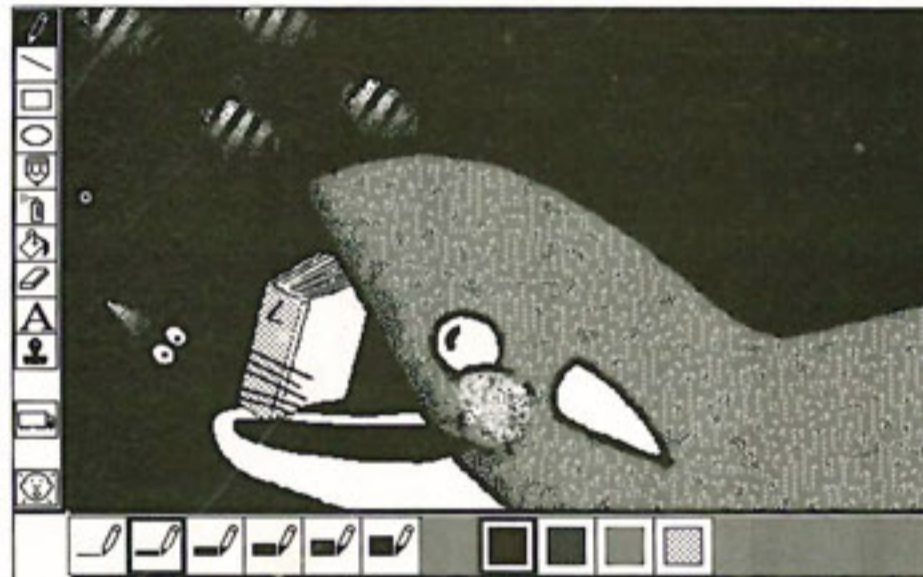

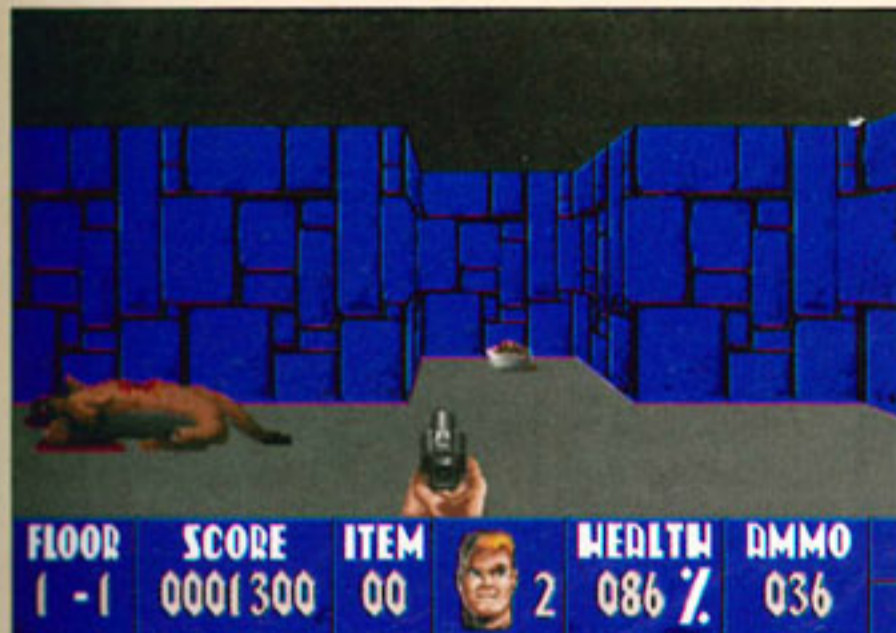
Customising your Mac may not hold quite the same street cred as customising a '68 VW Beetle, but many of us still like to make our Macs personal. And I don't mean with little stick-on fluffy gonks.

On start up your Mac usually comes up with the message: 'Welcome to Macintosh.' This program enables you to substitute a greeting of your choice for this rather bland message.

Just open *Welcome*, type in your preferred text and hey presto, the next time you start up, you have your own custom greeting. Great for Monday mornings. All I want now is a program that enables me to change the shut down message to 'Have a nice day'.

Inside Mac Games, a games magazine devoted entirely to the Macintosh, has been published on floppy disk since the start of last year. The magazine has now expanded on to CD. Although the heart of *IMG* is text-based, by clicking on buttons contained in the magazine you can play demos of hot releases and view slide-shows of soon-to-be-released games.

There's also some smashing *QuickTime* movies, and to make these run faster we've arranged with Apple to include *QuickTime 2.0* on this month's CD.

This folder also contains a section called *More Goodies*, which contains updaters, past issues, game walk-throughs and cheats.

Note: the slide-shows don't automatically

open from the magazine thanks to a technical problem with CDs. But don't worry because it's dead easy to get them to work manually, and you can find all the instructions in this folder anyway. Enjoy the ride!

Links Pro demo

Golf simulation

Fancy a quick swing? Try this demo of *Links Pro* - you get one of the holes at Harbour Town Golf Links to play. We reviewed this game in MACFORMAT 18 and gave it a great 88%.

You'll need someone to play with, so select them in the 'Available Golfers' list and click on the Add button. Click OK after you've added all the partners and click OK on the next screen. On with the garish trousers, stick a glove on your left hand (or is it right?) and off to the tee.

To strike the ball, first move the pointer over the Swing symbol and click and hold down the mouse button to start the backswing. Then release the mouse button when the yellow indicator reaches the top to set how hard you want to swing. (If you release the mouse button past the 12 o'clock line you hit the ball with more power, but you have less control.) Then click the button again when the yellow indicator reaches the bottom (6 o'clock). If you click too soon, the shot will hook left; too late and it will slice right. Fore!

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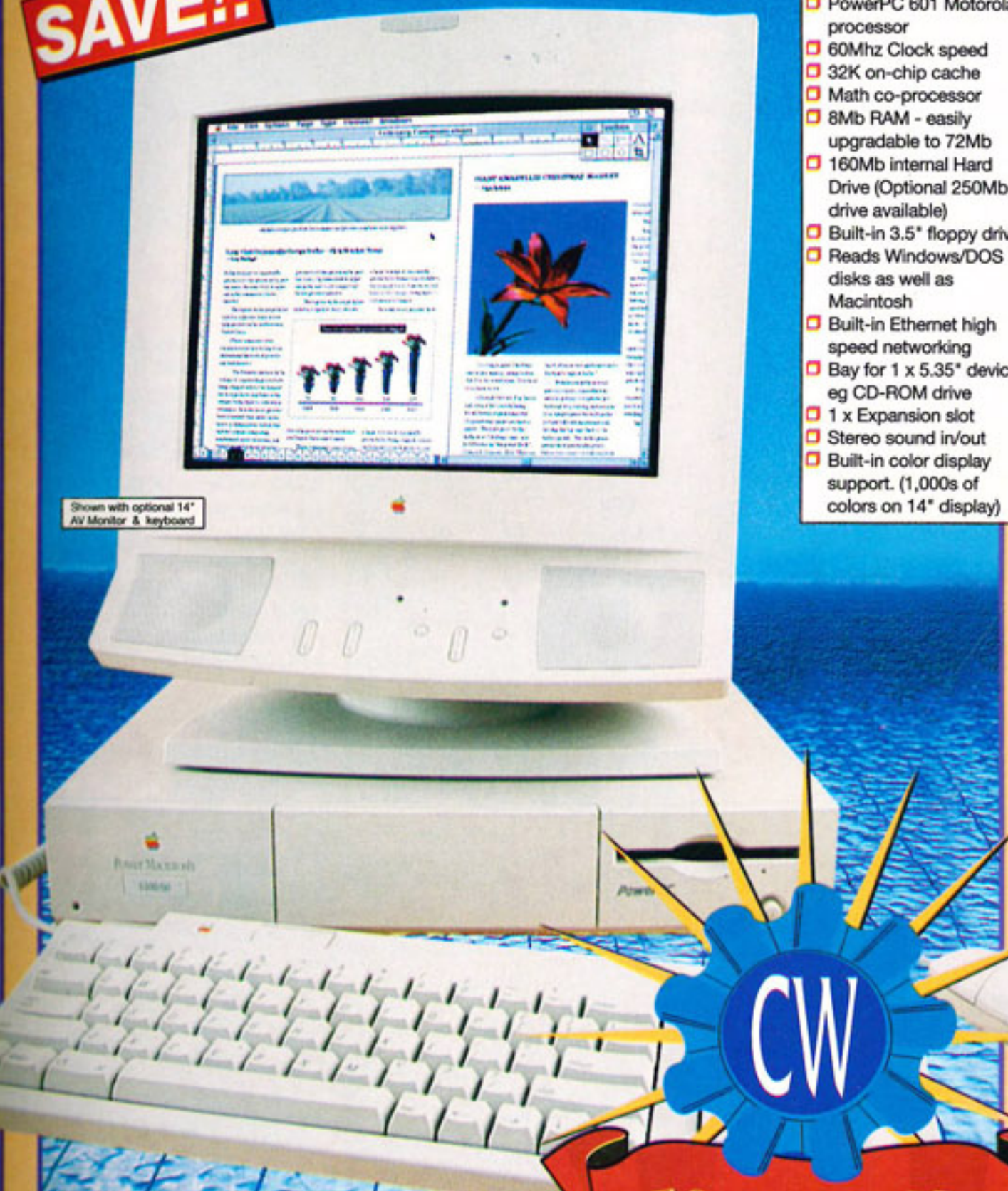


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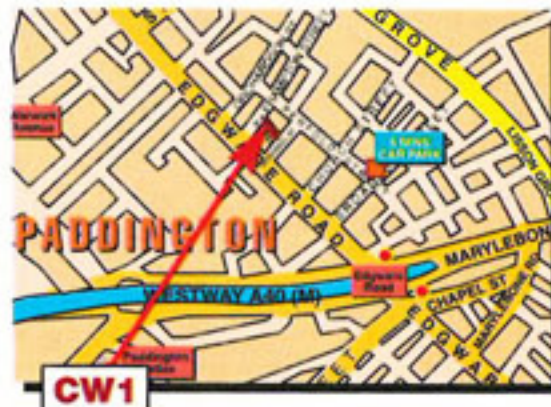
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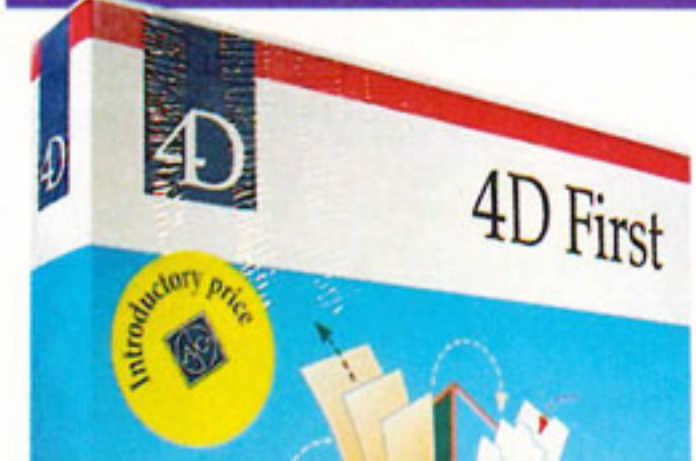
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Apple opens the door to Mac clones



You'll soon have the chance to buy Macs made by other companies as Apple clears the way for a competitive market. MACFORMAT gets the details...

As part of Apple's on-going plans to make the Mac more popular than ever, other companies are to be given the right to manufacture Macintosh computers. Apple is talking to businesses across the world, offering them the rights to produce computers capable of running Mac programs – in other words, Mac clones.

Why is Apple doing this now? Well, the move is part of its long-term strategy to encourage more people to use the world's best personal computer system. With more companies making and advertising Macs, there will be more models to

choose from, raising the Mac's profile on the PC-dominated high street. Apple will then have more opportunities to demonstrate to potential buyers the ease of use of its operating system and software, as compared to the *Windows* or *OS/2* systems.

Any company with a licence will pay Apple an agreed fee for each machine it produces. In return it will get the right to use the PowerPC 601 chip and other essential Macintosh components, as well as System 7.5 and Mac fonts. Most of the clones are likely to be Power-Macs, but a range of traditional Macs may be introduced as more

businesses come on board.

Mac clones should appear by this time next year. While the identities of the first companies to produce non-Apple Macs haven't been revealed yet, it's thought that some six firms will initially receive the prized licences. The firms involved will be those who have something innovative to add the Mac blend, or who are successful in parts of the world that Apple has yet to explore. This means it's likely to be a while before Mac clones go on sale in the UK. Apple is also keen to find a firm capable of boosting the Mac's profile in the competitive American market.

The Mac gets a makeover



As part of its plan to spread the Mac word wider, Apple is introducing a new logo for its operating system. The Mac OS face will soon

be appearing on everything from printer and hard drive packaging to books and advertising blurb. This means that you will be able to buy anything that carries the operating system logo – from a program to a printer – secure in the knowledge that it will be compatible with your Macintosh. As other companies begin to manufacture Macintoshes, the logo will help

to make identification of Macintosh-compatible hardware and software clearer, making life easier for the less experienced Macintosh users in particular.

Eventually, as more updated versions of System 7 are distributed, the new face of the Macintosh will appear on-screen each time you switch on your machine.

System 7.5 hits the stands

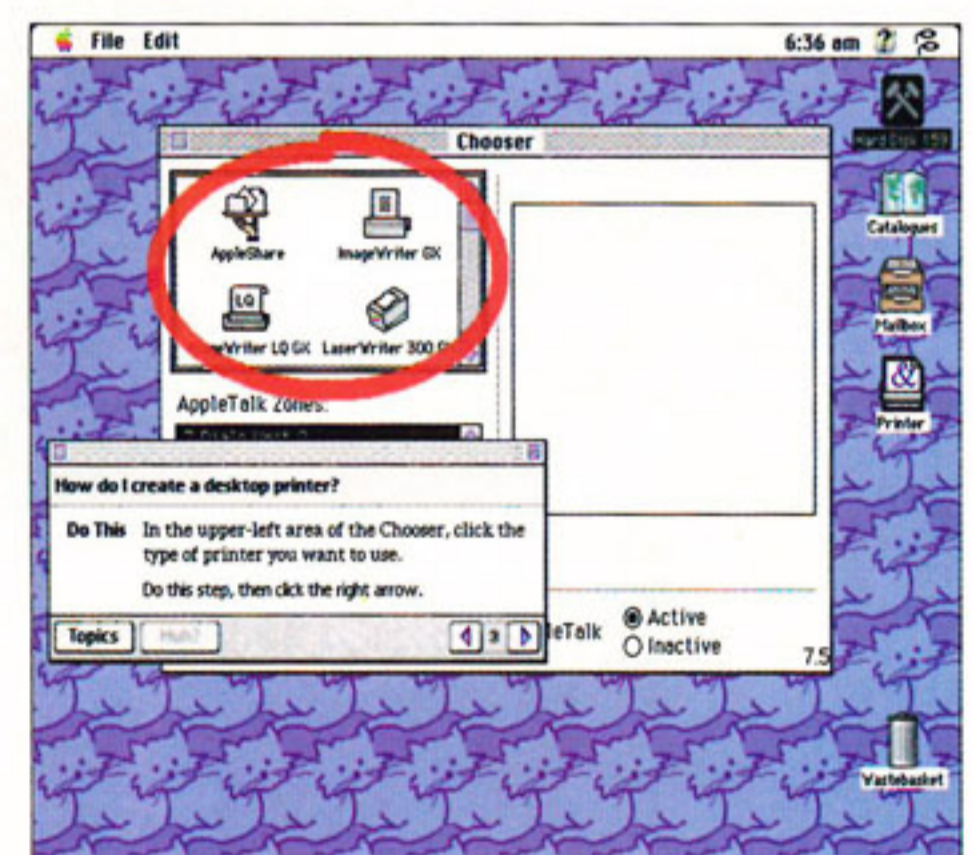
Despite the plans for a revamped logo, for the time being the Mac operating system will still be known as System 7, and the latest version, 7.5, is now available. Priced at £105.75, System 7.5 is the most powerful and memory-hungry Apple operating system yet. This means your Mac will need 4Mb of RAM just to run the necessary essentials.

A major addition to the System 7 repertoire is QuickDraw GX, a flexible new system for printing and font management. The most visible part of GX is the printer icon situated on the Desktop. This enables you to print a document without having to load a program first – you simply drag the document icon on to the printer icon. Unfortunately, though, your Macintosh

will need 8Mb of RAM to be able to run it.

The improved video system *QuickTime 2.0* is a late addition to a range of new features that also includes the *AppleGuide* tutorial program, the *AppleScript* program (which enables your Mac to do routine, repetitive tasks automatically), and *PC Exchange* (the utility that enables you to use PC-formatted disks), and a whole new range of Desktop designs.

By now, you should be able to choose between floppy disk and CD-ROM versions. The CD-ROM comes with extra software including utilities for QuickDraw GX, plus demos and *QuickTime* movies. System 7.5 should be compatible with all current Mac applications. For more details contact Apple on 0800 127753.



System 7.5 comes with a host of useful new features, including an improved help system, *AppleGuide*. You need 4Mb of RAM just to run the bare essentials, though.



Performas offer software galore

Tonnes of programs are being included with each new Performa, as Apple continues to entice new home users into Mac ownership. Each of the four Performa Plus bundles, as they are known, is aimed at people with different interests and budgets.

Top of the range is the Performa 630 TV Plus, which sells for a competitive £1,699 and is aimed at anybody who wants to wholeheartedly join the multimedia revolution. Like the entire Plus range, it comes with the top-selling integrated package *ClarisWorks 2.1* (which includes word processing, graphics and spreadsheet modules), *Mavis Beacon Teaches Typing*, *ClickArt Performa*, *MacGallery ClipArt Treasure Pack* and the excellent shoot-'em-up *Spectre Supreme*.

The 630 TV Plus also includes

the video editing program *AVID Videoshop* and a strong selection of CD-ROM titles: *Grolier Multimedia Encyclopedia*, *The Guinness Disc of Records*, *Microsoft Dinosaurs*, *Leonardo the Inventor*, *San Diego Zoo Presents The Animals*, *Rosetta Stone* and last, but certainly not least, *The Tale of Benjamin Bunny*.

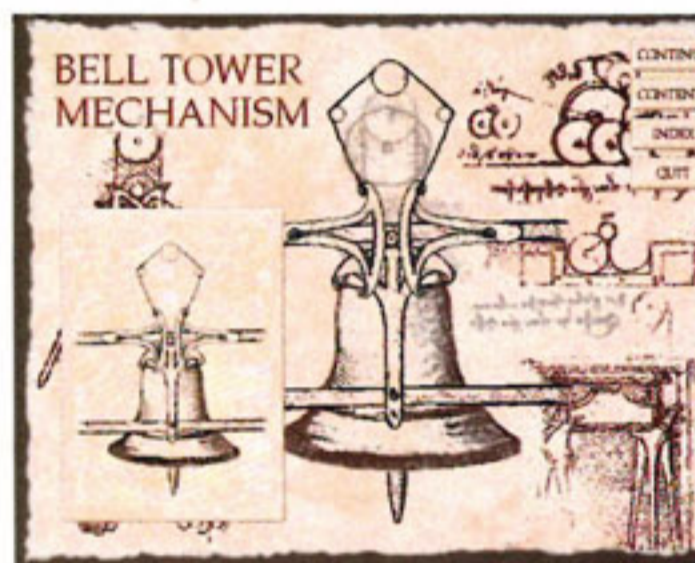
A double-speed CD-ROM drive, a video card that enables the 630 to receive television pictures or connect up to a video recorder, and an infra-red remote control complete this impressive package.

If you only need CD-ROM facilities rather than a complete multimedia authoring kit, you can buy the 630 Plus for £1,499. The only differences between the two is that the 630 Plus lacks the video

facilities, like *Videoshop*, and the TV card and remote control of the top-end package. Like the TV Plus, however, it does have a double-speed CD-ROM drive built in.

The £999 Performa 475 Plus is intended for home desktop publishing and other business uses. As well as the standard software pack, it comes with *HomePublisher*, *TouchBase Pro* and *DateBook Pro*.

Finally, the 460 Plus, a faster version of the Performa 450, sells for £899 and is aimed at newcomers to computing, or families with small children. It comes with the basic software pack plus the education packages *Millie's Mathhouse*, *Bailey's Bookhouse* and *Thinkin' Things*. For more details contact Apple on 0800 127753.

Multimedia shines at Live '94

Macs and CD-ROMs were prominent at the recent Live '94 show, which was attended by more than 180,000 people. Live '94 covers all areas of electronic gadgetry, including hi-fi, TVs and game consoles, but Apple's stand more than held its own in the crush.

The biggest part of the stand was devoted to the Performa. Mark Floisand, Apple's Consumer and Marketing Manager, was at the show and was encouraged by the response from the public. 'People were amazed that the Mac could do multimedia that easily, and they could see real uses for it. We had people saying, "I could see my kid putting together a school project [with that] because I can put my camcorder into the computer."' Multimedia played a strong role

in the Live '94 blend, with companies like Microsoft and MDI using stands to show off their current releases. Meanwhile, many large companies you wouldn't usually associate with the world of computing have made the move

into electronic publishing – phone company Mercury announced a link-up with software firm M33, while News International, Rupert Murdoch's giant multi-national publishing firm, is busy developing CD-ROM publishing plans.

Mac line is trimmed

Apple has just announced that it's abandoning its LC brand, which should make decisions concerning which desktop Mac you should buy far simpler in the future. The range now consists of three Performas – the 460, the 475 and the 630 – and three PowerMacs – the 6100, the 7100 and the 8100.

The LC and Performa Macs have been essentially the same machines for some time, the only difference being that while the LC was aimed at business users the Performa was targeted at the home users. With the distinctions between different types of users blurring, though, the two brands were confusing more people than they were helping. The choice is far easier now: you can either opt for the Performa Plus range with extra software, or the slightly cheaper Performas, with no extra trimmings. Dealers will be free to devise their own business packages, based around the basic Performa machines – such as choice of monitors or extra software. Software sales rise

More Mac programs are being bought in Europe, according to figures released by the Software Publishers Association. \$28.4 million was spent on Mac software during April, May and June, an increase of 9% on the figure for the previous quarter. The total for the first six months was \$59.5 million, with the UK accounting for \$14.8 million of that figure. What's more, falling prices mean the actual number of programs being sold has increased. The results are based on numbers supplied by 38 leading software publishers, including Claris, WordPerfect and Microsoft.

New speedy CD drive

The steadily growing line-up of high speed CD-ROM drives has seen another addition in the form of the Toshiba XM3501B. This is an internal drive capable of playing CD-ROMs at up to four times the speed of the original industry standard. Toshiba also claims it's quicker at accessing the correct point on a disc than any existing model. It costs £582, and is distributed by Ideal (tel: 081 390 1211).

PowerMacs revamped

The PowerMac range is dropping in price, and some models are being equipped with larger hard drives. The starter model, the 6100/60, has had its 160Mb drive boosted up to 250Mb and its price cut by £40 to £1,525. The cheapest 8100/80 doubles its drive capacity to 500Mb, but holds its price of £3,870. The added disk space will keep the PowerMac competitive until the new machines appear in the next few months. 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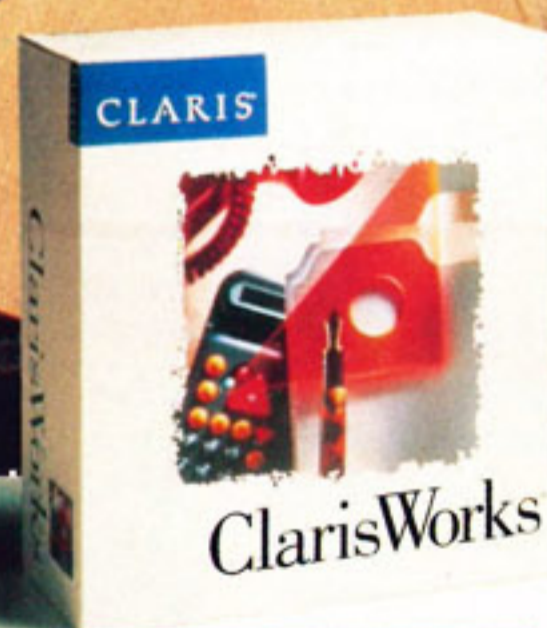
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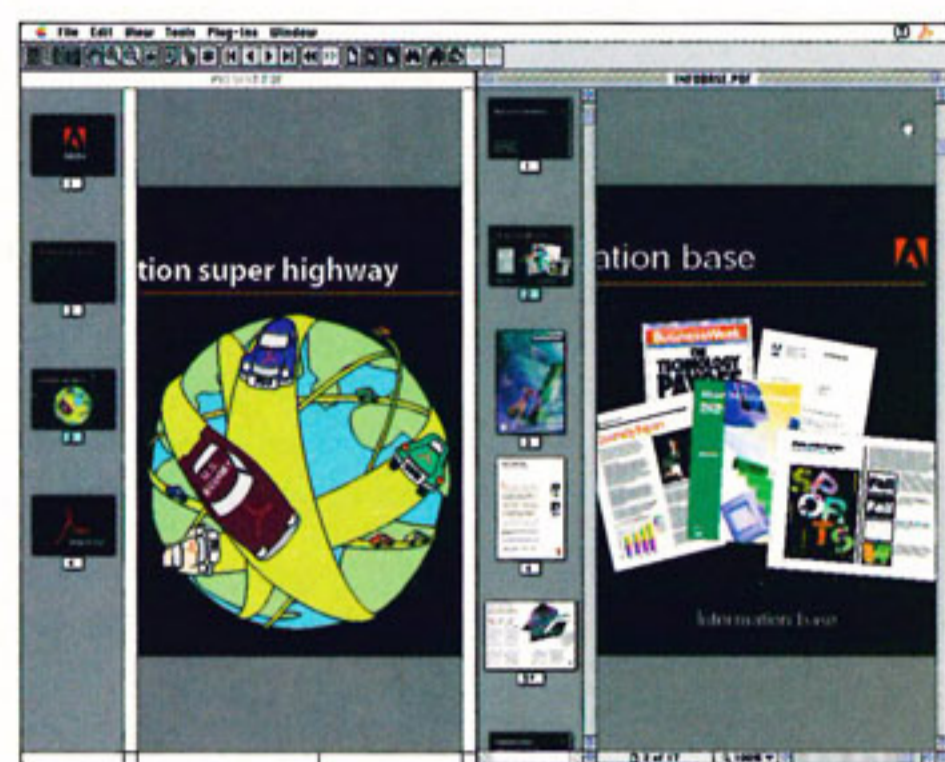
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Adobe revamps its utility kits



With Acrobat 2.0 you can view a file that was created by someone else, even if you don't own the software that was used.

New versions of the popular programs *Adobe Type Manager* and *Adobe Acrobat* are about to be released. The £58.75 *ATM*, which is now up to version 3.8, enables your Mac to employ sophisticated typefaces, such as PostScript Type 1 fonts, even if your printer wasn't designed to use them. It also gives

crisp screen displays of the fonts. New additions to this release include extra fonts, taking the total up to 30, and support for QuickDraw GX: *ATM* now also runs native on the PowerMac.

Meanwhile, the *Acrobat* suite of programs receives an upgrade to the £188 version 2.0. The core of this program enables you to save

documents – text, graphics or desktop publishing layouts – in a Portable Document Format (PDF) that can be read or printed by any computer setup. The receiving computer needs only to have *Acrobat Reader*, which you can get free. It doesn't matter if the receiving computer doesn't have the same programs or fonts as you – the PDF contains all the information it needs to display the document.

The new version includes en-

hancements such as a search function that enables you to find any text in a PDF file. You can also link together two PDF files so they become cross-referenced, or link a file to another program.

The higher power *Acrobat Pro*, selling at £570, enables you to make PDF files from PostScript files. This should prove a great boon to commercial publishers. If you want more details you can contact Adobe on 081 547 1900.

Haunted House leads home line-up

A new selection of CD-ROMs is due from Microsoft in the run up to Christmas. Due out this month is *Ultimate Haunted House*, a children's exploration package created by Gahan Wilson, a respected book illustrator. Two £40 CD-ROMs based on the *Magic Schoolbus* books, for children between six and ten years old, are also due this month. In *The Magic Schoolbus Explores The Human Body* you get to explore the body from the inside, with a bus full of children for company. You enter via the mouth and travel

down the throat! At the other extreme (not that one!), the second title travels across the expanse of space in *The Magic Schoolbus Explores The Solar System*.

Dangerous Creatures is a natural history encyclopedia of terrifying alligators, deadly spiders and other animals that you might not want to get too close to. This CD-ROM is £45, as is *Ancient Lands*, which takes you back in time to discover early civilisations.

Microsoft is also preparing a 1995 edition of its flagship home encyclopedia *Encarta*. With a team of 25 now working on it full-time, the new version is said to feature more video clips and pictures than ever before. For more details contact Microsoft on 0734 270001.

New system heralds a revolution

New software from the American company Taligent could radically change the way Mac and other computer owners use their machines. *TalÆ* – the Taligent Application Environment – is part program, part operating system. Taligent ambitiously believes *TalÆ* can become the most popular software system in computing, and will change the way computer users work with each other.

TalÆ uses a flexible combination of small programs, or frameworks, to enable itself to work with any operating system with no noticeable difference for the user, whatever make of computer he or she is using. What you see is not the familiar Mac interface, but rather a completely different style of interface called People, Places and Things.

Apple is just one of the partners that own a share of the Taligent company, along with IBM and Hewlett Packard. The renamed, new-look Mac operating system (see our news report on page 15) will be one of the operating systems with

which *TalÆ* will be compatible.

Each framework within *TalÆ* is responsible for handling a different task, such as text-editing, 3D graphics or running a printer. Programmers writing software to work with *TalÆ* won't have to worry about how to write the basic elements of a graphics program, for example, because a framework to do that job will already exist. Similarly,

you'll be able to copy a document created by one *TalÆ* program to use with any other *TalÆ* program, because both will be using the same frameworks to edit text or print the document.

The first version of *TalÆ* should be available for the Mac next year. An added bonus is that the *TalÆ* frameworks are generally tiny, taking up little space in your Mac's memory or on your hard disk.

Taligent believes this needn't be another of those revolutions you can join only if you buy yet another bigger, fatter computer. Time alone will tell how well Taligent can put its exciting ideas into practice – we will keep you posted on any developments.



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Apple goes global at Expo '94

Communication was the key word at October's Apple Expo, with news of a new on-line service that promises to make comms easier to use.

The Grand Hall at Olympia, scene of last month's Apple Expo, was filled with stands that looked as high-tech as the products they played host to, as an expected 40,000 people came to see what was new on the Mac.

Centre stage was Apple's own stand, which was promoting the PowerMac and System 7.5, the newest version of the Mac operating system. Also there, making its UK debut, was eWorld, Apple's latest on-line service. This enables you to use icons and illustrated screens to negotiate its electronic mail (e-Mail) facilities, so you don't have to learn and type in complex lists of commands.

A free eWorld kit which includes the software you need to connect your Mac and modem to the service is available. Just contact Apple on 0800 896206.

The cost of communicating

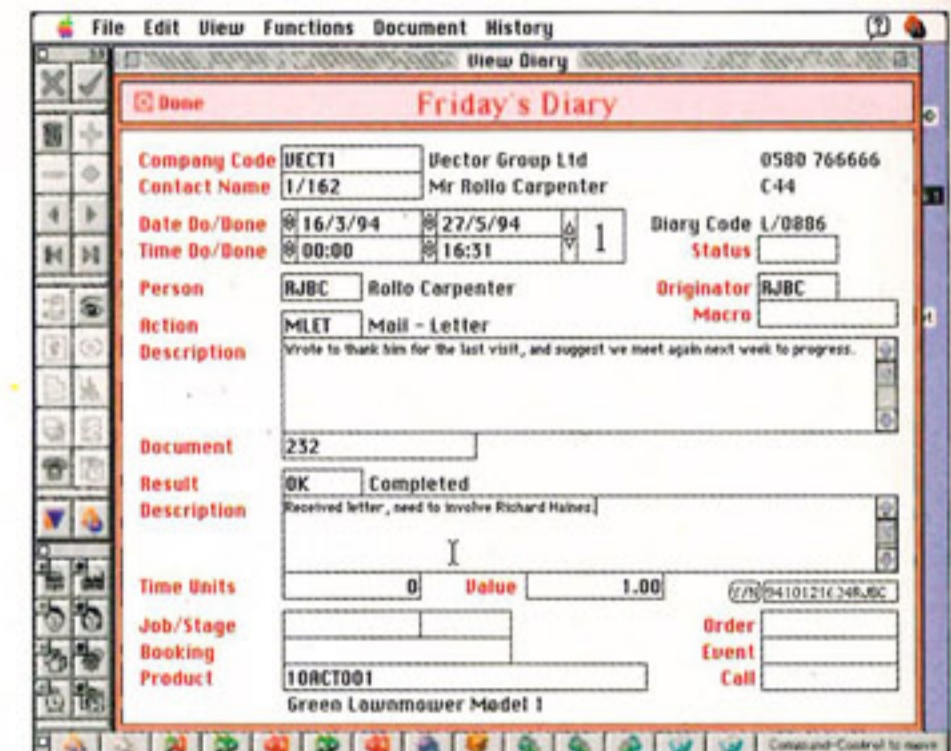
Charges for using eWorld are made in US dollars and are converted into pounds on your credit card bill, as we mentioned in our story in

MACFORMAT 16. After the first month, which is free, there is a monthly subscription fee of \$8.95 (roughly £6 at current exchange rates). Then, while you are connected, you will be charged at \$7.95 (£5.30) per hour for your first two hours each month, and \$12.90 (£8.60) per hour for further usage. Connection costs are charged in units of a minute each.

What you get for your money is access to an ever-growing group of services, including electronic newspapers and magazines, news of new Mac releases and access to conferences, where you can converse with up to 200 other eWorld users. More British-orientated material is being worked on.

Apple claims that, in time, the flat fees charged for access to all areas of eWorld will be replaced by a layered price structure. You'll then pay different amounts depending on which service you want to use. As yet, no date for the changeover has been announced, so it's unlikely to be imminent.

Admission to the Internet, which covers the wider world of e-Mail, will come much sooner. An Internet gateway is expected to open very

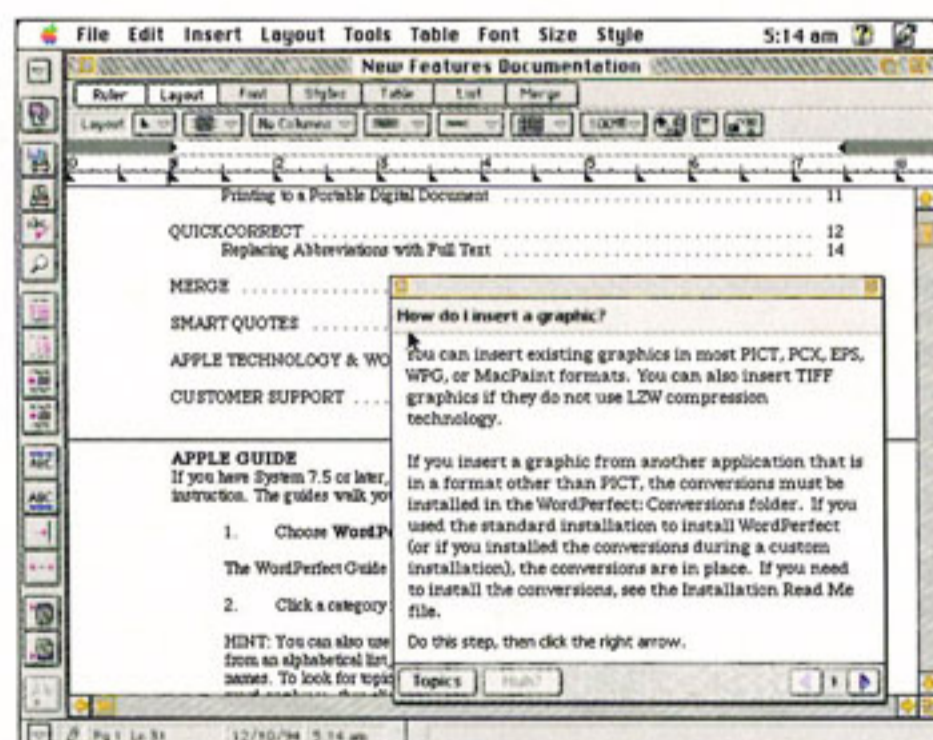
early in 1995, and it will be available to eWorld users at no extra charge.

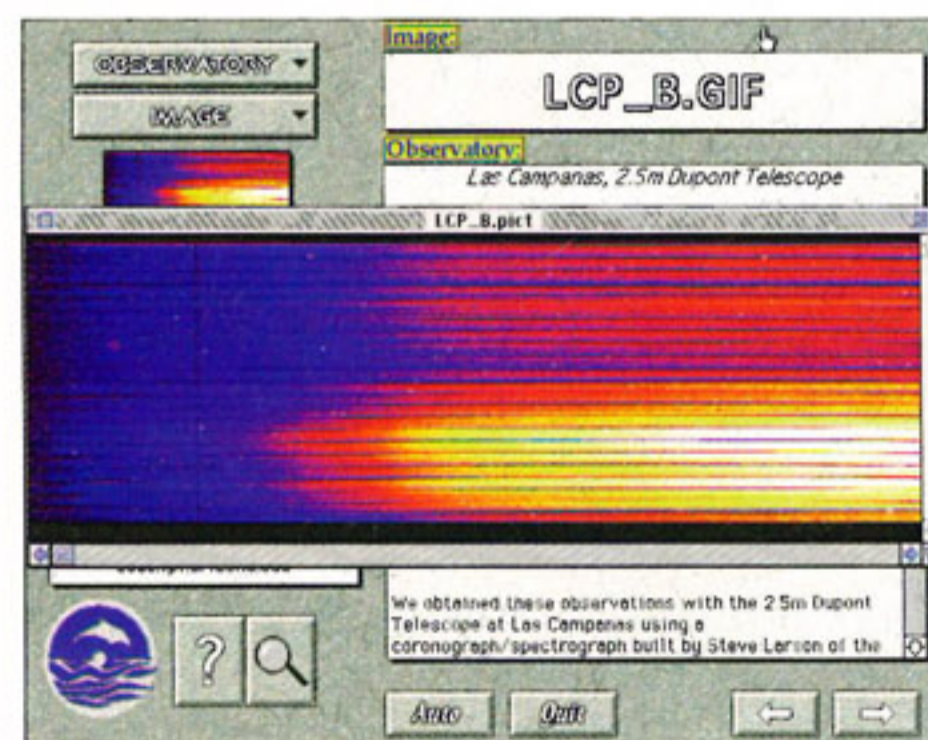

Graphics programs draw the crowds

Among the many live presentations given over the four days of the show were demonstrations of some truly spectacular new graphics software.

Leading the way was *Live Picture*, an astonishing and expensive image processor from HSC Software. Priced at a cool £4,112, it's clearly aimed at top-class professional users with big demands and equally big budgets. Its main advantages over the competition are superb quality printouts and awesomely powerful graphics tools.

Show visitors were treated to an impressive demonstration of how easily pictures can be manipulated in complex ways, with little or no time lag. This manipulation included smear and distort effects that can be brushed on to create eye-catching effects. *Live Picture* is also resolu-

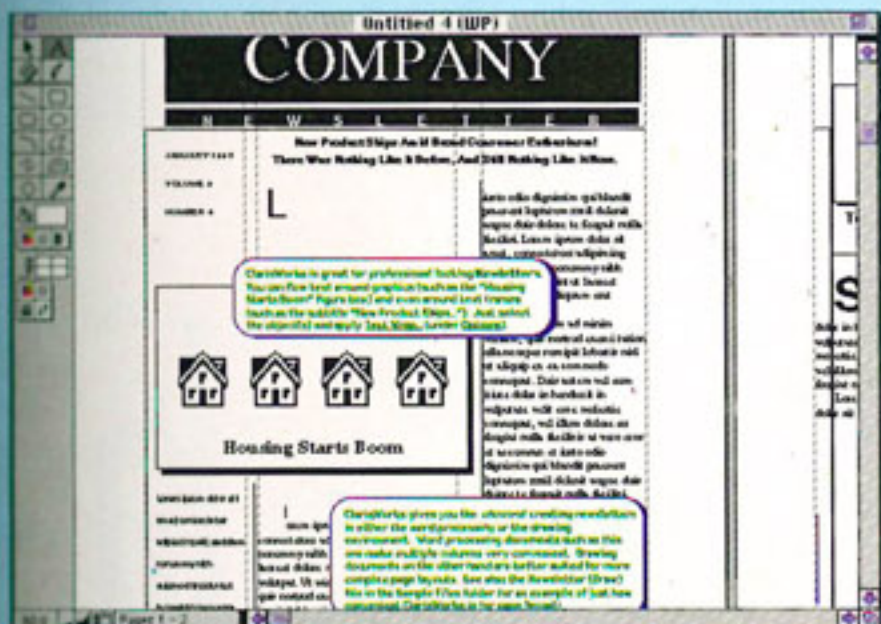

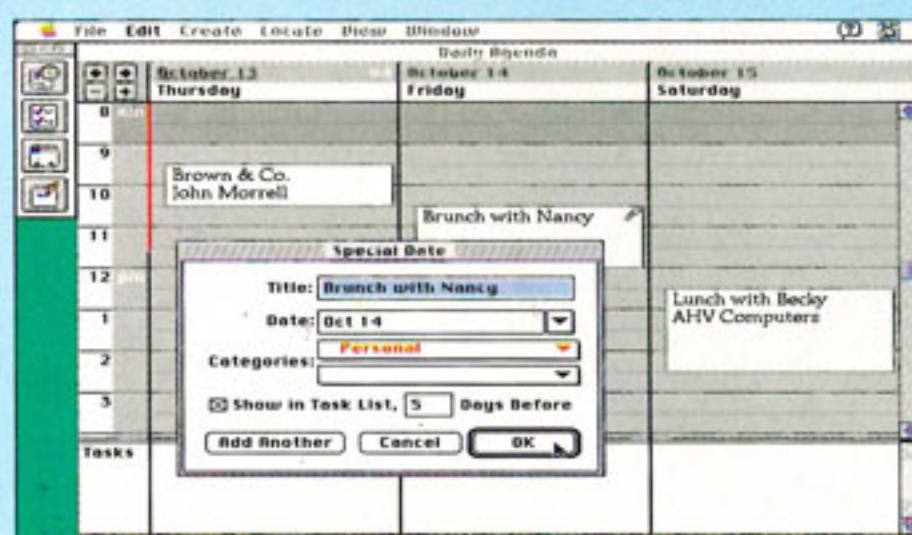

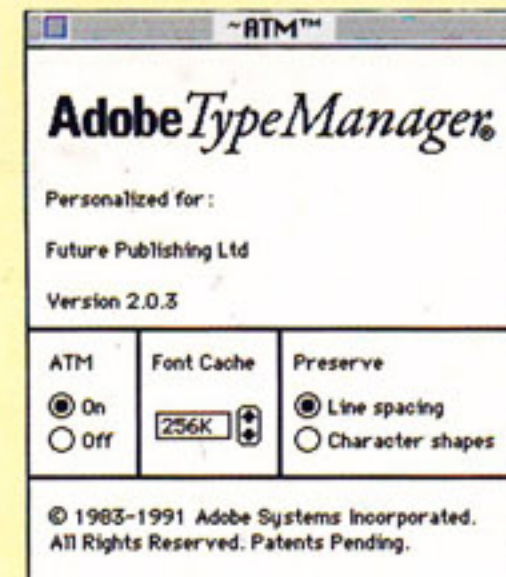

TYPE CATCHES UP WITH THE TIMES

Following its official launch of the latest version of *Adobe Type Manager* (see our news story on page 18), Adobe announced that it was adjusting the way in which it sells its typefaces.

If you bought an Adobe typeface in the past, you were licensed to use it with any one printer – and you could connect any number of Macs to that printer and use the typeface legally. From now on, though, Adobe will be pricing each typeface in accordance with the number of computers using it. However, the new licence conditions do allow you to use the typeface on up to five Macs, so small companies and lone users shouldn't be affected by the change. Site licences for larger companies are also available.

As Sue Thexton, Adobe's Marketing Director for Northern Europe, explained, the reason Adobe previously licensed typefaces per printer was because you were only using their faces during printing, not during screen work. You see, initially there were two components you

could get in a typeface: a bitmap font and an outline font. The bitmap font was for working on the screen, while the outline font governed the printer's output. So, as Thexton points out, 'It was only when you went to the printer and accessed the outline font that you were using [Adobe] software.'

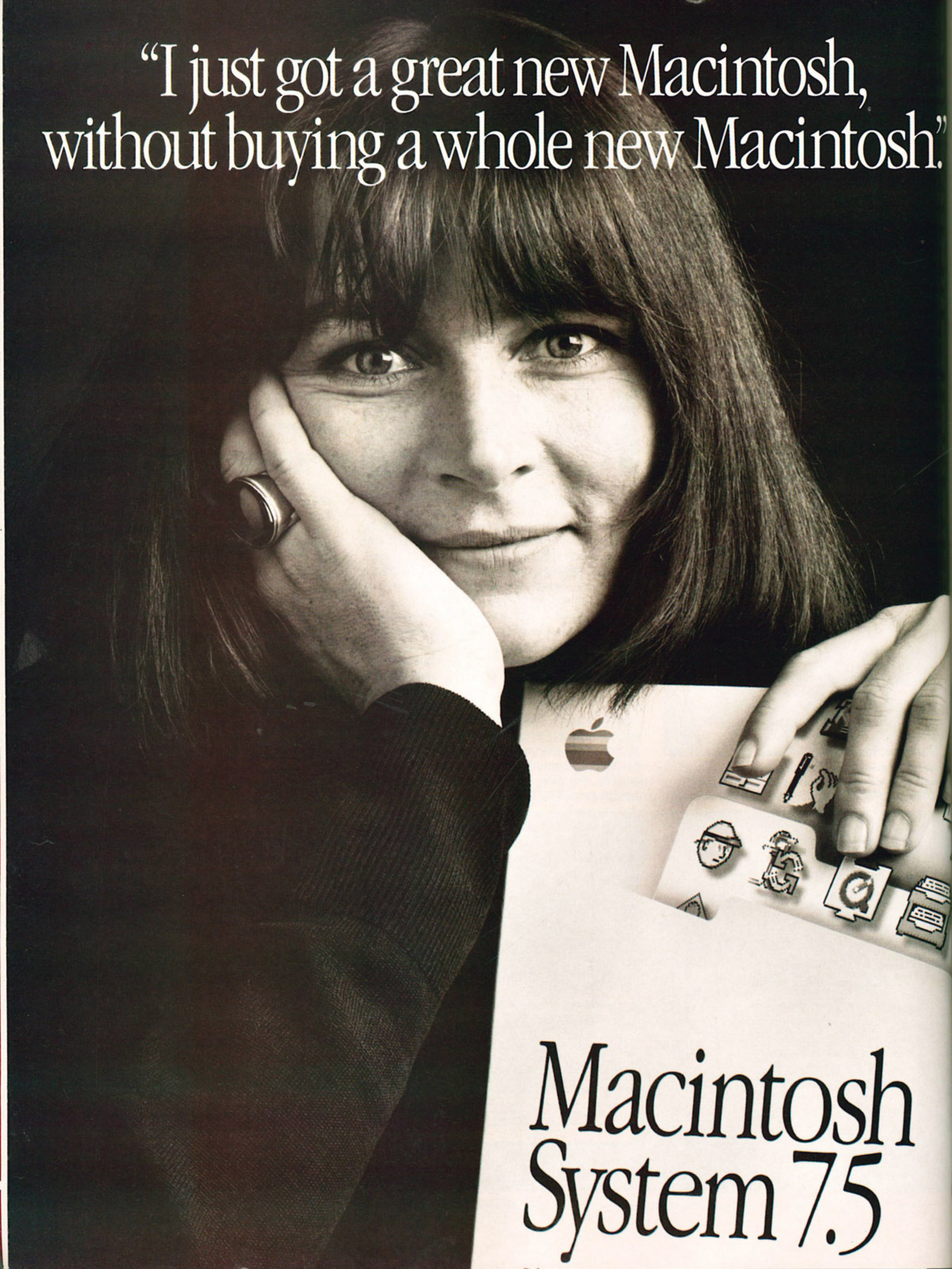
However, the increased use of ATM means that printer fonts can now be reproduced sufficiently well on screen, meaning there's no need for the bitmap font. So for the price of one licence, an entire network of computers can use the same typeface.

The new licence policy is in response to this change in technology, but Thexton stresses that Adobe has tried to ensure no type buyer loses out as a result. 'You can't say that x computers are connected to x printers – it varies from company to company. We felt that five was a reasonable figure, based on the research we did.'

'What we've done is change the way in which we license the typefaces [so that they are] in line with what the market says it wants.'

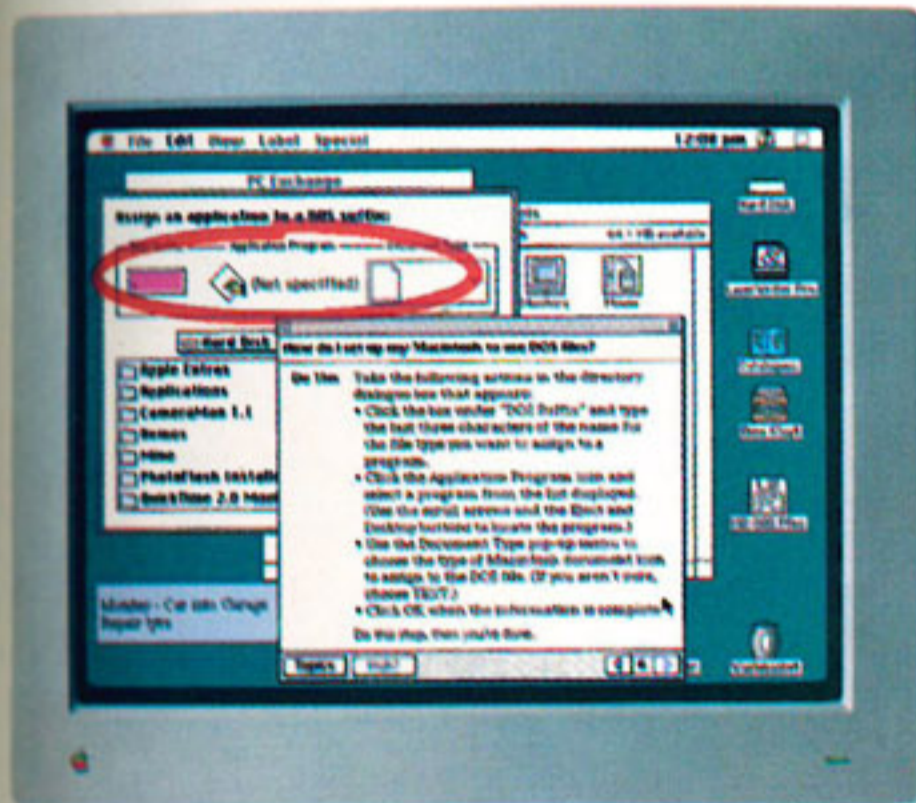

Once again MACFORMAT's Josef Morrell takes a look at the wonderful world of Apple, and discovers he quite likes the look of eWorld after all...

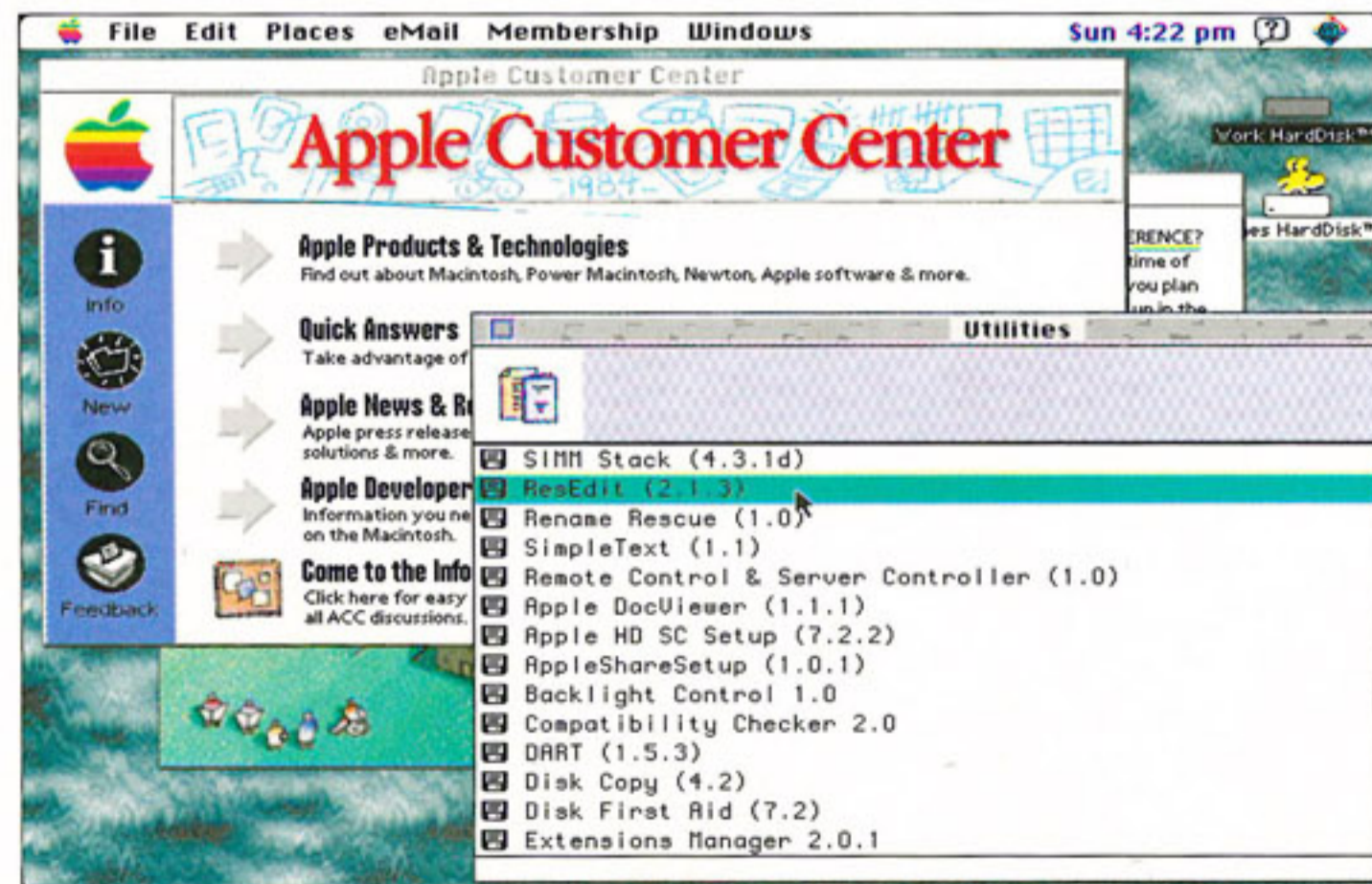
Don't you just hate it when Apple produces something good? There's nothing that makes a Mac journalist's life more worthwhile than a good opportunity to snipe at the burghers of Cupertino or, even better, Stockley Park. But despite all the signs looking good, or rather, bad, I've been denied the chance by eWorld.

Ever since I saw the preview about a year ago, I've been convinced I was going to hate it:

I was brought up sucking on an RS232 port, and think the scream of a modem connecting is the music of the spheres

cutesy little icons like the cover of Genesis's *Duke LP*, and everything laid out like a town centre – you just click on a house to go in. You can even hear the noise of the traffic when you first connect. Ugh! So patronising.

I was brought up sucking on an RS232 port instead of a dummy, and think the scream of a modem connecting is the music of the spheres,



One of the main advantages of eWorld over other systems is its direct line to Apple and Apple resources. Of course, Apple staff are no more likely to answer an e-Mail from eWorld than they are an AppleLink, but we can always hope...

so what do I need with simple-to-use graphical interfaces? Give me a Hayes AT command any day of the week. Or that's what I thought.

However, I must confess, having actually used eWorld for a week or two, I'm converted. It's so damned easy that anyone can do it, and that alone should bring tens of thousands of Mac users into comms who would never have dreamt of tackling it otherwise. (This has got to be considered a good thing – after all, a Mac without a modem is like a feminist without a bicycle. Or something.)

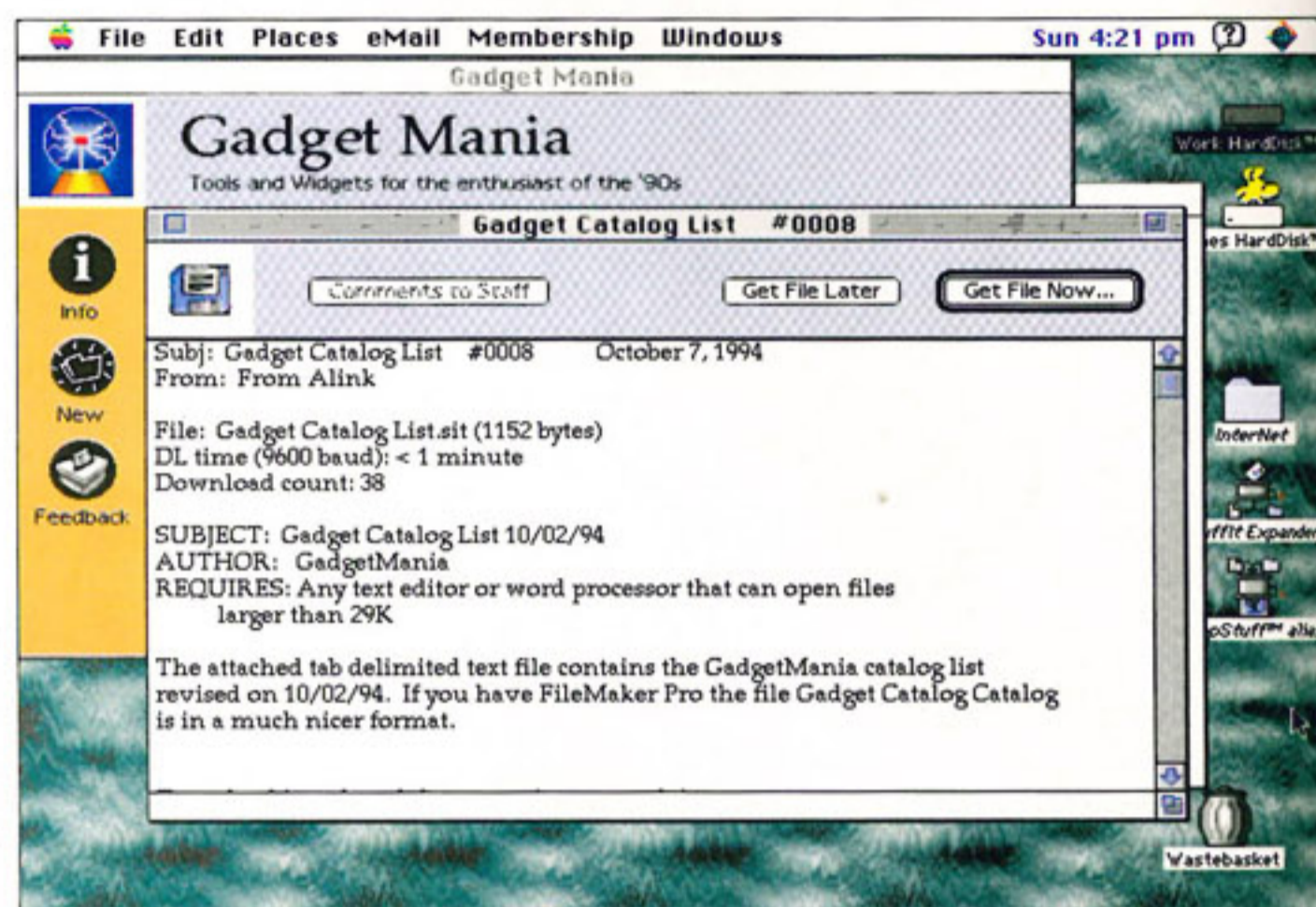
Apple's new eWorld is based on the same technology as America OnLine, which I raved about last month. This means all you have to do to get on-line is install the software and follow the instructions. It's so simple that you'll find yourself hooked up and 'Net surfing within a matter of minutes.

Once you're connected, you can do all the usual stuff: download files, send e-Mails, ask questions of experts, refer to databases, etc. But what makes eWorld so special is the fact that

it's accessible to the non-technically minded, while letting hardened comms-men use shortcuts to get the speed they need.

By the time you read this (I love writing that, it makes me feel like the holder of privileged information!), eWorld should be available properly in the UK. At the moment it's full of Americans, but that will change, no doubt.

eWorld is real competition for CompuServe (sorry, but I'm not a number), and is significantly easier for a beginner to handle than

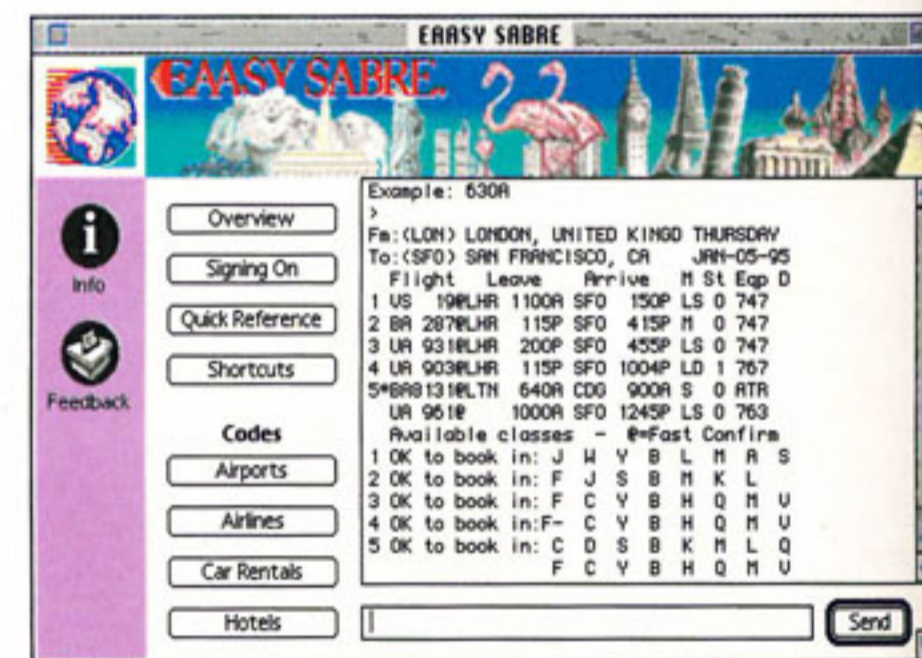


Much of eWorld consists of discussion groups, with plenty to read and download. The problem is, everyone here is American, and there aren't many of them yet, so striking up a discussion is difficult, and an intelligent one's impossible. But when you join, that'll change.

trusty old CIX or the immensely disappointing Delphi. (I'll say more on Delphi another time, like when I'm convinced that I haven't missed something obvious and it really is as dreadful as it looks).

Finally, if you haven't got a modem, turn to page 107 now, send MACFORMAT £200 and join the rest of us in comms land! Using a Mac that's not connected to the phonline is like having an answering machine in the same condition – no, really, it's true!

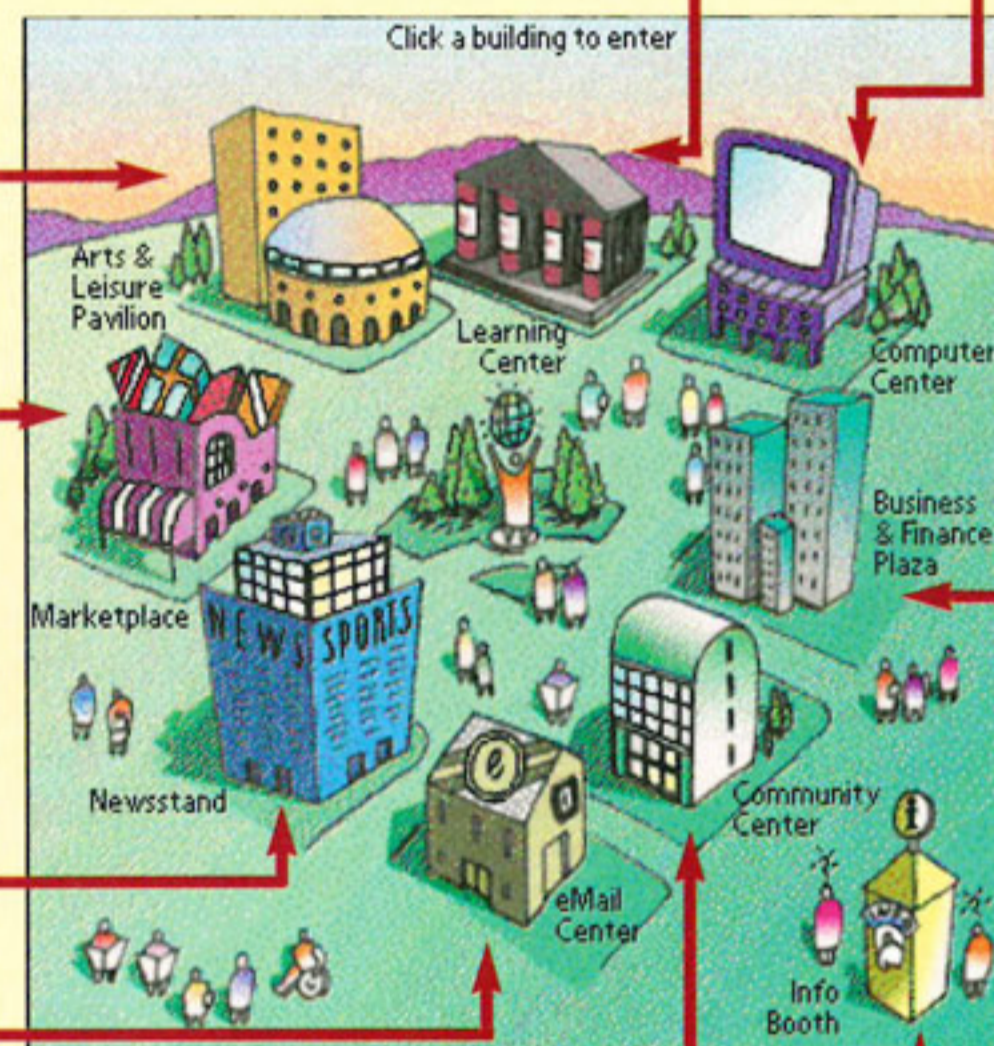

Colonization

Developed by the same team that produced *Railroad Tycoon*, *Colonization* is a new build-'em-up, strategy simulator. The idea's quite simple: conquer new worlds and then make sure that civilisation prospers there. Anyone who got a buzz out of the *SimCity* series should love this one.



Zone

Leviathan Media
Due for release next month

We've included this one because it sounds vaguely like *Spectre*. This is a 3D-rendered action-cum-strategy game. You control an

intergalactic species who have to battle it out for supremacy in a combat arena. The good news is that this is a network game, so expect productivity to crumble in offices where there are a few Macs connected together (like this one, for instance).

Wolfpack

Novalogic
Due for release this month

This was a particularly brilliant game on the PC, so there's every reason to think that it'll be equally brilliant on the Mac. You take command of a WW2 submarine wolfpack or surface fleet and attempt to blow the head gaskets out of the other side. The programmers

reckon that this one is historically accurate, in that your weapons and instruments are precisely keyed to the war year you choose to play in. But then, laser-guided missiles would look a bit out of place on a WW2 Destroyer. The game also includes a construction set, enabling you to re-create actual battles (the sinking of the *Belgrano*, perhaps?). Watch out for both floppy and CD-ROM versions.

Police Quest 4

Due for release next month

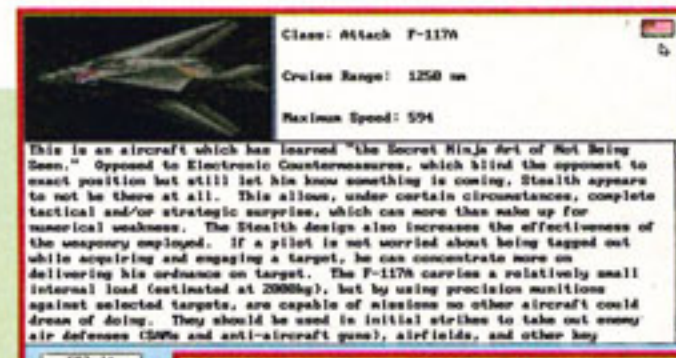
I've never been an enormous fan of the *Police Quest* series, but this one promises to be a bit different. You play a cop (surprise, surprise!), with the idea of the game being to solve a series of crimes. This version will be using photo-realistic images, so expect lots of ham actors and exterior shots of buildings.



Harpoon 2

Three Sixty Pacific
Due for release next month

This is the latest in a very short line of submarine simulators. You control a Harpoon nuclear submarine that operates in contemporary theatres of conflict. There are 20 different scenarios (that's missions, if you're European) set in hot spots all around the world. There are live-action video sequences of both your launches and the target strikes. More good news: the game's modem ready.

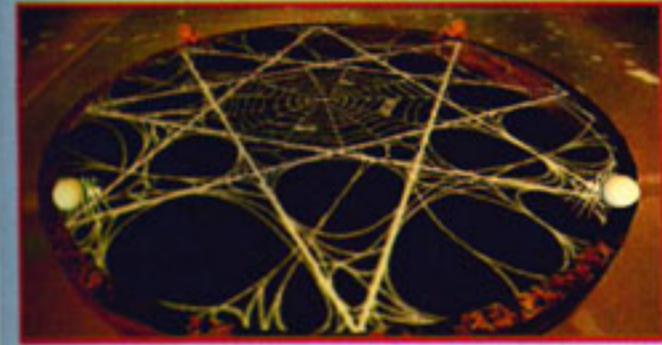


The 11th Hour

The 11th Hour, the follow-up to the million-selling *7th Guest*, is a fully rendered adventure-cum-strategy game with over an hour of full-motion video. The game's set



in a haunted house where you've got to solve puzzles (there's 40 of 'em), complete interactive quests (there's 13 of 'em), ask yourself how much data it takes to fill a CD-ROM (650Mb), and then gaze in awe at the number of CDs that come with the game (there are three of 'em). The game's got quite a violent theme, so it'll receive at least a '15' rating.



Dungeon Master 2

Anyone who owned an Amiga or ST will have fond memories of the original



Dungeon Master, and so this release is bound to create a bit of a stir. *Dungeon Master* was the first half-decent RPG game. It combined maze-mapping with spell-casting and was very atmospheric. This new version looks pretty similar to the original, although the artwork is being completely redesigned for the Mac. Expect to see lots of bug-eyed monsters, healthy doses of spell-casting and characters with names like Pendar the Elusive.

Alone in the Dark 1 & 2

Infogrames

Due for release next month

Definitely two to watch. The *Alone in the Dark* games created a hell of a stir in the PC market thanks to their innovative graphics. Just for a change, these games use real-time 3D graphics superimposed over very tasty, rendered backdrops. The games



combine combat with adventure and search gameplay. Considering that PC owners have been yattering on about how this game will never appear on the Mac, it's now our turn to smile smarmily and flick the Vs at them (metaphorically speaking, of course).



Flight Unlimited

Virgin

Due for release early '95

Here's a novel twist: a game with realistic flight dynamics. *Flight Unlimited's* actually designed to teach you to fly – a process that involves 25 interactive lessons. Once you've learnt the necessary skills you can test your aerobatic prowess and then use your winnings to customise your plane. Unfortunately, it looks as if this will only be released for the PowerMac. (Incidentally, that bloke who rammed the White House in a light aeroplane claimed he only did it because he couldn't get hold of this title. Allegedly.)

Out of the Sun

Domark

Due for release this month

Out of the Sun is yet another historical flight simulator set in WW2, which offers players the



option of fighting for either side (don't they all?). There are four different scenarios, including the Battle of Midway and the Battle of Britain, during which you take part in air-to-air combat, as well as bombing and torpedo runs. It's also reputed to have a realistic flight model and properly detailed aircraft. The good news is that it's been enhanced for the PowerMac.

Ultima 8: Pagan

Origin

Due for release early '95

Ultima 8 is widely regarded as the best in the series. You play Avatar, a warrior stranded in the land of Pagan. During the course of the game you've got to ally yourself with the



subjugated locals and survive endless attacks before confronting the evil Guardian who zapped you to Pagan in the first place. The game uses isometric 3D graphics and features a cast list longer than *The Winds of War*. Expect lots of Celtic imagery.

Doom

IdSoftware

Due for release early '95

Total, utter, complete, devastating, bloody, gruesome fun. *Doom* is just about the most non-politically-correct game there is. To say that it's violent would be an understatement on a par with accusing Michael Portillo of being right wing. This is a 3D texture-mapped first-person entrail-'em-up, in which you play a psycho marine who's been stranded on a colony on Mars, where some silly sod has accidentally opened up a portal to hell – well, it's a mistake anyone could make. You've got to make

your escape from the Mars colony by obliterating each and every demon, zombie, ghoul and cacodaemon that crosses your path. To do this, you use weapons that lie scattered about the complex, such as a chainsaw, a double-barrelled shotgun, a rocket launcher and a plasma rifle. Imagine, if you will, a cross between the films *Zombie Dawn*, *True Lies*, *Gallipoli* and *Aliens* played out on the set of *Prisoner Cell Block H*. You get the picture?



Doom 2

Due for release early '95

Doom 2 picks up where *Doom* left off. You've made it back to Earth and are just about to relax with a *Playboy Wet 'n' Wild* video when you realise you've brought a few stowaways back with you, and accidentally helped the demons to conquer Blighty. *Doom 2's* well over twice as large as the first game, it's quicker, there's a new weapon, six new monsters and some improved artificial intelligence. There's also more of an emphasis on the puzzle element of the game, and it's a lot, lot, lot harder. Basically, if you can finish this game without using any of cheat modes, then you should sign up with the SAS immediately. It's worth noting that this game is even bloodier than the original, so you can understand why it will carry an '18' rating. For extra fun-appeal, just imagine that the monsters are John Major's cabinet ministers. Well, it works for me.

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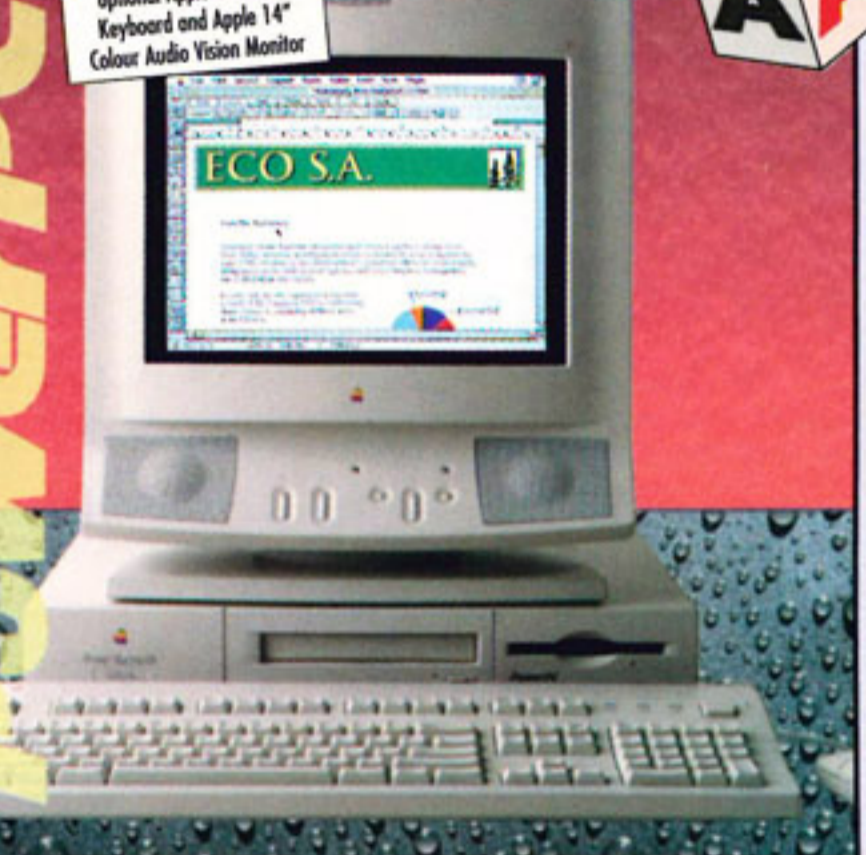
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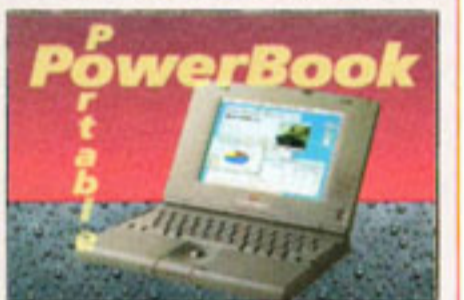
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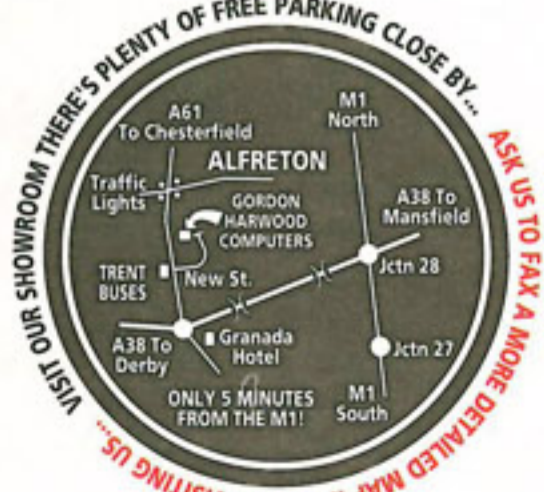

Violent objection

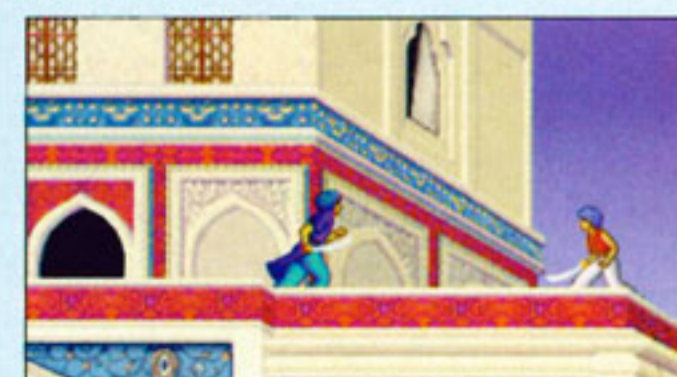

Last issue we brought you some useful System 7.1 tips from Henry Merrit of Cambridge. This month, some tips from Henry for Microsoft Word...

■ Are you using the Work menu? If you aren't, you should. This menu appears automatically whenever you have even one entry from the Glossary (usually a part of the Edit menu) added to it. Simply press [command] [option] [shift] [+] (the plus sign from the shifted '=' key, not the one from the numeric keypad) and then choose the glossary entry you want – say, 'Date'. The Work menu will now enable you to put the date anywhere in a document with only one mouse action (and it keeps better track of the date than most people). Add as many Glossary entries to the Work menu as you want – your name, address, etc.

■ Put the Word Count facility easily at hand by assigning it a keystroke you never use (say [command] [shift] [W]). To do this, add 'Word Count' to the

Tools menu if it's not already there. Then hold down [command] [option] [+] (from the numeric keypad this time), choose the command from the Tools menu and then enter your keystroke. Simple!

■ If you want to give a full 'professionally typeset' appearance to your documents, try replacing the character pairs 'fi' and 'fl' with the proper single-character 'ligature' symbols. Do this *only* after spell-checking your document (the spell-checker won't recognise the ligatured letters). The 'fi' is at [option] [shift] [5] and the 'fl' at [option] [shift] [6]. Use the 'Replace' command from the Edit menu, but *don't* use 'Replace All' or you will end up replacing even the letters that should be capitals.

■ Speaking of the spell-checker (in Word 3.1 and 4.x, at any rate): Matthew Williams of Dunstable points out that it won't recognise the word 'childcare' and will suggest 'kidnap' instead!

Ahem. Matthew makes amends with some tips for what some people think of as the least useful Control Panel:

■ Most of the people I know find it very difficult to actually see exactly where the cities are on the map. Hold down the [option] key when you open the Map Control Panel and you will find a greatly magnified map, making things much easier to see. You can also find the middle of nowhere by typing 'MID' – it's somewhere down by the Antarctic. To view the cities in alphabetical order, hold down the [option] key while you click on 'Find'. Lastly, you can have a colour map by copying the colour map in the Scrapbook (just use [command] [C]) and pasting it into the Map Control Panel (with [command] [V]). However, having a colour version does slow down the scrolling of the map.

Unleash the Power!

While the newest Macs boast blistering performance, most of us are still struggling with geriatric Macs with all the power of a zimmer frame in the Indy 500. Don't despair! Here's how to unleash the potential of your Mac...

What do you use your Mac for, and how much time do you waste waiting for it to do it? If you find yourself drumming your fingers, cursing, or making endless cups of tea (and subsequent trips to the bathroom), then you need to soup-up your Mac.

This can be a problem even if you only use your Mac for word processing. Software designers get lazy – the more power there is, the more they use. Applications are getting better, but they're also getting fatter and slower. This means you need to keep buying quicker Macs just to work as fast as you're used to.

But buying a new Mac every year is a little expensive – although prices are steadily falling (in power-per-pound terms). And while prices might not fall as far as you'd like, they fall far

enough and fast enough to give your old Mac the second-hand value of a pre-war Skoda.

An accelerator card is the answer. After all, why bother changing your keyboard, mouse, monitor and box when all you need to fix is the hardware inside? Practically any Mac can be accelerated (even a PowerMac – details in a future issue), and there are two main ways of doing it. First, you can go for an official Apple upgrade. In fact, this is more of a conversion. The hardware inside your box is essentially swapped for a new model's. Your Mac has to go back to the dealer for this, and you pay a premium price, but what you get back is a bona fide Mac – that is, its warranty is still intact. Of course, you can only do this if there's an off-the-shelf upgrade suitable for your model.

The second option is cheaper and quicker,

and comes in the form of a third-party accelerator card. You can fit this yourself, quickly, and at home. The trouble is that you lose your original warranty the moment you open up the case. (Only one Macintosh model so far – the 630 – enables you to add a card without invalidating the warranty.) If your Mac is more than a year old, this isn't a problem (the warranty is out of date anyway). On the other hand, if your Mac is less than a year old – well, you'll just have to take your chances. Or, if you are feeling especially insecure, you could always take out a maintenance contract.

What will accelerators do?

You can speed up mathematical calculations and rendering work with a co-processor, speed

A CLASSIC CASE TO CRACK!

The Mac Classic was never designed to be upgraded. There is an expansion slot of sorts, but this is usually taken up by a much-needed memory card. You have to clip the accelerator cards directly over the motherboard, which is a bit of a bodge and a worrying thing to have to try to do.

First, though, you need to get the case open. For this you need a special tool kit. We got ours from MacWarehouse (tel: 0800 181 332) for £14.

Tool number one is a special long-handled Allen key that looks a bit like a malformed coat-hanger. You need this, first, because the Classic case is held together by four screws with special heads, and second, because two of them are deeply recessed in the carrying handle, and no other tool will do the job.

Tool number two is a heavy-duty bulldog clip known as a Mac cracker. You insert the

closed jaws of the clip in the gap in the casing around the front of the machine, then squeeze the levers of the clip together to slowly prise the two parts of the case apart, carefully working your way around to lever it off evenly.

Tool number three is an earthing strap that goes round your wrist at one end and plugs into your Mac's mains lead at the other. Don't worry, it's smarter than it sounds. The strap is connected *only* to the earth pin and you *don't* leave the wall socket switched on. The purpose of this bizarre fashion accessory is to discharge static electricity from your body. High static charges can damage chips, so this is a wise precaution. In the absence of an earthing strap you should touch some substantial metal object before handling chips. *Don't* touch anything substantial and metallic inside your

Mac Classic! This machine has a built-in monitor that can carry lethal voltages even after the machine has been turned off. Make sure you keep your twitchy fingers well away from the high-tension circuitry towards the front of the machine – unless you want to turn into a six-foot kebab, that is.

Having got the back off the Classic, which is easy with the right tools, you then have to remove the memory card (if fitted) before disconnecting three leads from the motherboard. This is especially tricky, unless your name is Edward Plierhands. Having done that, you slide out the motherboard and proceed to clip on the accelerator. The motherboard slides back in, the leads are re-connected, the memory card goes back in and you check your Mac boots up OK before putting the case back on. Personally, I'd get a dealer to do it – or get a new Mac...

up your monitor's display with a graphics card, and speed up your networking capabilities with an Ethernet card. But the sort of speed increases we're looking at here are based on upgrades to your machine's Central Processing Unit (CPU). The accelerators we're looking at all replace your Mac's built-in CPU with either a faster version of the same chip (a double-speed 68000 for a Mac Classic, for example) or the next chip up in the Motorola series (a

68040 CPU for the 68030-based IICI, say).

Instead of just tarting up one aspect of your Mac's performance, these accelerators will make it do everything quicker. Sometimes dramatically quicker.

What won't they do?

Although these accelerators will make your Mac quicker all round, there are certain things

they won't do. For example, if you've got a mono Mac, it's going to stay mono. If you're lumbered with a measly 2Mb of RAM in your Classic, 2Mb it's going to stay. Fed up with waiting hours to load stuff off floppies? Well, your drive's not going to spin any faster just because your motherboard's suddenly running at ten times the speed.

There's one more thing accelerators won't do. They (or their driver software) won't

Upgrading a Mac Classic

The Classic and SE (and the old Plus, for that matter) are special cases, both figuratively and literally. Figuratively, because they're the models that most need accelerating (being based on the lowly 68000) and literally, because you need special tools to get into them. It's a bit ironic, though, that the machines most in need of accelerators are also the hardest and most dangerous to fit.

and the Cathode Ray Tube, which is only inches away from your fingers while you're working, can carry potentially lethal charges even after the machine has been switched off. Don't take any risks – a faster Mac isn't really something to die for.

You need to install additional software with both Harris boards (as you do with the other accelerators tested here). The software takes

To discover how difficult it was and, indeed, whether it was worth doing, we took a standard Mac Classic and fitted it with two Harris accelerators – the Performer 2 (a 16MHz 68000 to replace the 8MHz standard chip) and the Performer Pro (a 68030 chip).

Danger zone

If you've never fitted an upgrade before you need strong fingers, strong nerves and possibly some fairly strong headache pills. In fact, you really shouldn't do this at home. Most dealers who sell accelerators will also fit them for you – and remember, they've done it before. The design of Classics makes them easy to damage,

the form of a Control Panel document with various settings to control the new hardware.

Both boards met the maker's claims, both during the benchmark tests and while using real applications. Given the obstinate design of the Classic, fitting the boards was as painless as you could realistically expect, but we did have one problem. The boards are held in place partly by a snap fit, partly by a sticky pad. The

sticky pad was missing from one of the boards, and this made it an absolute pig to get up and running. The fit is crucial. The Classic's problem is that it has a motherboard that was never designed to have anything clipped to it – and nothing makes that more obvious than spending three hours heaving your motherboard in and out while you try to get the little sod to boot up.

The other Harris board, though, still had its sticky pad, and that worked first time. Significant, that. All Harris boards are shipped with these sticky pads, and you shouldn't expect the problems we had.

Performer 2

Harris's Performer 2 substitutes a 16MHz 68000 for the standard 8MHz unit, so you'd expect it to run twice as fast – which it does. But first, the installation...

Accelerators need software to modify your Mac's System before they can run. The instructions with the Performer 2 tell you how to do it. Twice. There are instructions in the manual, and revised instructions on a separate leaflet inserted in the box. Not the best way to inspire confidence! Nevertheless, installation went without a hitch.

The supplied disk contains graphics demos

THE BENCHMARK TEST

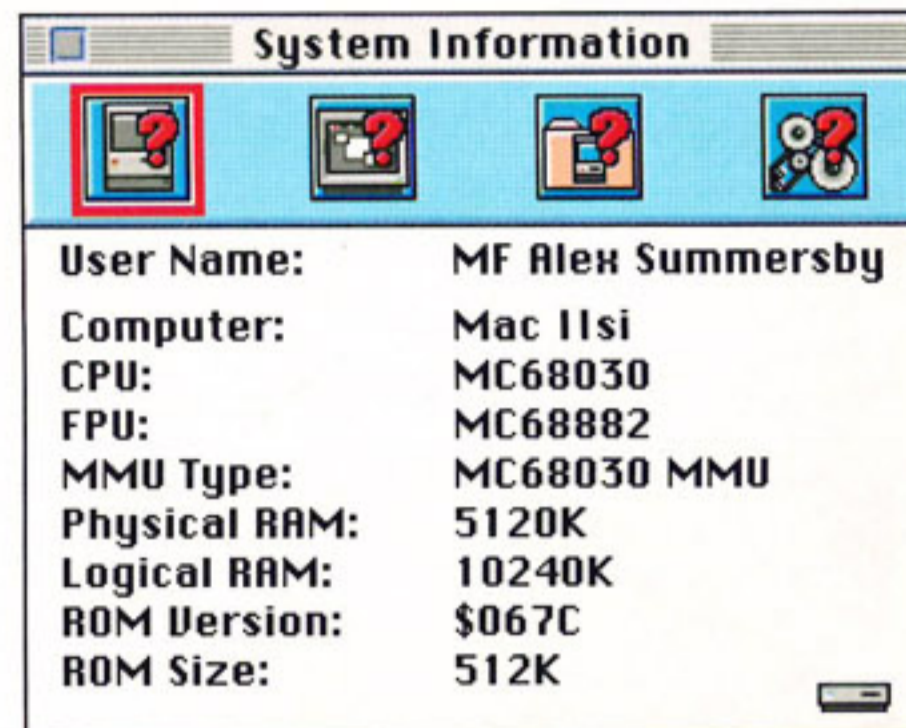
Harris thoughtfully provides the hardware testing program *Speedometer* with both of its Classic boards to enable buyers to check the speed increases of their accelerated Macs. We used *Speedometer* to test all the accelerators detailed here.

This software runs exhaustive tests on just about every aspect of your hardware, but these tests break down into four main areas: CPU (general processor speed), graphics, disk and maths. The results are expressed as factors – a Mac Classic is the baseline performance figure, with a value of 1.

We've already explained that accelerators won't make your floppy drives run any faster (see 'What won't they do?', page 36), but they can improve the performance of your hard drive – by 10-20%, in fact. The overall performance ratings quoted in 'The results' boxes include the disk performance figure, and since this rarely improves much, it has the effect of depressing the results. To

get a truer indication of the speed increases achieved, eliminate the disk speed measurement from the comparisons.

Benchmark tests enable you to measure

speed scientifically and under controlled conditions. They don't tell you what's going to happen in the real world, with real software, though, which is why we set up three less scientific, but more realistic software tests (see the 'The Real-life test' box on page 40 for more details). These measured speed when running a word processor, spreadsheet and graphics package.



This neat little set of tests checks out your Mac's performance in four principal areas and then delivers a final speed rating – relative to a the benchmark of a humble Classic.

necessarily be 100%, hand-on-heart compatible with every single piece of software you might have installed. Major applications aren't a problem – it's those clever little Extensions and shareware widgets that cause the trouble.

You shouldn't let compatibility worries affect your decision to buy an accelerator, but you

for a visual comparison, and the *Speedometer* hardware-testing program we used for all the accelerators on test. With the Performer 2's high-speed RAM cache switched on, the Classic ran at twice the normal speed, on average. This figure is an average of the results of tests conducted to determine CPU speed, graphics, disk handling and maths functions. With the cache switched off, the chip was just a couple of percent faster. Some games became unplayable with the Mac running twice as fast, though, so you may need this cache-toggling feature periodically.

Performer Pro

The installation procedure for this Harris card is the same as for the Performer 2. First you move all non-standard Extensions and Control Panels, then you copy the special Control Panel to your System Folder. Then you unplug the Macintosh, open it up, remove the motherboard and plug in the card.

Again, the Performer Pro does everything the makers claim. With its high-speed cache enabled, the accelerated Mac runs at up to ten times its normal speed. If your games now run too fast to play, or you can't type fast enough to keep up, you can reduce this to about six times normal speed by switching off the cache.



should bear software/hardware conflicts in mind as a faint possibility.

Are they easy to fit?

Ah! Well, to fit an accelerator, you've actually got to take your machine apart and start fid-

dling around with printed circuit boards, and software installation, and possible Extension clashes, and modifications to your System, and warranty invalidations, and possible electrocution... and what if it doesn't work when you've finished it?

Stop panicking! With the exception of the

STOP PRESS

Just before we went to press we discovered that Harris is no longer trading. We'll bring you full details of where these products are available as soon as we have them.

Both the Harris cards have slots for maths co-processors, and neither requires extra RAM – they use the memory already fitted to the motherboard. This is a bit of a shame, actually, because if there's one thing the Classic needs more than a faster chip, it's more RAM. The standard machine can only go up to 4Mb, and neither accelerator offers the chance to fit more.

If it wasn't for that, the choice would be clear. Given that the Pro card is two to three times faster than the Performer 2, that's the one to go for. But remember: while the standard Mac Classic is cute, by today's standards it's a museum-piece – and a slow CPU is only one of its problems. If you want to perk up your Classic and you're *sure* that a faster chip is all you need, buy the Performer Pro. Otherwise, grit your teeth, sell your Classic at a heartbreaking loss and buy a bigger Mac.

Mac Classic, all Macintoshes are desperately easy to take apart. All you have to do is disconnect the monitor, lift it off, remove the 'security screw' from the back panel (if there is one) and the lid of the system unit simply unclips. And there, underneath... is a big space. This is when you remember how much you paid for your Mac, and wonder who's kidding whom. You'll see a power supply, a hard drive, a floppy drive, and a motherboard with some sockets on it. In fact, you'll see exactly what the instructions tell you you'll see. And the instructions will almost certainly have an exhaustive description of how and where to plug in the accelerator, along with a diagram with an arrow in case you're not sure. Most connectors will only fit the 'right' way anyway.


All in all, you'll probably be OK. You should take a few precautions, though. First, make sure the Mac is off, and second, make sure you touch some substantial metal object (a radiator or tap will do nicely) to discharge any static electricity from your body before you touch anything with chips on it. And do read the instructions carefully.

Are they a cheap option?


List all the things wrong with your Mac, then compare this list with the things an accelerator will fix. If it all comes down to speed, an accelerator is a whole lot cheaper than a new Mac. But if you want to set up a CD-ROM authoring studio and all you have is a Mac Classic, an

HOW TO CUSTOMISE

Fitting an accelerator is a piece of cake in a 'modular' Mac – in other words, anything other than a Classic. The lids come off easily and all the cards tested came with clear instructions as to where the card should be plugged in and how to install the necessary software subsequently. However, don't forget that if something does go wrong and your Mac is damaged, it won't be covered by the warranty. And don't forget that chips are sensitive to static discharges and the human body is rather good at generating them. So remember to wear the earthing wrist-straps (if provided) or touch something heavy and metallic before handling the cards.



1 Take a look at the back of your LC's system unit. In the middle of the back plate just below the top there may be a screw that needs removing.



2 Now press with your thumbs on the tops of the sprung plastic tabs holding the lid shut and prise them open with your fingertips. The lid should lift off easily.

accelerator is a waste of money. You will want 24-bit colour, a CD-ROM drive, a wheelbarrow full of RAM, a new monitor, NuBus slots... no, just forget it.

Sometimes a new machine is the only sensible option, and you have to be pretty ruthless about your decision. But if it's simply a question of outright speed – you're just tired of waiting for your current machine to grind through this month's budget forecasts, or sick of collecting cobwebs while it scrolls through your latest literary masterpiece, then an accel-

erator will dramatically improve your quality of life (though maybe not the masterpiece).

The cards we've tested

Isn't it great that every Mac has the same Desktop, the same basic System software, the same way of handling disks, files and directories... and a different set of expansion slots? Wouldn't it be nice if one accelerator card fitted all Macs? Dream on! As a rule, one accelerator fits one Macintosh. There are exceptions – DayStar, for

Upgrading a Mac LC

While not as far gone as the Classic in terms of sluggishness, the LC still needs an accelerator. Let's face it, the only other place you'll find a 68020 nowadays is in the British Museum. Thankfully, the LC opens up with fabulous ease. Unplug and lift off the monitor, then find the two plastic catches along the back edge of the CPU box. Lever these outwards and the lid will simply lift off. If it doesn't, that's because your machine has a small 'security screw' between the catches. This can be taken out with an ordinary Phillips screwdriver. As you look down from the front of the machine, the LC's Processor Direct Slot (PDS) runs vertically down the left-hand side of the motherboard, near the back. You can't miss it. It's the only thing the accelerator you're holding in your hand will plug into. And it will only plug in one way, so you can't get that wrong either.

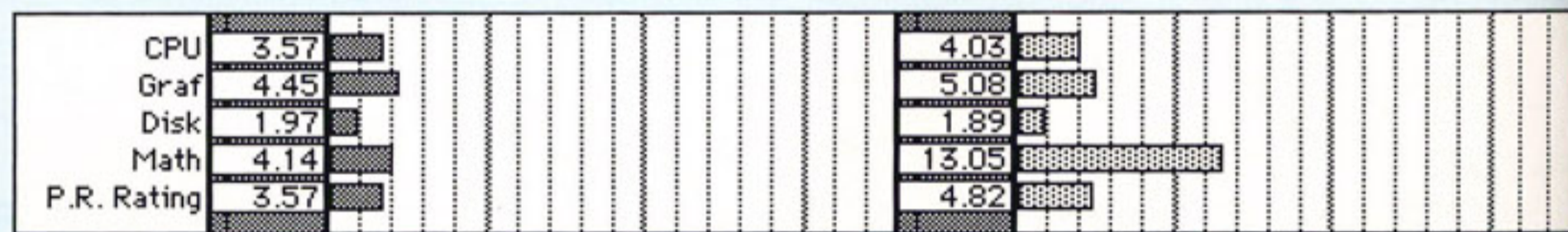
Software installation is as straightforward as it is with the Classic. More so, actually, because you can boot up with the board inserted without the software. Once the board's in, you can copy across its Control Panel, set it up if necessary, then restart.

Intensifier

This board, from Total Systems, is strange. The installation was the same as for the other LC boards – it's just the test results that left us completely baffled...

Our board was configured with a 68030

CPU and a companion 68882 maths co-processor – a nice meaty combination. The specs are interesting, too. Maths co-processors dramatically speed up maths-intensive work, but only if the software looks for them. Some software uses maths routines, but doesn't look for a co-processor. Instead, the maths is handled by the *Standard Apple Numeric Environ-*

ment (*SANE*) software. *SANE* isn't especially quick, and certainly isn't in the same league as a dedicated co-processor. What the Intensifier board and software do is distinctly clever. It can divert maths calculations that would normally be handled by *SANE* into its own 68882 co-processor, thereby making them a lot faster. That's the theory, at any rate.

In practice, our board didn't quite behave that way. We got the big general speed in-

crease you'd expect from the 68030 chip, but our spreadsheet test actually ran *slower* than on a plain, unaccelerated LC. Yes, we did switch the *SANE* option on and off in the Control Panel and it didn't make any difference. Odd!

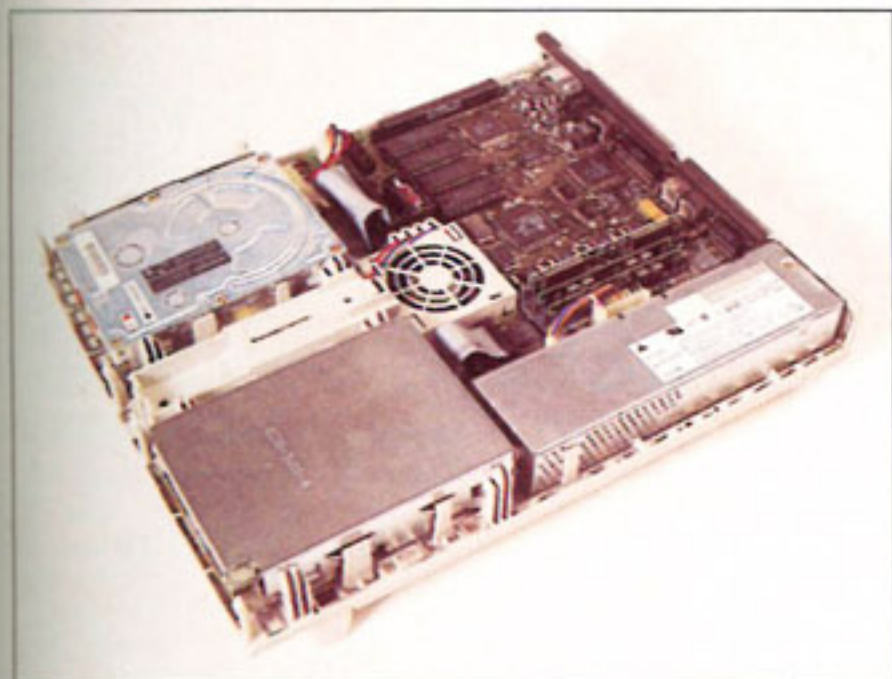
Pro33 LC

Formac Elektronik's Pro33 replaces the LC's standard 68020 with a 33MHz 68030. You also get a maths co-processor that its makers claim

works up to nine times faster than a standard LC with software that uses a co-pro. Unlike the Intensifier board, though, there's no special trickery involved to divert maths instructions from *SANE*.

The Pro33 gave our LC a massive performance boost. So much so that we didn't really want to take it out again. But we did. It ran without any problems, but it did get a bit hot. Not hot enough to boil a cup of water, but hot

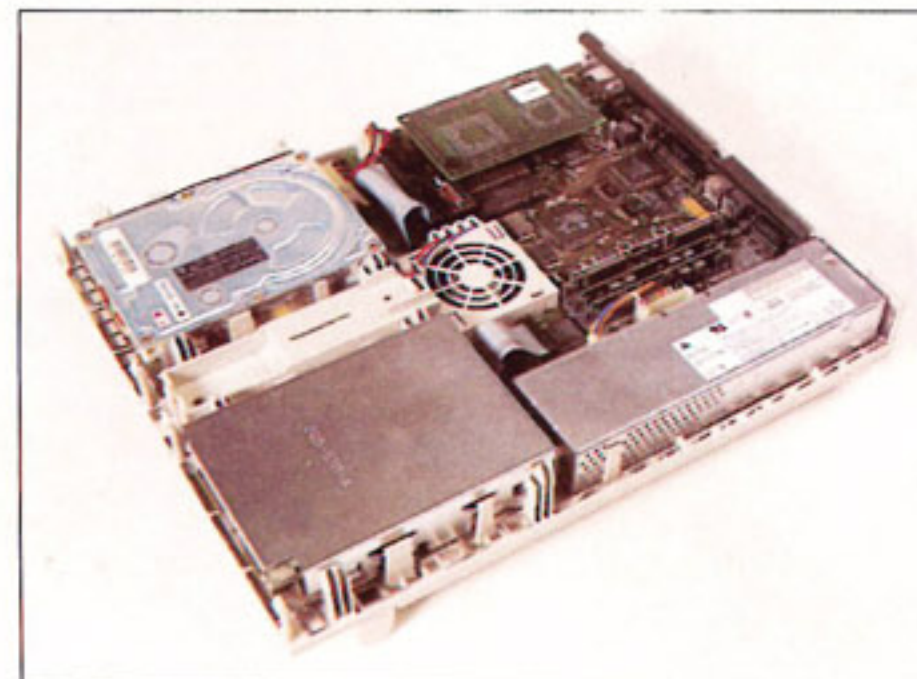
YOUR LC WITH GO-FASTER STRIPES

example, sells a 'Universal PowerCache' that plugs into several models with the appropriate adapter – but for the most part, accelerator cards have to be made for specific models.

Which is why we didn't get together a whole bunch of accelerators and compare them – they are different products that are designed for different machines.

Instead, we picked three typical Mac models and checked out accelerators for each. The three models we chose were the 68000-based Classic (if ever a machine needed an accel-

erator, this is it), the 68020-based LC (and it seemed so quick when we bought it!) and the 68030-based IICI (which suddenly looked very pedestrian when the '040 machines came out).

What do you get?

Of course, with each of the cards here you get a faster CPU – either a faster version of the standard unit, or a bigger, better chip altogether. What you also get is a high-speed RAM cache. A what? Well, your Mac's built-in RAM is no

faster than it needs to be. This keeps the cost down, but means that faster CPUs won't give you much of a speed increase on their own. A faster CPU needs to move stuff in out of memory faster, and that's what a high-speed RAM cache achieves. It's a neat solution the manufacturers use to give you the benefits of a faster CPU while still using your existing RAM.

And there are other ways of speeding up your Mac. If you use spreadsheets or CAD packages, your Mac's having to handle some pretty intensive maths processing – and this

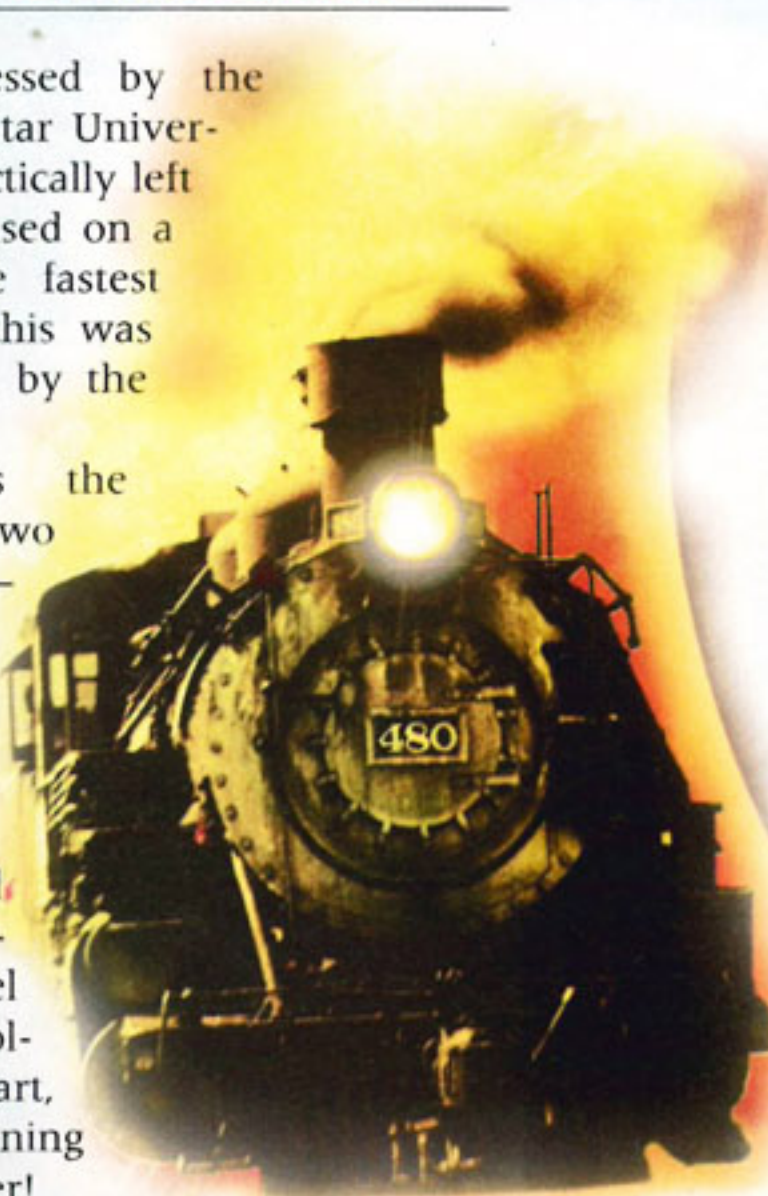
enough to make a passer-by howl when we held their hand near it.

This is one thing to note about accelerators: they are third-party products, and won't always be as slick and neat as proper Apple gear. They usually fit well enough, but in this case something odd was clearly happening to our LC's internal air circulation. Having said that, it worked without a hitch both during and after the tests. Maybe that passer-by was just being a bit wimpish.

Universal PowerCache

If we were impressed by the Pro33 LC, the DayStar Universal PowerCache practically left us salivating. It's based on a 50MHz 68030, the fastest CPU on test, and this was certainly borne out by the outstanding results.

Installation was the same as the other two LC accelerators – power down the Mac, lift off the lid, plug in the accelerator, reassemble and restart your Mac. Next you need to copy the PowerCache Control Panel into the System Folder. When you restart, your LC will be running up to five times faster!

A pretty even spread of results here, with the Intensifier board being the least impressive, while the DayStar PowerCache gave the most spectacular increase in performance. Once you've installed and run the PowerCache in your LC, you really won't want to take it out again. We didn't.

Upgrading a Mac IIci

The IIci is as easy to open up as the LC. Once you've removed any 'security screw' on the back panel, the lid simply lifts off the system unit. Unlike the LC, the IIci has NuBus slots as well as a PDS, but the instructions will leave you in no doubt as to which slot you use.

We tested one card in our IIci, just to give you an example of the sort of speed increases you can expect, and to check that the installation was every bit as trouble free as with the LC. The IIci is no slouch, but the Turbo 040 card made it look like one!

Turbo 040

DayStar's Turbo 040 is based – not surprisingly – on the Motorola 68040. This chip is not only much faster than the 68030, it also has its own built-in floating point unit. DayStar's QuadControl software can intercept any maths heading for the Mac's SANE system and re-route it to the much faster 68040. This speeds up CAD, 3D-rendering, spreadsheets and other maths-intensive software.

This was borne out by the real-world software tests. Our *Excel* document recalculated an amazing eight times faster, while both the graphics and text scrolling tests produced results that were three times quicker than the standard IIci. Who needs a Quadra?

Do you get diminishing returns when you accelerate an already quick Macintosh? No! The Turbo 040 made a spectacular difference to our IIci – in fact this was the card that produced the biggest speed increase of all those reviewed. The moral of the story is that your Mac is never so quick you can't make it quicker! (Watch for the PowerMac accelerators in *MACFORMAT* soon!)

will happen a lot faster if your Mac has a maths co-processor fitted. Some models already have them; many don't. Either way, most accelerator cards either have a maths co-processor built in or offer a slot to fit one (available as an option).

Maths co-processors are great – providing

you are running software that 'looks' for them. Otherwise, the maths side of things is handled by the Macintosh's own built-in *SANE* (Standard Apple Numeric Environment) software. Or is it? Two of the cards on test rather sneakily divert maths from *SANE* and point it towards

their on-board co-processors. Smart.

Most of all, though, what you get is a Mac that's been given a new and spectacular turn of speed – cheaply and easily. Maybe your faithful plastic pal will be good for a few more years after all...?

THE REAL-LIFE TEST

Benchmark software like *Speedometer* is one thing, but how do these accelerators stack up when using real-life applications? We ran some tests based on everyday software. These mostly confirm what the benchmark tests say, but also throw up a few surprises here and there.

The spreadsheet test

All the machines were tested for speed in handling a big spreadsheet. The task was to calculate the length of a light year from the

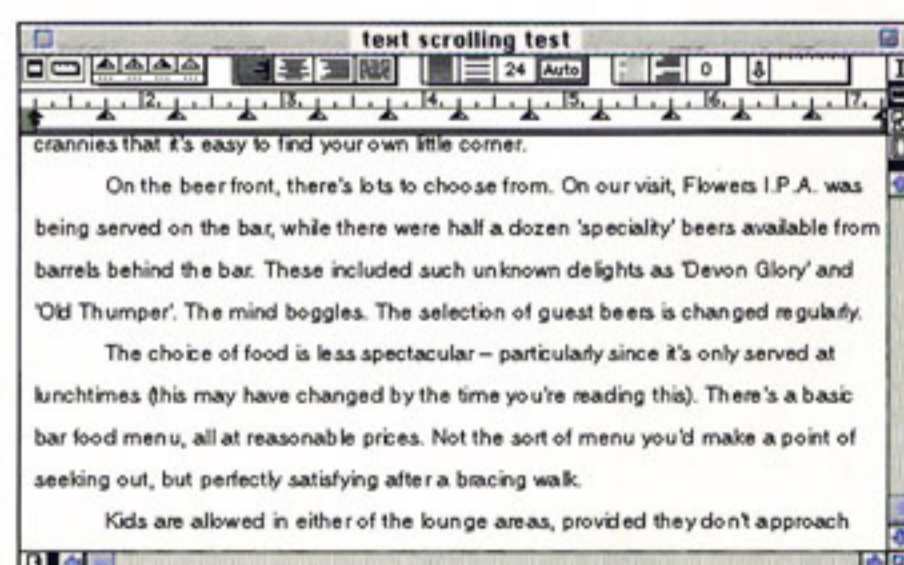

speed of light, then work back down to the speed of light – 600 times in a row. The final result was the average of two or more runs.

Text scrolling test

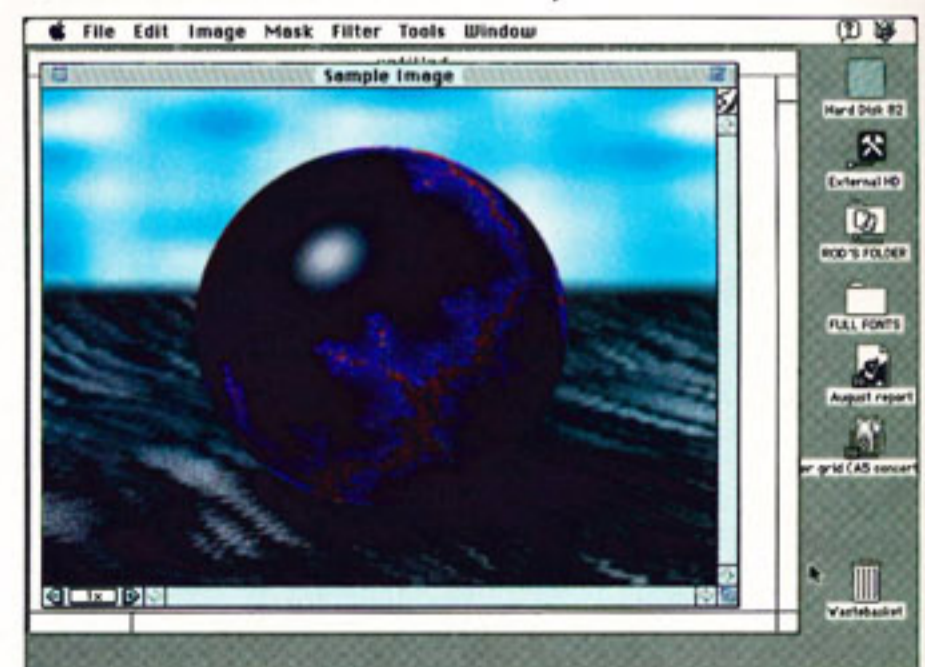
We set up an 8,000-word *Nisus* document and then we measured the time that it took to scroll through the document by keeping the mouse button down over the downward scroll arrow.



How long does it take to scroll through an 8,000-word *Nisus* document? This is where we find out!

Graphics scrolling test

A sample image provided by *ColorIt!* was viewed at eight times the normal magnification. Then we measured the time taken to scroll from the top-left to the top-right corner. On a low-end Mac this involves positively geological timescales (leave a house-brick on the mouse button).



Bitmapped images can be slow to move around. We found out exactly how slow with this *ColorIt!* sample image.

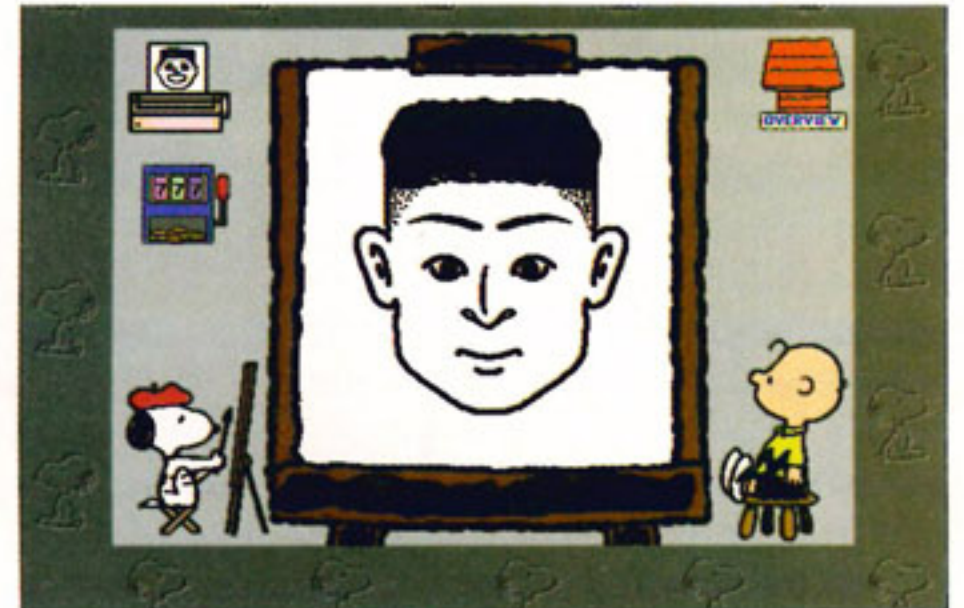
There are so many educational titles available for the Mac that deciding which package to buy can be a truly tortuous affair. First you have to consider who the program is aimed at: in other words, what age group and which nationality. You also need to consider the program's intent – is it a general purpose educational tool, or does it support a particular curriculum? Is it informative? Entertaining? Easy to use? Does it represent good value for money?

That's where we come in. Over the next few pages we'll be peeking behind the packaging of the educational titles currently competing for shelf space to bring you the ultimate MACFORMAT buyer's guide.

offer little to hold the interest of even the most immature minds.

Snoopy is in a different league and is well suited to children in the UK. The five activities are more considered and open-ended, and it's a fair bet that young children will return to this program many times.

The 'Maths' games (which include darts, and *Peanuts*' characters riding on buses and dividing up cookies) provide a range of activities based on addition, subtraction and division. All include good visual clues. There's also a Maths

game for one or two players. The five comic strips, which are read with plenty of expression, have lots of 'hot spots'. If you click on these, amusing things happen. It's just a shame that you can't record your own voice reading the strip, or print out the screens so that they can be coloured in by hand.

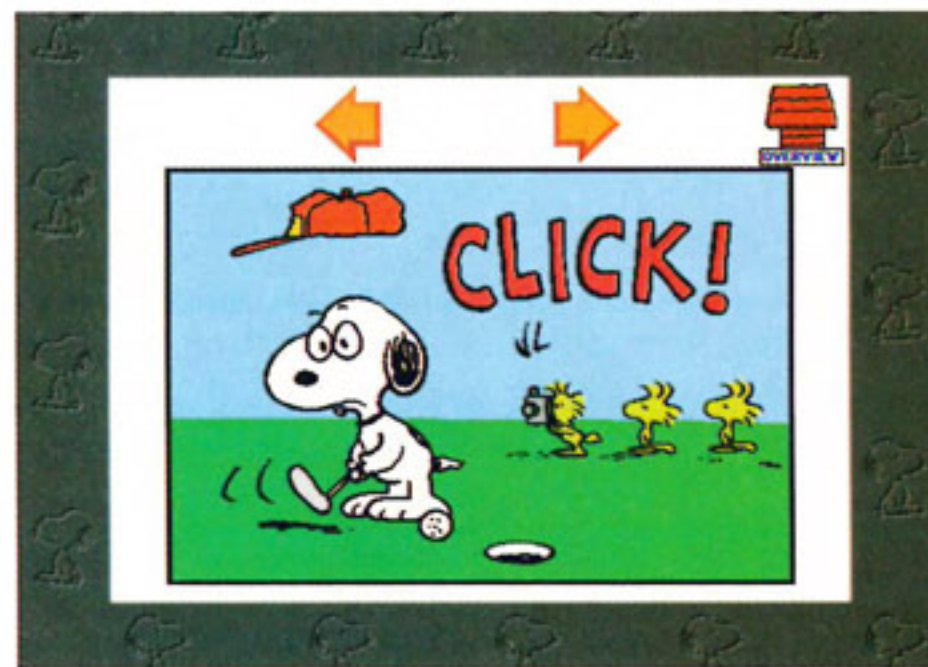
The 'Music' game is very good: you choose from rock, reggae, jazz, rave or country and assemble a tune from the 'licks and riffs' provided. The score for the tunes looks a little like musical notation, which helps to prepare children for the type of music programs they're likely to use in schools.

The 'Face Maker' is good too. Here children can select different features to put together, or draw their own faces from scratch. When they've finished they can (for once) print out what they've done – a definite plus. All in all, this is a good program for young children.

Snoopy is a stark contrast to the *Peanuts* program that's currently doing the rounds. Basically it's much, much better. *Peanuts* is overtly American – one of the tasks involves identifying and arranging the US states. And it isn't actually very good. Its 'Colouring Book' leaves much to be desired, and the games in the 'Fun' section

PRIMARY-SCHOOL CHILDREN

The bulk of the software advertised for this age group is to do with the basic skills of reading, writing and arithmetic. It's often difficult to know from the advertising blurb which packages are worth buying, especially because most claim to teach children everything they need to know – an impossible task for any program.

So how do you decide which titles to buy? Well, here are a few pointers worth bearing in mind...

- Software for this age group should be fun – if children don't enjoy using it, they won't come back to it. You know what makes your children laugh, or keeps their attention. Try to keep that in mind when making buying decisions.

- Beware of products that come from the US – often they haven't been adapted for a

UK audience and contain references that mean very little to British kids.

- Children should be in control of the software, not the other way round. Many programs not only control what happens on screen, but also what children are allowed to do and the words they are allowed to use. The best software, by and large, enables children to be in control.

- Try to get programs that encourage kids to continue their work away from the Mac. Effective learning occurs when children work with a variety of media – they soon get bored watching a computer screen.

Don't be afraid to give children access to word processors, databases, DTP programs and spreadsheets. These are likely to be of great use not only for their homework but, increasingly, for activities of their own.

This program makes a huge assumption: that you want your children to learn to touch-type. Whether this is really a necessary skill for the program's intended audience, four to eight year olds, is a moot point. It's one that is frequently argued in educational circles. But all sides agree that some form of keyboard familiarity is

useful at this age, such as knowing roughly where the keys are and what they do. For instance, it's useful for all children who come anywhere near keyboards to realise that the [return] key is often used to confirm a choice.

Kid Keys could prove helpful in this process of familiarisation. Each of the three modules enables children to experiment or follow prompts. 'The Magic Keyboard' offers children the chance to explore the keyboard in a fun way (most will start with the letters of their name). Each time they press the keys they receive a reward, like a certain sound or word appearing on screen.

In the 'Dragon Tunes' module, each key produces a note, enabling children to make up their own melodies. There's also a prompted activity that invites them to play the Alphabet Song, which is still sung in many schools. Children are also encouraged to type the letters that form tunes such as 'Alouette', 'Jingle Bells' and 'Old MacDonald'. But beware: some of these songs will be more familiar to American children than to British ones.

The third module is the one which aims to teach youngsters how to touch-type. The skill is taught within the context of a game, where

certain letters and letter combinations enable monsters to escape from a castle. The correct finger positions are shown, but of course the program can't check if students are using the right fingers on the right keys.

Provided that children are allowed to play freely with the program, and aren't expected to learn how to touch-type, *Kid Keys* could be a good way of increasing their knowledge of both the alphabet and the letter keys of a standard keyboard. But it's a little bizarre that a program that claims to teach keyboard skills doesn't touch upon the use of the space bar, the [return] key, or any of the other function keys.

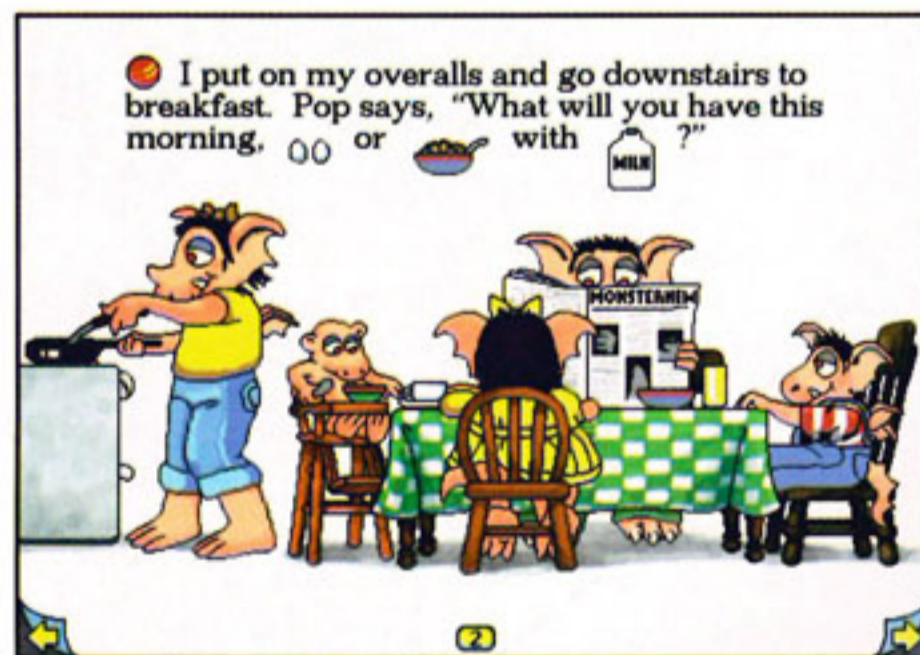

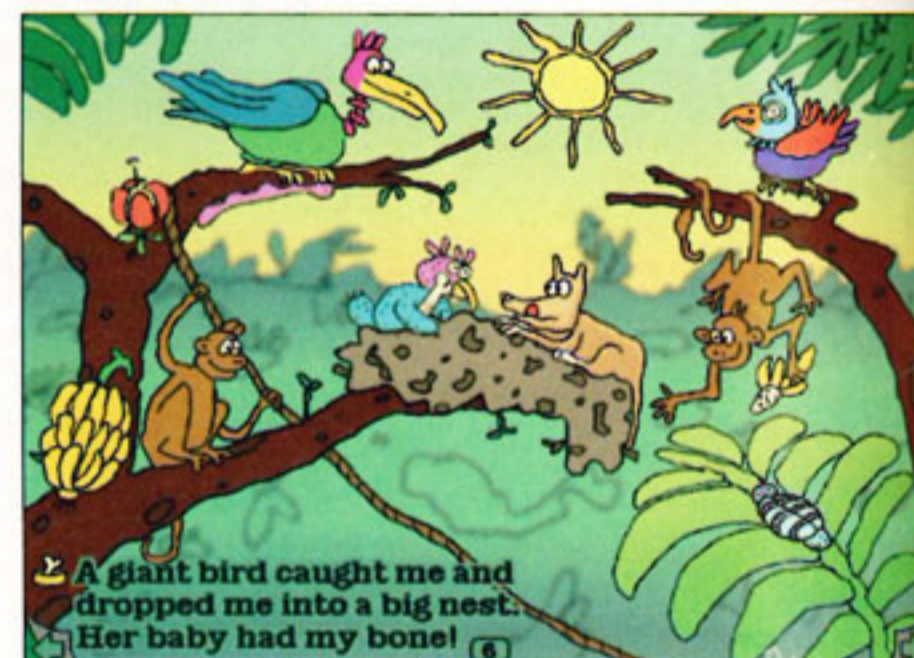

interactivity to the Mac: the words are read, while animated versions of the narrative's events appear on screen.

In addition, other things happen when you point and click on different parts of the screen – things that aren't always described in the text. This kind of hunt-and-find approach has been popular with printed books – like the *Spot* series – and it should entertain kids on screen too.

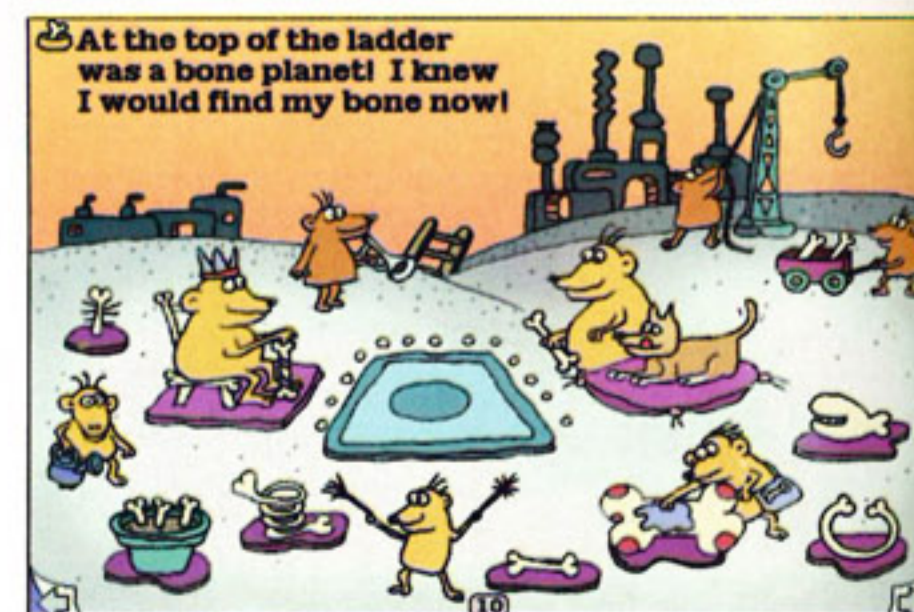
These programs illustrate the fact that reading is not a passive activity – they cry out for children to play with the words and pictures to discover the hidden parts of the story. Unfortunately, unlike printed books where the child's and parent's imaginations can always create new themes and sub-plots, once children have clicked everywhere on the *Living Books*' screens, nothing new can happen. A facility enabling children to record their own versions of the story would overcome this limitation.

All the *Living Books* titles come with a printed copy of the book in question. Given that many parents aren't confident about the shared reading of an electronic text, it's a good idea to start by reading the book together before moving on to the CD-ROM. Discussing the relative merits

SECONDARY-SCHOOL CHILDREN

The type of software children find useful changes as they go through secondary school, with a developing emphasis on reference material rather than programs that guide them through specific activities. Increasingly, generic software figures on their wish list – particularly now Christmas is closing fast – while word processors, DTP programs and databases become essential tools for doing homework.

At the same time, children also tend to become more sophisticated in their approach to computer activity. They question what's on screen rather than just accepting it because it's on a computer. They also begin to understand some of the processes that have culminated in the software they're using. For these reasons, it's probably not wise to buy any software for older children without discussing it with them first.

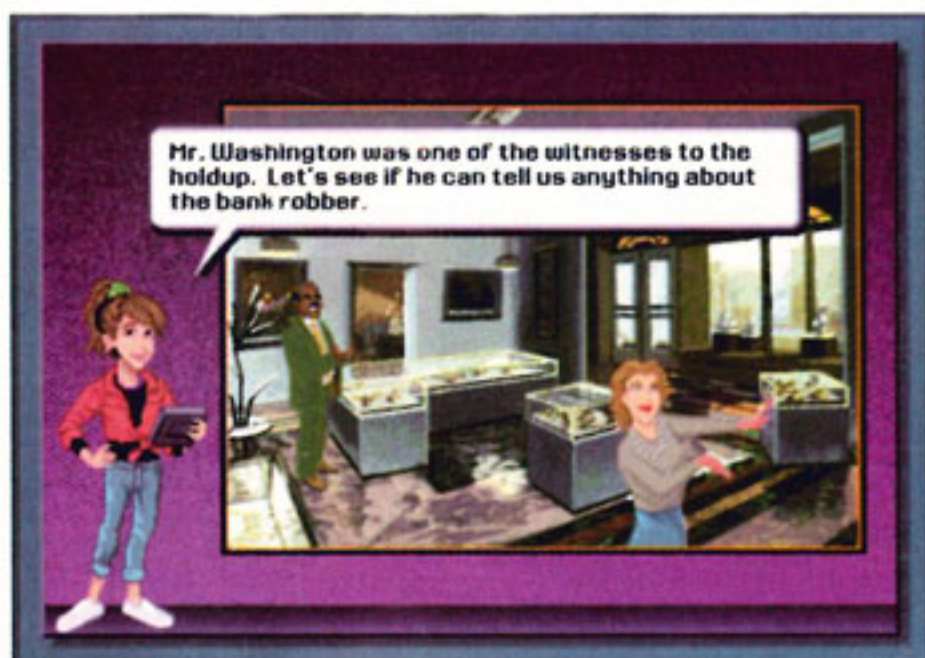
In *Eagle Eye Mysteries* you're cast in the role of a helper to Jake or Jennifer Eagle, two amateur detectives with an uncanny knack of finding mysteries to solve (fortunately, the OJ Simpson case isn't one of them). You investigate the crime scenes, look at clues and talk to suspects before reaching a conclusion and identifying the culprit - yeah, I know what you're thinking, but it's actually better than it sounds.

The original program contains three books of mysteries, each with a number of cases. The cases become harder to solve in the second and third books - and while the crimes are the same, the clues and culprits will be different. *The London Mysteries* are all based in the UK. Perhaps the most mysterious thing here is the American view of life in Britain.

The real educational value of these programs is in the variety of material that has to be digested and the deductive process that leads to the correct conclusion. Having reached your decision about the identity of the criminal, you are then asked which five clues have helped

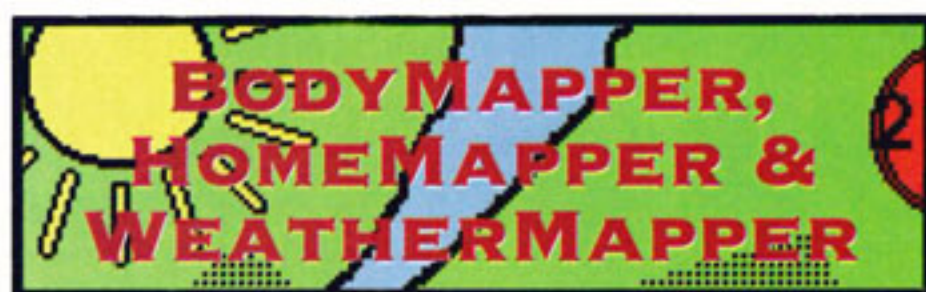

you identify the villain. With the more advanced mysteries, this is significantly less easy than it sounds.

Many children will find solving these mysteries fun, and they'll certainly have to read, digest and form hypotheses from the clues offered. These programs don't have explicit connections with subjects in the National Curriculum or 5-14 in Scotland, but the fact that children have to question the information presented to them by a computer will open their eyes to the possibility of suspect or biased information. Such awareness, some would argue, is an essential skill in today's information age.

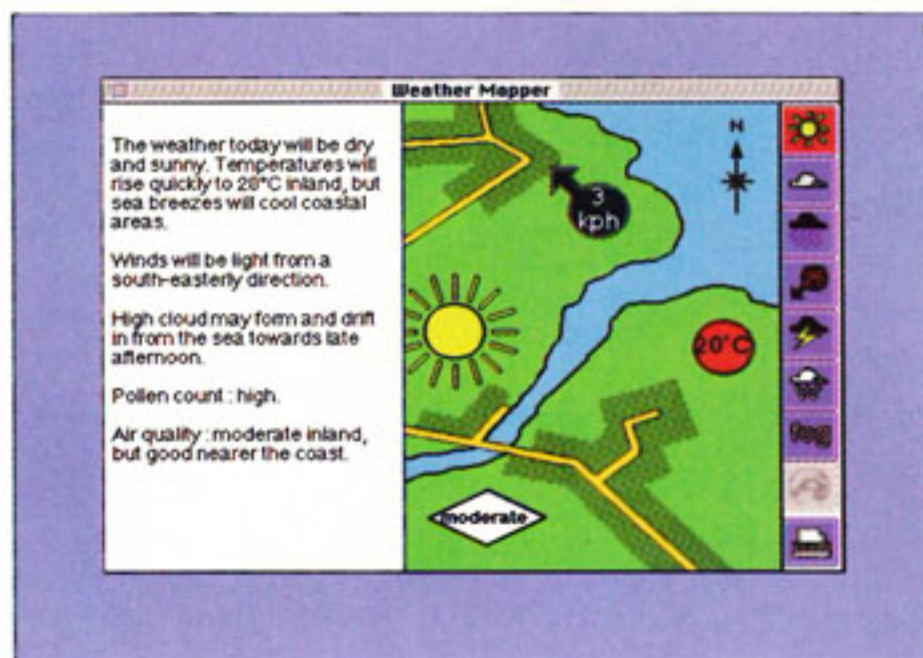

These three award-winning programs provide a range of resources connected with the subject in question – the home, the body and the weather. They don't attempt to teach children, as such. They provide information and stimuli to encourage kids to find out more about the subject, and about the methods for collecting and structuring data.

The Mapper series develops a whole range of skills: research reading, database retrieval and report writing, for instance. What's more, it's done in a way that shows that knowledge in the real world isn't really divided into the neat subjects on a school timetable. Despite that, though, the resources and approach taken by the programs will fit in with many school subjects – the documentation includes case studies describing how they may be used in lessons.

Many of the activities suggested in the programs can be performed by the whole family.



Plenty of detail, a good forecast – but it's not the same somehow without the smiling Suzanne Charlton, is it?

For instance, collecting weather data doesn't take a great deal of time or effort, but it can lead on to interesting discussions. Most of the images used in the programs can be cut and pasted into other applications and printed out, providing handy illustrations for a whole range of homework. 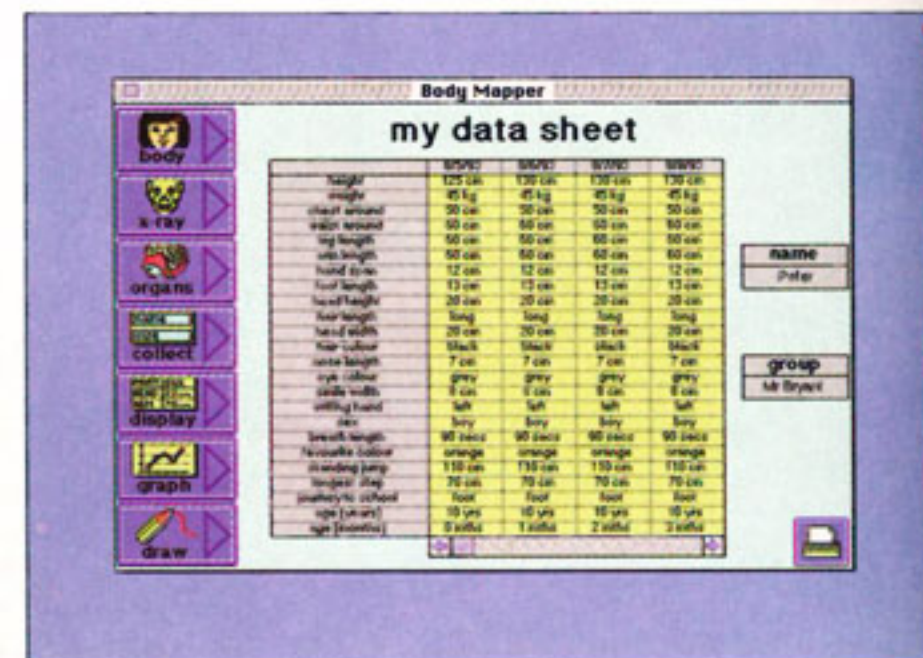
This is an awesome CD-ROM, and one that should prove fascinating even if your children don't need to study elements of astronomy for their science lessons.

RedShift provides 20 guided tours of the universe. Each shows a different astronomical event, such as an eclipse, or the way in which the Earth spins from day into night. There's more to it than that, though. It's a very flexible program, containing all the data you need to show almost anything from what the night sky looked like on the day you were born, to what the sky looks like from Jupiter's moons. You can even zoom in to get detailed fly-by pictures of the surface of Mars.

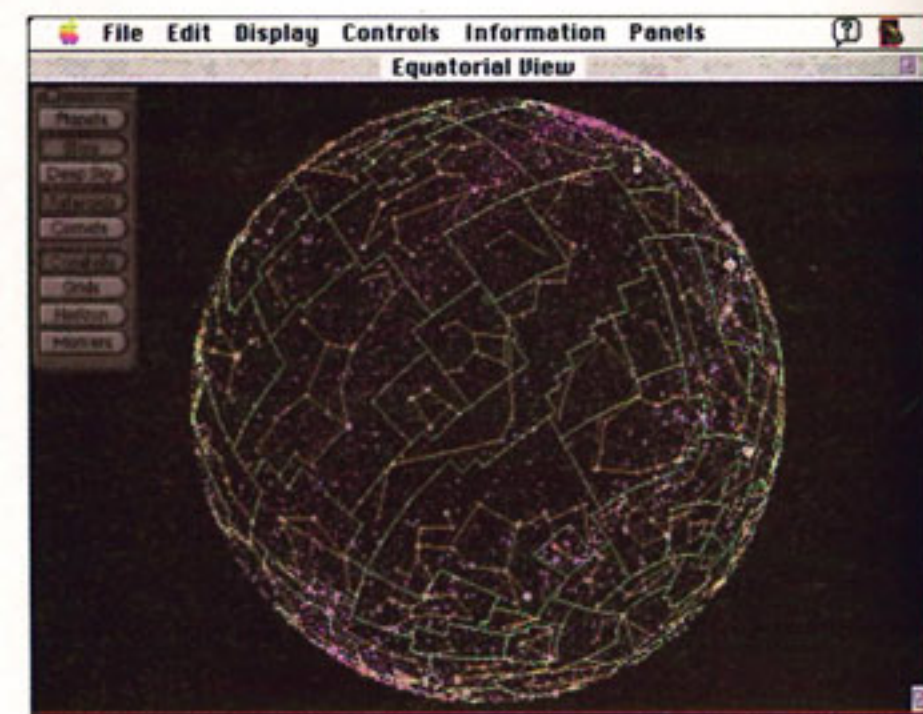
Having looked at a variety of pictures, you can save them as *QuickTime* movies and import them into other documents. You can also cut and paste extracts from the *Penguin Dictionary of Astronomy* to use in your essays (not that you'd want to do anything like that, of course!).

With over 700 photographs and a variety of NASA film clips, *RedShift* provides a wealth of resources that wouldn't normally be available to children at home. The program's controls do take a bit working out in places, but stick at it: it's worth persevering.

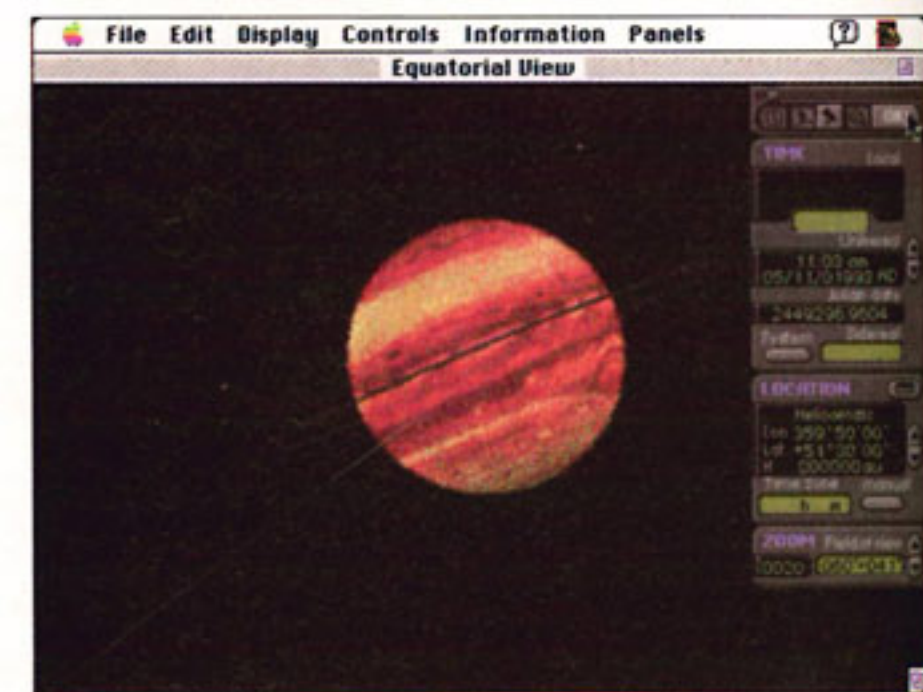

A test of character

At only £99, Xerox's TextBridge is the Mac's first affordable OCR software, so how does it compare to Caere's £699 OmniPage Professional 5.0?

Let's face it, the promise of a paperless office never did look likely to materialise, did it? More than ever, we're deluged with letters, announcements, invoices and faxes, which we'd just love to file away on our Macs – if only the people who'd sent them had also joined the digital revolution. And if you've just bought a Mac for your business, how do you begin to transfer the contents of all those filing cabinets to your hard disk? You take one look at those reams of client details, contacts, accounts, schedules and cor-

respondence and reach for the number of your local office temps bureau – only to find that you'll be paying £7 to £10 per hour for the services of a copy typist. The alternative, of course, is to buy some OCR software and attempt to save yourself some time, expense and hassle.

Last year you could have paid anything from £200 to a wallet-busting £1,000 for the software solution to the drudgery of inputting masses of text. So unless you regularly needed to convert paper documents into word processor files, you'd have had a hard job justi-

fying your software purchase. But with Xerox's TextBridge smashing the £100 barrier, it's no longer cost-effective to employ a temp, because a mere day and a half of a copy typist's services would pay for a permanent software equivalent. This is fine in theory, but does TextBridge work? Well, the answer is yes – and it's a real bargain to boot.

Of course, you need to include the price of a scanner in your equation, because without one you can't import the documents into your OCR software. But the good news is you only need one capable of scanning in mono and at 300 dpi. So the choice on offer immediately embraces the hand-held market and all the other low-cost flatbed models. In short, you needn't spend more than a few hundred pounds.

In my comparison of TextBridge and OmniPage Professional I've used three forms of hard

It was with more than dash of cynicism that I installed TextBridge on my Mac and set about putting it through its paces. I had the impression that OCR was more trouble than it was worth – and that its results required so much manual correction it'd be easier just to type it in and have done with it. But despite a few reservations, I'm now a convert. The reason's simple enough: TextBridge does get the job done.

After choosing what type of document you wish to process (be it a standard business letter, fax or dot-matrix printout), you can then set the orientation of the document to either portrait or landscape. Next you can choose whether to scan the document directly from within TextBridge, or to pull in a file that's been scanned elsewhere. Because you're able to preview the paper document before the OCR engines kick into gear, you can also

choose whether you wish to process the entire document or just parts of it.

Usefully, there's also the option to ignore half tones so the program doesn't spend an eternity trying to convert a picture into a thousand words. At this point, you can either scan the document and commence OCR processing, or just load an existing file and hit 'Go'. Some time later, depending on the complexity of the document involved, you're presented with the output file, all ready to load into your word processor.

It's here you begin to realise the shortcomings of OCR. While standard business letters are processed easily enough with acceptable results, fax sheets are trickier because so much depends on their initial quality. I found that I

had to re-scan the fax with more contrast in order for TextBridge to pick out the words. Even then the results were patchy.

And if you try to get it to handle multi-column layouts

with different typefaces and fonts, even bigger problems present themselves. First, the processing time (even on the fastest machines) is too prohibitive, and the error rate too high to make it worthwhile. So, if you wish to convert high-end documents into word processor-

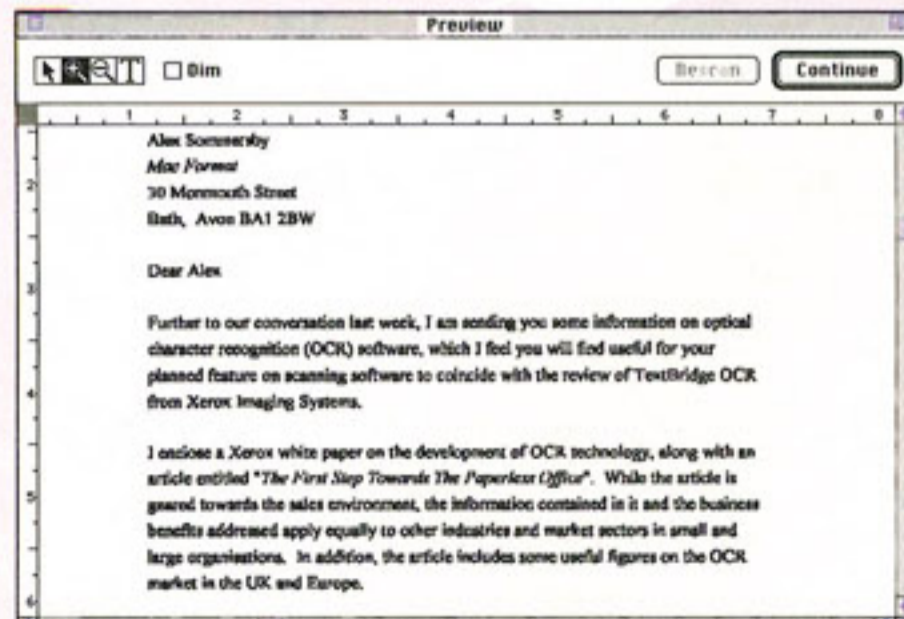

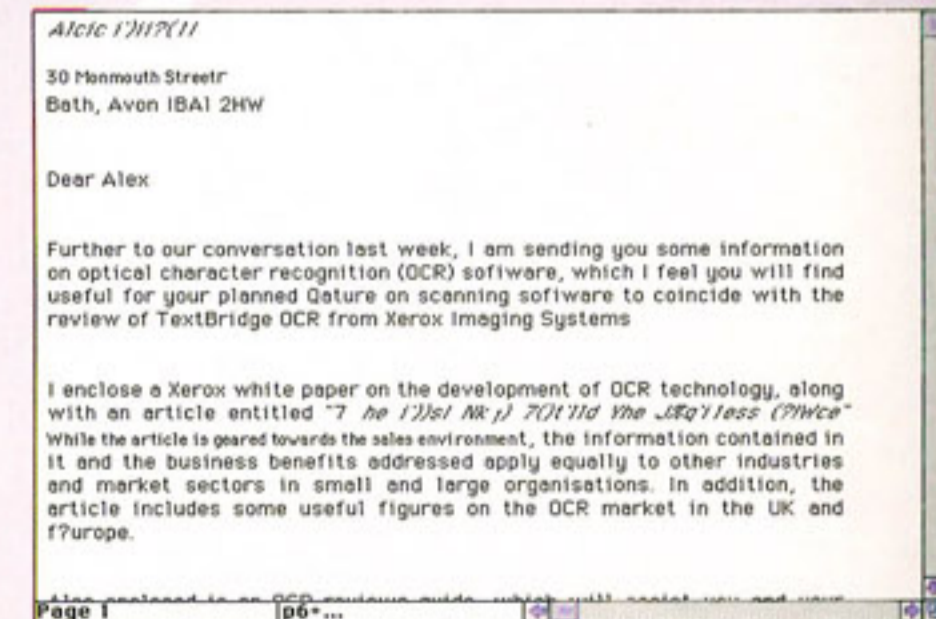

copy to test the speed and accuracy of both. First up is perhaps the most common type of paper document: the type-written sheet, of either laser or photostat quality. The second sample used was a fax sheet and the third, an article printed on glossy paper, like those found in magazines and brochures. I didn't even attempt to try hand-written samples, though, because even the manufacturers themselves admit their programs don't stand a snowball in hell's chance of recognising even the most

finely printed scrawl. Not yet, at any rate, but they're working on it.

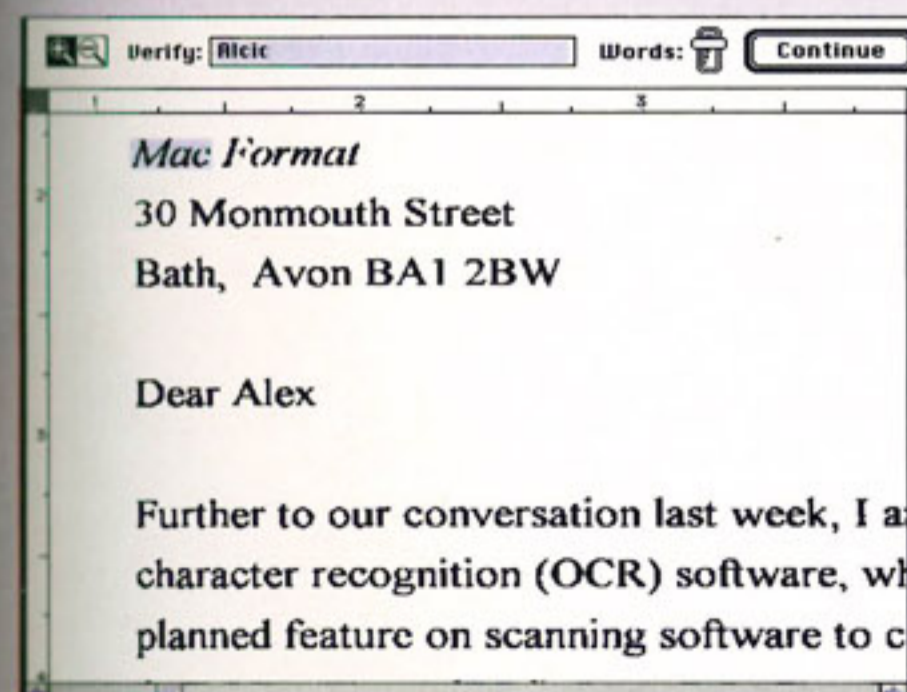
Each of the A4-size hard copy documents that I chose were scanned into the test machine – which was an LC475 with 8Mb of RAM – at 300 dots per inch. Because the samples were made up purely of black text on a white background there was no point in scanning them as

ready text, you're better off hiring that temp. However, with something as simple as newspaper articles, I had no more problems than with the type-written letter.

In order to get the most from *TextBridge*, you'll need plenty of preparation. First, it's im-

portant to know your scanner settings and adjust the brightness and contrast levels to suit the material you wish to sample. You should also make sure the paper isn't scanned at an angle. In addition, it's worth using the verifier to process documents, because the OCR engine

HOW DOES OCR WORK?

Once an image has been scanned, the Optical Character Recognition package goes about converting the bitmap picture into a stream of recognised words. Three processes are used: matrix matching, feature extraction and Intelligent Character Recognition.

Matrix matching is the most basic form and simply consists of the program matching scanned characters with popular typefaces and fonts that are either included with the system or which it has 'learned'.

Feature extraction, also referred to as omnifont technology, involves analysing in-

dividual elements of characters. These elements, such as the circular shape of the letter 'o' or the partial circle of the letter 'c', are matched against known data.

Finally, Intelligent Character Recognition processing looks at the features of the characters as well as the word itself for context verification. Here we're heading into the realms of artificial intelligence, with programs automatically learning from mistakes and increasing their knowledge base for better recognition decisions and a higher degree of accuracy.

anything other than mono line art bitmaps. Even so, the resulting test images were some 1,100K in size, which is a bit on the large size – so bear in mind that if you have a number of documents to process, you might have to watch your storage capacity.

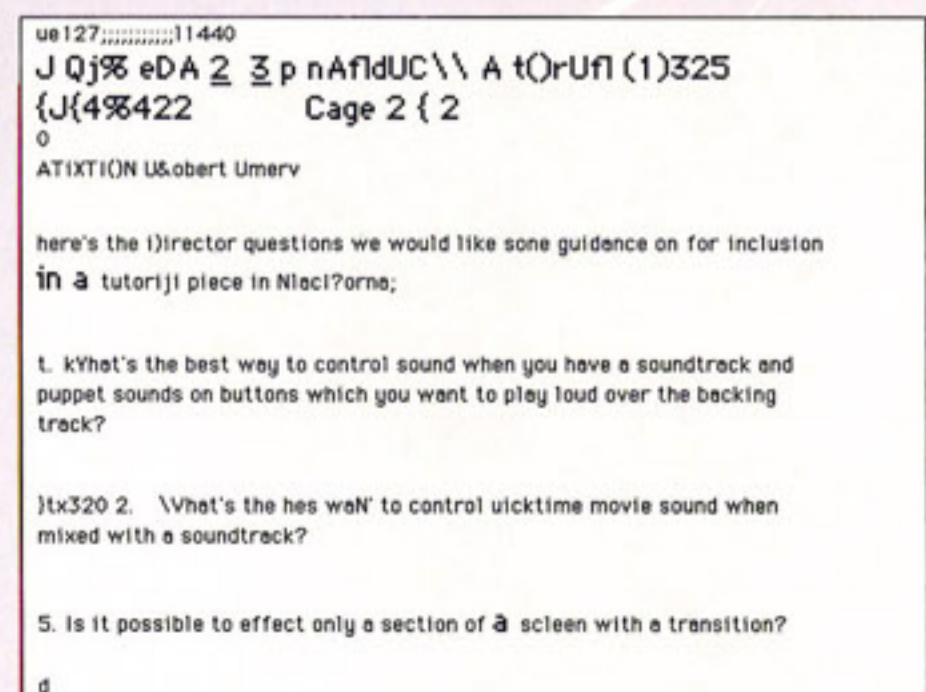
Both *TextBridge* and *OmniPage* use three different methods of optical character recognition to do the heavyweight job of converting bitmaps into type (see the 'How does OCR work?' box above). While more and more packages now use these same techniques, *OmniPage*

treads firmly into the future with the inclusion of a neural network system to add more dynamic artificial intelligence to the proceedings. But accuracy alone doesn't make great Optical Character Recognition. Equally important is how the final document looks, and how errors and inaccuracies are identified. After all, there's little point in scanning in an image and having it recognised as a collection of words, if the output document is bereft of any formatting information and includes a jumble of unidentifiable spelling mistakes.

learns from its mistakes. In this way, although you may find a lot of errors at the beginning of a multi-page document, these will subside as the processing continues. And, as the package learns, you can adjust the verifier slider button so fewer words are checked as the job goes on.

Finally, it's worth zoning your documents in the preview stage. That way you only need to process the text you actually require. This will again cut down on the time involved and also improve the software's recognition capabilities.

All in all, *TextBridge* doesn't do a bad job of converting scanned images of words into editable text, it's just that a little care and attention is needed before you start. If you want to use OCR software to recognise business letters and printouts, then look no further. If you wish to process faxes, then the results are less accurate – although you can, of course, modify them. Finally, if you want to scan pages out of MACFORMAT, don't bother – you'll need to preview and zone the material beforehand – and besides that it's a breach of copyright!

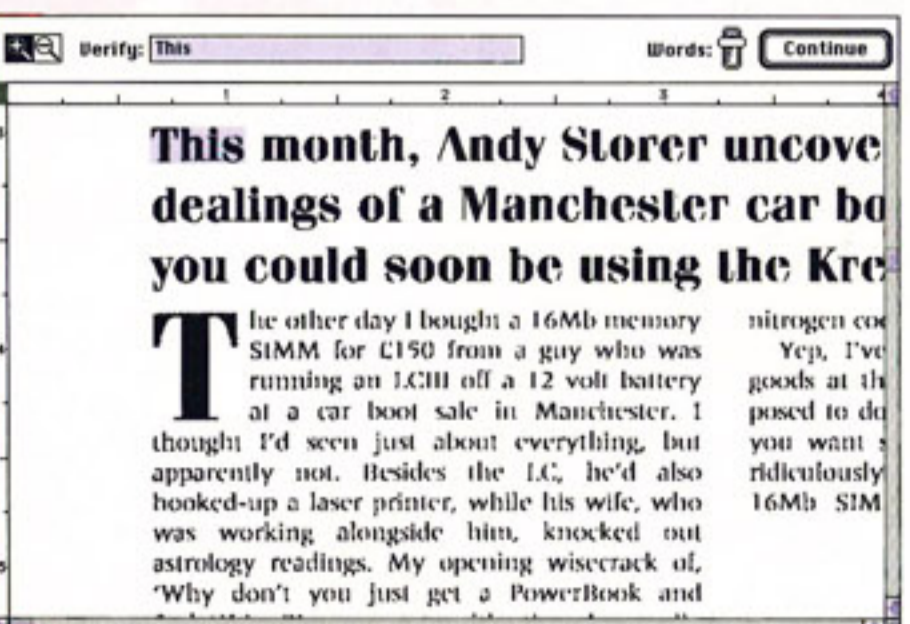

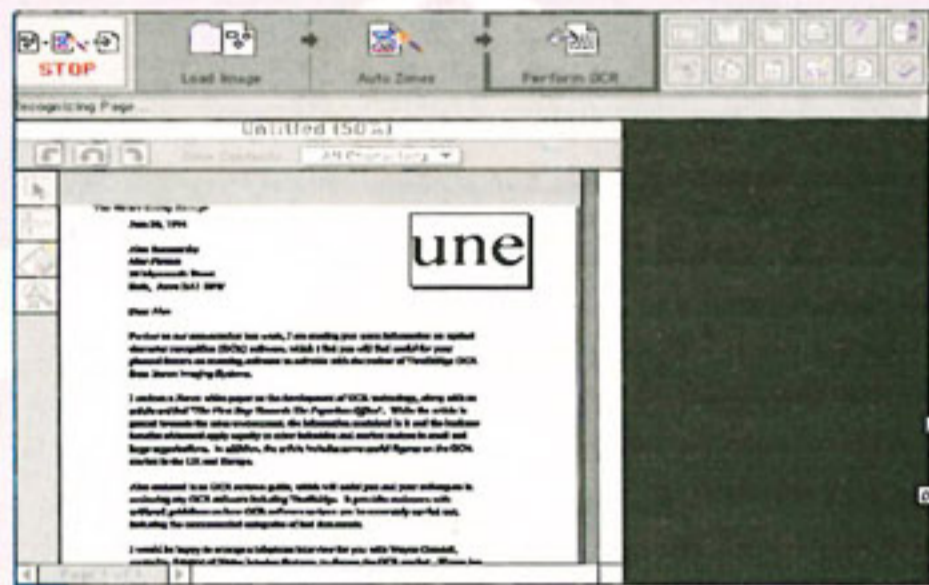

At some £600 more than *TextBridge*, you would expect *OmniPage* to be either over-priced or so laden with extra features that the extra £600 is entirely justifiable. Like *TextBridge*, *OmniPage* comes with a wide selection of scanner drivers, so you

can automatically import documents for Optical Character Recognition processing – and, if anything, this is an even simpler process than with *TextBridge*. All you need do in *OmniPage* is click on the 'Auto' button and the entire process is done for you. Of course, there are few pre-sets you have to set up beforehand.

Between *TextBridge* and *OmniPage*, though, are in the ways they approach OCR processing. *OmniPage* is more definable in this area – you are able to set it up to process text that's laid out in multiple columns, single columns or in tables. This means that much of the hard work of recognition is taken out of the equation. Couple this with a deferred recognition option, with which the software can recognise and process up to 256 documents in a single batch (probably overnight), and you have a powerful combination.

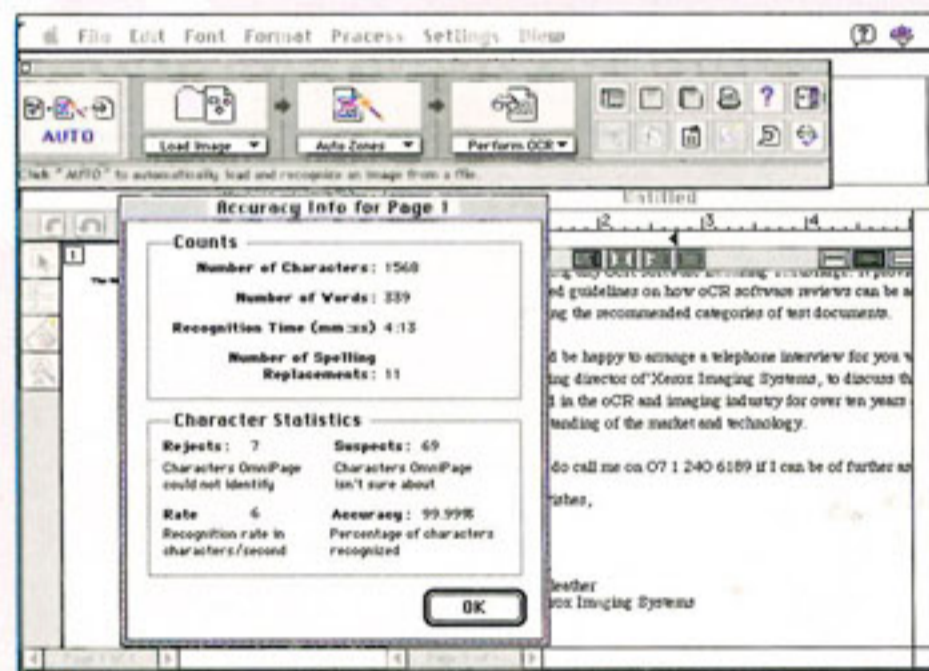
Besides being able to select which nation's language you wish the OCR software to recognise, you can also edit your own user dictionary of common words for any specialist terms. In addition, the package offers you full control over spell-checking, scanning, zoning, font and



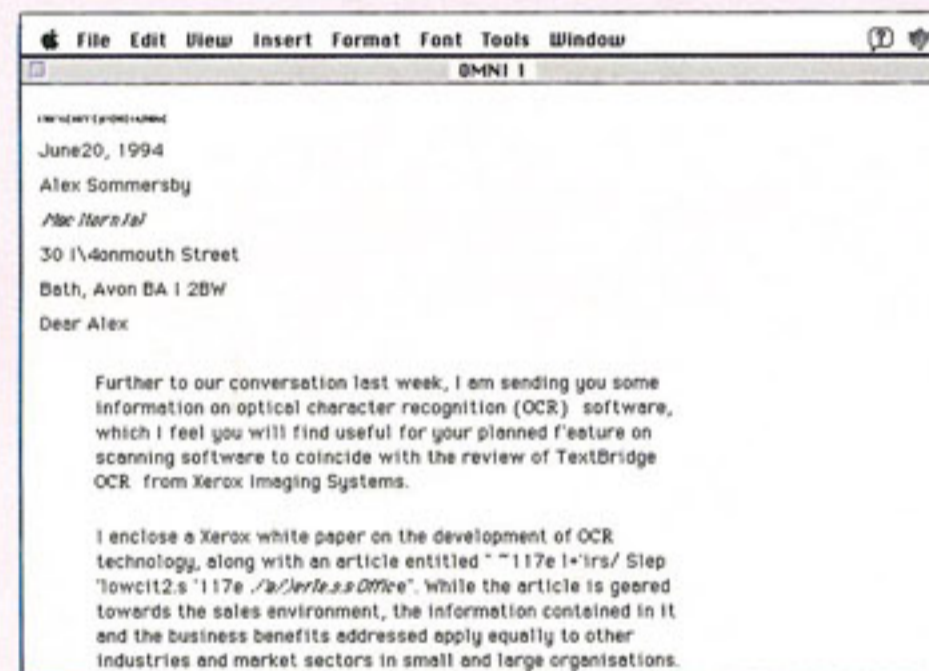

For starters, you can set it to load and process a batch of documents. You can also define the zoning of documents for the entire batch, so if you're attempting to process a number of sheets with common layouts – spreadsheet printouts, for example – you can save time by applying zone templates. Equally handy is the facility to edit and style up recognised text within *OmniPage*, rather than having to export and load it into a word processor as with *TextBridge* – again this saves time.

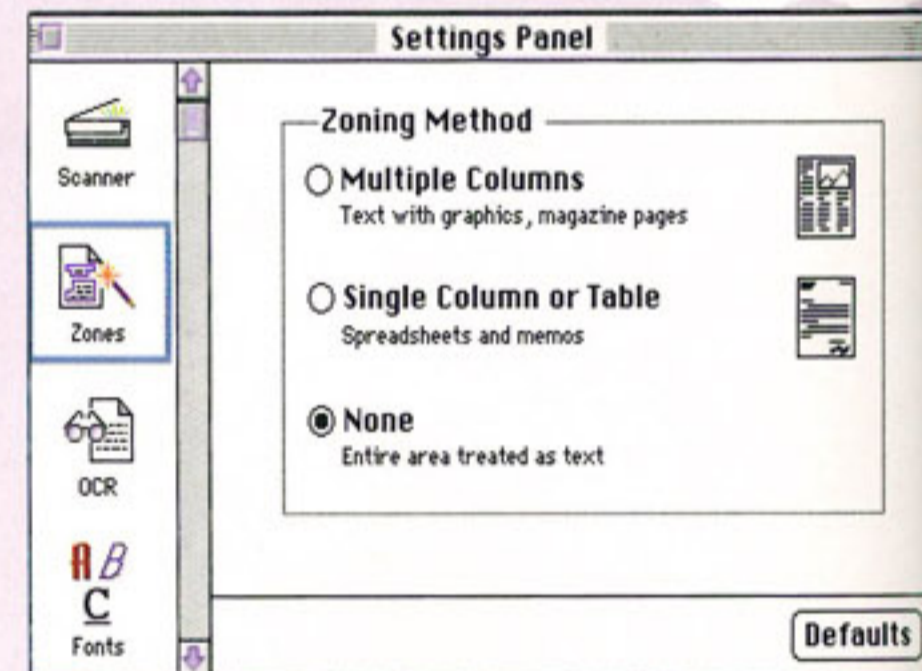

- 2 Image detection**
Does the package have the facility to remove photos or halftone images from scanned documents? If so, processing times will be drastically reduced.
- 3 Automatic operation**
Can the OCR software detect and compensate for documents that are skewed or even upside-down?
- 4 Document zoning**
Does the OCR software have the facility for you to preview the page prior to recognition and manually zone only the parts of the page that you want to recognise?

- 5 Diverse document types**
Does the package support newspaper, grainy fax, poor photocopies and on-line fax modem documents as well as good quality, laser-printed business letters?
- 6 Ease of use**
Can you configure the OCR software so settings can be easily changed according to the complexity of the task at hand?

styling options. Usefully, *OmniPage* will also rotate text (through up to 180 degrees) for perfect alignment, meaning even pages scanned in upside down can be easily processed.

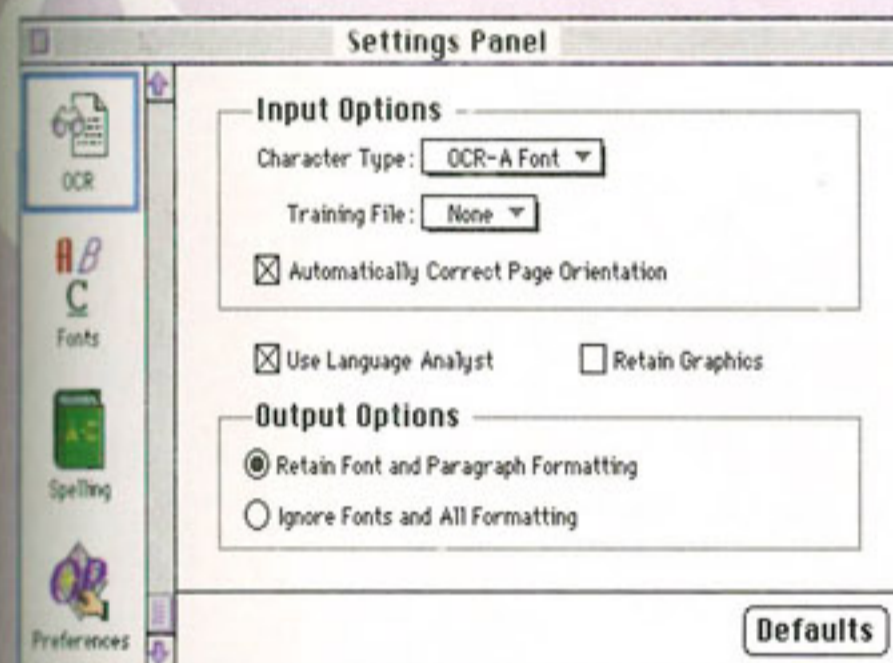
OmniPage's most sophisticated feature, though, is its Language Analyst. This is a pre-set utility that you can use to perform word and character analysis during the recognition process, to check spelling and replace unknown words. Using context and usage rules, the Language Analyst can evaluate words in any of its on-board languages; it can also be set to ignore proper nouns, abbreviations and acronyms that might otherwise be processed incorrectly.

Finally, *OmniPage* offers greater control over any images within documents. By setting your scanned page type to multiple columns, *OmniPage* will retain original graphics, such as photographs or diagrams, and separate them out

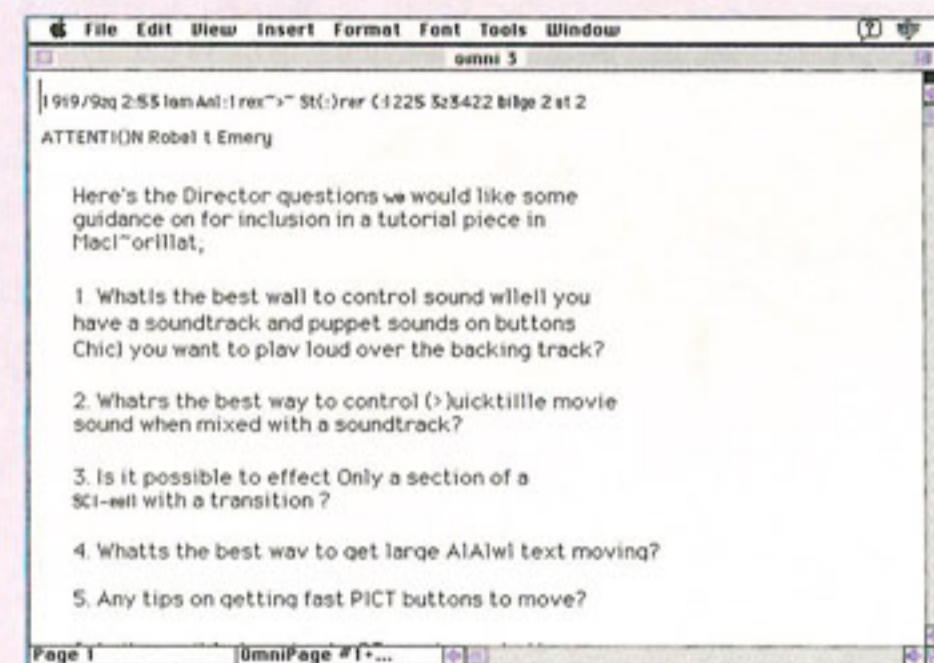
from the text it's converting. These images can then be manipulated, edited and generally cleaned up in *OmniPage's* 24-bit image-editing package, *Image Assistant*. This can also be used as a standalone application to scan and edit colour, greyscale and line art images for output in a variety of formats. The only downside to the inclusion of *Image Assistant* is that you must have at least 9Mb of RAM to run the two applications simultaneously.

So, in actual everyday tests, how do *TextBridge* and *OmniPage* compare? Well, as you might expect given the price differential, *OmniPage* is faster, more accurate and generally far more sophisticated in its Optical Character Recognition capabilities. Whether these factors together are worth an extra £600 largely depends on your needs, though.

If you wish to use Optical Character Recognition software for a range of document styles – including brochures, magazines, artwork and complex documents that incorporate tables and diagrams, then *OmniPage* is your best bet. It also includes a proprietary neural network for handling low-resolution documents such as poor quality faxes. You also get a full-blown image-processing application for your money. However if you merely want software capable of

You also need to buy a scanner. Therefore, you need to thoroughly investigate any potential compatibility problems when you are buying the OCR software.

THE MYTH OF THE PAPERLESS OFFICE

If current market research is to be believed, far from abolishing paper it seems that we are now using more of it than ever before. Last year, a report conducted by the Association for Information and Image Management revealed that in the US, businesses generated more than one million million paper documents, of which 2.7 thousand million go into file folders each day – and that's a lot of paper. What's more, AIIM estimates that the number of paper documents is growing at

the astounding rate of 20% a year – bye bye, British Columbia, Brazil and Norway.

Perhaps most revealing, though, are the figures that were produced by a recent *Fortune* magazine investigation. This investigation found that since 1983, US businesses bought a total of 25 million office computers. During the same period, office paper purchases rose by a staggering 51%. So, in short, we're about as near to the paperless office as we are to the paperless toilet...

Does the £99 TextBridge spell the death of the copy typist?

In the final analysis, all an Optical Character Recognition package is meant to do is save you the time of typing in documents and the expense of getting someone else to do it for you. Remember, though, it's not just the time it takes to process the scanned document in question, you also have to allow for the time the initial scan takes beforehand and the effort that's required to tidy up and correct the results afterwards.

Even though *TextBridge's* character recognition engine is pretty smart you still have to run spell-checkers through its output and manually refer to the original paper copy just to be on the safe side. Added together these might well take as long as it takes a copy typist to whiz through all that text – but at least you won't be paying an extortionate hourly fee of up to £10, because *TextBridge* will have paid for itself after its first two days on the job...

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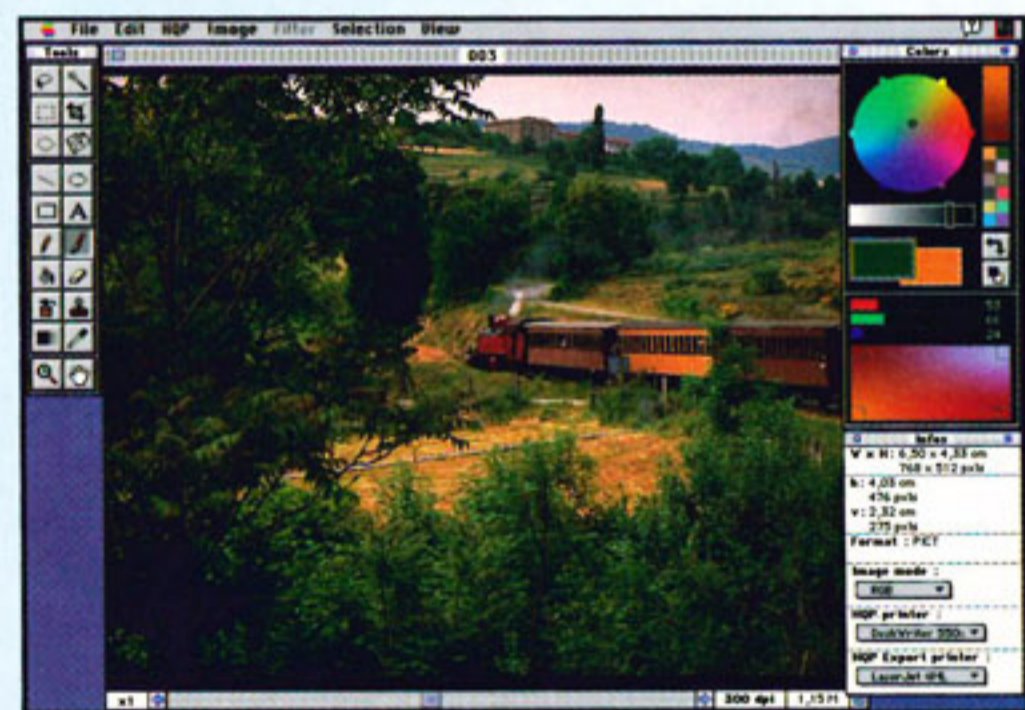


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On the chain gang

Most crashes are caused by software, but SCSI problems come a close second. Stuart McHugh and Alex Summersby explain the basics...

Does your Mac crash for no apparent reason, or sometimes refuse to start up at all? Silly question – of course it does. Last issue, in the first part of this series, we set out the likely causes of different types of crash, freeze and startup problem, and explained what you could do about them. (If you missed that issue, run – do not walk – to page 102 and order a copy now!) The most common causes have to do with software – conflicts between System Extensions (called INITs before System 7); programming bugs or poor memory management in applications; or corruption in various parts of the System software. But the next most common culprit is a notorious trouble-maker called SCSI.

SCSI (pronounced 'scuzzy' – no-one pronounces it 'sexy' any more, do they?) stands for the Small Computer Systems Interface. It's a standard for data transfer, and it's built into every Mac from the Plus onwards. (By contrast, it's an optional extra for most PC- and Unix-based systems – you need to buy an interface card and mess about with setup software. Isn't Apple good to you?) The Mac's other communication system, AppleTalk, enables you to connect your Mac to printers or to other Macs via

the serial port on the back of your machine. SCSI is a theoretically much faster system, so it is the method normally used to connect hard disks, CD-ROM drives, removable-cartridge drives, scanners, and some types of printers – any device that needs to shift a lot of data at speed between itself and your Mac.

Like AppleTalk, SCSI enables you to 'daisy-chain' several devices – see the illustration on this page – but that's where the similarity ends. An AppleTalk network could include a hundred Macs and printers; SCSI is rather more limited. The SCSI 'data bus' has just eight data lines. Each of these lines can be taken by one device, and each is assigned an ID number from 0 to 7.

But the Mac itself takes ID 7, and usually there will be an internal hard disk, which takes ID 0. So that's six external devices you can connect. However, it's not always that straightforward.

Your number's up

ID numbers can be a real headache. The golden rule is that every device on the chain must have a different number – otherwise your Mac probably won't even start up. At all. Any SCSI device will come with a pre-set ID (normally between 1 and 6), but you can reset this on most modern devices, usually by a push-button on the back or a dial-style setting. If you're really unlucky you might have to open up the casing and adjust a set of dip switches to give the desired number. (But in that case it might be easier to reset the others instead...)

It can even be possible to set the SCSI address by use of software – perhaps in the 'Preferences' or 'Settings' option in scanning or slide-imaging software. This can have bizarre consequences if the number you assign does not correspond to the physical number on the device's switch. For instance, we've seen a scanner attempt to scan when 'Print' was selected. Although things may not get as weird as this for you, suffice to say things will not work as they should.

Beware the Terminator

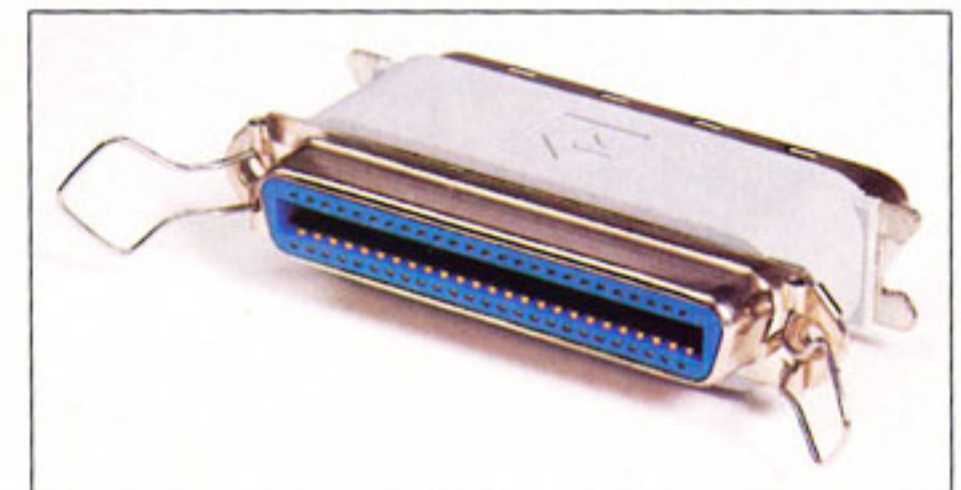
The SCSI system achieves its high speeds by using all eight data lines. Each device uses its own line to 'sense' whether the whole bus is busy, and if not it can 'capture' the whole eight



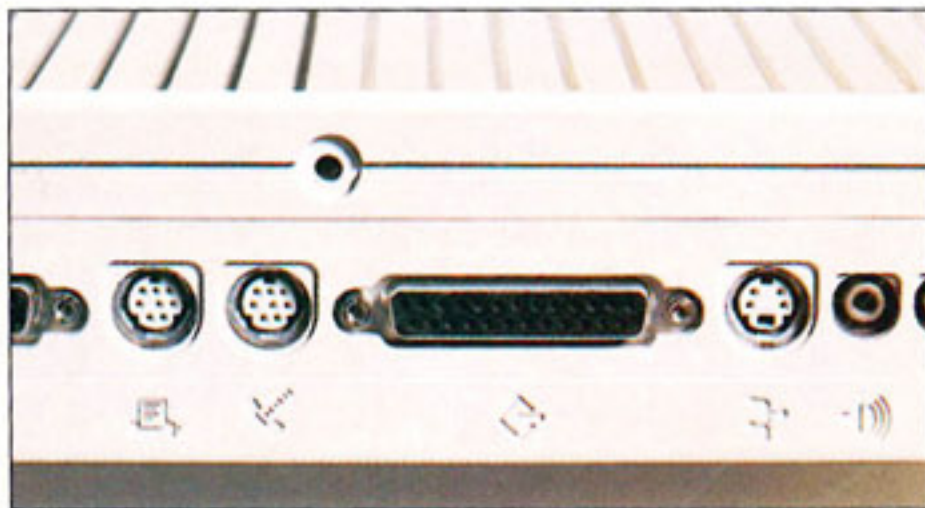

lines to transfer its own data. However, when a device sends some data to the Mac it will await a 'confirmation' signal from the Mac before it sends the next bit of data. It's all this traffic that leads to the biggest headache in SCSI systems – termination. If data were just being transmitted as an electrical pulse up the bus, it would simply 'bounce' back down the line, and such a signal could be misinterpreted as saying the bus was in use when it wasn't, or even vice-versa. So terminators are installed at the start and end of the chain. What these do is 'damp' the current so that spurious signals aren't flying up and down the chain.

If you have no external SCSI device connected, the chain is just the Mac talking to its own hard drive – no problem; both have termination built-in. But external devices handle termination in different ways, and this is where many problems start. The best scenario is an unterminated device. Then you can plug it in and simply add a terminator (like a SCSI plug without a cable) that completes the chain. Some devices offer 'intelligent' termination, where they terminate themselves according to what they detect on the bus when they're added to it. The worst thing you can find is a



A SCSI terminator is like a SCSI plug with no cabling attached. It simply marks the end of the SCSI chain and 'damps' the electrical signals flying up and down the chain.



There's a very handy rule of thumb when dealing with Mac connections: if the plug fits, you've probably got the right port. In the case of SCSI, it's the one with the completely unintelligible diamond symbol – so now you know.

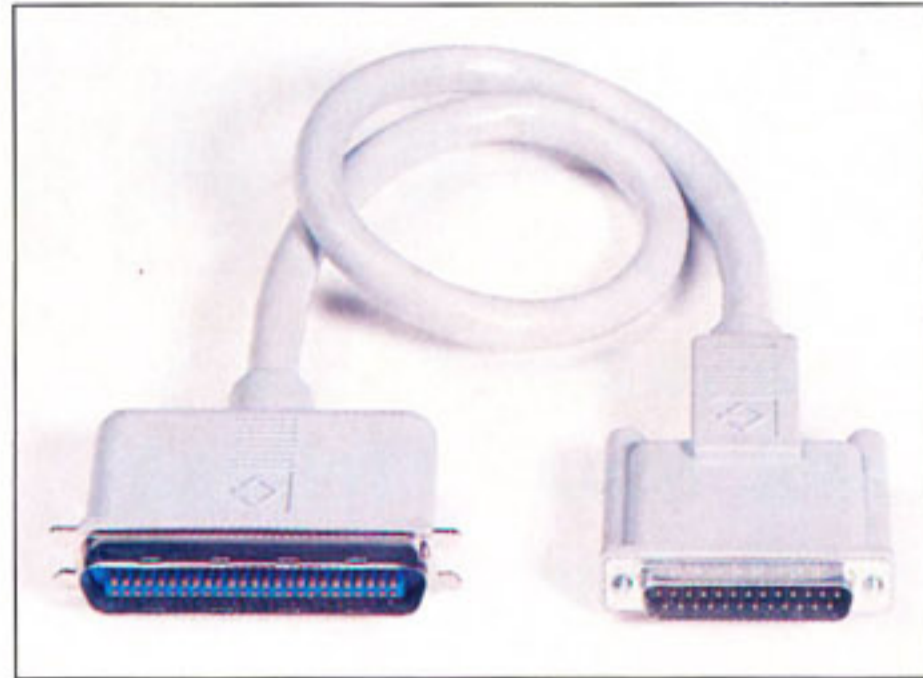

device which is internally terminated. Having more than two terminators in a chain won't necessarily cause everything to fail (though it does make it pretty likely!), but what it is sure to do is damp the signal that other devices on the chain can detect, so problems are more likely to occur. You *may* find you have to open up the device up and remove the terminators.

Making the connection

Like any other cabling, SCSI leads should be securely connected, un snagged and in good repair. In fact, SCSI seems to be a little more prone to problems, which is one reason for the fastening clips attached to the plugs. Also, the way that the channels are sensed by each device relies heavily on the current that they can detect. So if you have a choice of cables, use the shortest that will do the job. Very long cabling arrangements will lead to trouble – the length of the chain shouldn't really exceed 20 feet or so. You can get SCSI Cable Extenders, however, which plug into an existing cable and enable you to place a bulky scanner on another desk or perhaps put a noisy hard disk out of the way. SCSI Peripheral Interface Cables (with a 50 pin connector on both ends) are used to connect one device to another in the chain, while the only use of the SCSI System Cable (50 pin to 25 pin) is to connect the chain to your Mac.



To connect a SCSI device to your Mac, you need to get hold of a SCSI System Cable. It has a 50 pin connector on one end (the device end) and a 25 pin on the other (the Mac end).

SCSI cables look solid and robust but in fact they're quite prone to problems – and that's in addition to popping out of their sockets if not secured correctly. Breaks in the cable can occur deep inside the sea of wires that makes up one connector. And pins can become bent either in the SCSI plug or in the 25 pin D-connector on the back of your Mac. So when you're checking out a potential SCSI problem, if possible try a different cable.

It's a start

In theory you should switch on every device before the Macintosh to let them be recognised. Turning on devices afterwards can cause prob-

lems, but it would be unusual if actual damage was caused. Leaving devices switched on all the time is often unattractive – in the case of a scanner for instance, which won't be in use all day. If your SCSI combination lets you turn it on later then fine.

Some devices will allow for their being switched on after the Mac is booted. Other won't. If the Mac sees a 'dead' SCSI device on the chain it may not be able to boot; at other times it will. The reasons for this vary – the position of the dead device on the chain, whether it's terminated, and of course the other characteristics of the chain (length, type and termination of other devices, etc).

Generally, though, most hard disks can be switched on later, and subsequently 'mounted' using a utility like *SCSI Probe* or similar. (It was on last issue's *MACFORMAT* cover disk or, if you missed that, it's available from user groups and bulletin boards.) If CD-ROMs aren't turned on first they often won't appear on the Desktop, and no amount of coaxing will help, though all other aspects of operation will be OK. Scanners often tend to cause the entire system to hang if they're powered up after the Mac.

What you shouldn't do is physically plug in devices to a SCSI chain while they have power. You might get away with this seven times out of ten, but don't become complacent – in the worst case it could fry your Mac. It's really not worth the risk. But apart from all that, SCSI is just great! *Stuart McHugh & Alex Summersley*

SOLVING SCSI PROBLEMS

Last issue we examined a whole range of crashes, freezes and startup problems, what the likely causes were, and what you could do about them. The examples here are *not* a complete guide to Mac problems, just a more detailed look at specifically SCSI-related symptoms and solutions...

1. Symptom: flashing '?'

When you start up, you get a disk icon with a flashing '?' instead of the 'Welcome to Macintosh' screen. This is the main symptom of a SCSI problem.

Possible cause

- (a) One or more of the devices in the SCSI chain are not switched on.
- (b) One or more devices have the same SCSI ID number.
- (c) The SCSI chain is not terminated.
- (d) Too many devices in the SCSI chain are terminated.
- (e) The cabling is not secure.
- (f) The SCSI chain is too long.
- (g) There may be a non-SCSI problem – such as a corrupted System on the boot disk. Check last issue's step-by-step guide for more advice.

Action

- (a) Unplug the SCSI chain from your Mac, then try to start up. If this works, then you do have a SCSI problem.
- (b) Check that all the SCSI cabling is secure and undamaged. Switch everything off, wait for a minute or so to give things a chance to settle, then switch all the devices in the SCSI chain on again (the order really shouldn't matter). Wait 30 seconds or so, to give hard disks and so on the time to spin up, *then* start up your Mac. Use *SCSI Probe* to check what your Mac is seeing on the SCSI chain.
- (c) If you have several devices in the chain, try swapping them about. In theory this should make no difference, but some just like being closer to the Mac. It can help to swap the cables about too. Don't ask us why.
- (d) Check that all devices have unique IDs.
- (e) Check the termination of the chain. If necessary, consult the manuals you got with your devices to see if they are internally terminated.

(f) Don't assume it's SCSI. Do the usual checks on your hard disk as described last issue – start up from an emergency startup floppy disk and run *Disk First Aid*, etc. (If this means nothing to you, you need to turn to page 102 and order a copy of *MACFORMAT 18* urgently.)

(g) Oh, and you can try 'zapping' (resetting) the PRAM. The Parameter RAM contains details of which device will be used to start up, so resetting this may return things to normal. To do this, hold down [command] [option] P R when you start up or restart your Mac.

2. Symptom: 'sad Mac'

At startup, instead of the 'Welcome to Macintosh' screen you get a black screen with a 'sad Mac'.

Possible cause

This could be a SCSI problem; but again, other troubleshooting techniques may prove otherwise. If it is SCSI-related, this is more likely to be a genuine hardware fault, but check as for 1 anyway.

Action

Try checks as for 1 above. Unplug everything, then do a diagnosis on the assumption that it's *not* a SCSI problem. The problem could be RAM or the System file – see last month's issue for more details.

3. Symptom: device is invisible

When the System does succeed in booting, you can't see a device. You may get a message saying 'Couldn't find scanner' or similar, or the icon for a hard disk or CD doesn't appear on the Desktop.

Possible cause

- (a) In theory, the cause of this could be any of 1(a-f) above. If the System booted OK, then it's more likely that something has changed since then. So check whether the cabling has come loose somewhere, etc.
- (b) A device's software ID doesn't match the one set by hardware on the device.
- (c) A device was switched on after the Mac booted. Or a device was switched on too soon before the Mac's startup,

and didn't get the chance to 'warm up' before the Mac tried to recognise it.

Action

As above – restart with all devices *on*, and ensure that software and hardware IDs match.

4. Symptom: copying problems

Copying data to or from a SCSI device becomes slow, or you suffer from recurring copy errors.

Possible cause

Some of the cabling is insecure or faulty. Alternatively, a SCSI device itself is faulty.

Action

Try a different cable if possible – if there's still a problem then the cause could be the device – get it checked out. (Slow copying might be caused by many other things, but disk errors that imply that the disk couldn't be found are either disk or SCSI problems.)

5. Symptom: Slo-o-o-w display

You begin to suffer slow screen display – like, *really* slow!

Possible cause

A device was switched on after the System had booted. Or this may be a fault in a device, cabling or termination.

Action

- (a) Restart your Mac, making sure you've switched SCSI devices on first.
- (b) Check cabling and termination.
- (c) As a last resort, get the device checked out.

6. Symptom: freeze!

The System freezes or 'hangs' if you switch on a device after the Mac is booted.

Possible cause

Your System or the particular device won't allow you to switch on your device after booting.

Action

You'll either have to have devices *on* all the time, or else power down your Mac to connect them as needed.

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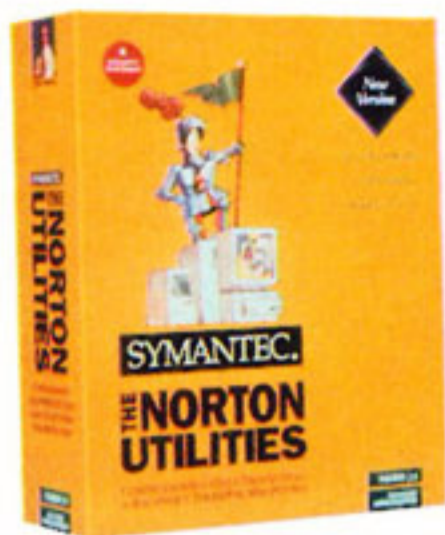
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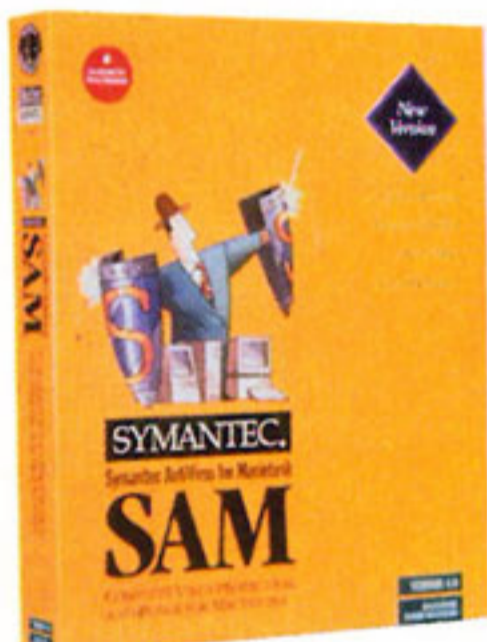


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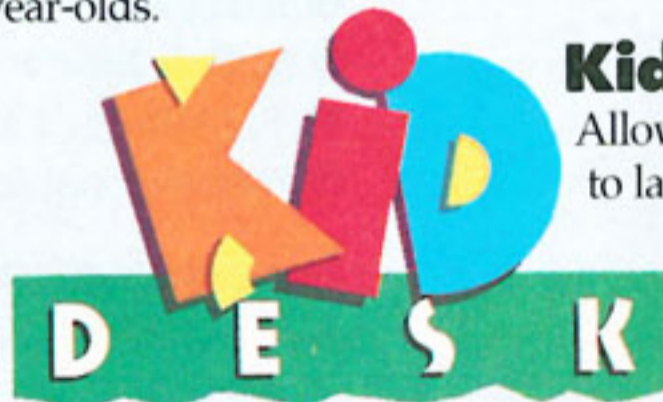
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SHADOW PLAY

Do you want your artwork to gain an extra dimension of reality? The easiest way is to use shadows – we show you how with *your* art package.

We really are very easy to fool. Often the simplest illusion can trick our eyes – or rather our brains – into thinking the marks we're viewing are 3D objects coming out from the page. Even a single dark line offset to one side can throw a basic object into relief – just look at the windows on the Mac Desktop, for example. In the same way, text and logos can be made to look even more dramatic by floating them above a surface. You can easily create this type of effect by placing a dark, soft-edged blur offset below and to the right of the main object; this is the classic 'drop shadow' effect. With a little more manipulation, shadows can be made to look as if they've been cast in any direction, giving an object a strong three-dimensional appearance.

Drop shadows

Drop and cast shadows like these are quite easy to produce, providing you're using reasonably powerful paint software. The tips and tutorials here will help get you started. If you're limited to 256 (or fewer) colours by your software, though, don't despair – the tutorials also show you how to achieve excellent shadows with a limited palette. If you're using hundreds (rather than thousands or millions) of colours in your image, and you want to use painting modes such as Darken or Tint, you need to make sure that you have enough suitable shades in the

palette to start with. If there aren't enough, then when the shadow's cast on to an object with a subtle gradient, the lack of colours may result in ugly banding and a bizarre choice of darkened shades.

For example, the simplest way to produce shadows in *Studio 8* (and the one described in the manual) is to carefully construct a range of colours that are essentially darker versions of the ones the shadow will be covering. This means that you need to know in advance which colours will be used by the effect. Now, not only is this difficult to predict, but it also hampers fluid, spontaneous painting – espec-

3D SHADOWS



Shadows cast over 3D objects are distorted accordingly. The cases described in the 'Producing flat shadows' box on page 65 still apply, but the shadow must be distorted to match the object. A simple model can be invaluable to determine the form of distortion. Here the silhouette was sheared to match the perspective, then the top half was selected and bent to match the curve of the pipe.

ially if most of the palette is already full of unsuitable colours.

Often, alternative methods can be used that get round this sort of problem. In *Studio 8*, you can force the program to use suitable colours by using the Brush/Tint option on the darkest shade included in the background that the shadow covers. In other programs, where the background is reasonably simple, you can

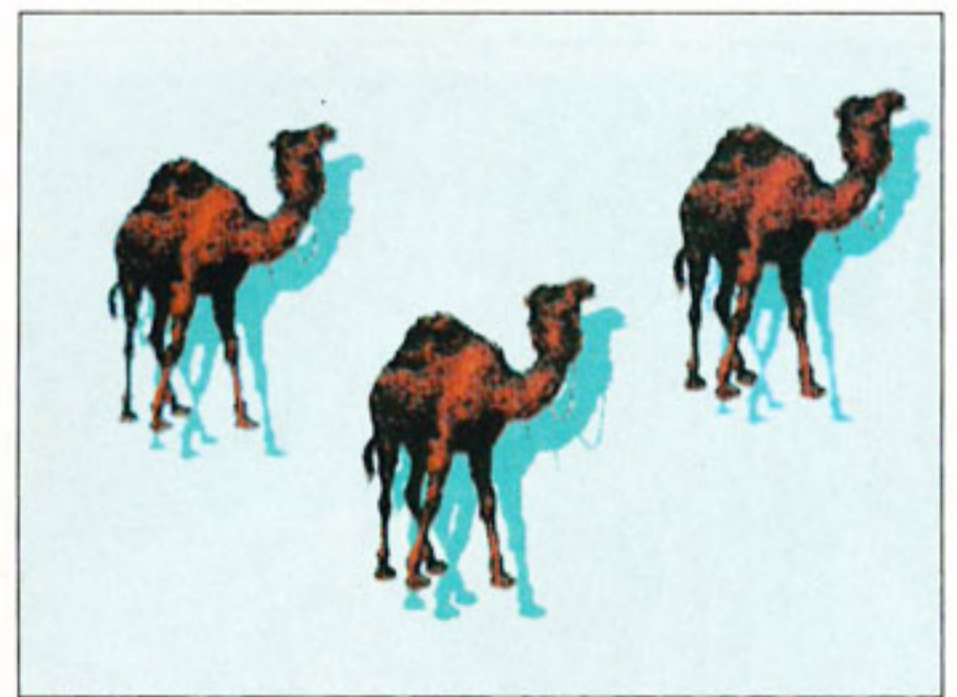
SHADOW DROP SHADOWS PLAY



1 Version 3 of *Painter* (due for release soon) has several built-in 'drop shadow' effects, a few of which we have shown here. The rose image is a 'floating' object with a 'drop shadow' attached automatically. The clover leaves were created using Fractal's latest innovation: the *Image Hose*. This sprays a variety of leaf images sequentially, placing drop shadows under each one automatically. The Rose shadow was created using Alien Skin's *Drop Shadow Plug-In*.



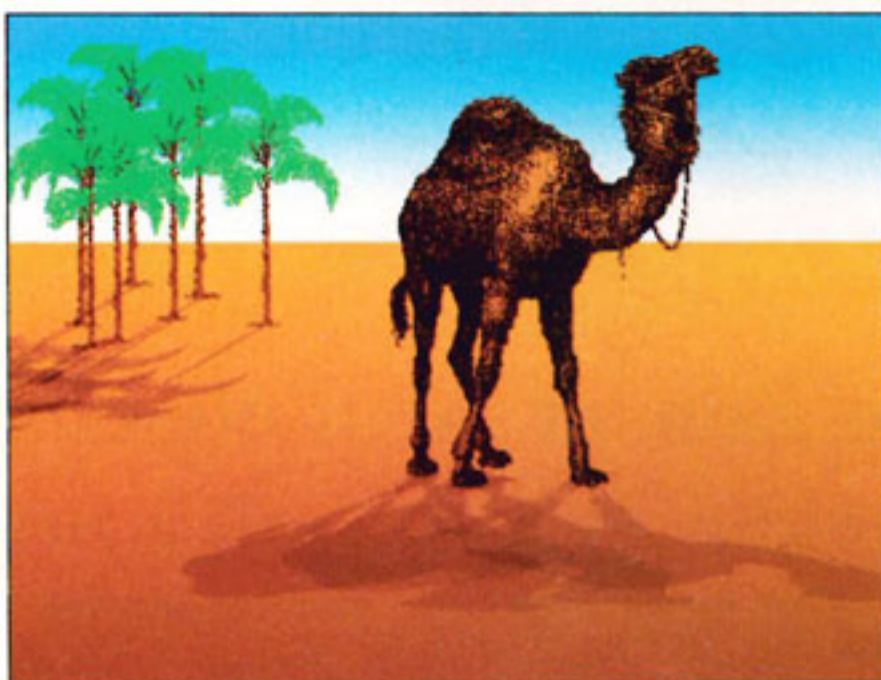
2 Like *Painter 2.0*, *Photoshop 2.5* has no built-in 'drop shadow' effect, but, as you can see from the Golden Gate image, Alien Skin's *DropShadow Plug-In* remedies this omission. Nevertheless, shadows can be created easily within a feathered selection either by using a black fill with 50% opacity – as in the mountain image – or by adjusting the Brightness and Contrast – as in the flowers image. (Make sure that you note the caution in the main text!)



3 *Studio 32* has built-in, adjustable 'drop shadows', but unfortunately, it doesn't soften the shadow's edges (centre). Even worse, the shadow selection remains joined to the object casting the shadow, so you need to use Blend Edges to soften them (left)! Nevertheless, *Studio 32* provides several methods to darken an area with its Selection/Process menu. Using these you can manually soften the edges to create conventional 'drop shadows' (right).

SH THE SHADOW WORLD LAY

To draw realistic-looking shadows, you have to understand the properties of light and shade. If you have a single point of light, the shadows are evenly dark with sharp edges. In real life, though, there's usually some background or 'ambient' light; often there'll be multiple sources, or a single source will be large enough to blur the edges of the shadow. (Each side of the light will cast a separate, slightly offset shadow. The points at which they overlap will be darker, while the edges will look blurred, an effect that increases as the shadow stretches further from the object.) Ambient light will also deaden the effect of the shadow, so the further it stretches from the 'casting' object the more it blends into the overall shading. Reproducing these effects



accurately can require quite sophisticated Alpha channels and transparency maps, but with a little ingenuity you can get similar results from more limited programs.

DROP SHADOW TEXT



Like most sophisticated paint programs, *Painter 2.0* provides tools that enable you to construct very realistic-looking 'drop shadows', especially with type. Text is placed on screen as a frisket, which can then be feathered to give the soft edges characteristic of shadows. Once you've done that, the frisket can be filled with black using the 'Effects/Fill' and 'Edit/Fade' options or darkened using 'Effects/Color'.

attain acceptable results by constructing the shadow by hand. Using a 'Patterned' shadow can also give excellent results. These techniques are all described in the tutorials.

Working with loads of colours in a professional program like *Photoshop* or *Painter* can also cause problems – especially if you're going on to high-res imagesetting or proofing. In these programs there are a number of ways to achieve the same apparent endpoint. Shadows can be created by darkening the colours in the shadow area. This can be achieved using Gamma curves, reducing the Brightness and Contrast, or creating a black shadow before making it relatively transparent. The different shadows look the same on screen, but once you print, the results can be different, especially with certain hues – notably blues. This is where using CMYK rather than RGB can be useful.

If you want to make things a little easier, think about the composition of your layout. Often the picture can be constructed as though the light-source were above and behind the viewer – that way only a minimal ground shadow

Jargon Busters

Alpha channels: a separate 8-bit greyscale image within a document, which is used for isolating, modifying, and storing masks.

Floating object: some paint and image-processing programs enable parts of the image to 'float'. These are sections of the bitmap that are treated as separate objects that can be 'floated' over the main image without affecting it. With *Painter 2* using X2 Extensions, *Painter 3.0* and *Photoshop*, these objects can have feathered edges and adjustable transparency.

Transparency mapping: many programs enable you to make pasted selections relatively transparent, so they show the area underneath (although 8-bit software needs suitable colours available in the palette to do this). The best software enables you to vary the degree of transparency. In this way, shadows can have soft edges and fade out according to their distance from the 'casting' object.

ow is visible behind the object. Here, the shape of the shadow and the inconsistencies produced by palette problems are minimised. The tutorials also deal with other, more tricky, cases, like shadows cast forward or on to objects.

The object's shape will also greatly affect the way you draw the shadow. Objects like trees, which stand on a single base, are easy – their shadows are really just suitably distorted copies of the original. Objects with legs are more difficult, especially if the shadow is cast toward the viewer. The legs farthest from the viewer are left disembodied from their shadows, and so some editing of the shape must take place.

If you're unsure about how a particular shadow might look, especially if it's cast across another object, try setting up a simple model with a torch, everyday objects (matchboxes,

SH PRODUCING SHADOW BRUSHES LAY



1 The original object could be virtually anything – scanned, drawn and painted, even rendered from a 3D program. Our image, here, was scanned as a 1-bit image from a copyright-free source book of Victorian etchings. The scan was then cleaned up and given a gradient-filled background. After that we blended with a Blend tool to hide the more obvious engraving marks.



2 Using a copy of the original, the shadow is created. First the selection is filled with black. Then it is 'Flipped' vertically and distorted so it's parallel with the perspective plane and therefore looks like a realistic shadow. To do this, you can use the Shear, Perspective and Distort tools. Make sure that the shadow is in the correct ground plane and opposite the light source.

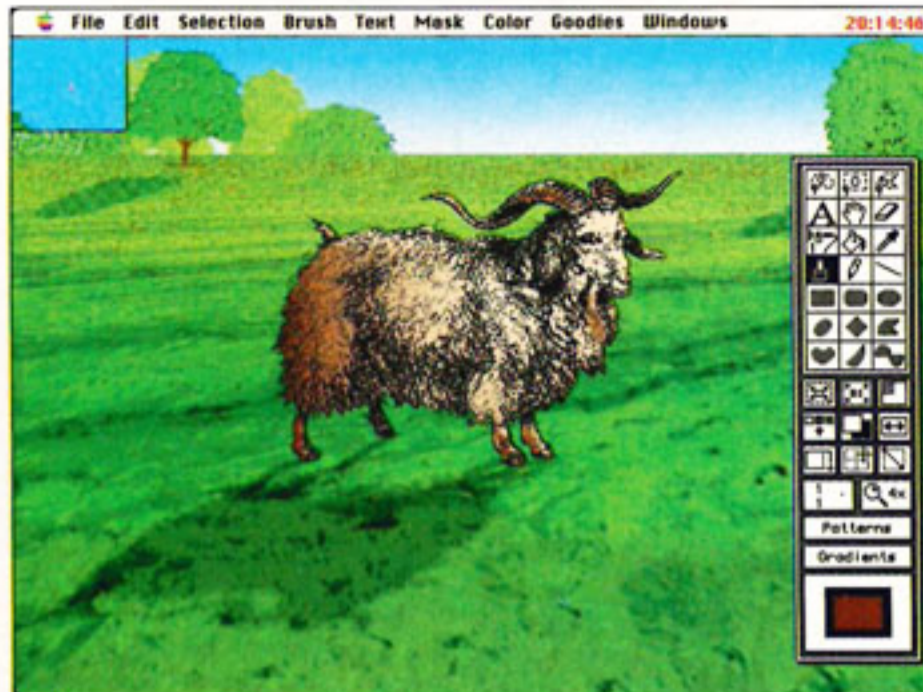


3 If the object has one base – say, like a tree, house or rock – you can use the copy you've made as it is, or soften it as shown in the screenshot on the right. If it has several bases – like an animal or a bridge – the shadow may need editing. In this case the Smudge/Finger tool is used to extend the shadow bases (legs, wheels, etc) to meet the original ones. You may need to draw the extra bits in by hand.

SHADOW PLAY PRODUCING FLAT SHADOWS



1 With only hundreds of colours to choose from, *Studio 8* and other older software can make a poor job of shading over subtle gradients. However, if you choose a single solid colour matched to the darkest shade in the gradient, the shadow appears to fade. You can soften the edge by outlining the shadow brush with a pattern of alternate transparent and opaque pixels.



2 8-bit programs often have trouble creating a convincing shadow if the background is very detailed. Try using a patterned shadow brush with a chequerboard of alternate transparent and opaque pixels. Although the pattern sometimes shows, it's a quick and easy solution, and works well at high resolutions. Choose a colour that will blend best with the background and the overall lighting.



3 If you have thousands or millions of colours to work with, it's easier to produce realistic-looking shadows – we used *Studio 32* here. The shadow was placed as a plain black selection with unsmoothed edges. 'Merge' and 'Blend Edges' in the 'Process' menu provide a transparency effect, but they also act on the background area within the selection. Moving the selection means re-doing the transparency.

film canisters, table tennis balls, etc) and a cardboard silhouette of the object casting the shadow. (You can easily create this last item by printing out your image, sticking it on to some card and cutting it out.) Playing with this sort of model is a very effective way of simulating true shadows.

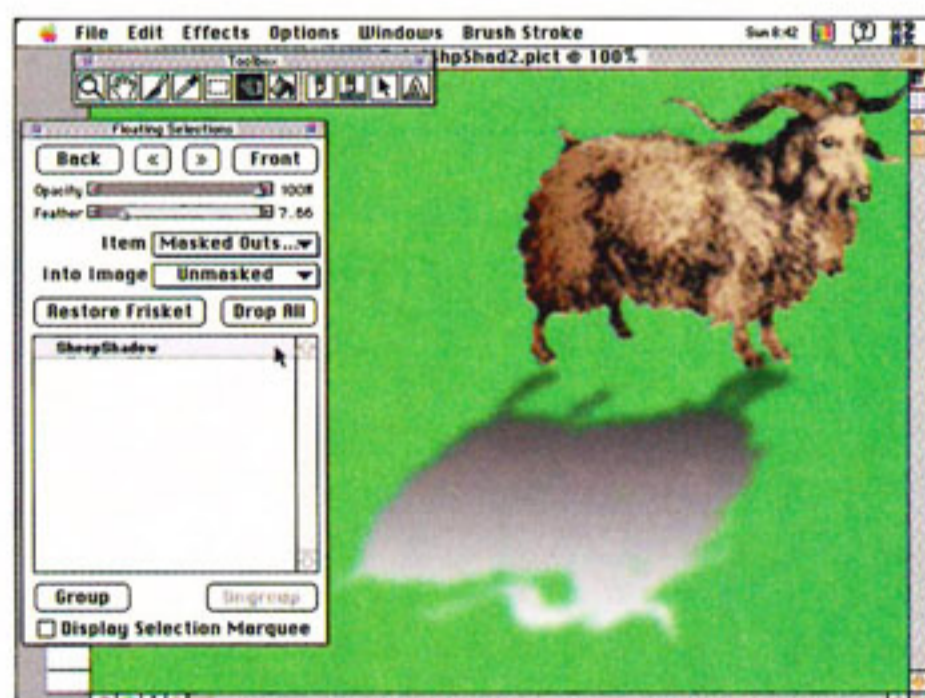
4 Using *Photoshop's* channels is far more versatile than the limited 'processing' effects of conventional paint programs, but the learning curve is steeper. The shadow effects in this image are similar to those produced by *Studio32*, but they're easier to modify because you can paint directly in the shadow's channel. This enables you to create shadows of exactly the right density and gradation.



5 This *Painter* image looks similar to the *Studio 32* and *Photoshop* creations, but its edge-feathering and transparency tools are far more interactive. 'Floating Selections' are by far the easiest way to manage shadows – especially if you have a number of objects whose casting shadows need to be positioned precisely. *Photoshop 3.0* should be equally easy to use when it becomes available.



4 The final stage, transparency mapping, varies according to your software. Programs with limited palettes of 256 colours or less, like *Studio 8* used here, lack edge feathering and often select unsuitable colours for transparent effects. Try filling with a chequered pattern of alternate coloured and transparent pixels for the shadow, and 'TraceEdges' with a small patterned brush for a softer edge.



5 Software that uses thousands or millions of colours can produce more sophisticated variable transparencies. Feathering, which is used in *Painter X2* and *Photoshop*, and its *Studio 32* equivalent, Edge Blending, enable you to vary the transparency (over a definable band of pixels) between the background colour and the shadow colour. This gives a realistic soft edge.



6 The best software can produce shadows that fall-off in depth as they get further away from the 'casting' object. Usually the level of transparency is defined by a gradient from black (opaque) to white (transparent). In the example here, *Photoshop* has a grey-scale image of the shadow mask in one channel, while the transparency map (used to fill the mask) is made up of a black-to-white gradient.


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There's no place like Home!

Fiddling with your Home Stack is the most dangerous thing you can do with *HyperCard*. It's also one of the most useful...

In this article, '↵' means 'this is not the end of a program line - don't press [return] yet'

All through this series we have been warning you to stay away from your Home Stack. In particular, its script. Both the Home Stack cards and the Home Stack script contain information and settings vital to the correct working of *HyperCard*. The *HyperCard* application quite simply can't work without it. And if you break it, you'd better hope you've got a backup.

However, the Home Stack is essentially *HyperCard's* nerve centre, and you can do some very useful things with it.

Not just one Home...

To start with, you're not stuck with the Home Stack you were supplied with. *HyperCard 2.2* users have two very interesting 'alternative' Home Stacks. One of them enables you to quickly launch your favourite applications and choose your most frequently used documents from scrolling lists. Another fits in a window half the size of the standard Home Stack's.

If you have the version of *HyperCard* that was given away with Macs up until a couple of years ago, you won't have these stacks. But you can create them yourself by modifying the Home Stack you do have. The 'small' Home Stack can be created without any HyperTalk knowledge from the standard Home Stack. The stack with the scrolling stack/application/doc-

ument fields is a little harder, but any half-competent HyperTalk programmer could do it with an hour or so's work.

Those two aren't the only other options, though. You could create something entirely personal instead - just take a look at the 'Rod's Home Stack' screenshot below, and you will see just what we mean.

If it ain't broke, don't fix it

But why fiddle with the Home Stack? If its operation is so crucial, wouldn't it be best left alone? Maybe, but it's the centre of all your *HyperCard* operations. When you hit [command] H (or select 'Home' from the 'Go' menu), you go to the first card in your Home Stack. This card loads when you double-click on the *HyperCard* application icon. And every single HyperTalk message sent (or that you send) passes through the Home Stack script.

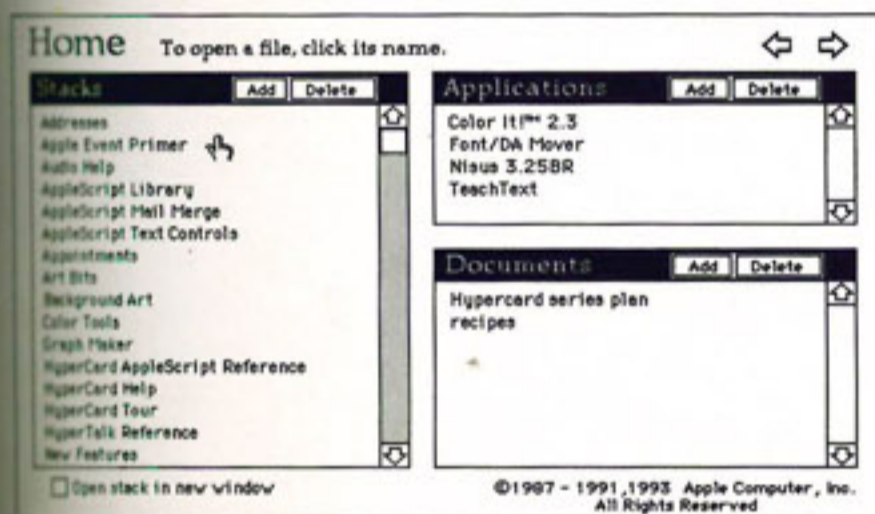
HyperCard isn't just an amazingly versatile database-cum-programming-language, though, it also has the potential to be the nerve centre

of all your Mac operations. Every stack, application and document can be opened from within *HyperCard*. And you can organise their names in the way that most makes sense to you - rather than the way the designers of the Mac Finder dictate. Take a look at the screenshot of the alternative Home Stack with the scrolling lists of names (below left) to see one possible way of doing it.

HyperCard's designers have made it easy. The Home Stack has an additional menu simply called 'Home'. It has options for adding links to stacks, applications and documents that make the process as easy as it can possibly be. All you have to do is choose which type you want from the menu, find the file via the standard Mac file-finding dialogue box, then position the button that *HyperCard* automatically creates. (The alternative Home Stack with the scrolling text fields simply adds the name to the relevant list rather than creating a button.)

The standard Home Stack has three blank cards for you to add your own buttons to. You can then re-name these cards and the new names will appear on the buttons at the bottom of the screen. For more details on how you would add a button to provide a link to another stack, see the 'Linking stacks' box (page 68).

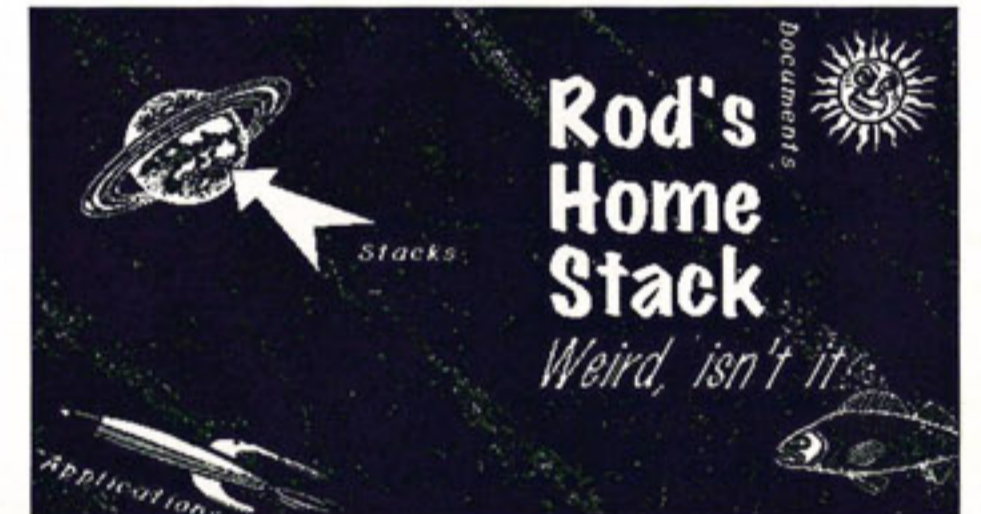

This 'alternative' Home Stack comes with *HyperCard 2.2* and offers a quite different front-end. You simply choose stacks, applications and documents you want to open from scrolling lists, and you can add to and delete from these lists at will.



If your Home Stack's taking up too much screen space, you can use this version, which comes with *HyperCard 2.2*, but it's easy to create from the standard Home Stack - you don't need any script changes, just a little tweak here and there.



Without any programming knowledge it really is quite simple for you to create your very own Macintosh interface by customising a Home Stack card and re-ordering it to be the first card in the stack.

READERS' LETTERS - CARD PROTECTION

Scott Love and Ross McCulloch have a problem keeping their cards safe from prying eyes. Not because they contain sensitive information, but simply because they form part of a game...

'We've written a game using simple *HyperCard* scripts. We spent ages on it and it's now finished. The scripts all work perfectly, but there's a problem that makes the game pointless - the arrow keys can be used to move through all the cards to the end of the game.'

Well, yes, that is a problem... unless you

do a bit of a hatchet job on the stack's script.

You need to do two things:

First you need to disable the keyboard's arrow keys. This is pretty easy, because every time an arrow key is pressed the following message is sent: `arrowKey [direction]`. Simply intercept the message to stop it dead in its tracks:

```
on arrowKey
  beep
end arrowKey
```

The 'beep' tells users not to be so sneaky...

Second, you need to disable the Go menu. That's even easier. All you have to do is add this to the stack script:

```
on openStack
  delete menu "Go"
end openStack
```

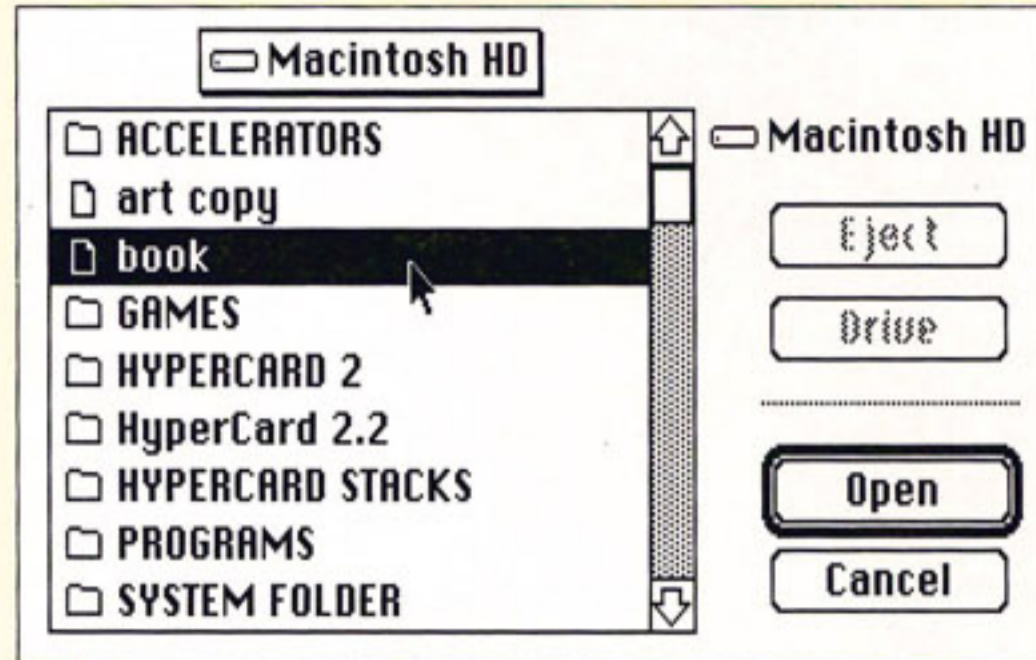
Users now have no way of getting around the stack, except via any buttons you set up specially to link one card with another.

LINKING STACKS

Here's how you would add a button to provide a link to another stack.



1 Choose 'New Link to Stack...' from the Home menu...



2 ... Choose the stack you want to link to via the standard Mac file-finding dialog box...



3 ... And a new button is generated. This button is highlighted and follows the cursor round the card until you click where you want to place it.

won't work, and it could be something crucial. Having done that, you can start adding code. The Home Stack script is an excellent place to put handlers. Why? Because, as explained earlier, all messages pass through it. This means you can set up a handler like this in the Home Stack script.

```
on mouseDown
    play harpsichord c7
    pass mouseDown
end mouseDown
```

Now, every time you depress the mouse key in any stack, *HyperCard* will play a short note, like a click. (Well, it won't if you click on an object with a `mouseDown` handler of its own, without a `pass mouseDown` instruction, but that is a rare occurrence.) This is a very simple way of producing an audible mouse-click.

Or, more ambitiously, you might want the telephone numbers of your business colleagues available at all times. One way of achieving this is to have a 'contacts' stack open all the time and simply to go to it. Another is to create a scrolling field on one of your Home cards and

Card's ability to launch applications and open other files through them is less useful, but under System 6 it's a godsend. Especially because when you quit the other application, you return to *HyperCard* at the place you left it.

With a little imagination – and zero scripting knowledge – you can turn your Home Stack into something far more personal, more useful and more friendly than the standard document.

Be gentle!

The Home Stack script needs very careful handling. *HyperCard* wears its heart on its sleeve – the code of most applications is buried deep in

utterly impenetrable files, but *HyperCard* owners who can use a button and the delete key can easily reach and wreck reams of HyperTalk code that is crucial to *HyperCard's* operation. More experienced coders can modify the Home Stack script pretty safely, but don't do it if you don't really know what you're doing.

Thoughtfully, the original programmers have documented the code in the Home Stack script. At the start of the script you'll find lists of handlers and variables used. Check these lists to make sure that your code doesn't use any of the same handlers or variables – if they are intercepted before the Home Stack and not passed, the relevant routine in the Home Stack

ANATOMY OF A HOME STACK

Before you do anything with your Home Stack, you need to know in more detail what it does...

First, it stores global *HyperCard* settings, like your preferred user level (the last card in the stack).

Second, it stores search paths so that *HyperCard* can 'remember' where to find applications, stacks and documents you set up buttons for (the three cards before the last).

Third, it enables you to access the other stacks supplied simply by

clicking on buttons; it also enables you to add your own buttons for stacks, applications and documents.

All Home Stacks do this, even if the layout differs. And providing you don't delete crucial cards or buttons, your own Home Stack can be re-sized and re-designed to do just about anything you want. But just so you know what you're starting with, here's every card in *HyperCard 2.2's* standard Home Stack. There's nothing here you won't find in the Home Stack of *HyperCard 2.1*, or even version 2.0.



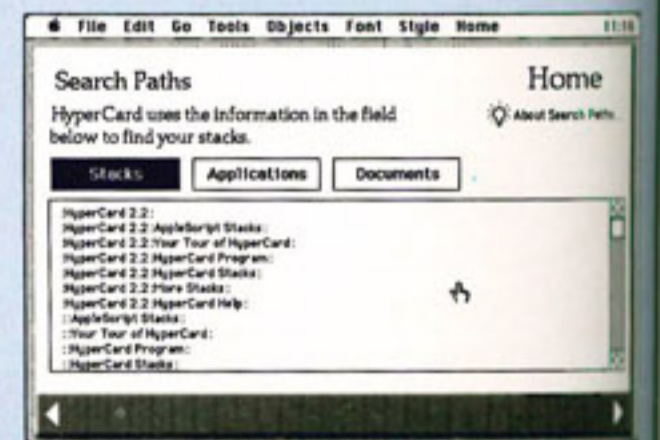
1 You see Card 1 when you launch *HyperCard* by double-clicking on the Home Stack or the *HyperCard* icon...



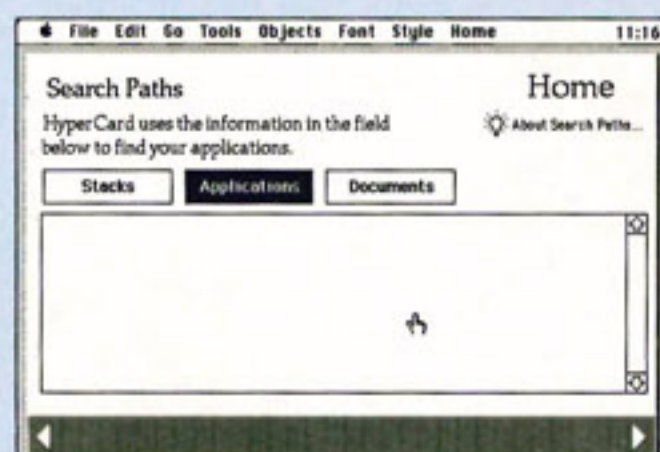
2 It has many buttons to take you to the other stacks, but card 2 offers more tools for stack development.



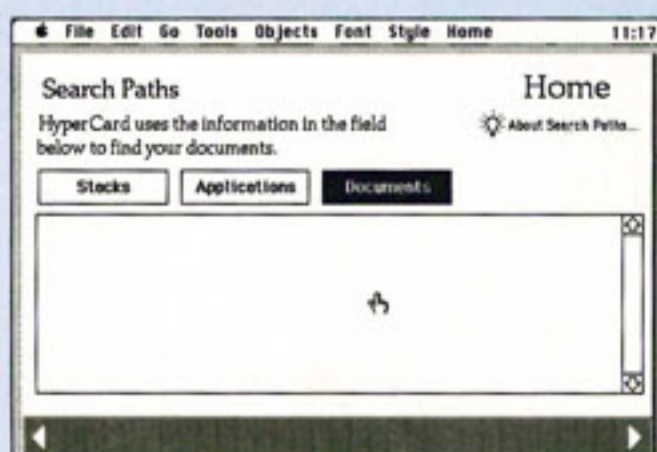
3 Cards 3, 4 and 5 are left blank so you can add your own buttons to link to other stacks, applications or documents.



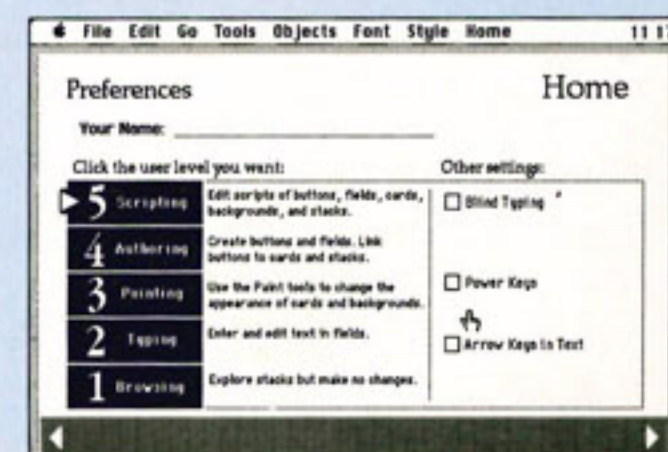
4 Card 6 is the first of three that store the search paths for all the files you have linked together. This handles stacks.



5 Card 7 contains search paths for any linked applications...



6 ...while card 8 details links to specific documents.



7 Card 9 is crucial. It contains the user-level setting, together with three options to make life easier for HyperTalk programmers.

store all your names and numbers there. Then handlers in the Home Stack script will let you recall details from any other stack, without having to modify those stacks.

How? Like this. First you need to add this line to the Home Stack script's startUp handler:

```
phoneList
```

This will activate the following handler, which is placed at the end of the Home Stack Script.

```
on phoneList
  global phoneList
  put card field "contacts" of card 1 into phoneList
end phoneList
```

This handler sets up a global variable and puts the entire contents of your 'contacts' field into it. Now you need a handler that will recover the details you want, when you ask for them. Something very similar to this, in fact:

```
on getno name
  global phoneList
  repeat with i=1 to the number of lines in
    phoneList
    if name is in line i of phoneList then
      put line i of phoneList
    exit repeat
  else
  end if
end repeat
end getno
```

This will cycle through all the lines in your telephone list, looking for the one with the details that you want before putting them in the message box. To use this handler, simply call up the message box in any stack and type:

```
getno [name]
```

The beauty of this is that none of your other stacks need modifying and, as long as HyperCard is running, you can get this information via the message box.

The handlers above are a little bit crude, but they are effective and they do demonstrate the point. If you fancy experimenting with them to make them more efficient, go for it. And, if you have any luck, send in your results and we'll print them in MACFORMAT.

These are just simple examples of what you can do with your Home Stack script. Because every single HyperTalk message passes through it, you can write routines and functions that work with all your stacks, without further modifications - no stack sharing, no special menus. The downside is that you can easily upset the Home Stack script if you're a novice HyperTalk programmer - and even if you're a more experienced one. The voice of experience? Oh no, not me...

So make sure you don't edit what's already there unless you have to. Do not, under any circumstances, play around with routines you don't understand. You should also check to make sure you're not using handlers that are already in use, and that the variable and function names don't clash with any others.

Do this and you should be OK. But always, always keep a 'clean' backup of your Home Stack. You can't re-build a new one from scratch, any more than you could re-build the HyperCard application it-

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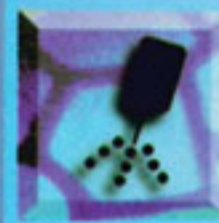

Giving your pages the Works

You don't need a high-end DTP program to create polished pages – *ClarisWorks* does it all.

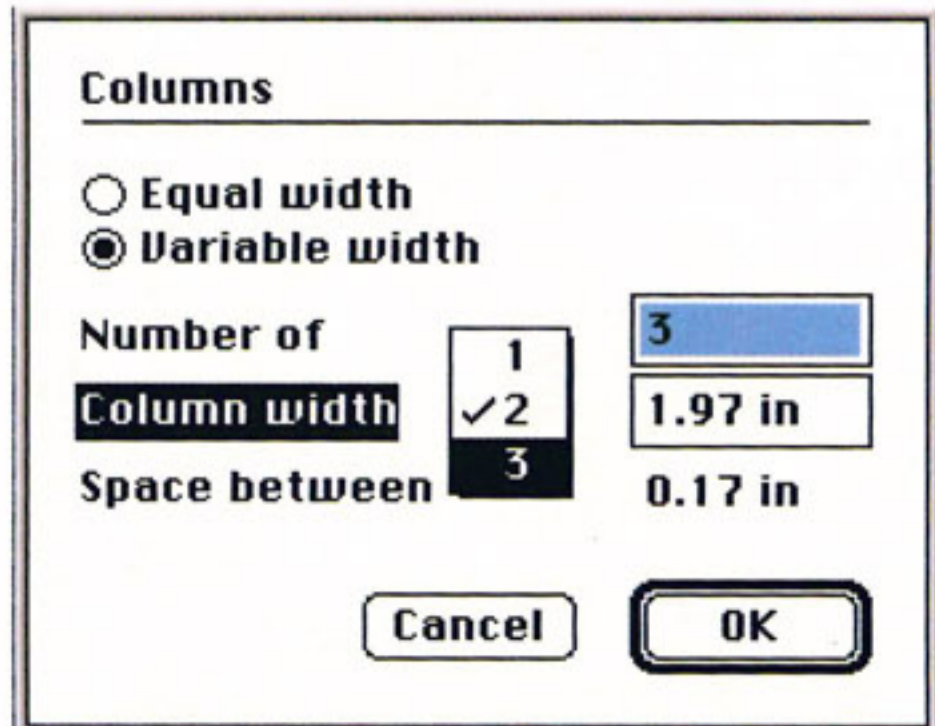
Not many people believe it, but it's true. You don't need *QuarkXPress* or *PageMaker* to lay out pages. With a bit of imagination and a few handy tips, you can do it just as easily using *ClarisWorks*. In fact, there are two ways of setting up a page in *ClarisWorks*. For a quick and crisp page, the simplest thing is to use the word processing method; if you want something that's more professional-looking and intricate, it's best to use the drawing mode (which is called 'graphics' in *ClarisWorks 1*).

Before you start, you need to do some page planning, so decide how you ideally want your page to look (see *MACFORMAT 9* for some hints). If necessary, make some rough sketches of your page layouts on a scrap of paper first, then place your headlines, illustrations, subheadings, captions and so on. It's usually easier if you have your articles written before you try to set out your pages.

Word processing method

The first thing you should note here is if you are using *ClarisWorks 1*, you won't be able to lay out a page using the word processing mode because it doesn't have a columns function. So, in this instance, skip to the tips under the 'A more professional page' header.

Now that you're ready, open a word processing document and we'll begin. First, you have to set columns. For evenly-spaced pre-set columns all you have to do is click the column buttons in the text tools bar at the top of the page. But if these don't suit your needs, use the 'Columns' option in the 'Format' menu and set them yourself. This is handy for uneven column widths. One thing you should remember is that the pre-set margins are quite wide: one inch on each side, top and bottom. So you might need to adjust these using the 'Document' option in the 'Format' menu. If you do, *Claris* will re-jig the pre-sets automati-

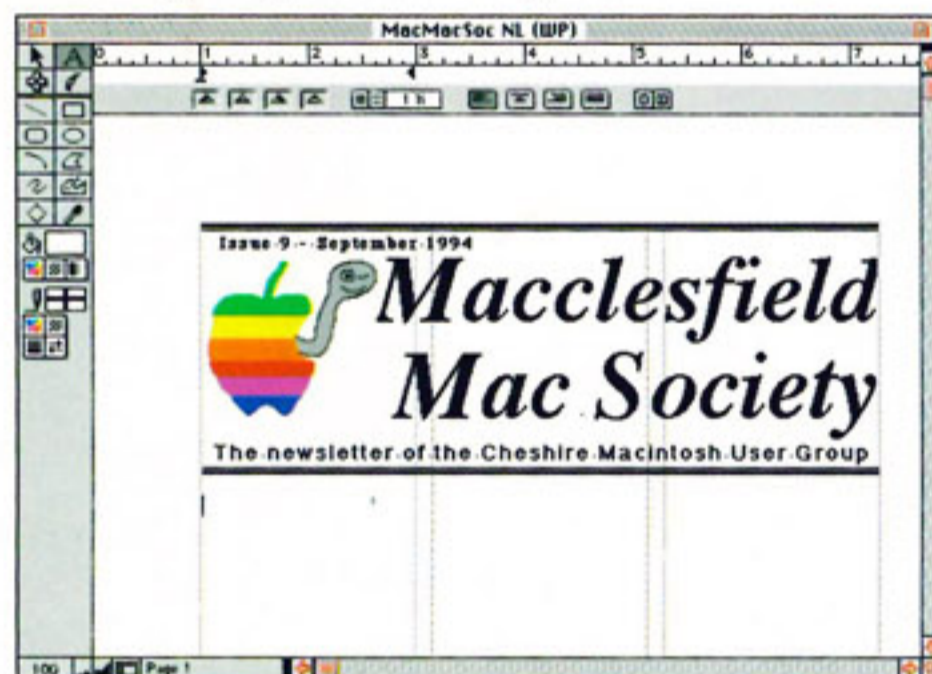


The first thing you need to do is set up the columns as you want them – with either equal or variable widths.

cally, but if you've set your own, you'll have to readjust them yourself.

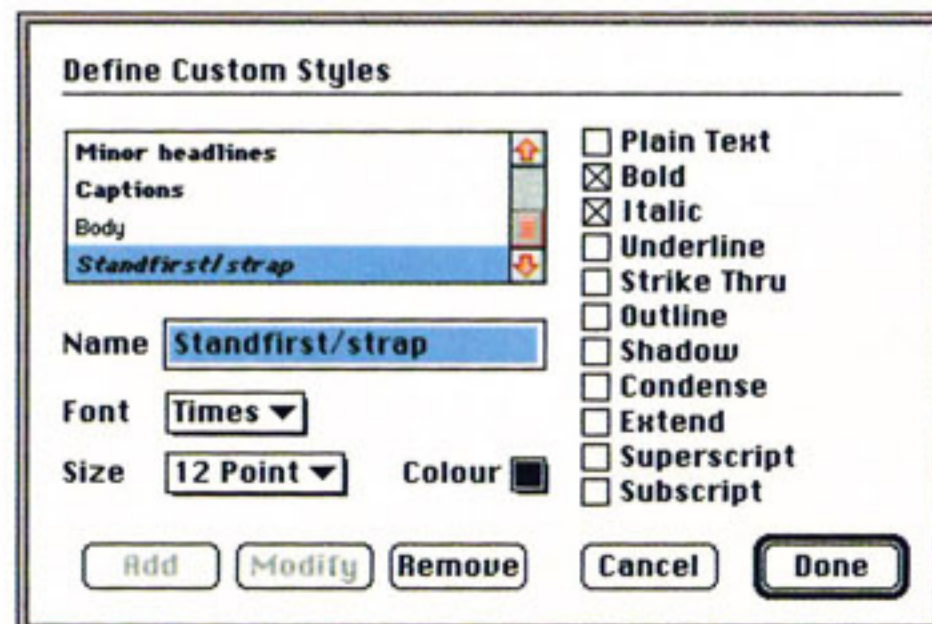
And now the fun begins. Now you've set the columns for your publication, you need to design a header for your front page. Select the 'Show Tools' option from the 'View' menu to access the drawing palette. To place your header, any headline, or other non-body text, move the cursor to where you want it to go, hold down the [option] key, and drag the cursor across the screen to create a text frame. You can re-shape or move this around the page just like a graphics object by clicking the tool bar arrow and selecting the text box.

Whenever you introduce free text frames or graphics objects, you need to use *ClarisWorks*' 'Text Wrap' option. That way, when you introduce your body text it won't cover up the objects or frames. In order to do this, select (or [shift]-select) the various objects, then activate 'Text Wrap' (under the 'Options' menu) by choosing 'Regular' or 'Irregular'.



We've set up our header. The apple and worm graphic is a paint frame we've pasted in. To get rid of the border, choose 'None' under Pen Thickness while the frame is selected.

If you're going to produce something like a newsletter or small fanzine on an on-going basis, you might want to keep your general page design as stationery and maintain a set of text styles for different purposes. To set these, you need to use the 'Define Styles' op-



It's useful to set styles for the page furniture and stick to them. But don't worry if you change your mind about the fonts, sizes and styles, they can be modified easily.

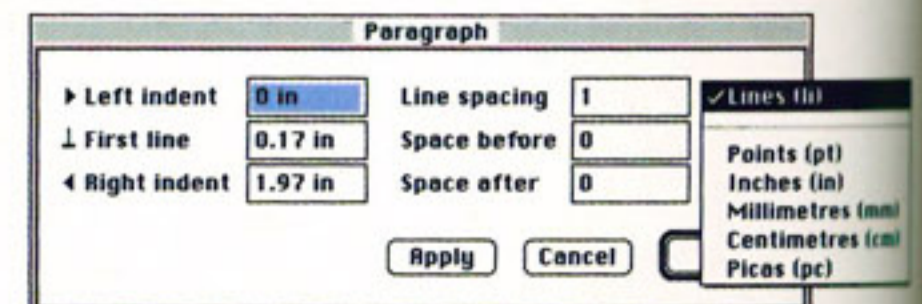


Forget *QuarkXPress* and *PageMaker* – *ClarisWorks* can create classy page layouts with the best of them.

tion, which you'll find under the 'Style' menu.

Once your styles are set and you're relatively happy with your header, [shift]-select all the objects that you want to keep as they are, then 'Group' and 'Lock' them using the 'Arrange' menu – but don't 'Lock' anything that you might need to change issue by issue. By grouping and locking these objects, you won't be able to accidentally mess them up later. Now you can save your master page and styles as stationery, ready to be loaded whenever it's time to publish again.

You're now in the flow of things, and it's time for you to put the body text on to the screen. To do this, open your story, copy it, and paste it on to your page. Keep the text selected and style it up using your pre-set styles. You can set the paragraph indents and line spacing using the 'Paragraph' option in the 'Format' menu (or you can double-click on the spacing indicator). Spacing can be set in lines, points, millimetres, centimetres, inches and picas, but a curious glitch in the program means that text will jump further away from 'Text Wrap' objects if you use anything other than the pre-set spacing. If you have *ClarisWorks 2.1*, you can turn on 'Auto hyphenate' from your 'Writing tools' – this is invaluable, particularly when you're working with narrow columns.



Shape your body text using the 'Paragraph' options. It's best to stick to the pre-set line spacing, but you can adjust it in points, inches, picas, centimetres or millimetres if you like.

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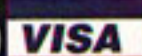

Donald A Norman

When is a corkscrew not a corkscrew? When it doesn't work.... Design guru Don Norman analyses the form and function of everyday objects.

In this custom-built world of ours, where much of what we see and touch is man-made, good design is vital. By this, I don't mean how lovely an object looks, but how well it does its job – and how easily we're able to learn to use it.

Donald Norman has spent years looking under the surface of everyday things to see how they work, and how we work with them. Let's take an obvious and infamous example: the corkscrew. How often have you been handed a corkscrew and not had the faintest idea how you were supposed to use it?

What's happening here, apart from the effect of alcohol, is bad design: the function of the object is not clear. This is sometimes true even after you've been shown how to use it.

This *First Person* CD-ROM, which reproduces the text of Norman's three books, deals with the psychology of design, adding video clips of the author to spice things up a bit. These clips preface and complement the text, making it less intimidating to dive into.

Do make a point of getting stuck into these reams of text, though, because the questions raised in your mind as you watch Norman and read his thoughts are especially relevant for CD-ROM and computers.

Both are becoming ever more widespread in all our lives – including the lives of those people who, for whatever reason, haven't yet been

One person was even an engineer who worked for the same company that made the refrigerator.

And what about the need for electric outlets? You would think that any modern kitchen designer would understand the need for sufficient outlets, or for rooms to store all those appliances, a place to put them during use. No, I think that designers try to make everything look good. And outlets are simply not thought of as a part of the kitchen. Outlets are for the electricians to worry about. But electricians do what they are told to do, and if nobody tells them how many outlets to put in, they will follow the electrical code, which probably specifies two outlets per wall, regardless of whether it is a kitchen or a bedroom. Design neglect.

THE PROPER WAY TO DESIGN
The proper way to design anything is to start off understanding the tasks that are to be done and the needs of the users. In a

part of the personal computer revolution. What Norman effectively does here is take a step back from all the enthusiasm for computers generated by marketing people and Mac owners – the ones who are telling the rest of the world how essential this technology is – and asks how right they are. Is there a better way in which these machines could be used?

The camcorder is a prime example of poor use of technology, according to Norman. Many camcorder users are so preoccupied with the process of committing their lives to video that they're missing out on the full richness of the experiences they're filming. Their lives are serving the technology, rather than the other way round.

The solution to this problem, Norman suggests, is to design objects in such a way that people don't have to think about how to use them. Technology needs to be invisible

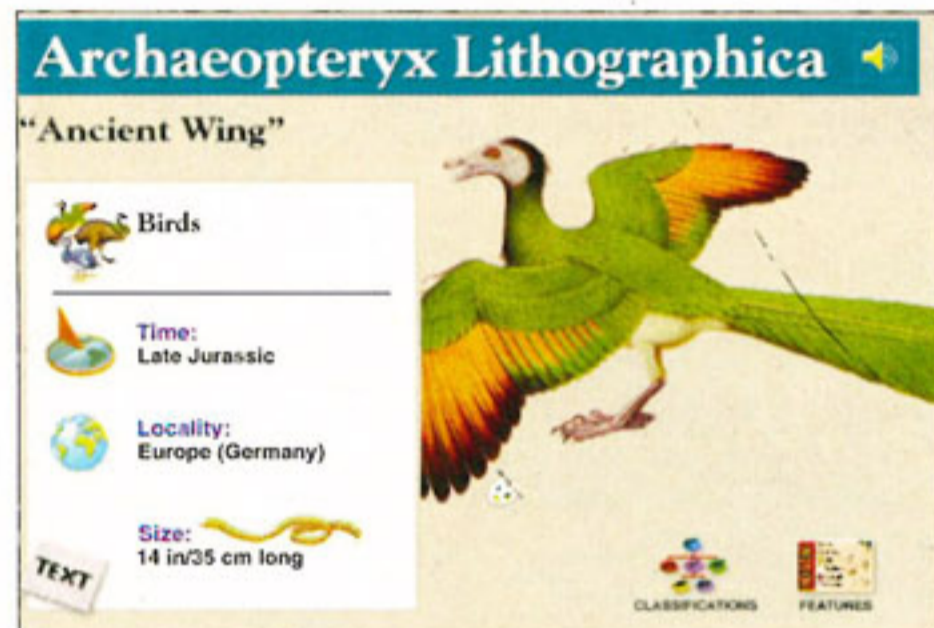
Prehistoria uses text, video clips and a selection of illustrations and graphics to give you a

basic guide to the animals that lived on Earth over the last 500 million years, including our primate ancestors. The core of the presentation is an encyclopedic display of page after page of creatures of all types and descriptions.

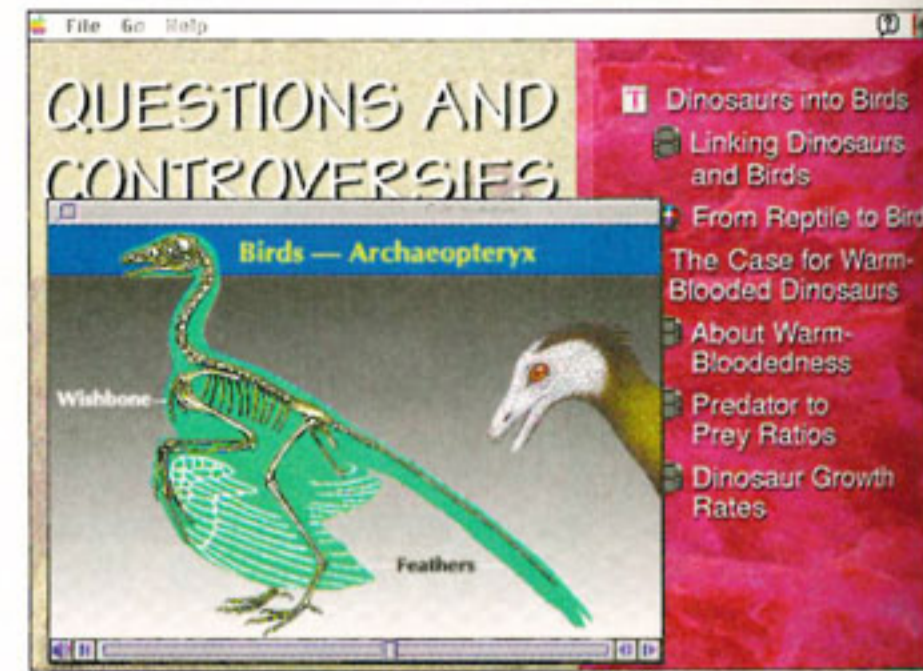
Each page shows you what each individual creature looked like, and its name is spoken out loud when you click on the loudspeaker icon. If you've been wondering how to pronounce 'Thecodontosaurus', here's your chance to find out. You can also see where in the world it lived, what size it was compared to a human, and get information on how it lived.

You can browse randomly through the pages, or choose from several ways of searching for the entry you want. The best method is to use the Gallery. This takes you through illustrated classes of animals until you narrow down the range to one. A strong alternative is the Time Tracker. Using this, you can choose a creature to read about, based on when it lived and what sort of animal it was.

While most of the information comes from these pages, it's the Grolier Museum section

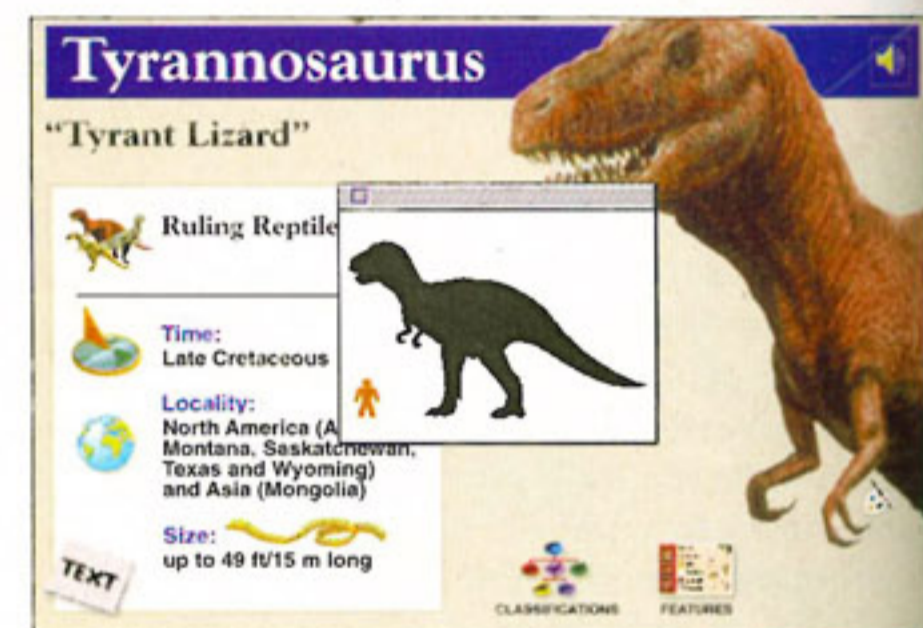


Pictures show scientists' interpretations of living dinosaurs – a big improvement on fossilised bones and bits of old rock.

Behind The Scenes:

The Zoo

A double CD-ROM tour of Marwell Zoo – but where's Johnny Morris when you need him?

Reality has a habit of catching up with the future faster than you think. Remember when CD-ROMs first arrived on the scene and few people

could see how anyone could need that much space for data? Now MACFORMAT has cover CD-ROMs that are chock-full every month, and here, from MDI, is a program that needs two CD-ROMs to fit everything on.

The Zoo is the first in a planned series of documentaries called *Behind The Scenes* – which is as self-explanatory a title as you're likely to get. You go, um, behind the scenes at various places – in this case, a zoo.

What happens is this: the program uses video clips and illustrated text to take you through a day in the life of the animals and staff of Marwell Zoo.

Despite the presence of many encyclopedia pages on the park's occupants, *The Zoo* relies mostly upon video footage, giving the program a reassuring feel of a TV documentary. The dif-

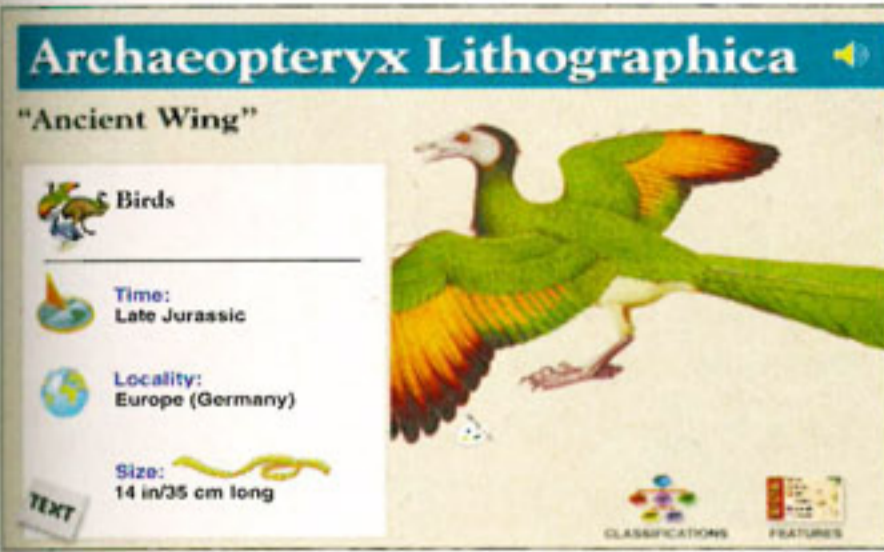

ference offered by CD-ROM is that you can view the video clips in any order you want. For a while this has some novelty value, but once that's worn off it's hard to see what the



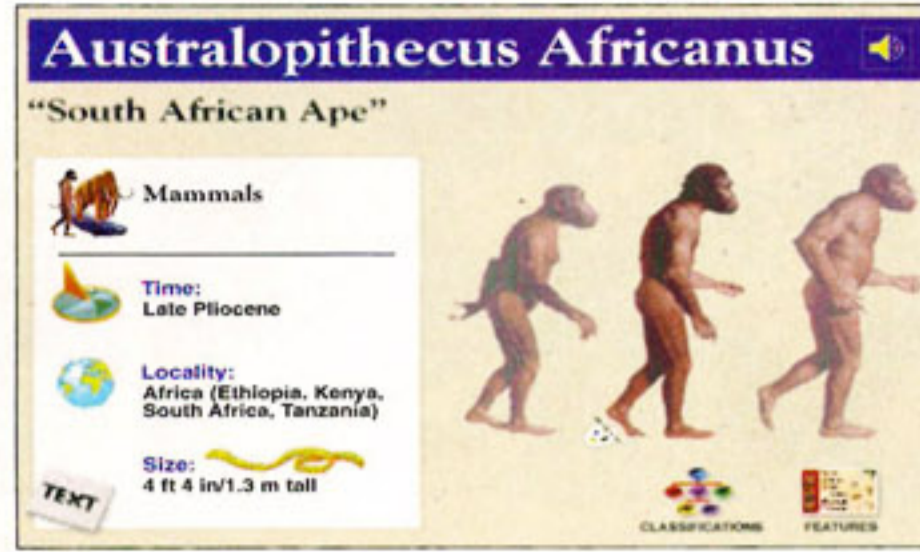

scientists into the guide, showing you how they do their research into fossils and the like. Unfortunately, though, the clips suffer from the usual technical shortcomings – the picture quality is too blocky to make watching a lot of clips in one sitting much fun. But the insight into how the information at your fingertips was gathered is fascinating.

Another impressive part of this program is what Grolier calls Knowledge Explorer essays. These simple narrated animations, made especially for the computer, work so well that you'll wonder why they aren't far more widely used. As the narrator takes you through the subject, illustrations appear and transform, with text pointing out particular points of interest.

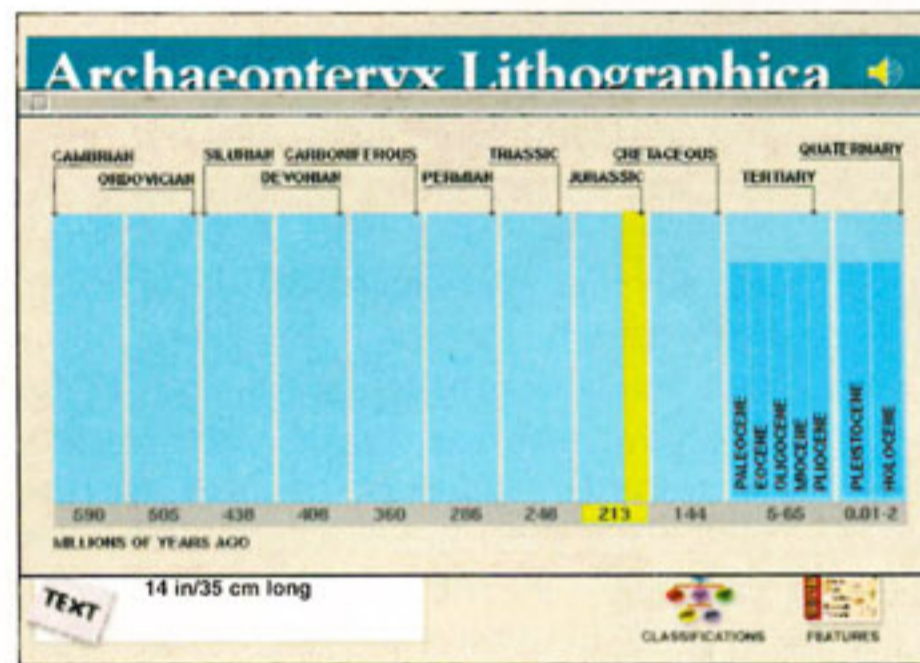
Prehistoria is a solid piece of multimedia, but it doesn't set the flames of inspiration alight. Nevertheless there's real potential in its use of educational animations.

Of course, there are problems. Even when the quality of computer video becomes more

real, long-term benefit is. It's not as if it's a real day out, and you've got a tearful child on the end of your arm demanding to be taken to see the lions and tigers *now*. Hmm, maybe primary schools would find it useful?

One of this program's most distinctive sections is the 'Tour'. This involves a lengthy trip around the zoo's grounds with an accompanying map screen – so you can see exactly where the car is as it progresses through the zoo.

The 'Place' section has a second map. You can use this to zoom in on a particular animal that's kept at a certain point.

Unfortunately, these two sections don't work closely enough together. It would have been nice to be able to stop the video tour and zoom in to read information on the giraffe you'd just passed, for example.

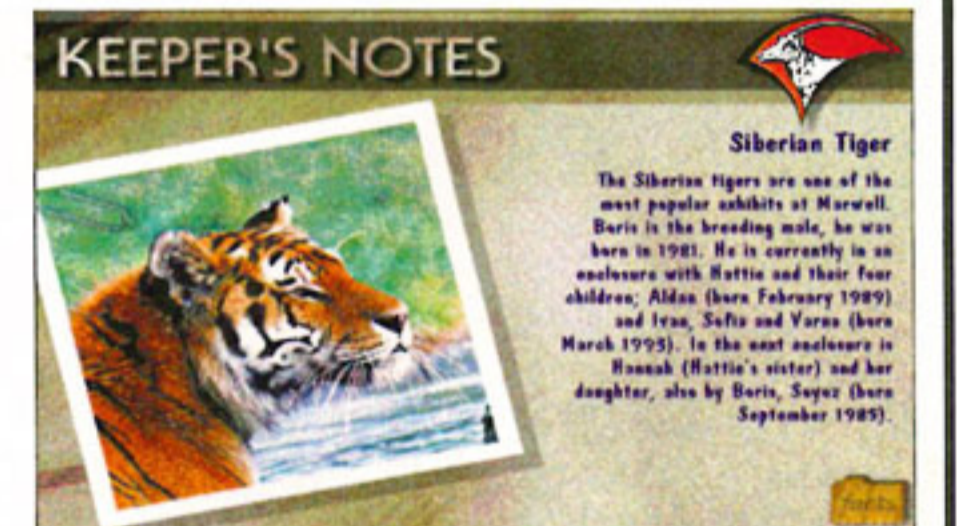
Instead, the sheer bulk of information in

The Zoo – enough to fit on two CDs – works against the program. Presumably because of the size of particular sections, the Tour section is on a different CD-ROM from the Place section. To move between them, you have to quit one program, eject the CD, load in the other CD and run the program again. It's a bit of a pain, to say the least. Future double-CD-ROM sets will need to approach the problem of moving between sections more thoughtfully to create a smoother ride.

With its wealth of material to browse through, *The Zoo* scores highly on value for money, but as a CD-ROM, it adds little to your experience of its subject that couldn't have been gained through books and TV. To succeed fully, CD-ROM really needs to become a medium that offers something that no other single format can. *Richard Hill*

King Arthur's Magic Castle

This set of simple games for kids uses the legends of King Arthur – sort of.

The mist-shrouded, romantic tales of Arthur Pendragon will be the last thing on your mind after you've played with this CD-ROM for a few minutes. Games and interactive drawings form a set of activities for young children, but there's nothing here to hold a kid's attention for long.

You can find out about the different parts of a castle by clicking on different areas of a drawing, but, sadly, a brief spoken explanation and a cartoon showing you that area are your only rewards. The sophistication of the info here is not bad for the young, but, as with the other parts of the program, there isn't a lot to it.

Merlin's Tower gives you a single-screen drawing with lots of objects to click on, each one offering a short animation. This is good mouse practice for an inexperienced toddler – but only one screen?

The Dungeon takes you to a 3D maze filled with things to

find and weird and wonderful creatures to meet. It's quite good fun and not too threatening. This is the strongest part of the program, although it's really best suited for an older age group than Merlin's Tower.

The joust is a thin exercise: you move your mouse up and down to keep your cartoon knight's lance straight so he can beat his opponent. It's really far too fiddly and pointless to bother with, though.

King Arthur's Magic Castle may be useful for acquainting your youngest child with a Macintosh, encouraging him or her to use the mouse. The child will probably enjoy the experience, although there's so little here that he or she will soon get bored and move on. And, after all, the program has nothing to make anyone want to return to it.

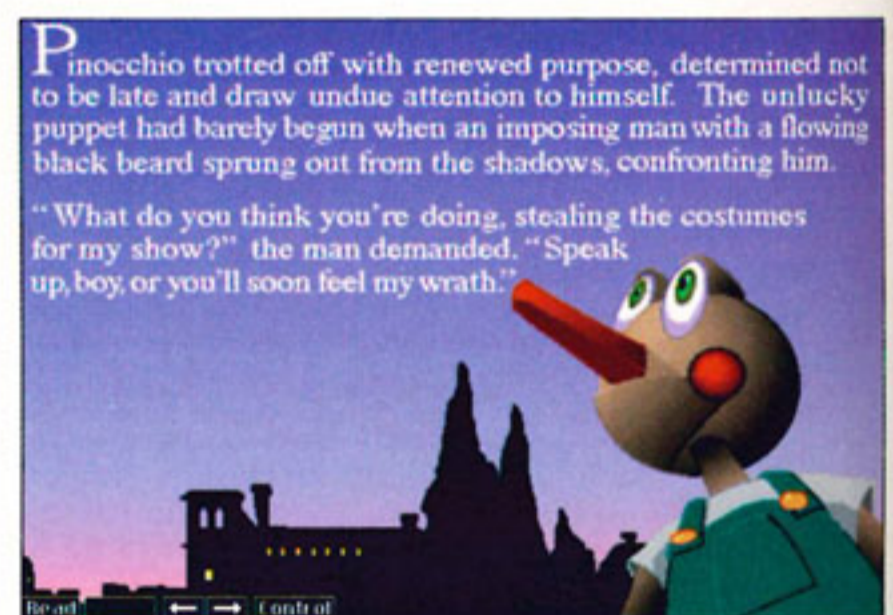
beast. You can select any of the 20 chapters from one screen, and go forwards from that point – or backwards if you're feeling particularly contrary.

Most of the pages are simply text and pictures, although there are a few pages where you can see an animated scene. At the click of a button, you can hear all the words being read out by an American gentleman. The main point of this CD version of the traditional tale is that some words are highlighted in a different colour from the rest. Click on one of these, and you can see and hear a definition of that word. It's a simple concept with great educational potential...

Except, the result is that both the storytelling and definitions are horribly ham fisted. In particular, the definitions give you the impression that

Time Traveller

Climb into your time capsule, hit the controls and reappear in the past to see history first-hand.

The idea behind *Time Traveller* is both clear and imaginative: you have a time capsule at your disposal and can use it to visit any given continent between 4000 BC and 1992 AD. You can discover the political events of the time, see how people lived with the program's 'Culture' button, or monitor man's scientific development. The program aims to be a chronicle of the growth of civilisation and its effect on the human race.

Dipping into history with your own time machine is an evocative concept, and your Mac playfully acts out its part by making appropriately futuristic bleeps whenever it calls up a historical record.

Time Traveller uses three windows – one each for the text, images and control panel. Using standard Mac windows for the program may



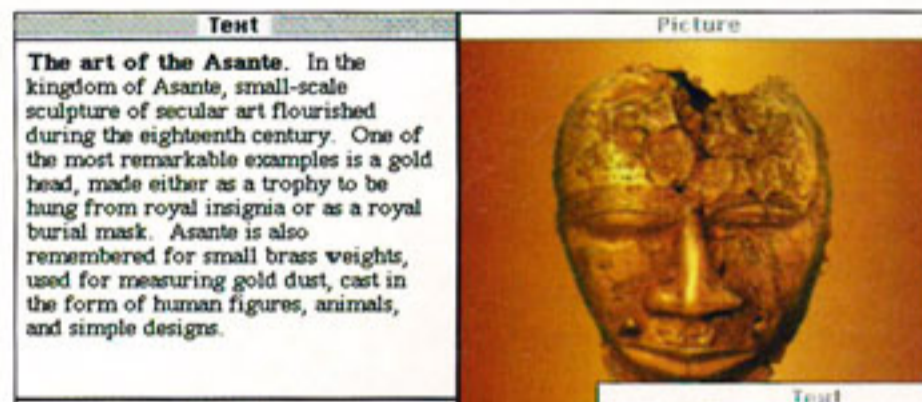

make it easier to grips with, but that doesn't necessarily make it a good idea in this case. There's no sense of the various elements working together coherently, and it's a pain having to click on a window just to scroll through some text or move to a different year – you keep forgetting you have to do it. Ideally, you should be able to

use any program without having to think about it, but that doesn't happen here – despite the fact that there are only a few features to juggle with. *Time Traveller* is essentially a simple program, but it's awkward to use because the design has been screwed up pretty badly.

A more serious problem, however, is the sketchiness of the information. Even with relatively recent history, where plenty of information was available to the program's researchers, entire decades of progress have been summed up in a perfunctory paragraph. Visit Europe in the 1980s, for example, and you'll be given the

story of the Beatles and the first British pop invasion of the United States! Now whatever you think of the Fab Four and – let's get it right – '60s music generally, this is hardly a detailed account of the cultural growth of Eu-

ropean civilisation. Size is not necessarily a good indication of quality, but

when an illustrated reference guide uses a mere 80Mb of CD-ROM space from a possible 650Mb it suggests it's not exactly a definitive work.

When descriptions become so paltry that the scientific and philosophic growth of Africa apparently remains unchanged for centuries (a conclusion you'd draw because the same caption and picture are used to cover the entire period), you begin to feel that someone hasn't been doing their research.

For a program costing over £125, *Time Traveller* just isn't good enough. There are plenty of better reference works to spend your money on, including *Prehistoria* (reviewed on page 74). It really is a shame, because the basic concept is such a strong one. Someone should steal this idea and do it properly.

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A cadet's guide to

Cyberspace

The Internet is deep, it's vast and it's only a phone call away. But how do you go cruising the digital superhighway without getting lost?

If I were to begin this review by claiming that there're 23 million computer users hooking into the Internet world wide, I'd be wrong. Because by the time you've bought and read this issue of *MACFORMAT*, there will be tens of thousands more. In fact, the 'Net's growth rate is so stratospheric no one really knows how many users there'll be in six months' time. But this should give you an idea. When *Internet Starter Kit* was revised earlier this year there were 2.3 million computers connected to the 'Net community (each with an estimated ten users). The first edition, however, which was published in September 1993, quoted 1.7 million 'Net connected computers (giving a figure of 17 million users). Get the idea?

You come across these problems of scale all the time when you're trying to describe and explain the Internet. It's not just a question of numbers either – it's as much to do with the sheer diversity of news and interest groups, subject areas, information providers, vendors, academic institutions, corporates, e-Mailers and absolutely every freeware and shareware Mac title ever written.

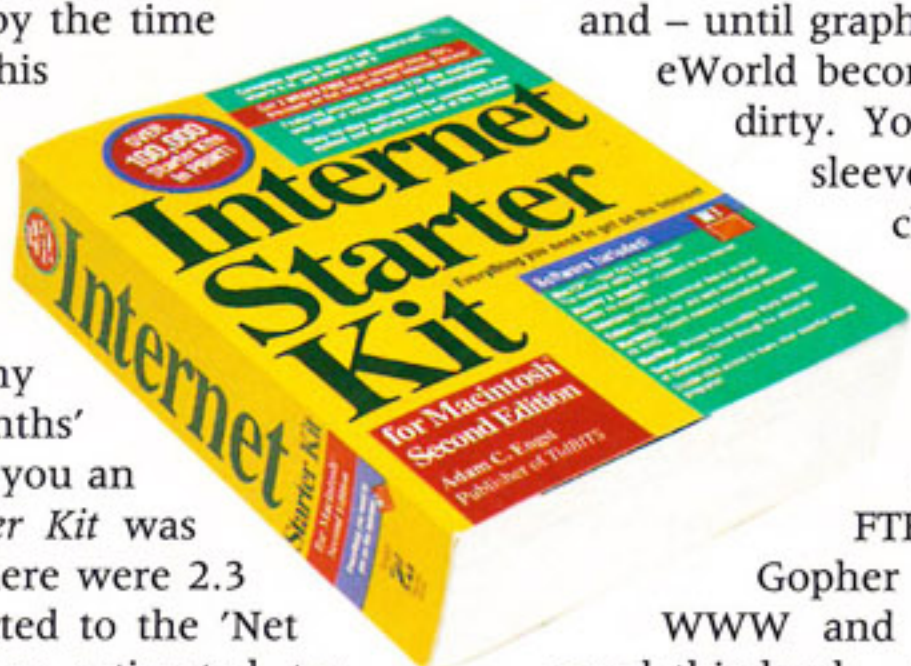
Bible studies

Adam C Engst, *ISK's* author, clearly had a tough job. True, he could have applied a skimpy coat of thin gloss and come up with a sparse reference guide that read like an index – but he didn't. Fortunately, what we have here is a 995-page, fact-packed bible complete with a disk full of Mac utilities for going on-line. In short, all that's missing is a covermounted modem. [Now, there's an idea! – Ed]

Unfortunately, though, much of the content is aimed at an American audience and, as such, you have to grin and bear the overly gushing style. That aside, there's much here that deserves praise. Engst certainly has a good grip of this huge subject and manages to cover all its

facets with sufficient detail to make *Internet Starter Kit* an engrossing read. But therein lies the flip side to the Internet: it's big, it's complex and – until graphic front-ends like Apple's eWorld become well established – it's dirty. You have to roll up your sleeves, ditch your mouse, get clued up on UNIX and get friendly with whole new bunch of acronyms, terms and concepts. Know what TCP/IP refers to? What about FTP? RFC? Any guesses on Gopher or Telnet? What about WWW and WAIS? No? Then you need this book – and those terms are just the beginning.

ISK deals with the low-level structural stuff straight off, taking you through the various networking terms and protocols, through a history of their disparate construction, and to their

Coming with updated versions of the programs found on *ISK's* disk and a couple of other handy Internet utilities, the *Explorer* book appears to be a little more lightweight than its sibling publication – despite its 446 pages. But this is because the style takes the form of an on-going on-line correspondence between Engst and William Dickson – who it seems spends more of his life on-line than off.

The tone is explorative and reflective, and the content more concerned with signposting those esoteric little shacks lurking at the end of the dirt tracks just off the superhighway. Yep, it's the wild and wacky world of 'On-line', folks. But before you start thinking it's more to do with Super-egos than Superhighways, I'll just say it's crammed full of all the addresses that you'd expect to find in a Rough Guide to the

eventual consolidation as a World Wide Web. But before pitching into the real nitty gritty of how you actually connect to the 'Net, Engst shares with us some extracts from his on-line forays around the world, just to underline the fact that there's a fun element here. Because although the 'Net may appear complicated and seem to require serious application, it's nevertheless an exciting place to explore.

So it's on to chapters establishing the rules for e-Mail and addressing, file transfer protocols and 'netiquette', and descriptions of the main Internet services and where to find them. Next, of course, comes the 'how to' of it all. By now we're at page 222, so, as you can imagine, there's plenty to get to grips with here.

Methods and madness

Engst outlines the four main ways of connecting to the 'Net: hooking up to a commercial service offering e-Mail only access, logging on to a public access UNIX account, joining a UUCP (UNIX-to-UNIX-CoPy) site, like those found at universities, or dialling up a site running SLIP (Serial Line Internet Protocol), which, providing you have *MacTCP* software, enables you to do everything on the Internet via a Macintosh interface.

And since *MacTCP* and *InterSLIP* are two of

Internet. Like interactive cafes, underground journals, on-line magazines – or simply servers that you can lurk around and aimlessly wander.

The two books work extremely well together: the *Starter Kit* prepares the ground work, while the *Explorer Kit* points you in the right direction for some choice encounters. In short, it's an invaluable guide to cruising some of the cooler hang-outs on the Internet, and is well worth a browse before you buy.

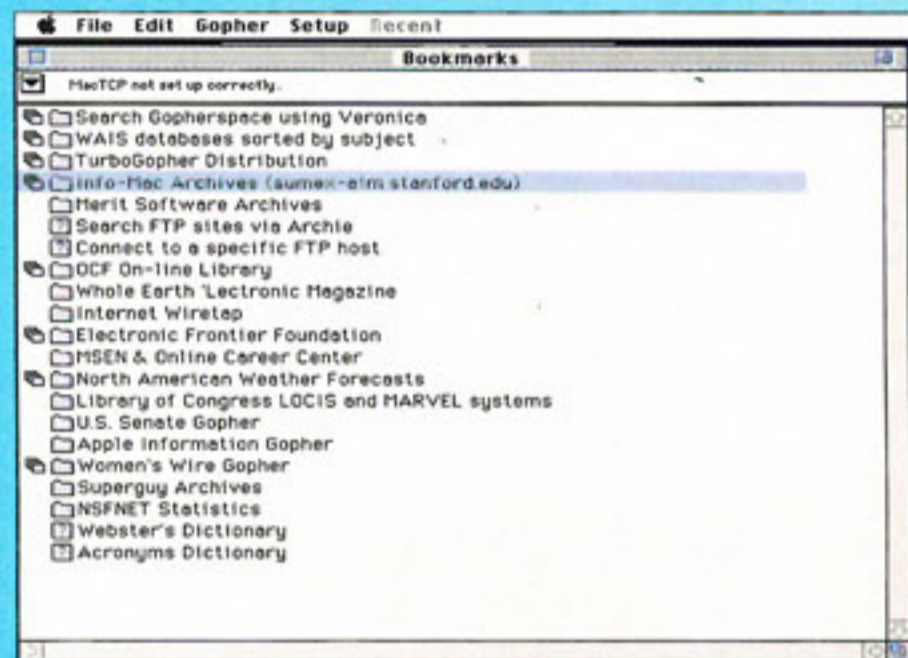

And we can only be thankful that there are Mac front-ends to this vast UNIX network, because otherwise the new frontier would look about 15 years out-of-date.

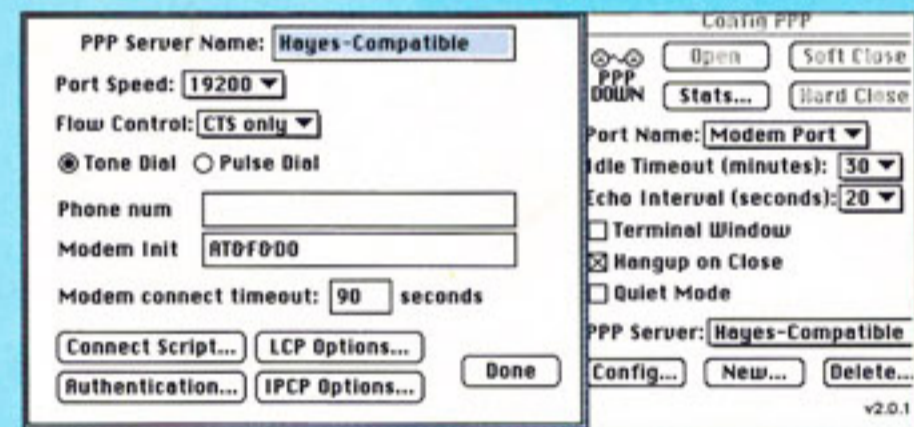
In describing, explaining and comparing the clutch of Macintosh software designed to make UNIX more palatable, Engst really excels. We are treated to thorough discussions on the merits of all the software on the disk: e-Mail programs like *Eudora*, Usenet newsreaders like *NewsWatcher* and FTP clients such as *Anarchie* and *Fetch*. 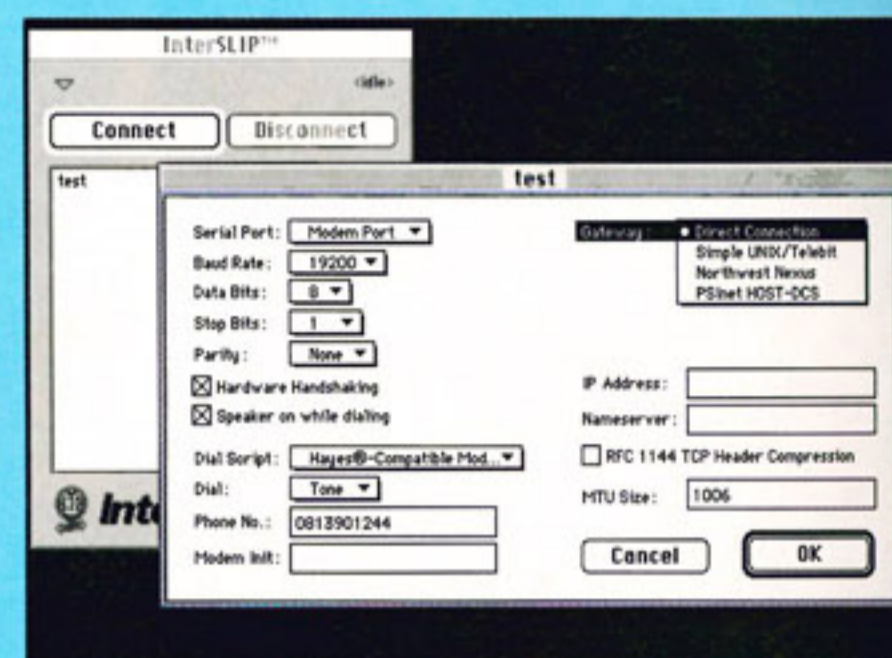

No, none of it sounds easy and appealing – but after nearly 300 pages, you'll get the hang of it. Especially because all the software is included on the disk; so all you need is a modem, a number and a rather a relaxed attitude to your next phone bill.

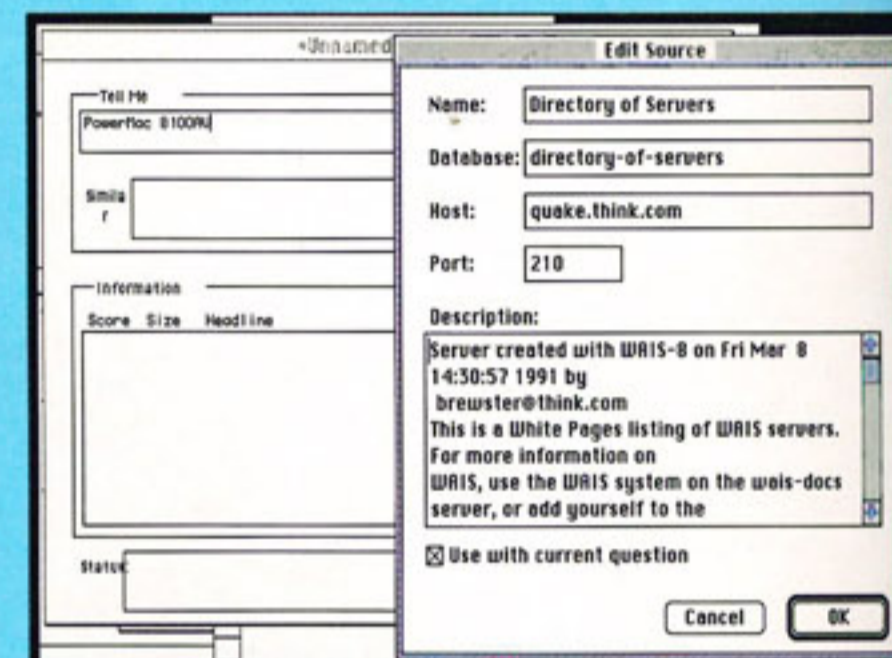
Discussions of the disk's programs don't dominate *ISK*, though; the majority of the pages are devoted to step-by-step guides about how to install and use the software. And if, like me, all this comms lark tends to go a bit over your head, you'll enjoy the clarity and ease with which the actual mechanics of Internet access are explained.

Sell by date?

Because the only thing you can be completely certain about on the Internet is the fact that it continually changes, an author writing a book devoted to the Internet needs to watch his back. New resources such as mailing lists, news

groups and servers spring up all the time, and while any book will find this dynamism difficult to pin down, at least *ISK* shows you how to keep tabs on the changes. Indeed, its appendices alone – dealing with an alphabetical tangle of the hundreds of diverse subject resources available on the Internet, from Astronomy to Zoology – could have been a book in their own right. Add to this a full listing of all the Usenet news groups and hundreds of dial-up numbers for sites with Macintosh interfaces and you're all ready for the onslaught of on-line overkill.

It is a pity then that most, if not all, of the services and sites that are described here are in the States. Perhaps a chapter dealing with international access, and how to minimise its inherent costs, will find its way into the third edition – or, better still, what about a Euro-specific edition? Still, *Internet Starter Kit* succeeds in delivering a mass of readable information on a highly complex subject. And, despite its all-American focus and tone, it remains indispensable for anyone wanting to explore the brave new whirl of the Internet. Thoroughly recommended.

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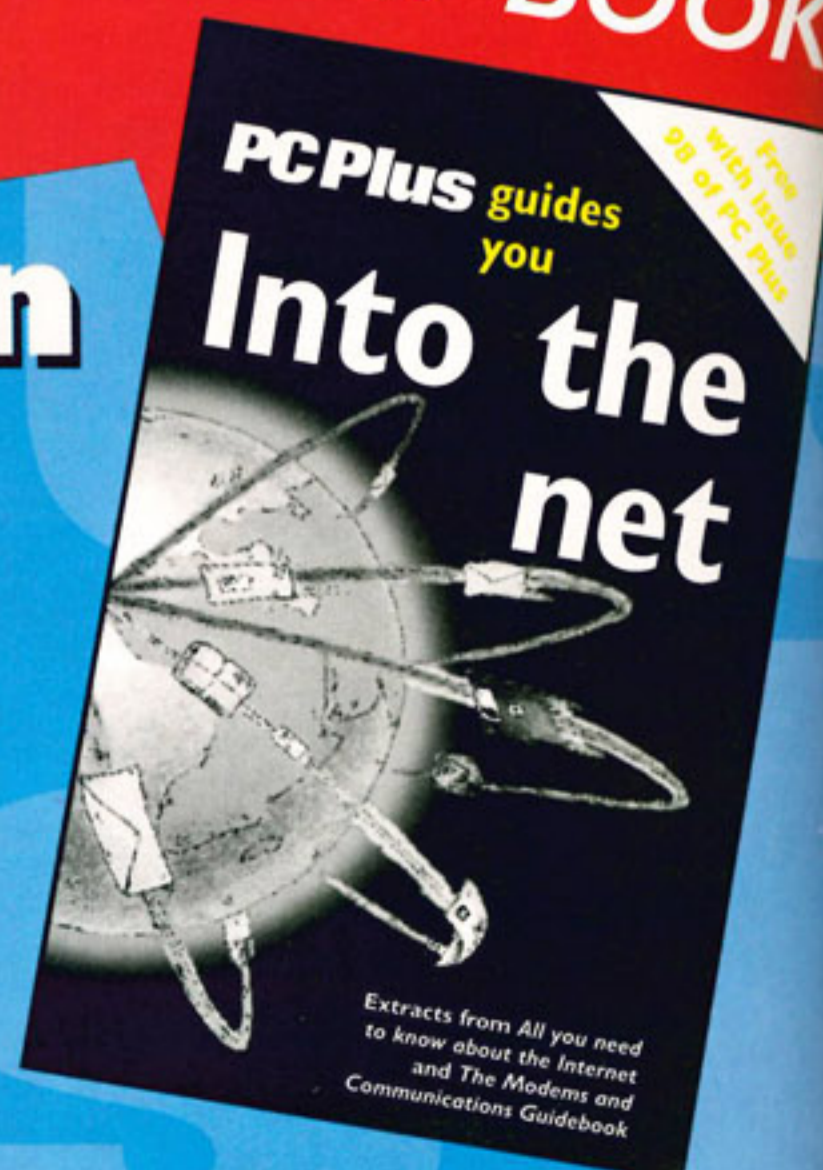

Do-it-yourself problem solving

One of the main causes of a program not working properly is something called an INIT clash – this ominous-sounding term means your program isn't happy with one of the system-level Extensions (INITs in System 6) that are running.

Fortunately, it's easy to check if this is the case. First of all, restart your Mac without any System Extensions (INITs). If you're running System 7.0 or above, that means restarting the Mac and holding down the [shift] key – a message telling you

'Extensions off' will appear. For any System version below 7.0, move all the Control Panels and INITs out of your System Folder and restart the Mac.

If your program now works, it must have been unhappy with one or more of the INITs. The only way to work out which one is the culprit is to move them all out of the System Folder, then put them back in one at a time – not forgetting to restart your Mac after each one – and test the program again after each one has been replaced.

Protect and save SYSTEM

After experiencing regular crashes, I tried re-installing System 7.1. But I got the message: 'cannot overwrite a protected resource on hard disk. Error detected before installation began.' How can I re-install my System software?

The problem comes from the fact that some piece of software has altered the System file in the System Folder. I notice you have a hand scanner, and it may well be its software driver that's caused the problem. Apple's installer can't get rid of the changes to your System file and gives up. To solve the problem you can follow these steps...

1. Start from the Disk Tools floppy that comes with the System software.
2. Open your hard disk, then open the System Folder and move the System file out of the

folder to somewhere safe. Don't worry when your System Folder and all the folders within it lose their custom icons.

3. Choose Shutdown and restart from the Install 1 disk. You should now be able to re-install your System software.

4. If after a few days everything is all right, you can delete the old System file.

You may well find that whatever software caused this trouble will not work, and so you will need to re-install that software as well. JS

A macro made in heaven GENERAL

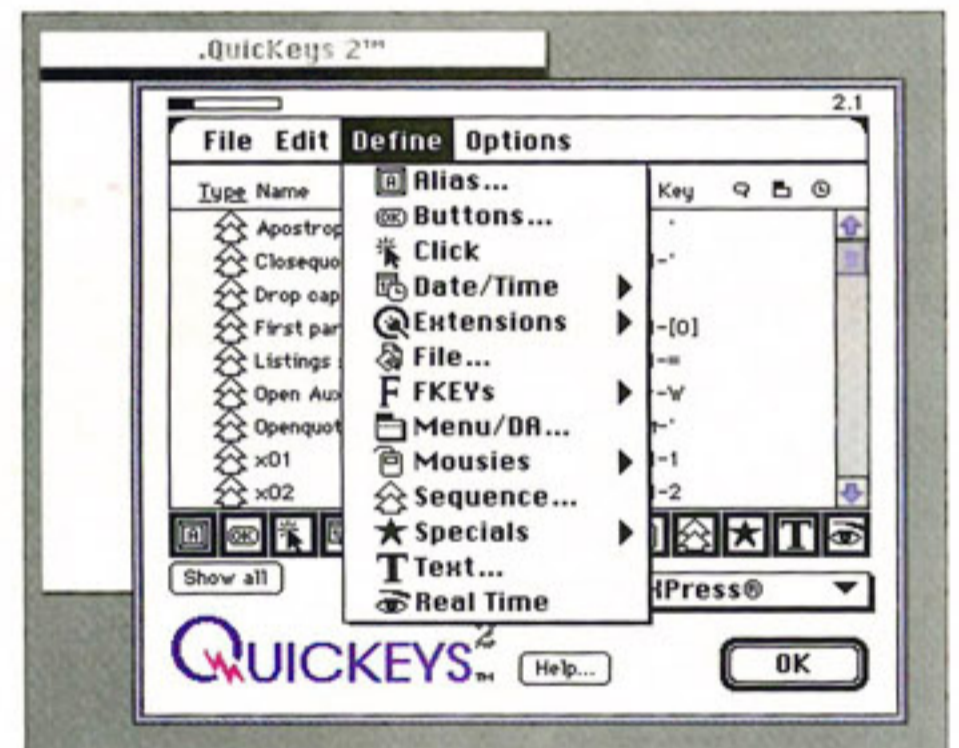
I have recently found a copy of the old Apple System 6 utility MacroMaker. I have two questions about it: will it run under System 7, and is it any good?

For those who don't remember System 6, MacroMaker was a utility that recorded your actions so they could be replayed at a later time. This is very similar to the macro facility in ClarisWorks. Unfortunately, MacroMaker won't work with System 7, but then, it wasn't particularly reliable under System 6. And even when it did work, its usefulness was fairly limited.

The fundamental problem with MacroMaker is that the macros can't be edited. All it does is record simple events such as mouse movements and key clicks. For example, if you move the mouse to the top-left of a window and click on the close box button, the window will close. But if you try to use a replay of that action, it will only work if the window is in the same position, which isn't very likely.

CE's QuicKeys works in a similar, but more intelligent way. (It's £135 or less from Frontline on 0256 463344.) If you are waiting for a System 7 version of MacroMaker from Apple, then



QuicKeys is able to record keystrokes and mouse clicks in a file for subsequent playback.

the closest you're going to get is AppleScript, which is part of System 7.5. If applications are written appropriately, then AppleScript can record actions in the same way as MacroMaker – only better. However, this versatility comes at the expense of ease-of-use. JS

Easing into madness SOFTWARE

I have At Ease, but every time I try to switch it on I get a message saying: 'At Ease couldn't open because an error of type 39 has occurred'. The book said that if you throw At Ease away without closing it, you can cause problems. What should I do?

Error 39 means 'end-of-file', which suggests that you have a file error. Although it's not what I would have expected, certainly At Ease shouldn't be trashed before being de-installed. If you want to remove At Ease, it should be switched off in the Control Panel first and then dragged to the trash. You should then

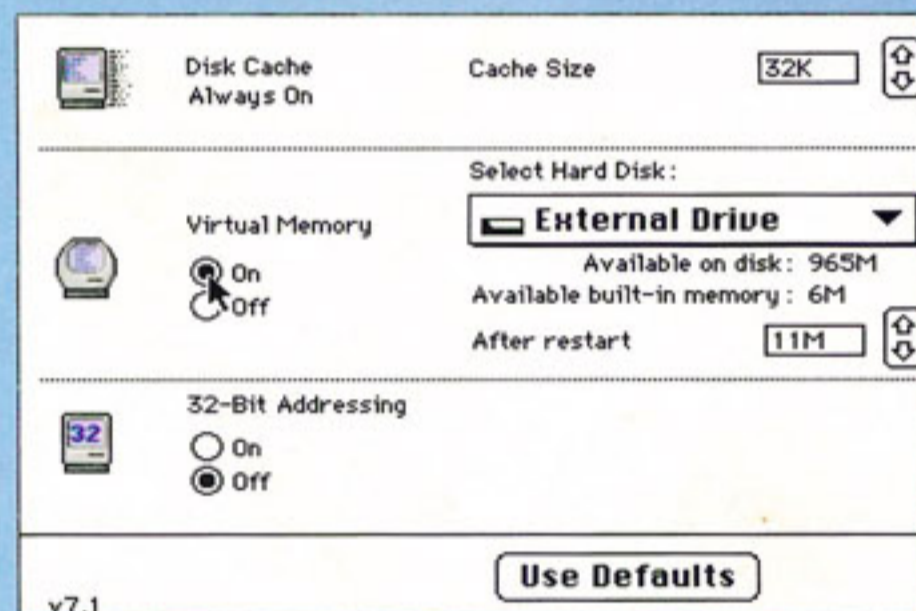

Q Does a program exist that enables you to allocate different types of memory to different applications? For example, is it possible to run the Finder in Virtual Memory so you have enough real memory to run the programs that need it?

A An intriguing idea, Marc, but alas, it's not possible because of how Virtual Memory works. A Macintosh contains a certain amount of memory that the System's able to allocate to any applications. This allocation of memory can be changed by using the boxes in the 'Get Info' window in the

A VIRTUAL PROBLEM

Finder. What Virtual Memory does is to trick the System into thinking it has more memory than the hardware actually contains. It does this by using the hard disk as temporary memory.

Unfortunately, memory appears as one block with no distinction between the built-in memory and your hard disk, so you can't choose which programs run in which type of memory. However, there are a couple of shareware programs that enable you to quit the Finder when it's not in use, such as *Xo-Launch*, which is featured on page 103. This will help you to free up some of that precious memory.

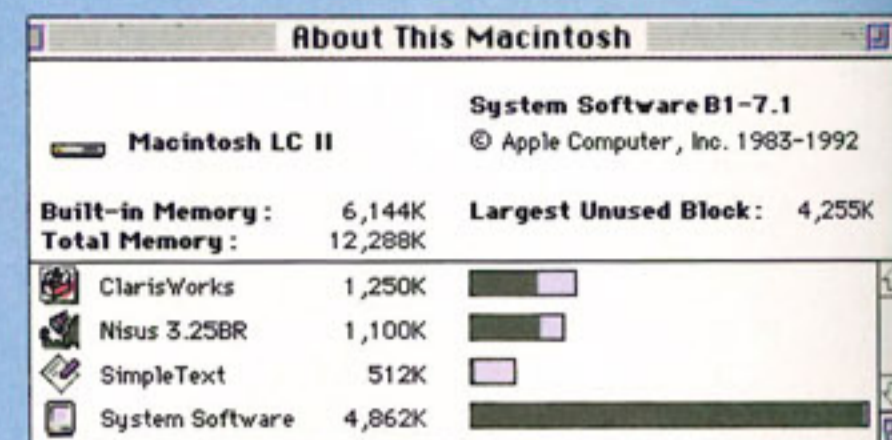

Q I've recently bought an LC475 with 4Mb of memory. For some reason PageMaker 4.0 will not run unless Virtual Memory is turned on. When Virtual Memory is turned off, PageMaker crashes with an error of type 15. Is there a technical reason for this?

A An error of type 15 is called a segment loader error and can arise for a number of reasons. In this case, it's probably because you don't have enough memory to run *PageMaker*. When you turn on Virtual Memory, the System uses the hard disk as extra memory. So, when *PageMaker* is launched with Virtual Memory turned on, the application runs properly.

Q I've heard a lot about *RAMDoublor* and how much faster it is than Virtual Memory. I have an application that refuses to run with Virtual Memory. Will it work with *RAMDoublor*?

A *RAMDoublor* is indeed somewhat faster than Virtual Memory for two reasons. First, it creates its own form of Virtual Memory using your hard disk. This is superior to Apple's Virtual Memory, but it also uses memory more efficiently. Although there is no hard and fast rule, generally if a program doesn't work with Apple's Virtual Memory, then it is unlikely to work with *RAMDoublor*. We have found around the office that applications often give exactly the same error message with *RAMDoublor* as they do with Virtual Memory.

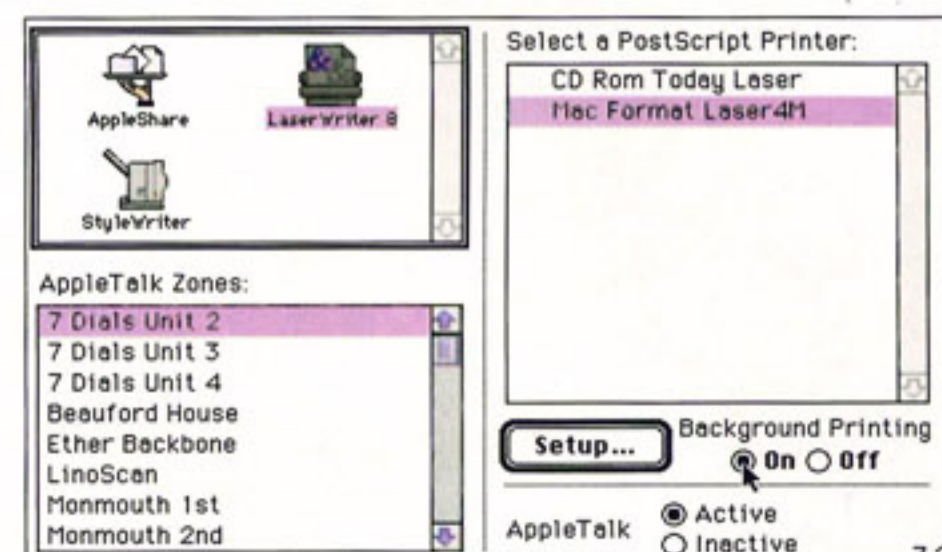
A good background

PRINTING

Q When I print in the background, the System eats up most of the available RAM and stops me using my Mac. As soon as printing stops, the System goes back to normal. It doesn't happen with simple documents, or when background printing is off.

A Background printing is the culprit here. The idea of background printing is that you

can print a document while you continue to work. With background printing turned off, the application you're printing from sends all its information direct to the printer. This forces you to wait until the printer's finished before you can continue working.

Background printing creates a spool file on your hard disk, and starts up the application called *PrintMonitor* to manage the process. The more complex the document to be printed, the more information needs to be sent, and consequently, the larger the spool file. Then, the *PrintMonitor* sends the spool file to your printer a bit at a time, so the larger the document, the longer the process takes.

With background printing on you get back control of your Mac more quickly than with background printing turned off, but your document will take longer to print, use more memory, and slow down any other programs that are running. The best remedy here is to turn off background printing. This is done from the Chooser window when you select a printer.

Alternatively, find the *PrintMonitor* application in the Extensions folder, click once on its icon, and select 'Get Info' from the file menu. Then you can alter the amount of memory allocated to the *PrintMonitor* at the bottom of the box. Normally this is set at around 90K, so if yours is higher, you could try reducing the memory allocation.

Q I have some questions regarding my LaserWriter Select 310.

1. Is there a simple (and cheap) way to speed it up? It takes 25 minutes for a page of mixed text and graphics at the moment.
2. Can you tell me why I get white hairlines on black graphics? The machine is clean. Should I stop using PICT format?
3. Is there an equivalent to Adobe Type Manager that will enable me to use old TrueType fonts?

A 1. The Select 310 is a PostScript printer, and as such, its print speed is largely deter-

mined by the speed of its microprocessor and print engine. Neither of these can be easily replaced in the Select 310. 25 minutes for a page of text and graphics does sound a lot though. You don't say which application you're printing from, or what your page consists of, but I suspect that it has some fairly complex PostScript images on it, or lots of fonts. Simplifying the page and using fewer fonts should help.

2. Again, you don't say which application you're printing from, or whether this problem only affects PICT graphics. Some PICT bitmaps suffer when printed on a 300dpi (dots per inch) laser printer because they were created at 72dpi, which can't easily be scaled to 300dpi.

READERS' TIPS

If you need to copy a lot of files on your Mac, you needn't wait for that grey bar to finish snaking across the screen before you resume work. Providing you opened an application before you started copying, you can bring that application to the front again and your Macintosh will continue copying in the background. To do this simply select the appropriate application from the application menu, which is at the top-right of your screen, next to the 'Balloon' help icon. *Dennis Farmer*

To log on to a network quickly, make an alias of its icon and leave it on your Desktop. Double-click this icon to bypass using the Chooser. *Michael Rasmuson*

To open a folder and automatically close the previous window, hold [option] as you double-click the folder. *Susan Partridge*

Open the Map Control Panel, hold [option] and click 'Find' to see the next town in alphabetical order. *Jon Maynard*

Sometimes you put a floppy disk into your drive, but its icon doesn't appear. To eject the disk all you have to do is press down [command] [shift] and 1. *Frank Eller*

going to Page Setup and choosing Options. Click on 'Precision Bitmap Alignment' and reduce it by 4%. Now print out a page. Everything should come out 4% smaller, while your PICT files should have a resolution of 288dpi (which is four times 72dpi), and so should print out more clearly. This is a fairly common problem with PICTs that contain patterns, but it is conceivable that your solid blacks are suffering from the same problem.

3. TrueType fonts are supported by the System, so they can be seen and printed without installing anything like ATM. If you're running a version of a System later than 7.0 (and you are), they should display and print in all their pristine glory. I get the impression that only some of yours do, though, because you refer to 'old' TrueType fonts, when in fact there is only the one format of Macintosh TrueType fonts.

I suspect that you've fallen foul of the 'LaserWriter 8.0 TrueType problem'. For some reason, version 8.0 of the LaserWriter driver won't print a lot of non-Apple TrueType fonts. It gives no errors, but just doesn't print. The best way around this is to annoy your local AppleCentre until they give you a copy of LaserWriter driver version 8.1.1. This often seems to fix this problem, as well as a few other bugs. *JG*

Q I intend adding more memory to my 4Mb LCIII, but I have a few queries before I start.

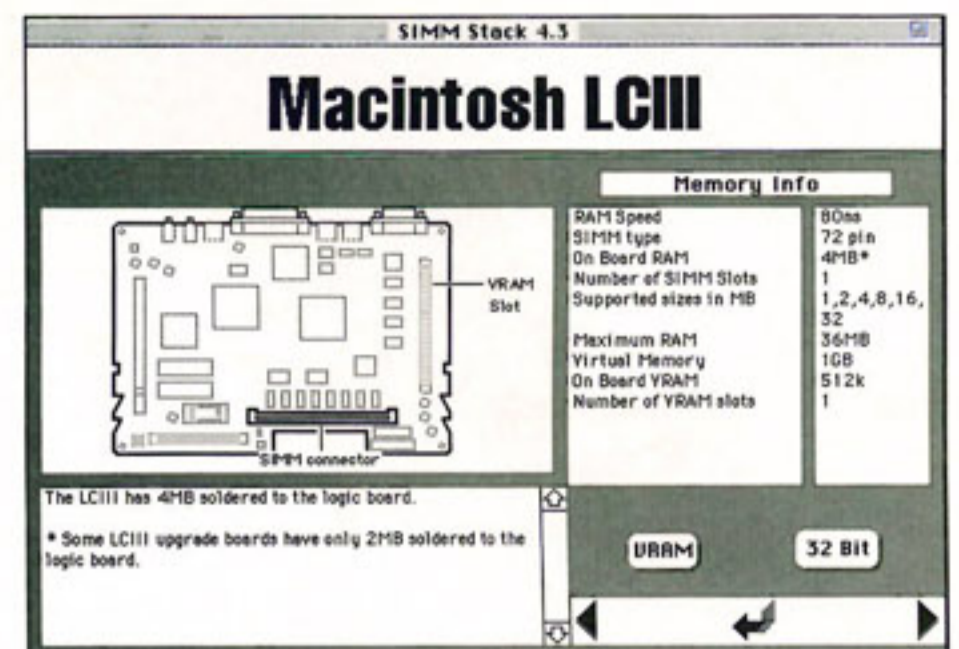
1. Can I increase my memory in stages of 4Mb up to the maximum of 36Mb?
2. Why does an 8Mb SIMM cost more than double a 4Mb SIMM?
3. Is there any reason for buying an 8Mb SIMM rather than two 4Mb SIMMs?
4. What is the significance of the number of pins when applied to SIMMs? I have seen both 30 pin and 72 pin SIMMs advertised.
5. The advertised prices for memory vary considerably. Does the price reflect any difference in the quality or reliability?

A 1. The way you add memory to a Mac depends entirely on which Mac you have. All recent Macs have at least one socket on their motherboard where you can place more memory - memory being sold in units called SIMMs (Single In-Line Memory Modules). In the case of the LCIII, there's only one socket. This can accept a single SIMM of 1, 2, 4, 8, 16 or 32Mb. Therefore, you can only increase your machine's memory to 5, 7, 8, 12, 20 or 36Mb.

SIMM Stack is an excellent program packed with information, and you'll find a copy on MACFORMAT 14's CD-ROM.

2. Each SIMM is generally made up of eight individual memory chips. The larger the SIMM, the larger each individual chip has to be. The price of these individual chips affects the cost of the SIMM. Generally, larger memory chips are newer and tend to be more expensive because they're harder to produce. This is why an 8Mb SIMM can cost more than two 4Mb SIMMs.

3. With an LCIII, your expansion options are severely limited and therefore you should probably buy the largest single SIMM you can afford. For other machines with more SIMM sockets it may be worth buying SIMMs in pairs. Most Macintoshes now require you to add the same size SIMMs in all the SIMM slots when you upgrade.

4. Older Macs take 30-pin SIMMs, while newer ones use the 72-pin variety. You should buy the correct type for your machine, which in the case of the LCIII is a 72 pin SIMM.

5. Generally, there's no difference between SIMMs, because there're very few manufacturers that produce them. However, you should not buy composite SIMMs. These are produced by gluing together a number of small size memory chips to make a larger SIMM - for example, making a 16Mb SIMM out of sixteen 1Mb SIMMs rather than eight 2Mb SIMMs. Composite SIMMs can cause problems in certain Macs and are not recommended by Apple.

For more information on expanding the memory of a Mac, there's an excellent HyperCard stack produced by Apple called *SIMM Stack*. Or you could read our feature about upgrading your RAM in MACFORMAT 14. *JG*

Pull the plug

Q Whenever I plug the microphone in, all the sound from the computer disappears. When I try to record a sound, nothing is recorded, just ten seconds of silence. When I take the microphone out, the sound returns. Why?

A It seems you're plugging the microphone into the wrong port. Most ports are different shapes, so you can't plug things in the wrong hole, but you've found the exception.

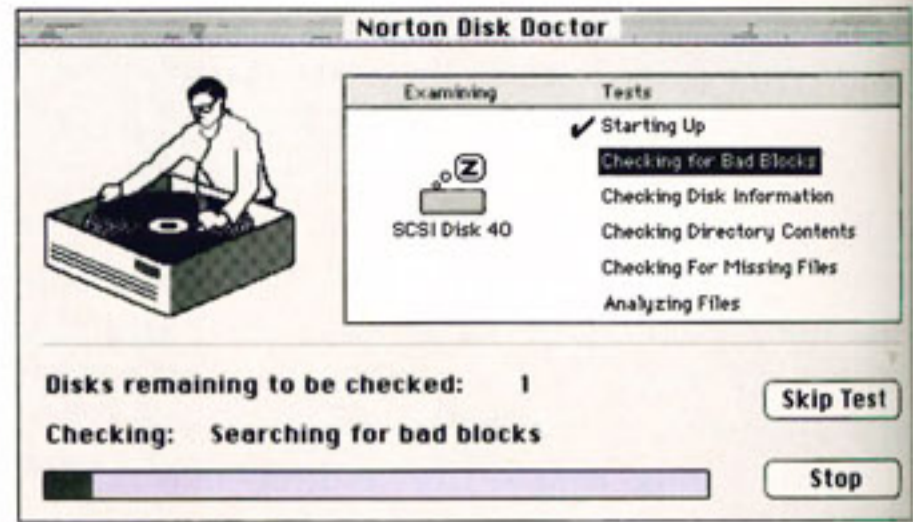
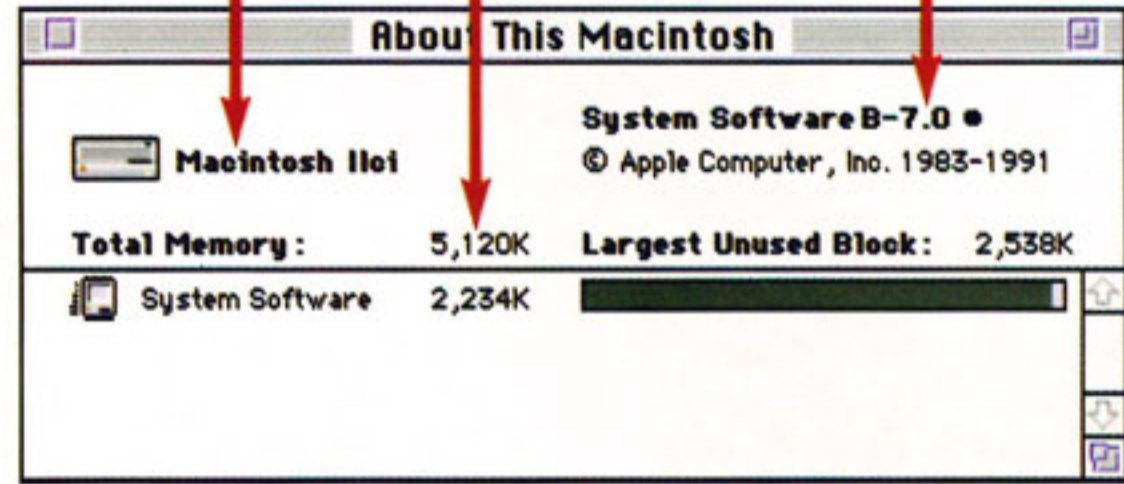
There are two sound ports at the back of a Mac: sound-in and sound-out. You should plug the microphone into the sound-in port, which has a symbol of a microphone above it. On your Classic II this is next to the keyboard port.

The sound-out port, which has a speaker

but it means we can sound smug if you call us in a panic). Then use some software to check your disk. Use Apple's *Disk First Aid*, or better still, a commercial program like *Norton Utilities*.

Even if these don't detect a problem, I still strongly suggest you completely re-install your System software from the original System disks. If you have a Performa, you won't have any of these, so you'll have to buy them. If your printer's not an Apple one, then re-install the printer software as well. If this doesn't cure the problem, then try to find out if the problem occurs in all applications or just one. If it's in just one application, check with the distributor that it's up-to-date and re-install it.

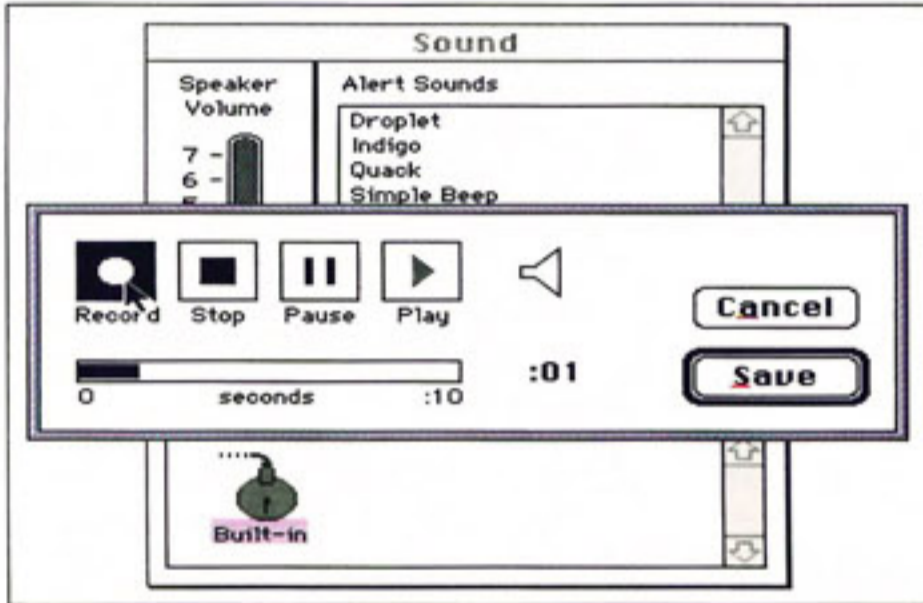

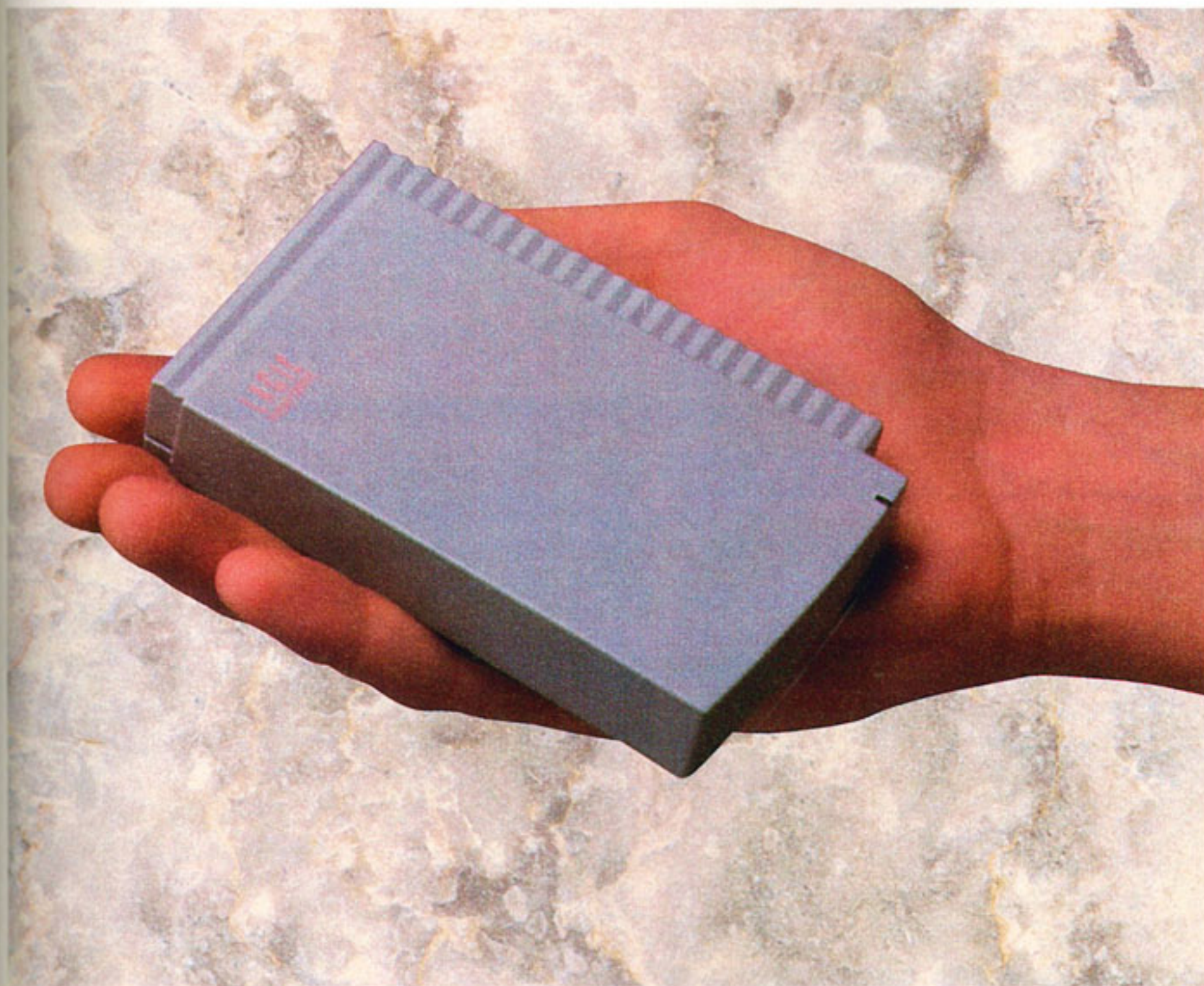

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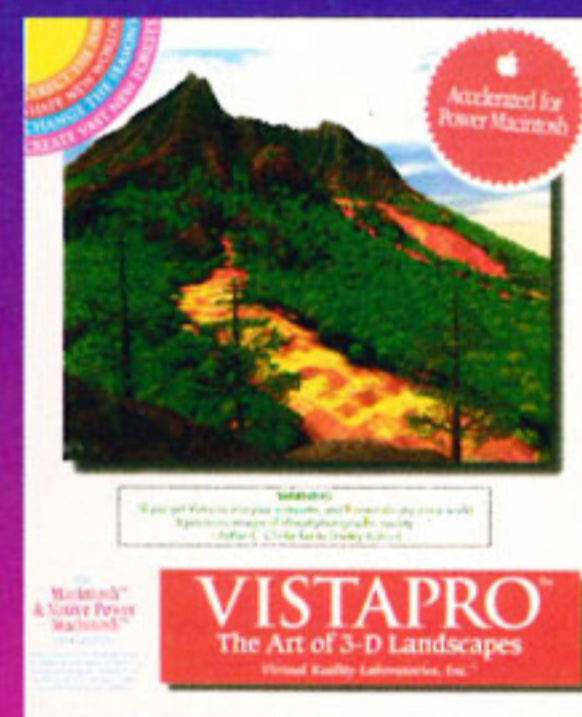

You don't need to be able to play a note to create the smoothest symphony of the century – just build it all up from sampled sounds. Ian Waugh tests the pick of the samplers.

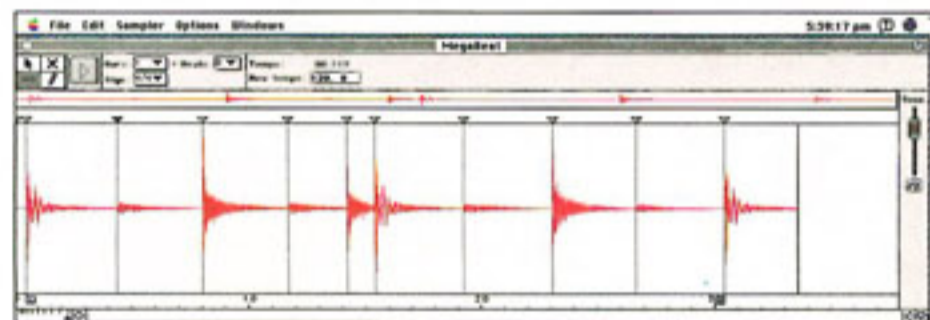
One of the exciting things about making music with the Mac is that you aren't limited to MIDI files. The two fastest-growing trends in music are direct-to-disk recording (which we'll look at in a month or so) and the use of samples.

Many garage bands create music entirely with samplers. They take drum loops and grooves, bass lines, and vocal snatches and combine them to produce a new piece of music.

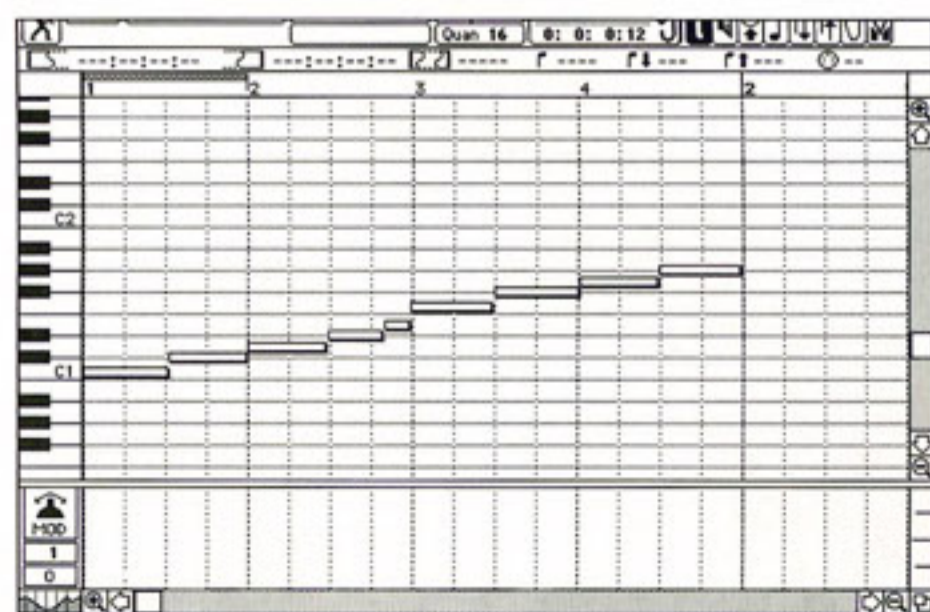
Editing on a sampler, even one with a large LCD, is not the most intuitive process, so software developers have produced a range of programs to help musicians handle digital audio almost as easily as they manipulate MIDI data.

RECYCLE

Steinberg's *ReCycle* is a brand new program that does with sample loops what a sequencer does with individual drum sounds. If you have a MIDI drum track, it's easy to alter the timing, shift the drum beats around and change the drum sounds. Well, *ReCycle* enables you to also do that with sample loops. It can automate the process of making a sample groove fit the tempo of a song; it can change the tempo with-

out changing the pitch and vice versa; and it can remove and replace any of the sounds inside the sample and change their volume.

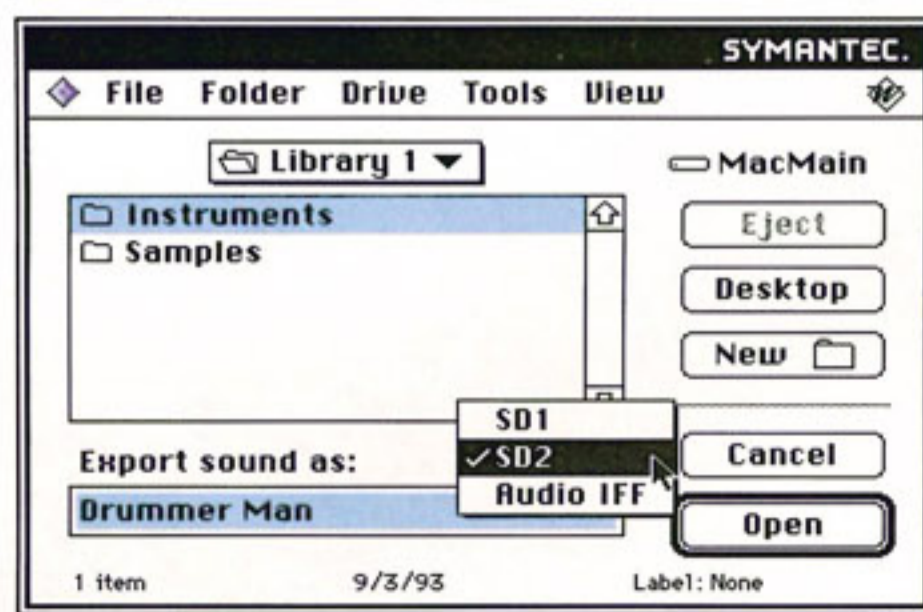
How does it do it? Well, it looks at the waveform and marks the loudest parts, dividing the sample into slices. In a drum groove these will generally correspond to the drum hits. It does this pretty much automatically; all you do is move a 'sensitivity slider'. The higher the sensitivity, the more slices you get. You can add slices manually, too.

The program assigns a pitch to each slice, so each note triggers a different slice. You then dump all this information – key assignments, slices and all – into a sampler. The program currently only supports Digidesign's *SampleCell* and Akai's S3000 range, but a forthcoming update will provide support for other Akai samplers, while future updates will support the Roland and E-max range.

You can also save a MIDI file containing the notes you assigned to the slices. Load this into a sequencer and, when you play it, the notes will play the groove in the sampler a slice at a time. This may sound a little complex, but it's a lot easier to do than it is to read about it.

Now the fun really starts! You can manipulate the notes in your sequencer and, as long as you keep the pitches intact, the changes will affect the sample. You can apply a swing quantise to it, change the tempo, substitute one sample slice for another and so on. Using a sequencer such as *Cubase*, you can apply the sample's groove to MIDI data.

The pack includes a CD containing loops and grooves to get you started. *ReCycle* is a superb piece of software. Easy to use and great fun,

too. Even at a more basic level, it can help find a good loop point for any sample. Absolutely essential if you use sample loops.

PANEL PARTNER

Steinberg's *Panel Partner* is not a sample editor as such, it's a front-panel emulator for the Akai S1000 and S1100 samplers. It is also compatible with the S1100ex and enables that sampler to function as a standalone unit.

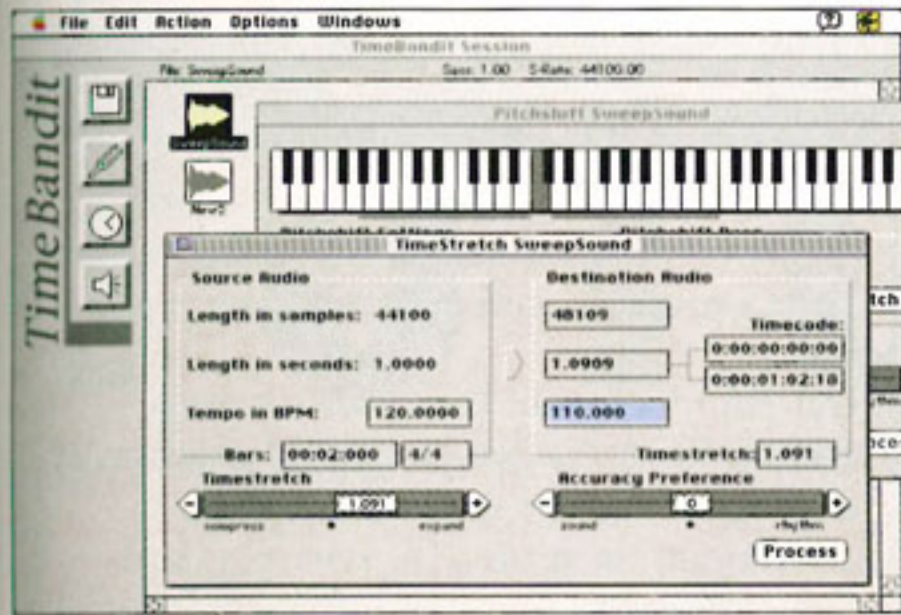
The program has been around for a few years and, according to Steinberg Support, it is unlikely to be updated to support the newer S3000 series. Still, there are an awful lot of S1000s out there – so many, in fact, that they are virtually the de facto sampler in music land.

It's a bit of a shame that it doesn't actually edit samples – although it does save you squinting at the LCD. If *Panel Partner* is not going to be updated, sales could undoubtedly be improved if the price were somewhat lower. Useful though the program is, at this price it will only interest short-sighted programmers and S1000 owners who can't stand LCDs – although there must be a few of those around.

TIMEBANDIT

Steinberg's *TimeBandit* can apply time correction, pitch shift and harmonisation effects to a digital audio file. It can handle mono and stereo files in *SoundDesigner* and *AIFF* formats. It can apply a 25% vari-speed time correction to a file without changing pitch, and it can shift



Here we are using *TimeBandit* to timestretch a sample so it will play the same pitch at a slower tempo.

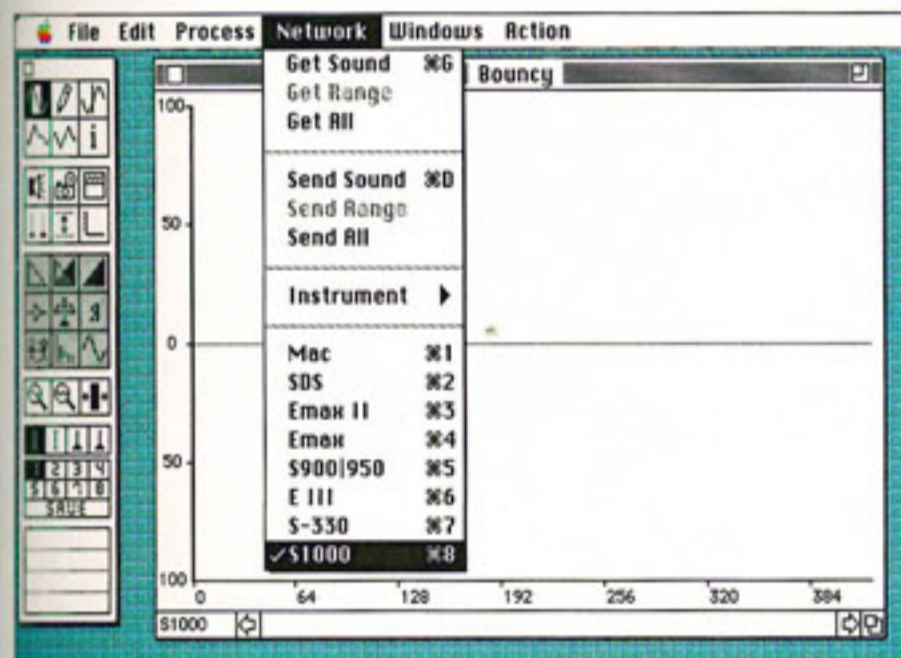
pitch by more than four octaves in a single operation. It can also generate up to 16-note polyphonic chords from a single tone sample.

If you have *Cubase Audio*, then you can access *TimeBandit*'s function from within the program. *TimeBandit* is a very powerful program and a great utility to have in your sonic arsenal, although the price, alas, places it firmly in the professional domain and beyond the pocket of most users.

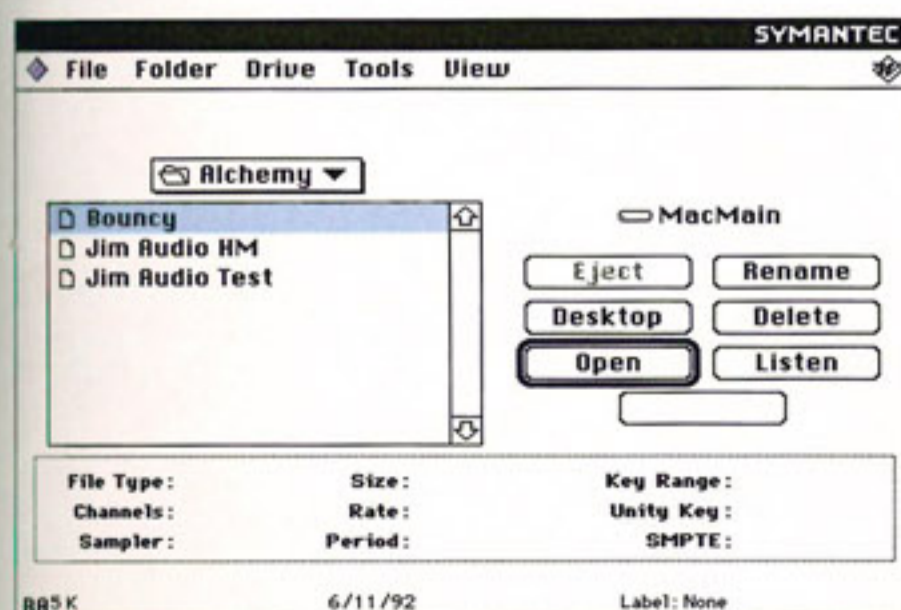

ALCHEMY

Passport's *Alchemy* is the only dedicated sample editor for the Mac. It can load samples from a wide range of samplers, edit them and transfer them back. But it's not been without its problems: apparently the cost of technical support



Alchemy supports many major samplers, but technical support overheads caused Passport to discontinue it.



Alchemy can show you a lot of information about a particular sample before you decide to open it.

was so high that Passport decided to withdraw it from its catalogue. But despite this, users will not let it lie down and die, and there's a happy band who continue to use it. If you're one of those, you can now upgrade to the latest – and final – version: *Alchemy 2.6*. If you currently have version 2, it'll cost you £89. If you have version 1 (what on earth are you doing with it?), an upgrade'll set you back £149.

Note: you can't buy the complete program, only the upgrade – and it will then be specially ordered for you from the US. Arbitrator warns that it could take a few weeks to arrive.

If you use *Alchemy*, the upgrade is worthwhile. Otherwise, you'll have to struggle on with your LCD and wait until another company dips into the sample editor market. It's that or switch to Digidesign's *SampleCell*, which comes with its own sample editing software.

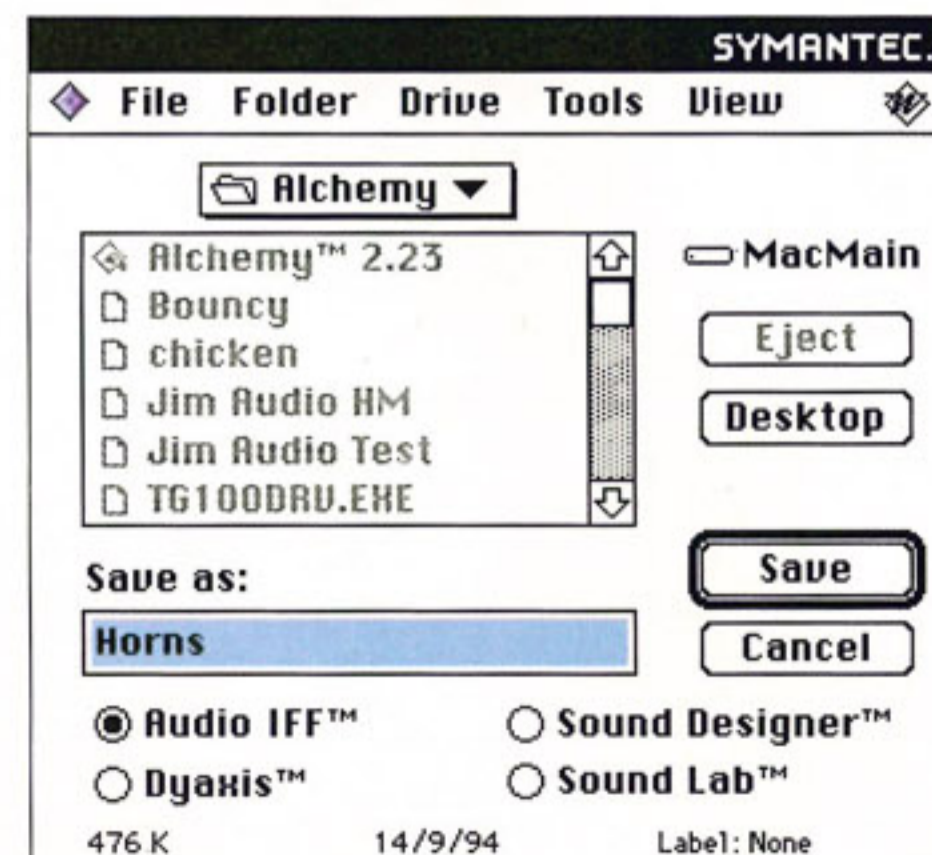
SAMPLESEARCH

SampleSearch was designed primarily for use with Digidesign's Mac sample card, *SampleCell 2*. It acts as a housekeeper, putting the samples, instruments and banks in the correct order so you don't have to worry about where they are on your hard disk. It can find and catalogue samples and it supports off-line volumes, too.

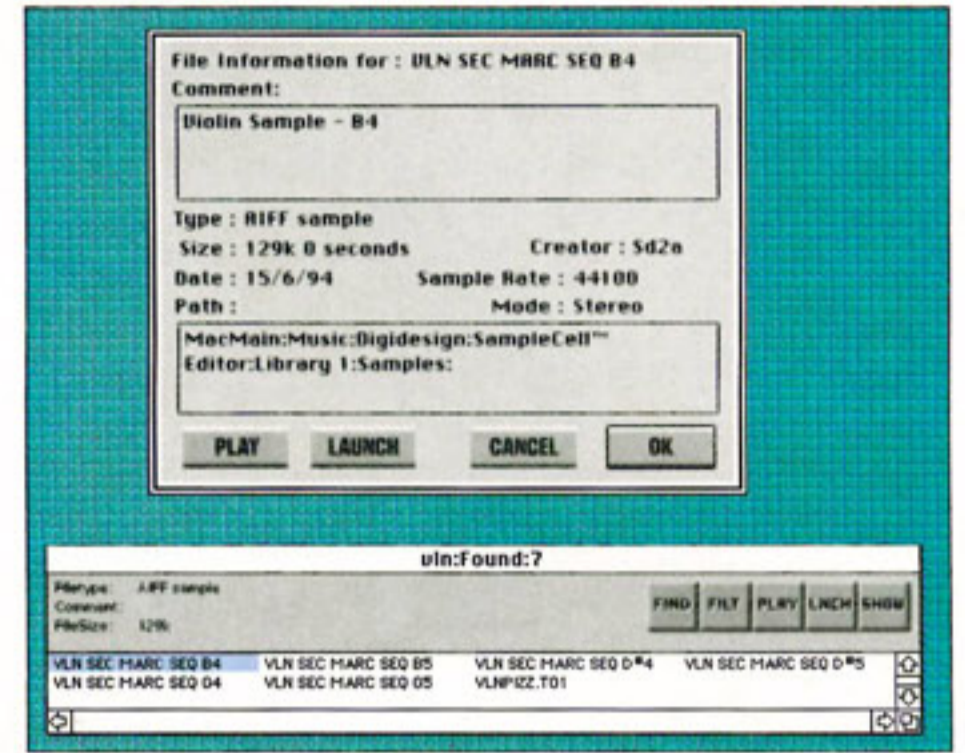
The search routine's blindingly fast. It can scan through 1 gigabyte of disk space and list hundreds of files in a few seconds. The search routines aren't limited to samples, either, and you'll find yourself using the program to search for any other file you may have lost.

Other features include the ability to read data from an audio CD and convert it to an AIFF file. This enables you to lift a sample directly from a sample CD and manipulate it on your Mac, without it ever leaving the digital domain. It can convert AIFF files to a *SoundDesigner 2* format, or if you want to work on a PC, you can save them as *Windows*' WAV files.

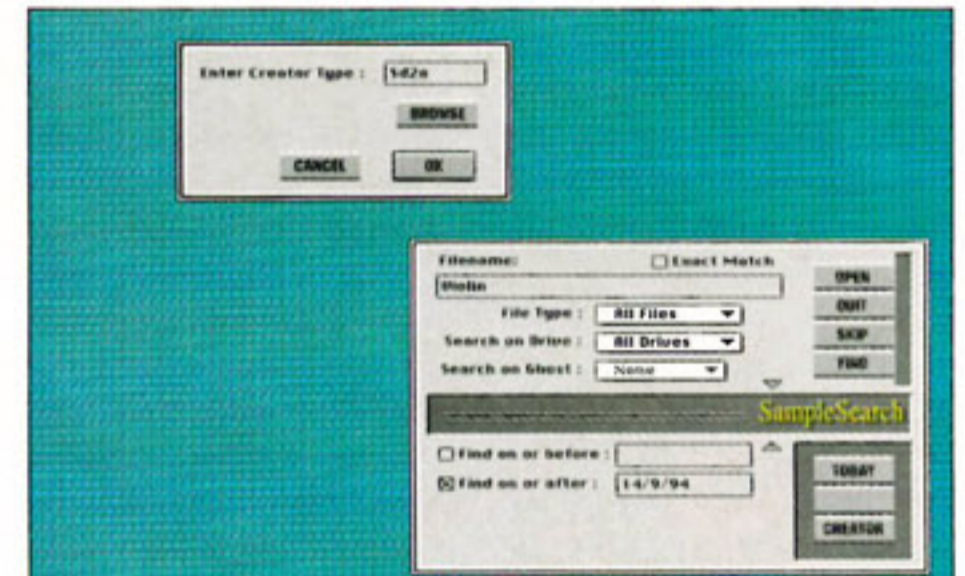

AUDIOSHOP

Opcode's *Audioshop* is two programs in one. It can play audio CDs from a CD drive attached to your Mac, as well as recording and editing digital audio samples. The CD player is a graphic work of art. Put it this way: if this doesn't impress your non-computer friends, nothing will! You can loop tracks and decide in which order they'll play using a playlist. It can also read files created with Apple's *CD Remote*.

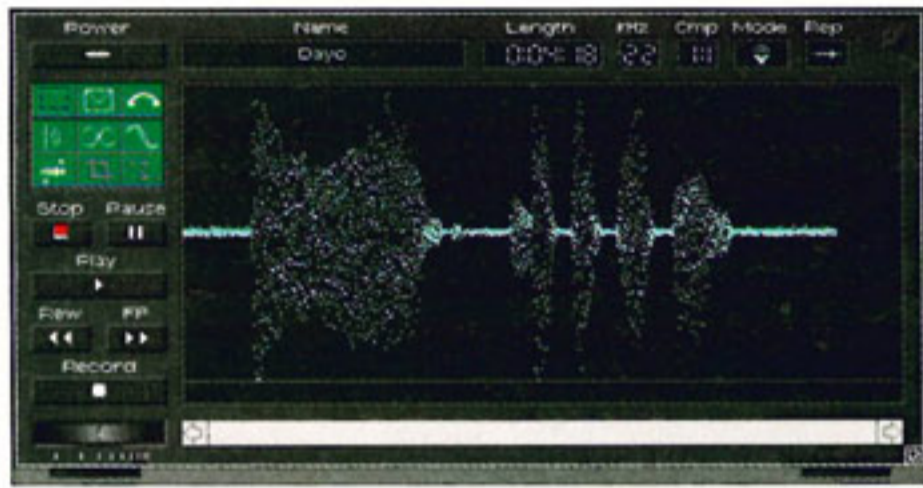
Audioshop was upgraded a few months ago and the digital recording section now supports 16-bit recording and AV Macs. It can handle six popular sound file formats, including AIFF and *SoundDesigner 2* files. It also supports Apple's *Sound Manager 3*, while a rather cheeky *System Extension* automatically converts *SoundEdit* files to *Audioshop* files.

Edit features include cut, copy and paste commands plus a number of processing functions. 'Envelope' enables you to change the volume of a selected area of the waveform and produce fade-ins and fade-outs. The 'Bender' can alter the pitch. What's more, you can apply 'Echo', 'Vibrato' and 'Flange' to selected areas,

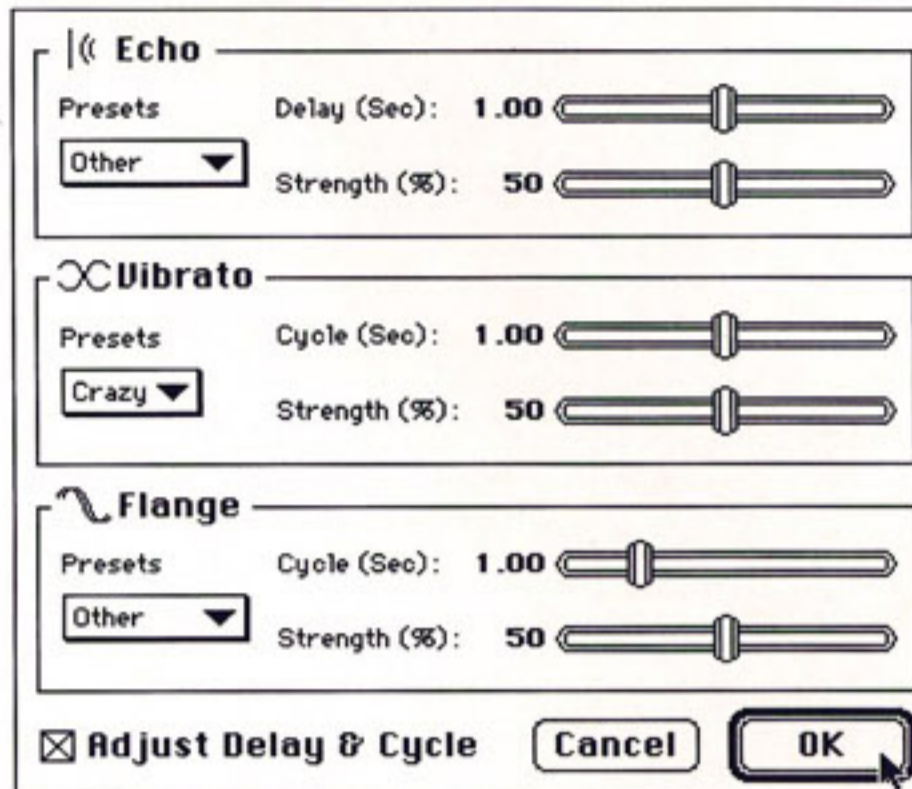

JARGON BUSTERS

AIFF: Audio Interchange File Format. Apple's standard audio file format, which most sample-based programs can read.

Off-line volume: removable storage media. Samples consume vast amounts of disk space, so it's more convenient to store them on several removable hard disks or magneto optical disks than to fill your internal disk with them. When these disks are not physically connected to the Macintosh, they are said to be 'off-line', but some software will, rather usefully, be able to tell you what is stored on your off-line volumes.

Sample loop: a digital recording of a drum pattern, perhaps one or two bars long, set to play continuously so that it sounds like a continuous drum track.

SoundDesigner 2: the current Digidesign sound file format.

Swing quantise: takes a run of notes of equal duration and offsets every second one to create a swing feel.

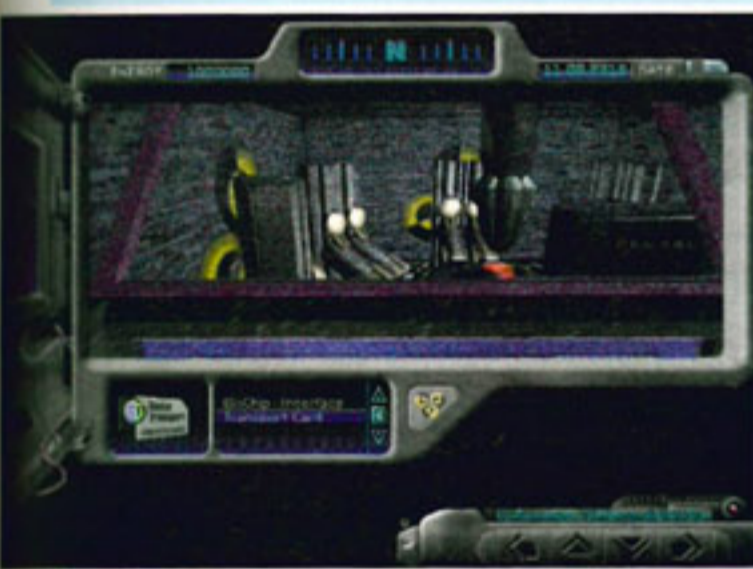


Flying Nightmares

IntelliTalk

For less than £60, you can now buy a word processor that reads your work to you. Andy Storer listens to what *IntelliTalk* has to say...

Considering it has the capacity to take any text file and immediately read it back to you, *IntelliTalk* is ludicrously easy to install. There are no System Extensions involved – all you have to do is copy a single 285K application on to your hard disk and you're away.

Once it's up and running, you're confronted by a plain, no-frills word processor – in fact, the term 'text engine' would probably be a more accurate description. Here you can type in your text, select Read from the Speech menu and – hey presto – a synthetic voice starts pronouncing the words and sentences.

While the voice used – a robotic twang the like of which hasn't been heard since the days of early '50s sci-fi films – certainly wouldn't win any awards for elocution, its attempts to pronounce your text correctly are extremely good. So much so, in fact, you can't help wondering how its wide command of RoboEnglish

has been compressed into just 285K.

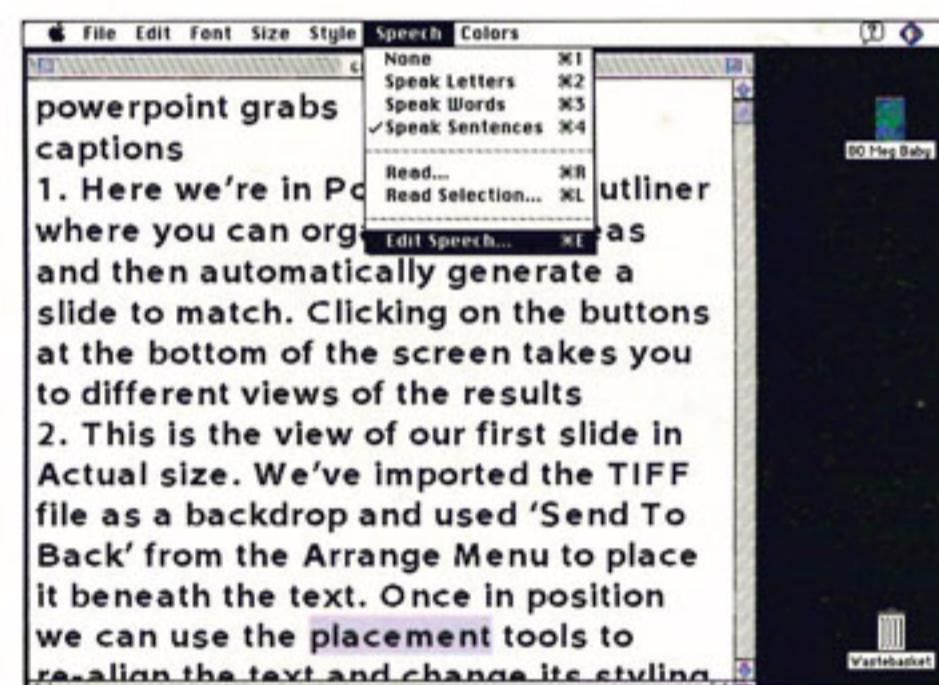
IntelliTalk can talk to you in two ways: you can set it to speak as you type, or it can read back what you've written previously – either in part or in its entirety. So unless you want every typing error read back to you as it happens (which in my case would be as comprehensible as Rab C Nesbitt with a mouth full of cotton wool) your best bet is to configure *IntelliTalk* to read your prose after you've written it.

You can then set it to read through a document either by letter, word or sentence. If, or more likely when, the resultant speech is pronounced incorrectly, you can halt the proceedings, call up a speech editor, type in the mispronounced word and enter a better phonetic replacement. And don't worry if it still doesn't sound right – you can repeatedly test your phonetic equivalents until it does.

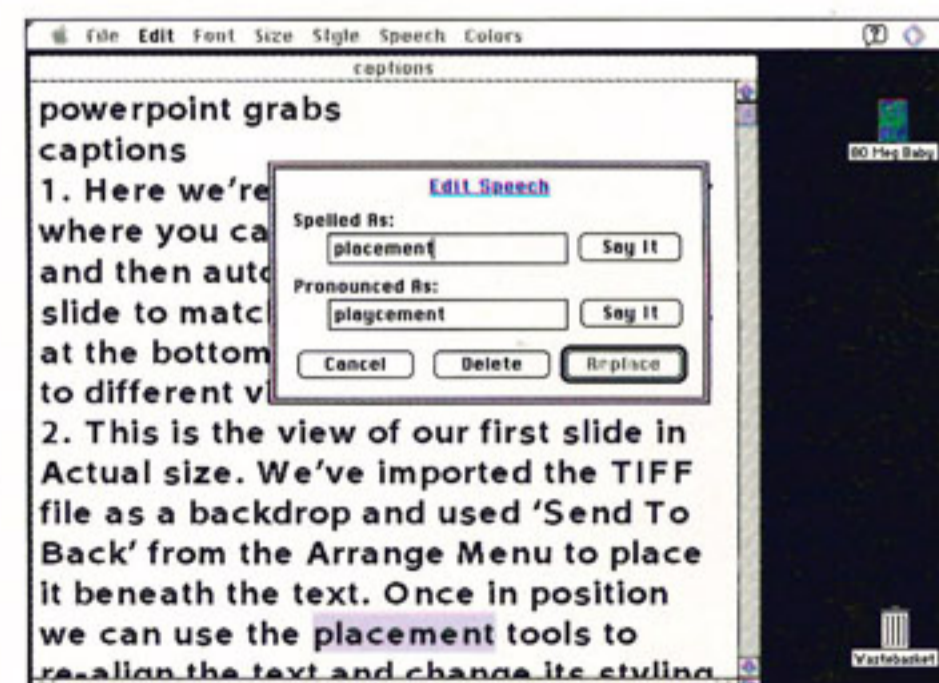
However, *IntelliTalk* does a surprisingly good job of recognising the vocabulary of everyday English; it's only likely to be caught out by more specialised, technical and esoteric words. But these can be added to its library of pronunciation, so when you've corrected it once, it'll never make the same mistake again.

As a word processor, it's low on features: apart from its own documents, it'll only open plain text files, and there's no spell-checker, thesaurus or DTP pretensions. There's the usual range of editing and styling features that you'd find in the most basic of early Mac shareware titles: you can cut, copy, paste and alter font and text size, but not much else.

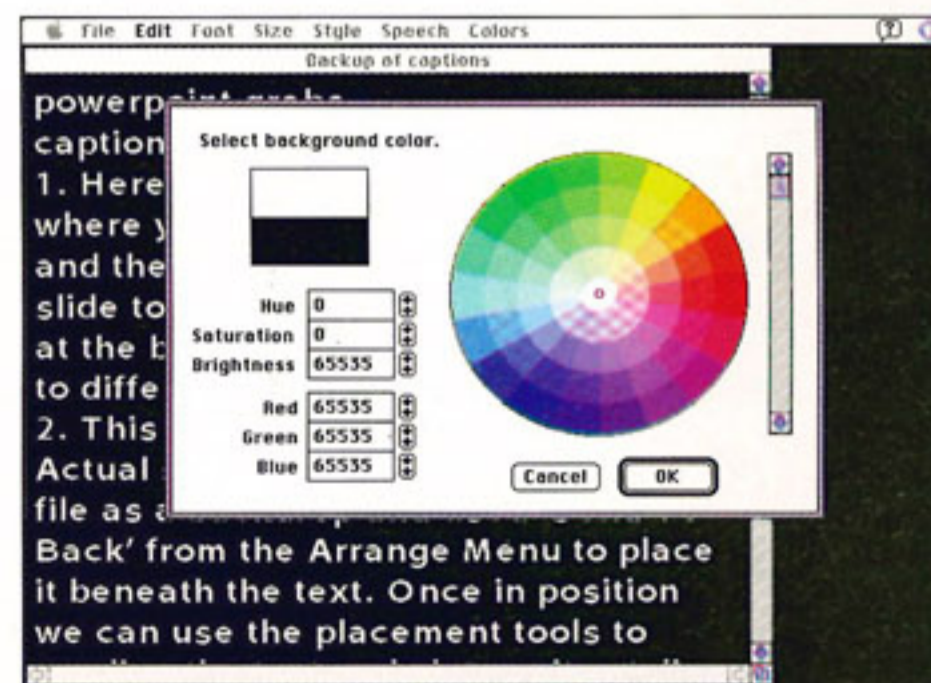
There is, however, a handy facility to change foreground and background colours. This is presumably because the product is geared, at least in part, to the partially sighted, for whom the option of running, say, bright green text



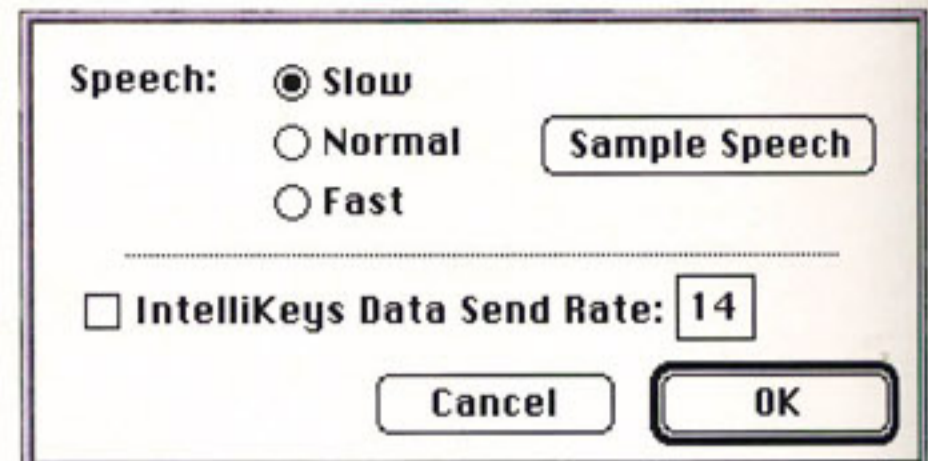
When you open a document in *IntelliTalk* the only sign that it's a talking word processor is the 'Speech' menu. You can instruct *IntelliTalk* to read back the document on screen. When it mispronounces a word, call up the speech editor.

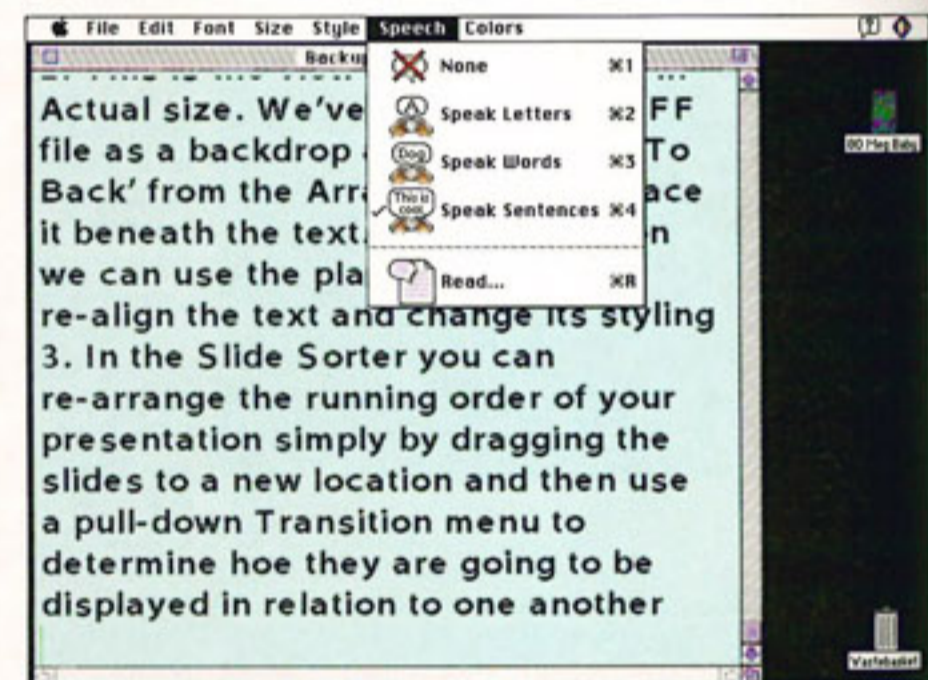

over a black background in 64 point text is highly desirable, if not essential. There's also a File menu item that enables you to capture your new style settings (along with any new additions to the speech pronunciation library) as permanent defaults.

If you think all this sounds easy enough for a kid to use, then you'd be right. *IntelliTalk* is a great educational tool. OK, the RoboVoice does get a little tiresome after a while, but then preschool attention spans being what they are, this doesn't really matter. This aside, the program's facility to replace its standard text menus with pictorial equivalents adds to its functionality as a fun word processor for kids. *Andy Storer*



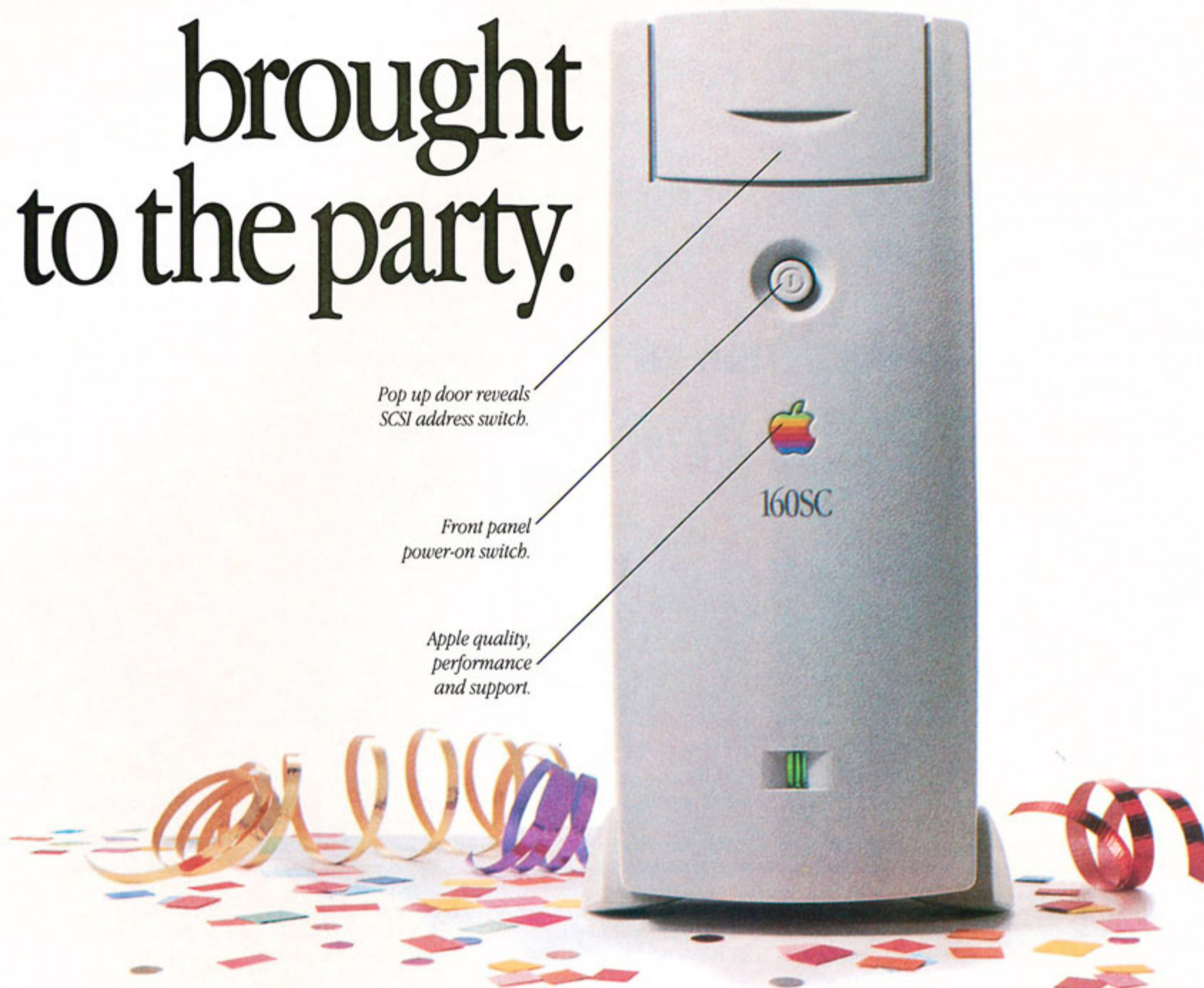

What's the difference? A breach of copyright and a legal case if you're not careful, that's what. Anyway, here's the best of this month's delve into the internet, and boy, is some of it strange...

'You revolting excuse for defective sewage sludge!' *HyperCard* strikes back, and this time it's armed with rude prepositions.

This ingenious stack generates random insults created from base units of adjectives, prepositions and nouns. The stack comes with enough predefined parts to create no less than 1,244,126 insults. And if that isn't enough, then you can add your own adjectives to customise those insults to really hit home. This is an invaluable tool for masochists everywhere.

Sourcing the shareware

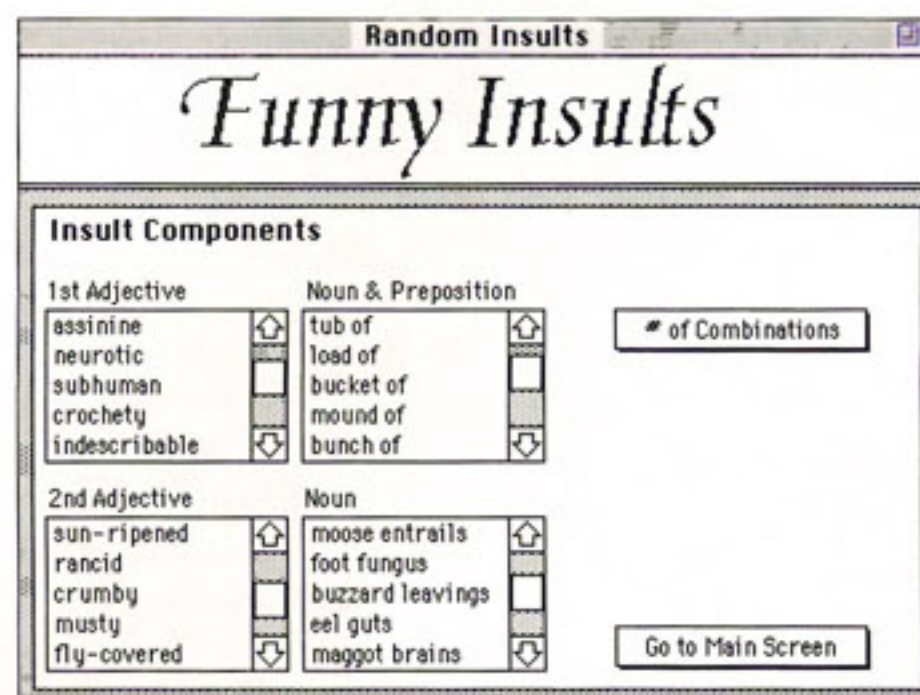
We often get calls from keen readers who want to know where they can get hold of some of the shareware we review in these pages. Well, here are some of the ways:

1. Buy the CD-ROM version of *MAC-FORMAT*, because all the shareware we review is on there in a separate folder. There's also a wealth of other shareware on the CD, which we've sorted into categories for you.
2. Write to a shareware dealer; there are several that advertise in the back of *MAC-FORMAT*. They should have the program you are after, especially if they subscribe to our CD!
3. Use the Internet, if you have access. One of the best sources around is Imperial College at src.doc.ic.ac.uk. Use ftp to connect (login: anonymous; password: your E-mail address) and "cd" to computing/systems/mac. Personally I use the umich directory, but sumex is fine as well.
4. In a few months we will be setting up our own bulletin board using a brand new version of a wonderful BBS program, which should be absolutely brilliant, and a joy to use. We will let you know as soon as it is up and running. Future Publishing is also about to become an Internet site, so you'll soon be able to access us like any other Internet server.
5. Local user groups often have libraries of shareware, so see if you have one near you. There are some listed in the Reader Ads section (see page 122).

Finally, wherever you get your shareware, beware of viruses. At the time of going to press, *Disinfectant 3.5* (on *MAC-FORMAT 14's* cover disk) was the best and cheapest way of staying safe.

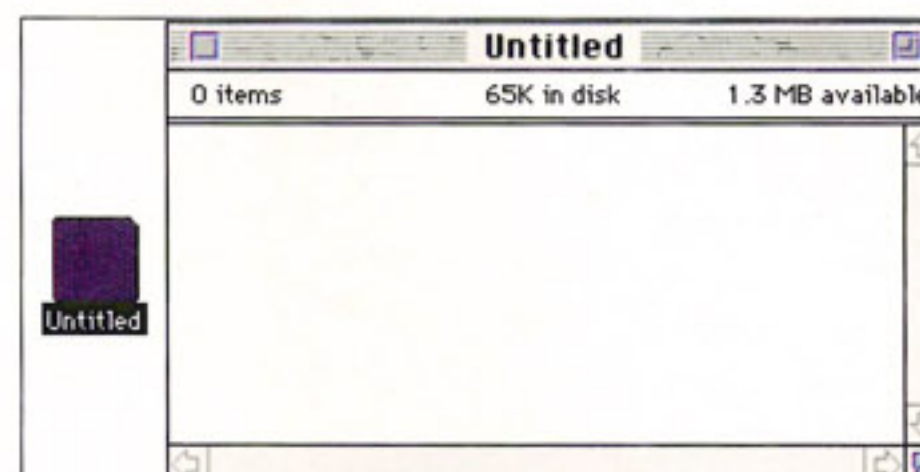
DiskSweeper 1.0

FLOPPY DISK UTILITY

Freeware

If you insert a blank floppy disk that's been lying around for a while, you might be confused to find out that there's 50K or so 'in disk'. What an incredible cheek. I mean, when I buy a blank VCR tape I don't expect to find ten minutes of *Aerobics for Poodles* at the beginning. Let's face it, it's bad enough that high density disks are called 2Mb disks when, in fact, they only hold 1.3Mb.

The reason for this mysterious 50K lies in the Desktop file. When you delete stuff from your disk, the Desktop file often doesn't recognise the fact properly and becomes over weight. You could try re-building the Desktop by holding [option] and [command] as you insert the floppy, but this doesn't work if there are no files or folders on the disk. *DiskSweeper* solves



To solve the problem of phantom files, you can grab hold of your Mac, shake it vigorously and shout at the top of your voice 'Look, there's nothing there you stupid machine!' Alternatively, you could use *DiskSweeper*.

this terrible dilemma. All you have to do is drag and drop your offending floppy's icon on to *DiskSweeper* and the Desktop is deleted and then recreated to take up just 1K of space.

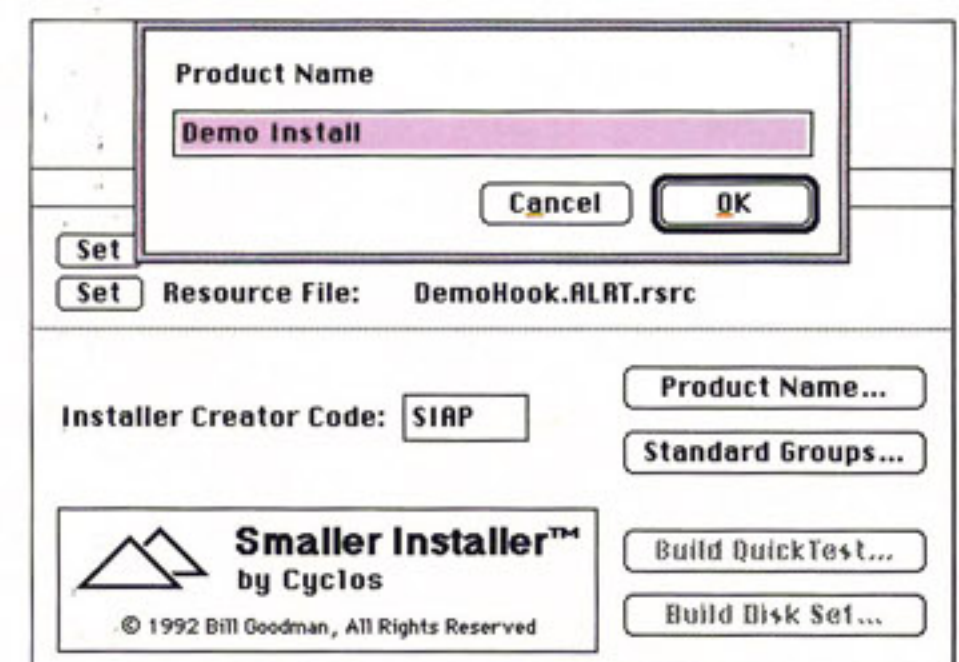
PROGRAM INSTALLER

Shareware up to \$1,000

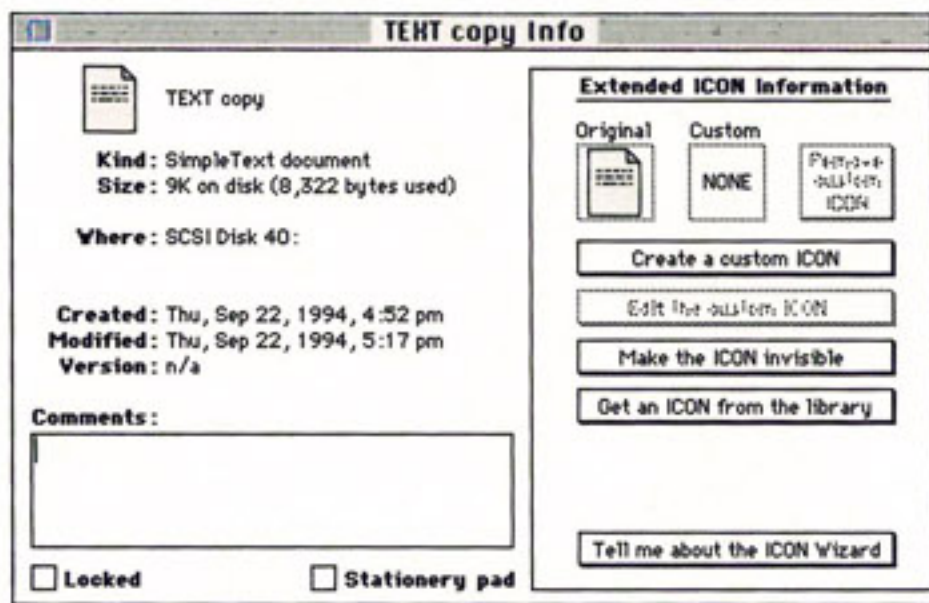
\$1,000 for a shareware program may seem a little bit expensive, but many people have already forked out all that dosh for the right to use this program. *Smaller Installer* creates a compacted archive on one or more floppy disks, which can then be distributed commercially. The people you send it to can then double-click the archive to decompress it. Because this program halves the size of your data, it will halve the number of disks needed, therefore saving you money, and possibly even paying for itself.

If you use any other compacting software such as *StuffIt* or *Expander Pro*, you may be wondering why anyone would pay for this ability when these two programs do the same thing for a tiny fraction of the cost. Well, *Smaller Installer* has a couple of functions that other compacters don't have. The most important of these is its ability, when decompressing, to install items in the System Folder.

OK, this isn't essential - you could include a note along with the archive to let the users know that they have to put these items in the System Folder - but people don't like reading notes, beginners get confused, and this is just more professional. You can also have a customised screen that will appear when a user is

installing your software, which helps to add that professional feel.

If you have software that you want to distribute in a professional manner, then *Smaller Installer*, like road works, is right up your street.

Making your own icons is great fun, but it can be a little tricky. *ResEdit* is the most complete icon editor, but you may want to consider *ICON Wizard* for its ease of use. Drag an icon on to the utility and you're presented with an extended Get Info window. From here you can bring up a screen to edit your chosen icon.

It's not as sophisticated as *ResEdit*. For instance, you can't create a separate mask or different icons for black and white or colour displays, but this will only be important if you create icons to send to other people who have different displays from your own.

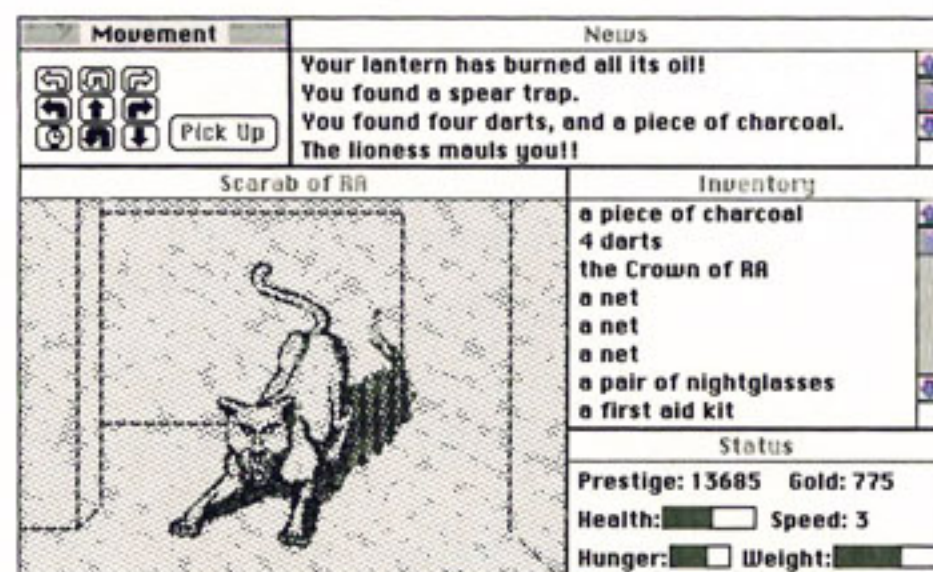
As a simple icon editor for personal use, this is a well thought-out program. Recommended for people who are reluctant to use *ResEdit*.

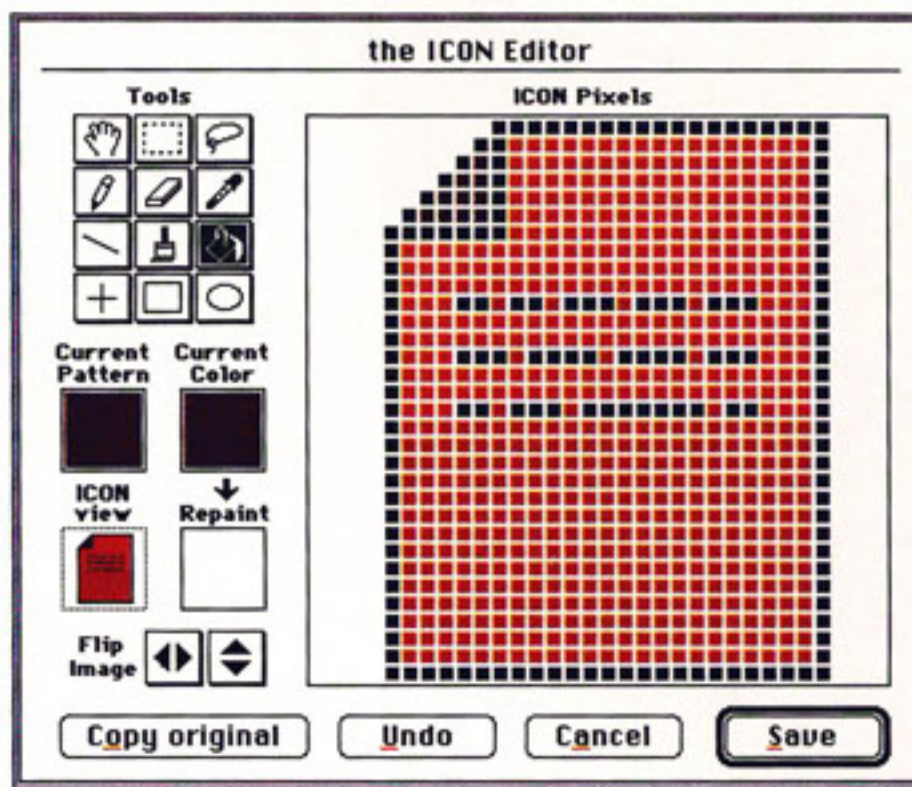

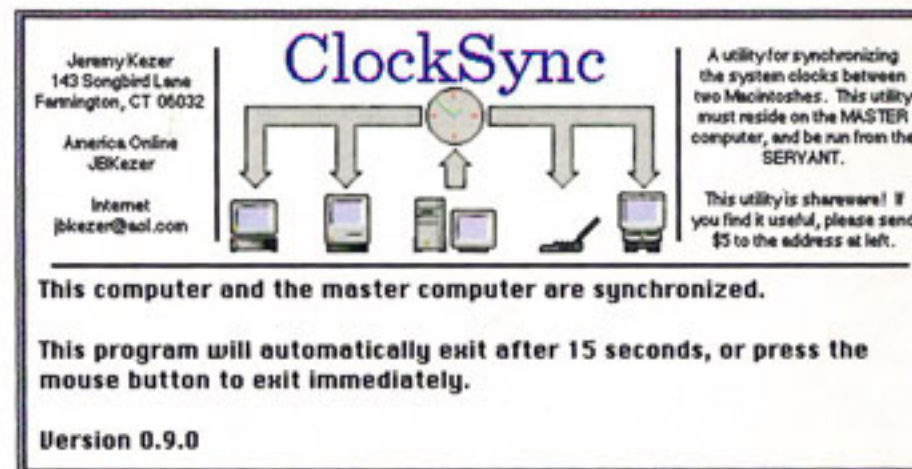

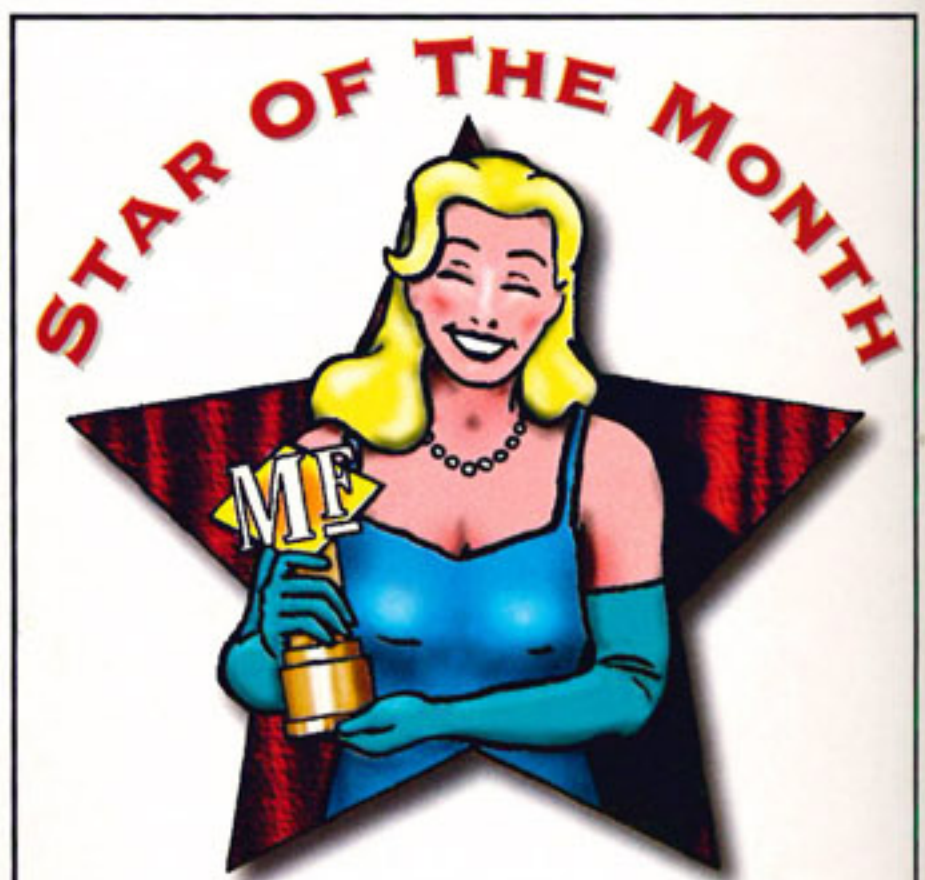

This is a fantastic little program that was e-Mailed to us by Leon Bubb. Although it will be useful to anyone, the main beneficiaries will be those users with a 4Mb Macintosh who find that they don't have quite enough memory.

No matter how hard you try, it's impossible to get System 7 to run in less than 1 megabyte of RAM – and some programs need a good 3Mb to get out of bed in the morning. One program that's always running is the Finder. Maybe you don't think of it as a program, but that's all it is, a program to display icons, format disks and other mundane little tasks. The point is, when you are using an application, you don't actually need the Finder open in the background.

XoLaunch starts off by quitting the Finder, and then offers you the opportunity to open an application. With the Finder out of the way, you will have much more room to open your chosen application. To get it back, all you have to do is quit *XoLaunch*, and everything will return to normal. Be sure to keep this program close at hand.

For speed, you could put an alias in the Apple menu, or for super accuracy, you could pop the application in the Startup Items folder in the System Folder. Every network manager should have one.

SuperSpam 1.2 SPAM SIMULATOR

Thermometer can use the immensity of the Internet to communicate with sites around the world to discover what the temperature is at different locations – well, it could if there were instructions on how to do this. The only Internet address provided is one in Colorado where the author lives. The worst thing is that there's already plenty of detailed weather information on the Internet.

This program doesn't calculate temperature by guesswork, but rather relies on people around the world typing in that piece of information (they're obviously not very busy in Colorado). I couldn't get the program to work anyway, largely because there's staggeringly little documentation on what to do. Presumably the only person who knows how to work it is the author – and he already knows what the bloody temperature is in Colorado!

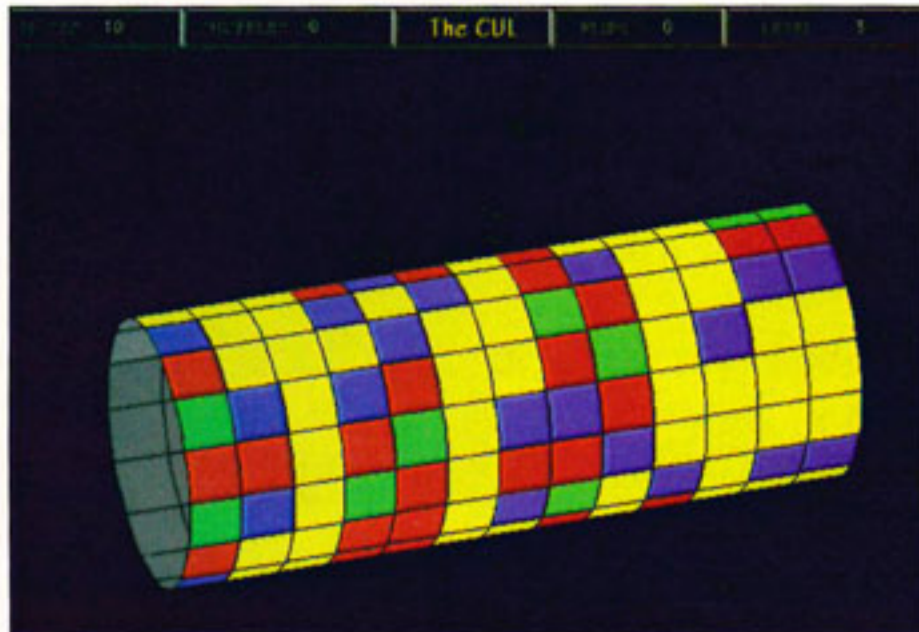

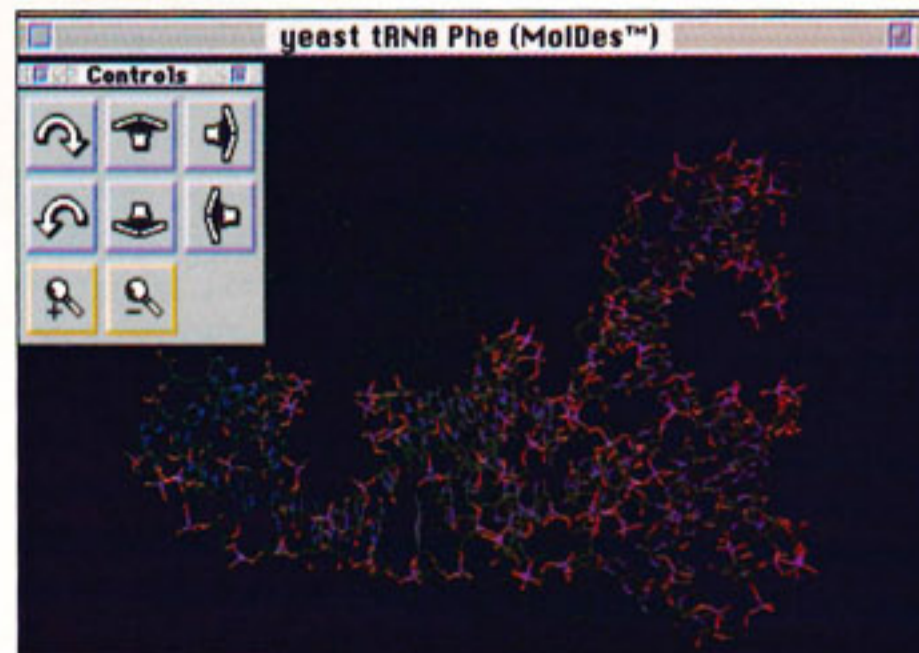

However, it isn't just a case of turning the cylinders until everything falls into place. 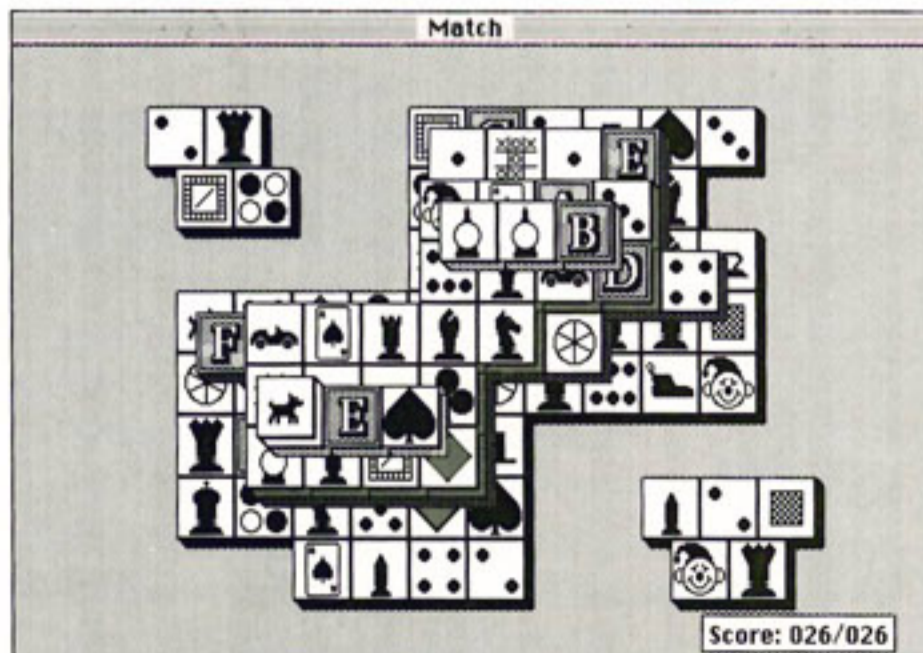

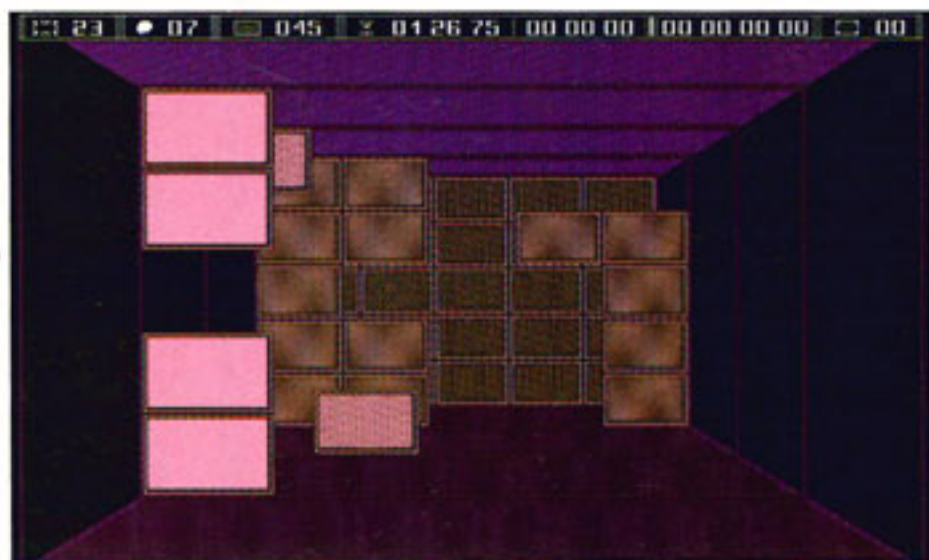

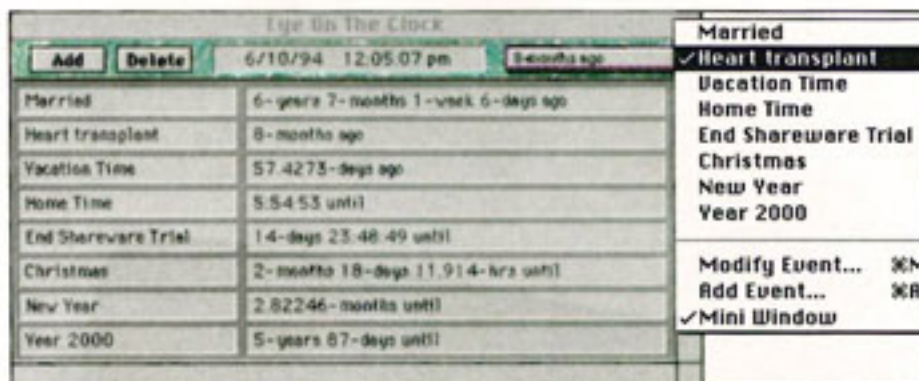
BALL GAME

Combine squash with *Breakout* and you have *Shatterball*: a fast ball game that needs quick reactions to play at full speed. It works well in black and white and on lowly Macs. I tested it on an LCII and it was plenty fast enough.

At the start of the game you're presented with a squash court with blocks at different distances along its length. The point of the game is to clear the court of all the blocks by bouncing the ball off them. You hurl the ball down the court, where it hits a block or the back of the court and rebounds, requiring you to position the mouse-controlled bat to whack it back down the court.

Some blocks disappear as soon as they're hit,

whereas others take several strikes to get the message. The speed of the ball is totally your decision, varying from the speed of a snail with a broken leg [*erm, leg? – Ed*] to Concorde on steroids. The game isn't actually very difficult to complete because bonus lives are given with abandon. The challenge lies instead with completing levels faster and faster each time. It's not the most addictive game I've ever come across, but acts as wonderful stress reliever, although you do tend to grip the mouse tight enough to make it squeak.

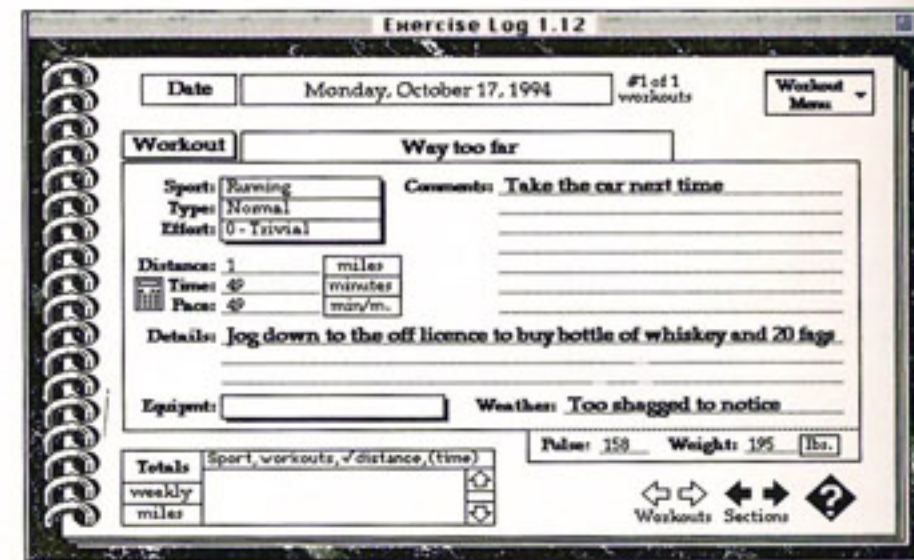

HEALTH RECORDER

Exercise Log is a *HyperCard* stack that enables you to keep track of how much exercise you are doing on a regular basis. Ideally you would want to install this on a PowerBook to take to the gym as the ultimate posing aid when you walk into the weights room. Mind you, carrying a PowerBook around all day is enough weight training for most people.

You can enter pre-defined lists of sports to choose from, such as jogging, cycling, chasing women and pulling the ring pull on beer cans. To actually go to all the bother of using this program I suppose you'd have to be a Mac-owning, *HyperCard*-using, statistic-collecting, calorie-counting health freak.

Programs like this are all very well but with the introduction of increasingly sophisticated machines like the PowerMac, when is someone going to produce a program that does the exercise for you? Maybe a Virtual Reality application that simulates running around a bit and being healthy, with an add-on peripheral to recreate the odour of sweaty armpits.

As for me, my daily exercise will continue to consist mainly of getting up in the morning, peeling the foil off microwave meals, and loading the dishwasher full of my underwear because the washing machine is broken down and I really can't be bothered to phone the repair company.

YOUR ALMOST COMPLETE GUIDE TO SHAREWARE

Shareware is a form of 'try before you buy' software selling and it's a great idea so long as people are honest. When you get some shareware, the documentation will tell you how much it costs – typically it's somewhere between \$5 and \$40 – and where to send your money. If you like the software and decide to keep it, then you are morally obliged to cough up. Not only do you get the

satisfaction of boasting to friends about how honest you are, but the author will often give you something in return, like a printed manual, or updates when released. The most common problem is sending money abroad, but as many shareware authors now accept credit cards, it's getting easier.

Freeware means that you don't have to pay for it at all. There are many derivations

such as postcardware, which means that you have to send a pretty postcard to the author. However, freeware is not the same as Public Domain (PD) because although you don't pay for freeware, the author keeps copyright and you have to follow his terms and conditions to use the program. This often means keeping all the files together and not using or selling them for profit.

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Apple Personal Diagnostics

Like to know how your Mac measures up? Apple itself has brought out a bundle of test routines to help you find out. To see how well *they* compare, read on.

Until recently, Apple had only a selected band of dealers who were eligible to sell its products, and this exclusivity also made these dealers the sole custodians of various bits of arcane problem-solving software. Now that you can buy a Mac from your corner supermarket, it makes sense for problem-solving software to be more widely available too. So Apple has released some problem-detecting and correcting routines in the *Apple Personal Diagnostics* bundle.

D for diagnostics

The Disk Tools floppy, which you probably got with your Mac, contains both *Disk First Aid*, which aims to repair disk errors, and *HDSetup*, which enables you to solve other problems such as updating the disk drivers. So what more does *APD* have to offer? Well, the D for 'Diagnostics' actually says it all: what you get is a series of tests that will give you an indication

of how your Mac is performing.

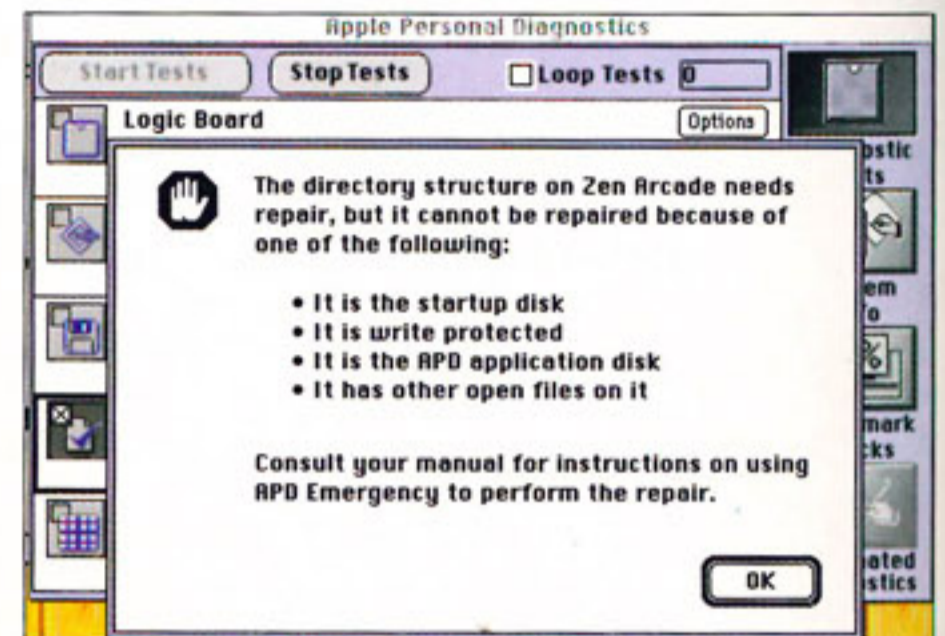
There are five disks in the package, but four of these are emergency startup disks for the various models of Mac available. The fifth disk is the interesting one – it contains the full diagnosis software, plus an automated diagnostic Extension, which can perform tests automatically after your machine has been idle for a time. Also included is a manual, which isn't bad – it enables you to cross-reference the problems that *APD* lists, with a description of the action to take. Mind you, this becomes rather predictable – check cables, disable Extensions, re-build Desktop, re-install System, and if all this fails, see your dealer!

The *APD* program can perform a variety of tests. There's a logic board test – checking the clock, ROM, PRAM, ADB and the co-processor if you have one. There's a test to check the video and the RAM. There's a hard drive routine that performs a read test (a random data seek), a bad block test and a write test. Finally, *APD* can check your System software. Though this set of routines may sound impressive, it is in fact quite minimal – but this is fair enough, as all it is designed to do is get you up and running when you have a problem.

No quick fixes

Also included is a 'Personal Diagnostics' suite, which is more comprehensive. It will run a test of your floppy drive, check out the sound and VRAM, and also check the performance of your monitor, by displaying a series of patterns. Of course you have to look at these yourself and decide if there's a problem. And apart from adjusting the controls on your monitor there's little you can do if a problem is encountered.

In fact, this is pretty much par for the course for the whole suite of tests. Really you're just getting a readout of information on your setup – the System info test, for instance, merely names the SCSI devices that you have attached and lists Control Panels, applications and so on. The benchmark checks seem more useful – these basically perform tests of integer and complex maths functions, hard disk, memory, and so on, and compare the performance with that of any Mac (the default machine happens to be a Mac Plus). But there are shareware packages such as *Speedometer* that do as much, and if the comparison of your processor to that of another 'identical' Macintosh is slower than



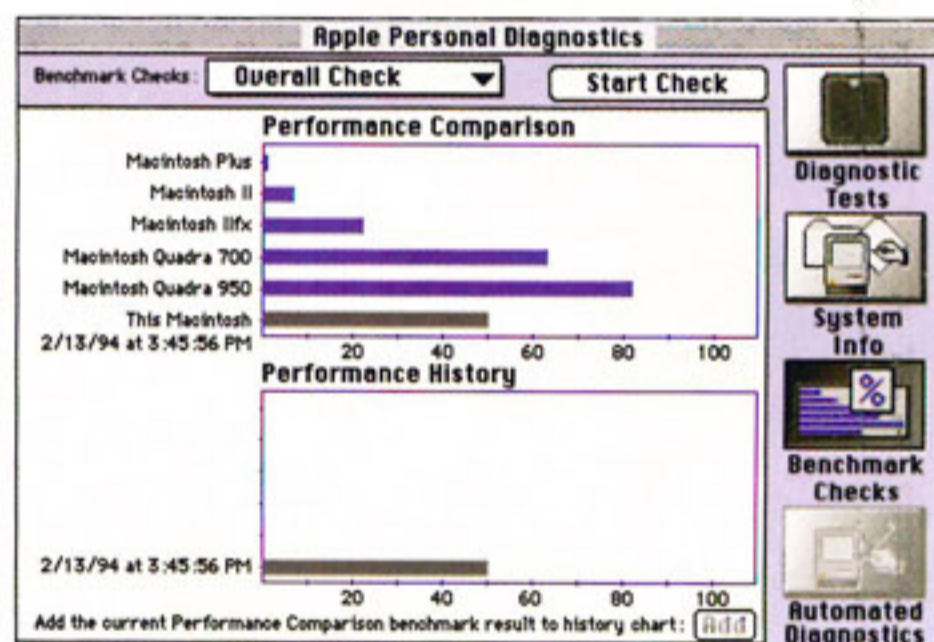
Loosely translated, this message from *APD* means, 'there's a problem all right, but your guess is as good as ours.'

it should be, what do you do? Ask for a refund?

More promising is the fact that logging your machine's performance over time is a simple task with *APD*, so you can see if things are deteriorating. But suppose your hard disk is getting slower. This is often a sign of data fragmentation. If you want to correct this, you'll have to either erase and re-format your hard disk or get a third-party disk utility program. The same is true if the tests suggest that there's a virus, or a disk driver problem: you can't just hit the 'Fix' button – there isn't one.

In one place the manual admits: 'Other disk repair and file recovery programs available commercially... may succeed running repair routines not included in *APD*.' That's the point. If *APD* came free with your Mac, that would be fine. Along with *HDSetup* and *Disk First Aid*, this would make a fairly useful suite of diagnostic programs. But as a commercial product, *APD* doesn't have the same versatility as other programs on the market.

Gabriel Knight

Dive into a world of magic and murder in the city of voodoo and blues, in this epic adventure. Richard Hill slips into Gabriel's dreams...

Blues from a slide guitar and Creole spices drift through the Louisiana air. Gabriel Knight paces the worn carpet of the book store, trying to understand the impenetrable: why are people being killed? What is the explanation for the voodoo artifacts left alongside each corpse? He decides that it's time to call on the beguiling Malia Gedde, who fascinates him more than he can believe. He collects his coffee-stained trench-coat and heads for the door – very slowly – as the storm clouds break.

Set in the streets of New Orleans, *Gabriel Knight* is an adventure with a distinctive approach, although its potential's held back by weaknesses in its design. The promise is apparent immediately – the frustration comes later.

Knight's story begins with a sequence of images plucked from our hero's dreams. You sense that Gabriel's nightmares are linked with the voodoo-connected serial killings that afflict the city, so you decide to explore the streets for clues. Before long, you're drawn into a plot involving mysterious Germans and the voodoo culture, including the semi-mythical voodooienne Marie Laveau.

Most of the action's shown in a cinema-style wide-screen display, with the cast moving across painted backdrops that look nice but make objects hard to find. Any dialogue appears below this area – and is colour-coded by character – while a toolbar for controlling Gabriel's actions can be called up in the area above.

You move Gabriel around using a selection of icons that give you access to commands like 'walk', 'pick up' and 'operate'. The commands prove versatile in use, but a lack of consistency

in the way the commands work undermines your ability to play the game smoothly. For example, you can read the newspaper on the desk by clicking on the 'pick up' icon, but you can use the 'look' icon to read a notice board. Overall, it's a flexible system, but more intuitive ones have been designed and should have been ripped-off shamelessly.

Once you've got the hang of moving Gabriel

around, you can concentrate on playing the game. Story details and clues are given away by incidental dialogue, so you have to do a lot of sitting around and watching the action unravel.

Throughout the story humour is used at every opportunity. For example, Gabriel changes from being a blur of pixels to an inquisitive peacock. Other characters take on lives of their own as you become drawn into the plot.

The problem is that the characters move so slo-o-owly. They take forever to move across the screen. Entire civilisations will rise and fall while you wait for Gabriel to take his coat off. This lack of haste is a mystery, because there are moments when our hero suddenly turns giddy with speed and makes a cup of coffee in three seconds flat. If the game's slothful pace is some sort of attempt at realism, it's rather misguided.

The other display you see a lot of is the interrogation screen, where two characters exchange dialogue. You select a topic from a list and the other person supplies an answer. The trick is to pick the right subject to ask the right person, so you can gather the clues that you need to progress.

If you don't find all the clues and figure out the puzzles, you quickly reach an impasse. The story takes place over ten days, but you have to

resolve all of one particular day's dilemmas to be able to go to sleep and move to the next day. Some of the obstacles can only be overcome through arbitrary trial and error, which means that you spend a lot of time over them but end up with the feeling that you haven't used your brain too much. Many sleepless nights lie ahead.

The saving graces of *Gabriel Knight*, which will make you forgive these flaws and others, are the story and characters. The New Orleans

has become more familiar and immediate than the text narration used by books. As part of this direction, the game comes with a prologue in the form of a comic.

Also, there are points – especially in the dream sequence – when the room backdrops fade to be replaced by a montage of images. These montages work successfully to show the cast in greater detail, as well as to impart a lot of information economically, and should've been used more often.

The adventure is accompanied by a constant soundtrack that is interesting to begin with – especially the occasional bursts of tom-tom drums and the smattering of sound effects – but soon becomes tedious over the course of a few hours. Relying on electronic plinkety-plink noises, the music doesn't have enough natural vibes to suit your adventures in New Orleans. It's probably better to turn off the sound and play a Neville Brothers album.

With a winning use of detail and humour, *Gabriel Knight's* big success is in giving its world life. Many adventures, such as *Myst*, have exotic settings illustrated with lush graphics that remain too complex to animate convincingly in 3D (and barely any people). *Gabriel Knight* takes advantage of its simpler look to make its version of New Orleans overflow with people for you to meet, each with their own secrets to discover. It beats working out which lever to pull so you can enter another empty room – if only the action wasn't so slow! *Richard Hill*

location is used to offer you a wealth of historical and cultural background on voodoo, and the characters that live in this version of the city add to the richness of the experience. There are elements of cliché in some of them, but you do get a sense of them living their lives outside of the game.

Characters are built up through the understated use of mannerisms and biographical detail. By doing this through animation and dialogue, *Gabriel Knight* uses a visual language that

Goblins 3

It's French. It's weird. If any game could make you laugh, swear and shout 'Zut alors!', it's this.

You may have been to France and seen nothing amiss. At least, nothing you could put your finger on. Everything seemed quite normal. And yet, at the same time, something didn't feel quite right. It wasn't the fact that all the cars were on the wrong side of the road. Or the signs were all spelt wrong. No, it was something more subtle. Something about the people...

Yes, the French are a bit weird. And this never comes across so strongly as in their computer games. From bizarre adventures full of naked ladies, to driving games adorned with purple scenery, they've turned out some truly odd titles. Good ones, mind you, but nevertheless rather strange. *Goblins 3* is the latest. It could best be described as a cartoon-style point 'n' click adventure, where you solve puzzles to get from one screen to the next. But it's a lot cleverer than that. And a lot more weird.

As in most games you've got a character to

control. He's called Blount. He's a journalist and he's on his way to interview Queen Xina and King Bodd, the rulers of two rival kingdoms. You've also got to rescue Wynnona, the daughter of the recently-deceased guardian of the labyrinth – don't ask! Blount walks from place to place, picks things up, and uses things on other things.

But that's not all. Blount is also a fully-formed cartoon character who'll capture your heart within seconds. When you do something right he'll give you a reassuring thumbs up. When he gets his hands on an essential object he'll somersault with joy. When you tell him to do something silly he'll shrug, wanting to help but not quite knowing how.

Right at the beginning, when he reaches for a much-needed parachute and it's whisked from his grasp, Blount pulls out a gun, puts it to his head, looks at you mournfully and pulls the trigger. When the smoke clears, his head's gone. But it's okay. A few seconds later it pops out of his shirt and he laughs gleefully. He's genuinely amusing rather than just 'funny' in the usual computer game sort of way.

No comedy character would be complete without a sidekick. Blount accordingly picks up a variety of helpers along the way. The first is Chump the parrot, who seems to bounce around on his head most of the time, and there are others later on, both human and animal. There are loads of baddies and things as well, many of which you'll need to get out of the way if you want to progress further into the game. So it's just as well that most of them are

even more gormless than Blount, and are easily distracted by, say, the old false-hand-extended-in-friendly-welcome gag.

But where the game gets really off-beat is in the puzzles themselves. They range from the obscure to the virtually impenetrable, and generally involve you clicking on everything on the screen and trying every object in every possible combination until you get a result. For example, who would guess that to trap the blue Will o' the Wisp (which you need for a recipe), you first need to dress a skull in the comedy false glasses and nose that you've just removed from a clown, and then flip up a lid on top of

AND THERE'S MORE...

You've probably been wondering about the '3' in 'Goblins 3', and why you haven't come across *Goblins 1* and *2*. And the reason is that although the series has been running for a while on the PC and Amiga, it's only just made it to the Mac. As well as releasing the latest Goblins game, Coktel Vision has also taken the opportunity to convert the two old ones. Should your financial resources, not to mention your sanity, prove adequate, the scene is therefore set for a whole Goblination.

Gobliins

The three 'i's are probably because the first Goblins game, *Gobliins*, had three Goblins in it,

and you had to pick the right one for each task. (Or possibly it was just another example of Frenchness.) This sounds neat, but actually proves to be a bit fiddly, and you can see why the idea was dropped later on.

Apart from that, and the game being rather smaller, *Gobliins* is every bit as entertaining as the others in the series. Oh, except for some reason you've got an energy bar that goes down every time you make a mistake. This is sheer lunacy in a game that relies almost entirely on trial and error. The energy bar alone costs *Gobliins* quite a few percentage points.

the skull to ensnare the Will o' the Wisp? And, equally baffling, in a brilliant sort of way, is the level where you bathe the scenery in different coloured lights to reveal different characters.

It doesn't matter too much, though. First, the consequences of any action are never fatal, so you can try anything you like to see what

happens. And second, whereas in the old days you'd have been repeatedly told, 'You can't do that,' Blount will give anything a go. To make it more interesting he has an amusing animation up his sleeve for most occasions. If you get truly fed up there's always the 'clue' facility. This is just plain silly though, because you are

presented with the whole solution to a level as a screenful of text – steer well clear of that.

Goblins 3 is frequently hair-tearingly frustrating and you may well find yourself stuck on one screen for days at a time. But it always makes a very special sort of 'French' sense in the end, and it is continuously enjoyable. If you get to the end, and still want more, well, Coktel Vision has released two more *Goblins* games as well (see the 'And there's more' box on the left). Vive la difference, eh? *Jonathan Davies*

leisure and enjoy the amusing animations that result when things go wrong. Rather than *Gobliins'* single-screen playing areas though, and *Goblins 3's* scrolling ones, each level has several screens that you have to move between, which seems a bit tedious.

You've usually got several puzzles on the go at the same time, too, some of which are ridiculously obscure. For example, to make a chicken lay an egg, you have to hit it not with the bottle, or the stone, but with the sausage. Eh?

Gadget

The multi-talented Inspector Gadget? Erm, no – this CD-ROM is a different kettle of Koi entirely.

Caligula, as Morrissey so mournfully sang in 'Heaven Knows I'm Miserable Now', would have blushed. Not because Dr Horselover, the scientist star of *Gadget*, is named after one of the emperor's favourite pursuits, but because this game is more embarrassing than being caught in a compromising position with your favourite mare.

If a marketing hypester were asked to describe *Gadget*, the words 'movie' and 'interactive' would feature very closely to one another (though probably not in that order). He or she would probably waffle on about the cin-

ematic multimedia experience, the conversations with in-game characters, the detailed rendered graphics and the avant garde musical score. If a normal person were asked to describe it, they would call it a glorified slide-show with sound effects. Put in the politest terms possible, *Gadget* is simply not very good.

It's trying desperately hard to be a surreal graphic adventure along the lines of *The 7th Guest* or *Myst*, but it's badly lacking in both atmosphere and gameplay. You start in a hotel room with the knowledge that you have to track down a scientist (the aforementioned equine admirer) who's trying to persuade the world that a comet's going to smash into Earth and send us all on a one-way trip to oblivion.

The control system is simple – ridiculously simple: move the cursor over the screen and if it changes to an arrow, you can click and move in that direction. If it doesn't, you can still click in the hope you'll be presented with a close-up view of whatever you clicked on (or start a conversation if the thing you clicked on happens to be a person). There's no *Guest*-style smooth sweeping along pre-rendered paths, it's just click and move. While this makes for much

faster progress, you're always waiting for the game to throw something impressive at you, and you're continually disappointed. It does throw in its tuppence-worth of pre-rendered *QuickTime* movies, but these moody monochrome sequences are singularly deplorable.

Even though the static screen approach is faster than chugging along pre-set paths, the movement in *Gadget* is often confusing. You can often see a location that you want to get to, or

a person you want to talk to, but you have to click your way around a convoluted route to get there. And when you do finally reach the person, you can't ask any questions. Instead, you just click the button a few times to look at what he or she has got to say – and that is about as interactive as *Gadget* gets.

In fact, throughout the game, the gameplay follows this simple click, click, click procedure. When you get out of your hotel room, you get in the lift with a small boy who just happens to have the same kind of case as you. One click gets you into the lift, the next makes you look at the boy, another click makes you look at the cases, a fourth turns you round to look at the lift's button. Click five sends the lift down, click six opens the lift door, and click seven makes your character look in his briefcase to find that it's been switched with the boy's. All that clicking and you haven't had to think once about what you were doing. No problem solving, no

grappling with mind-bending puzzles, just click, click and click again.

A couple of dozen thought-free clicks later and you're rattling along on a train. You want to get off at the next stop, but the train doesn't stop until you've talked to all the people in your carriage. As soon as you've done that, it magically arrives at your destination. There's nothing for you to work out while you're on the train, it is just a matter of making sure you've clicked on everyone. And when you get off the train, it won't leave the station until you've talked to whoever happens to be

lounging around on the platform.

Occasionally, you'll find a bigger location that needs more exploration, but essentially all you're doing is trying to find the triggers that will enable you to leave that scene. It could be as simple as talking to a person; it could be as complicated (for *Gadget* at least) as pulling a couple of levers. Either way, there's a total lack of involvement – those who thought *The 7th Guest* was lacking in the interaction department will have an absolute field day with this turkey.

All the 'conversations' you have with people along the way are supposed to generate an air of excitement and intrigue about the true nature of Dr Horselover's scientific investigations, but it's all so lame and uninteresting you really don't care what happens. The high level of tedium means you could quite easily stroll your way through to the end of the game with barely an inkling of the plot, and it's all over within three hours of solid play anyway. There's no sense of atmosphere. And while there are one or two peculiar cut scenes that promise some weirdness, any spark of excitement is thoroughly drenched by the sheer banality of the gameplay. *Richard Longhurst*

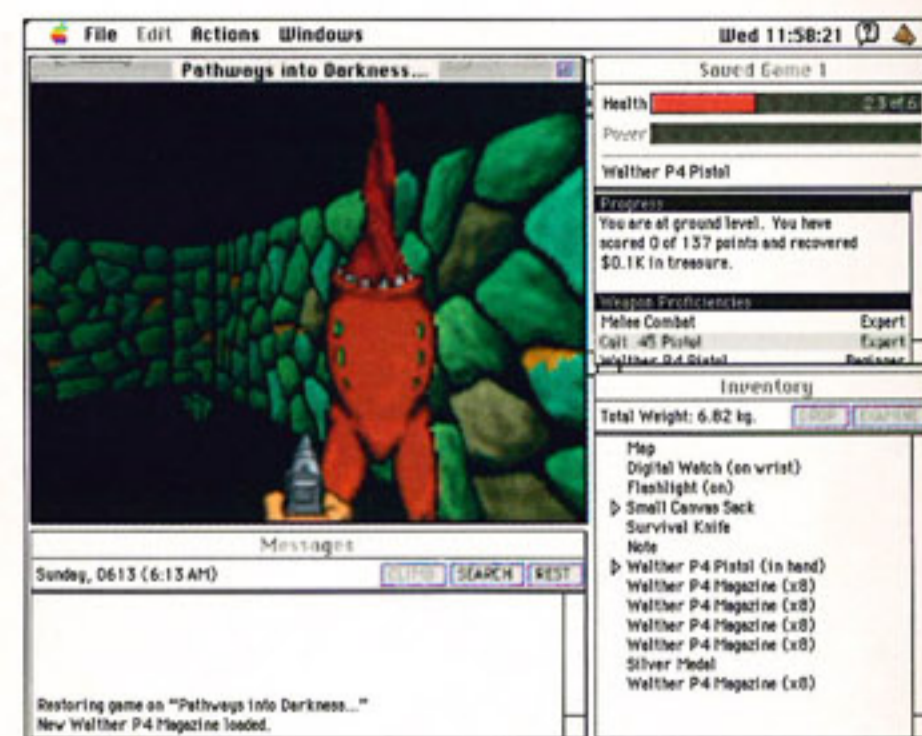

Pathways into darkness

Now Utilities 5.0

Is efficiency out of reach if you've got an untidy mind and an untidy Mac? Not with these nine nifty utilities.

Now Utilities is a suite of nine utilities, most of which are Control Panels. They're designed to help you perform a variety of tasks more efficiently. Although they all share a common look and feel, they are in fact separate programs. This means you can install just the ones you want – this is useful because very few people will actually need or want all nine.

There's very little that's new here. Most of the utilities included have shareware or commercial equivalents – although if you were to buy them separately they'd cost you far more than the *Now Utilities* collection. So if two or more of the utilities within this package sound useful to you, then I can heartily recommend the entire suite. Check out the demo on the MACFORMAT CD. It's the full product, time limited to seven days.



Now FolderMenus

FolderMenus enables you to navigate your way around your hard disk without cluttering up your screen with windows. In use, you click and hold down the mouse button on the icon of a folder or disk. A pop-up menu appears showing you the contents of that file or document. If you move the cursor down the menu to any folder, a further sub-menu appears showing the selected folder's contents. Move the

cursor down that menu to see more folders within folders within... Well, you get the idea.

In practice, this means that to open, say, a word processing document you have to click and hold down the mouse button on your hard disk icon, then move the pointer down your hard disk's menu and click on your word processor's folder icon. Another menu appears.

Move the pointer down this and select the document that you want, then let go of the mouse button and the document will open just as if you'd double-clicked it.

To move or copy a file, you can drag its icon on to a folder and then navigate your way as before, letting go when the file is on top of the destination folder. The whole program works slickly and is the sort of thing that I would keep permanently on my Mac. It's very similar to *PopupFolder*, which was reviewed in MACFORMAT 15 and costs £45.

Now Menu

The largest part of *Now Utilities*, *Now Menu* has a bewildering range of options and they can take a while to fathom. It adds several new menus to the menu bar, which are then available all the time, regardless of any applications you're running – it's a bit like the Apple menu in that sense. You can customise these menus to contain whatever items you want.

Essentially, this is no real improvement over the Apple menu, just somewhat neater and more powerful. There's also a separate pull-down menu to access recently used applications and folders – this is something you will also see in System 7.5.

Its most useful feature, though, is the way it enables you to access files held in folders under

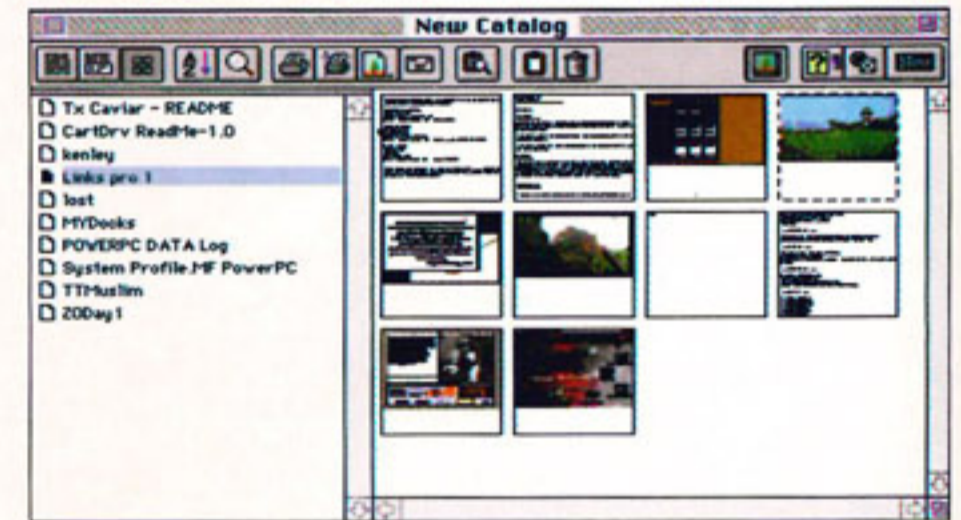
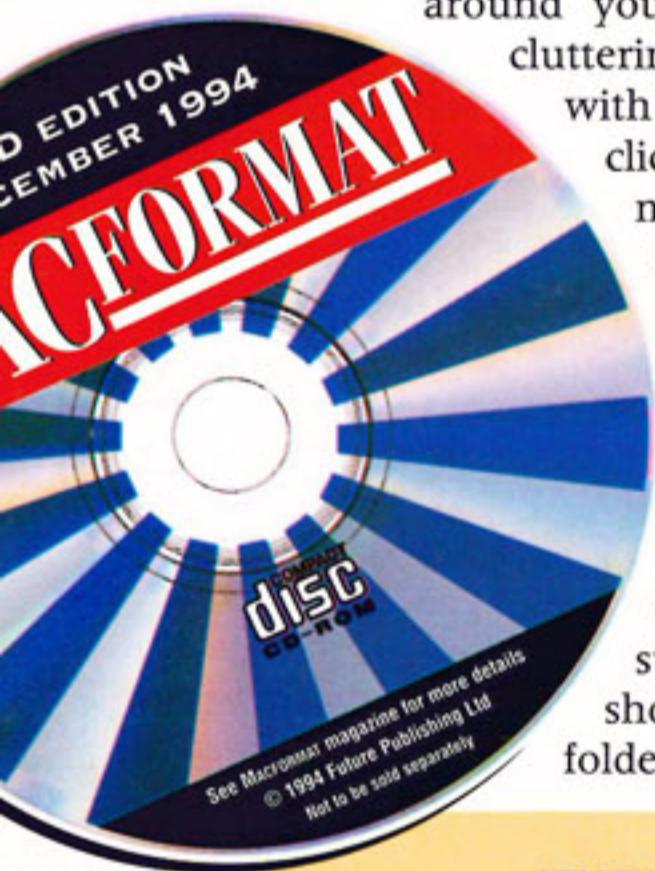
the Apple menu in a single action. Of course, the shareware program *BeHierarchic* already does this, but *Now Menus* also enables you to access directly the features of the Chooser and certain Control Panels. For instance, to change printers, pull down the Apple menu to the Chooser, and a sub-menu pops up. From this sub-menu you can select a printer or a shared volume on a network.

Now QuickFiler

A utility with an identity crisis, *QuickFiler* offers a disparate array of options. There is a find facility that's marginally better than Apple's built-in one, plus an option to move files around your hard disk.

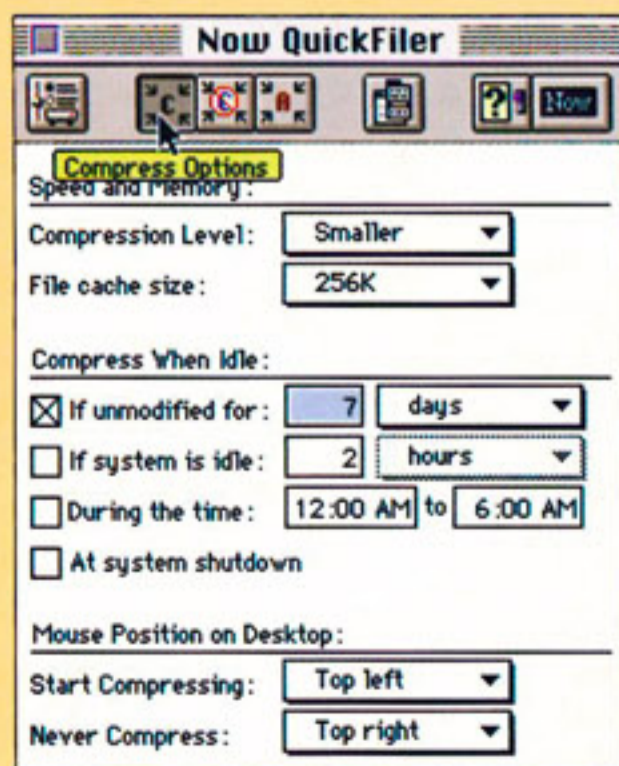
But hidden away without much hype is a truly great compression feature. You can compress files to save disk space and create self-extracting archives – just like the ones on our cover floppy disks.

There's also on-the-fly compression that automatically compresses and decompresses files in the background – you don't even know it's happening. This gives you more storage space on your hard disk, although there is a trade-off

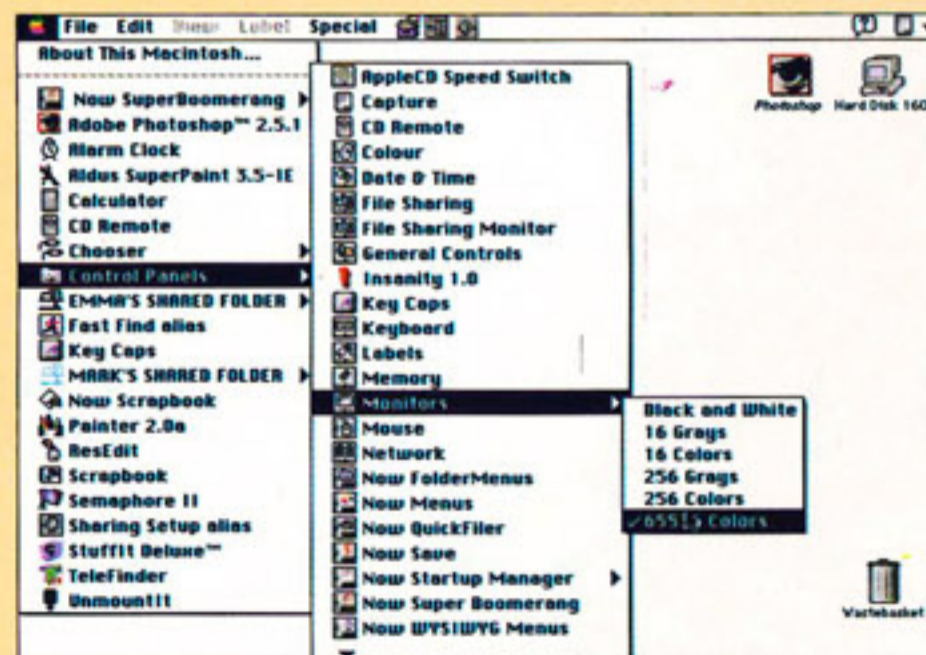

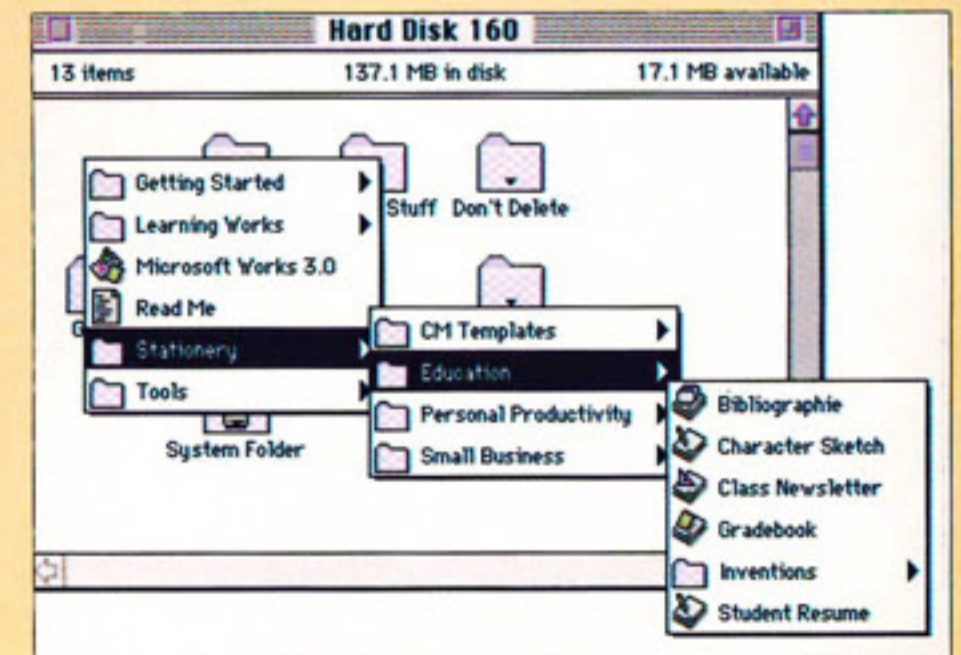

tures, sounds and pages of text.

Now *Scrapbook* improves this situation. The screen is split, with the pasted data on the right-hand side, and the names of items on the left. This means you can quickly see the names of your items. And even if you have hundreds of items in your Scrapbook, there's a find function to zap you to it. If you use the Scrapbook a lot, then this utility will be a real help.

Now Startup Manager

Startup Manager manages your, erm... startup. In particular, you can select which Control Panels and Extensions you want to load at startup. You can create different setups and save these for later use.

This is handy if you know that the odd Extension clashes with a certain application, or if you want to create a setup that uses a minimum number of Extensions to save memory. I found it useful to turn off all of the Extensions except the ones that drive my CD-ROM – this increased the Mac's speed no end.

Startup Manager has another trick up its digital sleeve. It monitors the start up process and lets you know if there's a conflict and what the solution is. This utility gives you most of the features of *Conflict Catcher*, which costs as much as the whole of this package.

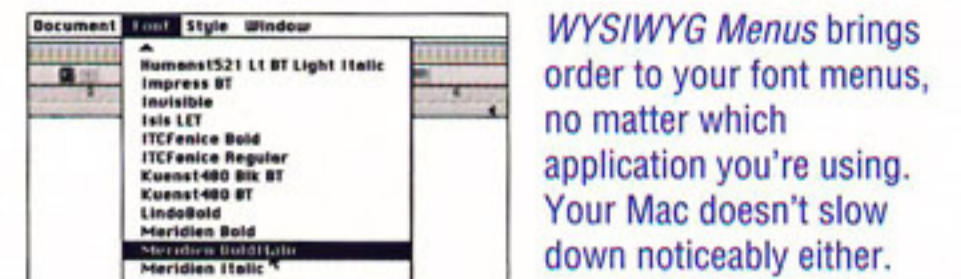
Now Super Boomerang

This has long been a popular Mac utility, but it's beginning to look a little redundant. This program alters the Open command in the File menu to give you direct access to recently used files and folders. Sound familiar? Well it should, because most of this program's features can also be found in *Now Menus* (not to mention System 7.5).

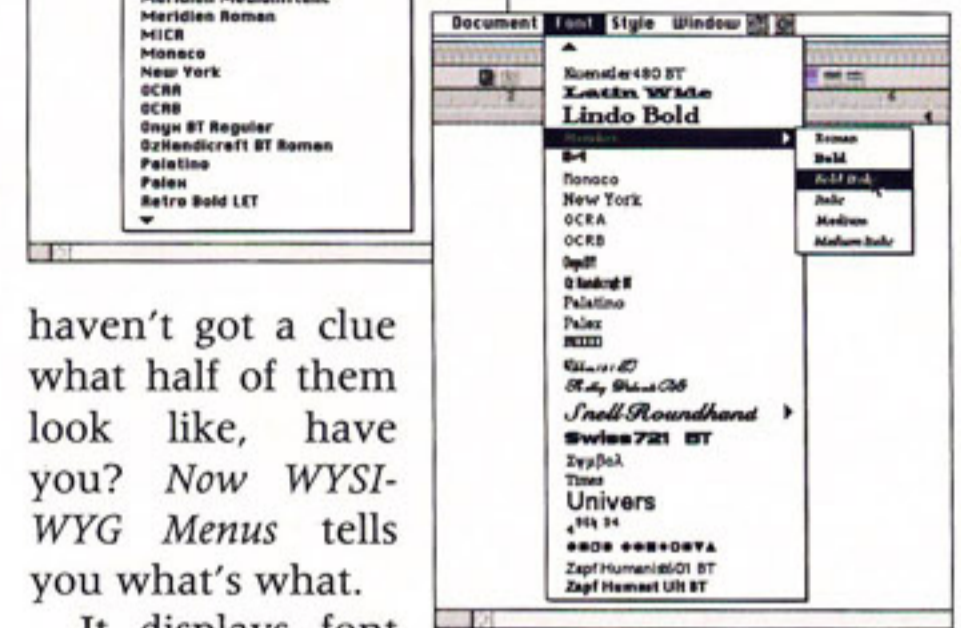
I assume it's been included for those people who don't want all of the features of *Now Menus*, but would like access to recent items. It does a few extra things, but for most people the choice between the two utilities would be an either/or decision.

Now WYSIWYG Menus

What you see is what you get, except in the case of font menus. With those you get a huge long list of font names – but let's face it, you

haven't got a clue what half of them look like, have you? *Now WYSIWYG Menus* tells you what's what.

It displays font names in their own font, thus reminding you what they look like. Many fonts consist not only of the basic typeface, but italic, bold and extended variations, making your font menu 12 feet long. This utility gives each font a single mention in the menu, with a sub-menu for the different varieties.

The only drawback is that it makes some font names difficult to read, or even impossible in the case of graphic fonts such as Zapf Dingbats, where all you get is a load of weird symbolic gibberish.

Now Save

In years gone by I used to use my software without any protection at all in the hope that everything would be all right. It was my Mac's responsibility to see that it didn't crash. In the virally aware '90s, *Now Save* is the Mac equivalent of a condom. (And with all its exciting options and features, it must be the super lubricated ribbed variety...)

What it does is automatically save your work at set intervals, say every five minutes. You can choose whether to be warned about saving or whether it just goes ahead and does it quietly in the background.

There are occasions when you don't want to save, such as when you are fiddling around with *ResEdit*. To cope with this, you can make any application exempt from its effects. You can also tell *Now Save* not to affect files with certain letters in their name, for instance, the word 'stationery'.

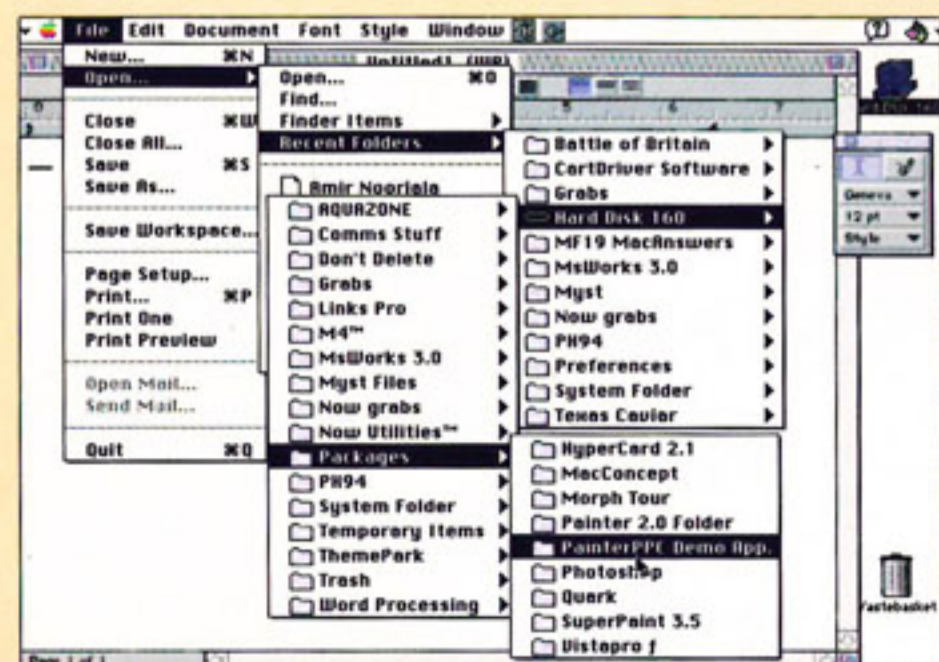
Now Scrapbook

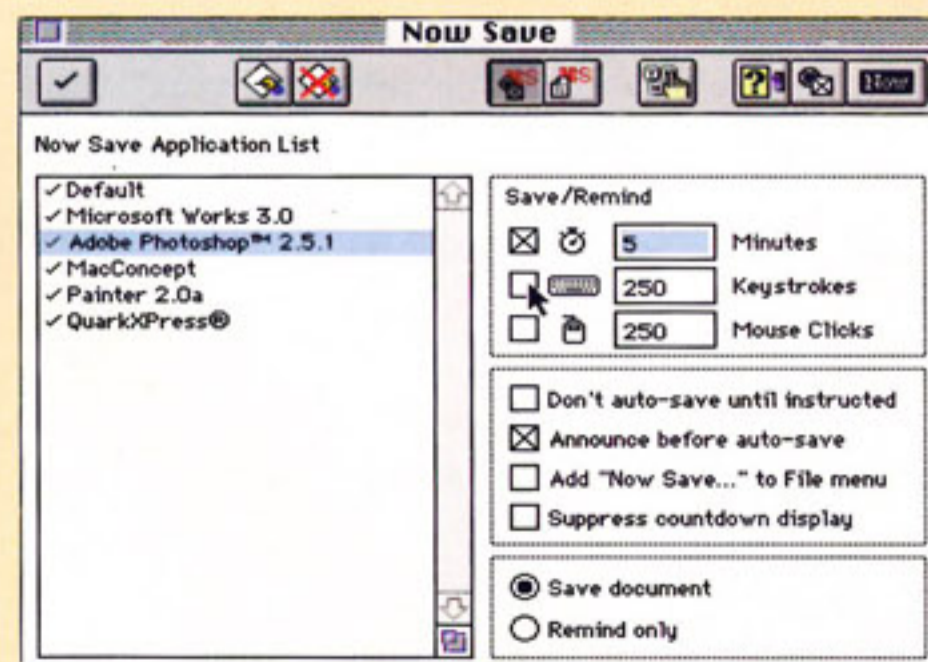

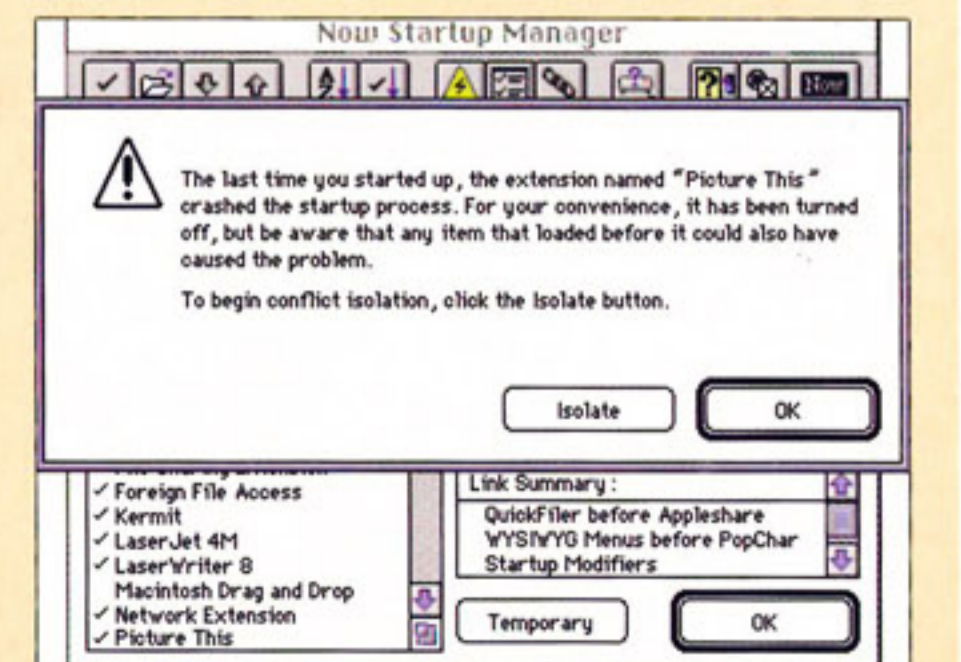

Buying advice

Whether you're buying by mail or in person, here are some sensible precautions to bear in mind. Note that everything here applies to buying from a business; most of it does *not* apply to buying from a private seller in MACFORMAT's reader ads pages.

Always be absolutely clear about what is included in the price - postage and packing? Any necessary cables, etc? VAT? (By law, an advert must say *explicitly* if VAT is not included; if it doesn't, VAT *is* included. But this could be in the small print - so read it all!) If you're buying in person, check that everything is there and it all works properly before you leave the shop. If you're buying by mail, ring the supplier first to confirm the price and availability, and ask what your options will be if there should be any problem. Find out when you can realistically expect delivery. Always keep all receipts and make records of all correspondence, whether it's by mail or by phone.

How to protect yourself

If you are buying goods of more than £100 in total value, always try to use a credit card. That way, in the unlikely event of anything going wrong, you will be legally entitled to claim against the credit card company as well as the

seller, even if the seller has gone bust. You may also get extra insurance - check with your credit card company.

If you're not paying by credit card, pay by cheque. Never send cash through the mail - it is impossible to trace if it gets lost, you can't stop payment if you need to, and even if you have proof of posting you can't prove how much you sent.

Keep records. If you are paying by credit card keep a note of the exact time of the order and ask for an order number. If you are paying by cheque make sure you fill in the details of date, amount and payee's exact name in the stub - and keep it!

When a mail order arrives

Check everything carefully. If anything is missing, contact the supplier immediately. If something doesn't work, make obvious checks (the fuse, etc), but don't try to repair it. If there is anything you're not happy with, don't use it - if you do, you could be deemed to have accepted it.

If there's a problem

Whether you bought it by mail or in a shop, the law says a product must be:

1. 'of merchantable quality' (that is, broadly speaking, it must work),
2. 'as described' (in the advert or in person - and this one criterion also applies when you're buying from a private seller, not a business), and
3. fit for the purpose for which it was sold or for the purpose you specified when you ordered it.

If it fails to meet any or all of these criteria, then you are entitled to return the goods for a refund, receive compensation for all or part of the value, or get a replacement or free repair, depending on the seriousness of the defect. These are the 'statutory rights' that adverts always say are 'not affected' by any extra guarantees. The supplier cannot change or deny these rights.

If you're not happy about something, always contact the supplier first and politely explain your problem. Most problems are sorted out at this stage with no fuss. If not, put your complaint in writing and send it to the manager or owner - ask for the correct name and job title. Give the supplier a reasonable time to reply - say ten days or so.

If the problem is still not resolved, you may need to take some sort of legal action to enforce your rights. This need not cost you a lot of money. You should seek advice from a solicitor (ask about the free advice scheme) or from one of the following organisations (check in your local telephone directory):

- Citizen's Advice Bureau,
- Trading Standards Office (listed under your local council),
- Office of Fair Trading, or
- County Court (ask about the 'small claims procedure').

The Mac is dead!

Apple has got it wrong and IBM is moving in for the kill, says MACFORMAT reader Benjamin Muller...

IBM stands for 'Infinitely Better Mind', and APPLE stands for 'Awkward, Probably Pathologically Limited Evolution'. I am a sworn fan of the Mac since its appearance ten years ago, but *the Mac is dead!* The great revolution started and ended back in the Mac 128. The only innovation from Apple during ten years was putting more power in the Macs, and the only major System evolution was MultiFinder (switcher, actually). Software houses were the real revolutionaries and they were putting in more innovations between versions 1.0 and 2.0 than Apple in its entire System and hardware for all those years. Yet for every little cosmetic change, Apple charged prices out of all proportion, and the only reason it could get away with it was that there was no alternative (unlike in the PC market).

IBM made a very clever calculation in the last few years. Its logic goes like this: the Mac has reached its pinnacle; DOS is dead; Windows is a pale cosmetic imitation of the Mac. What lies in the future? Something built on the best of what is available. IBM did not want to team up with Microsoft, because it had learned its lesson after MS-DOS. So it decided to offer a so-called 'salvation' for Apple, but its real intention was to lure Mac faithfuls to a new Mac-like system *ultimately controlled by IBM*.

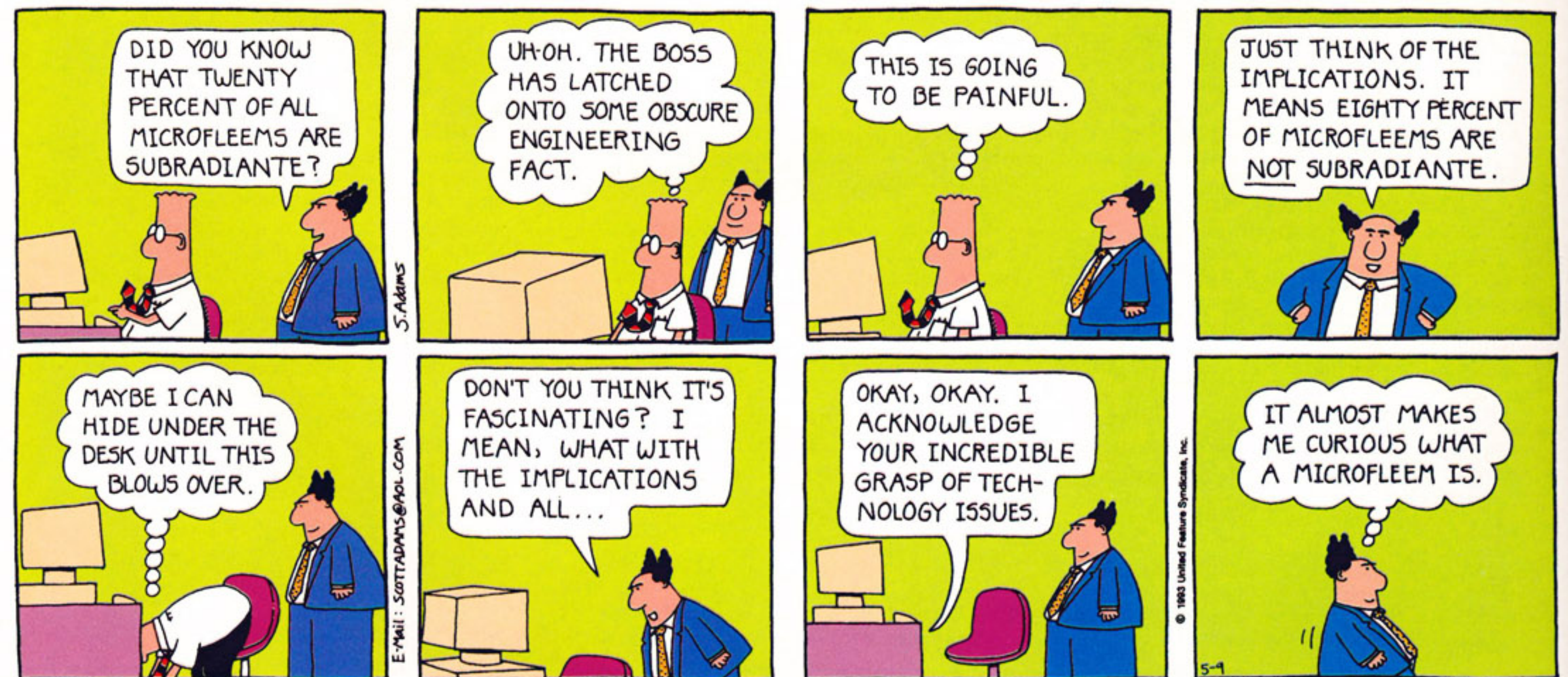
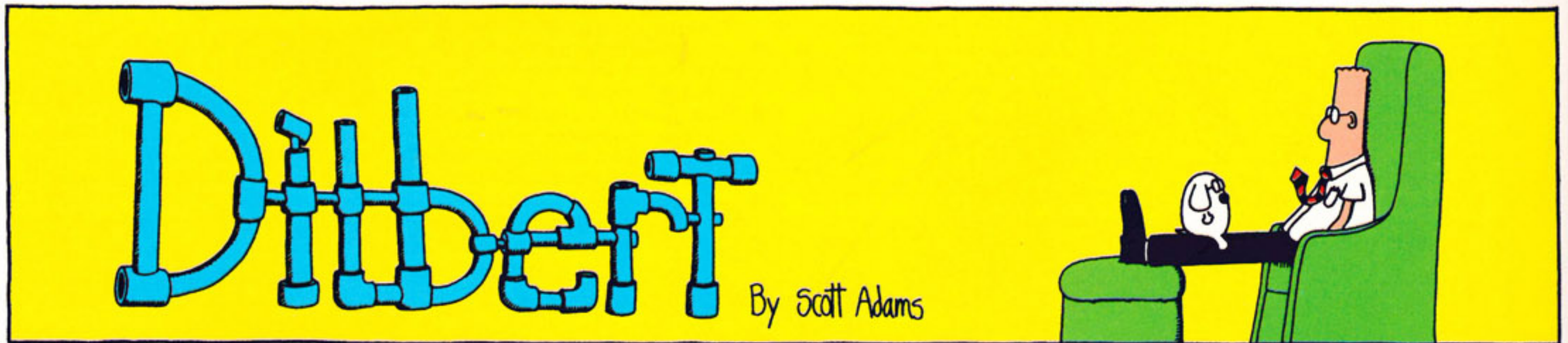
In this, IBM has succeeded brilliantly. Apple gave it and Motorola all its graphic interface know-how. And IBM is coming out with PReP (PowerPC Reference Platform, based on an Apple philosophy of united platforms for all developers), a platform that is surely going to replace the ageing Mac, DOS and Windows plat-

form. That's why most developers are not committing themselves to the Mac version of PowerPC. Their reasoning is as follows: our current programs run at Quadra speeds on real Macs or on PowerMacs under emulation. If we have to rewrite them in PowerPC 'native' forms, we will gain much more by doing so for PReP. In the first place, the market is likely to be larger. Second, there is no gain in power or graphics by using the Apple format (unlike before, when developers had to compare QuickDraw to Windows). Third, Apple is going to be obliged to conform to PReP in the near future anyway, if it wants to survive in the emerging PowerPC market. Yet again, IBM is going to rule the roost.
